KO-REDS TRY FLANKING MOVEMENT

12 Farm Boys To Scramble For 6 Heifers

Twelve qualified 4-H club boys and Future Farmers will scramble for six registered Jersey heifers on the second night of the Ranger Jaycee rodeo, Thursday, July 20.

Beverly Dudley, Jaycee committeeman, said that the boys would be picked on their qualifications for raising the stock.

Five of the calves were purchased by Ranger businessmen; the sixth calf is the produce of the calf that Floyd Woods won in last year's scramble.

Because of the value of the calves, the boys will scramble for pigs, marked by numbers. The pigs are greased.

On the third night of the rodeo, the boys that did not win calves the second night and additional qualified farm boys will scramble for six registered Duroc pigs.

US Tankman Uses Bazooka

With U. S. Eighth Army At The Front, Korea, July 13 (UP)—An American tankman fired his cannon repeatedly at a group of heavier, more powerfully gunned North Korean tanks yesterday, but the shells just bounced off them.

The tankman, whose name must be withheld, jumped out of his tank, grabbed a bazooka from an infantryman and in a few seconds knocked out two tanks with point-blank fire at vulnerable spots.

A moment later, he was killed by North Korean machinegun fire.

MacArthur Reports Of 500 Casualties; Tells Other Losses

US Troops Praised For Heroic Holding Action By General Mac

TOKYO, Friday, July 14 (UP)—Columns of Communist tanks struck out for the mountain passes of Central Korea today in a flanking drive designed to slice in behind the American forces along the Kum river defense line before Taejon.

The North Korean push around the East flank of the Americans was reported by field dispatches and Gen. Douglas MacArthur's midnight communique.

Enemy enveloping forces are attempting to negotiate the Tabek mountain passes in an attempt to break through between Taegu and Taejon," MacArthur reported.

Such a breakthrough would cut the arterial transport lines between the Americans digging in along the Kum river and the big American entry port of Pusan on the Southeast coast.

U. S. Superforts struck the most powerful air blow of the Korean war. Nearly 50 of them showered 500 tons of bombs on an unidentified North Korean target.

Dirty weather in the battle area cut into the round-the-clock assault by American and Australian fighters on the Korean forces directly behind the lines.

MacArthur reported in a special statement that the United States had suffered fewer than 500 casualties so far in the war. They included 42 killed, 190 wounded and 256 missing. Many of the later were expected to turn up sooner or later.

"American ground units in Korea are fighting one of the most skillful and heroic holding actions in history," MacArthur said.

The regular midnight communique, trailing well behind field reports, said American and South Korean forces "continued to withdraw before numerically superior forces to take up defenses behind prepared positions and natural barriers."

The main movement to which it referred was the U. S. withdrawal to the South bank of the Kum, a dozen miles North of Taejon.

It was after the positions in the U. S. sector were stabilized along the Kum that front reports said Communist troops, armor and artillery were reported wheeling Eastward to join the big scale flanking maneuver.

MacArthur reported that two Communist divisions, the fifth and 15th, were mauling South Korean forces around Chungju, 52 miles Northeast of Taejon. The South Koreans were falling back in the general area to the East of the U. S. positions.

Reinforcements believed to be Korean veterans from Manchuria are reported in Seoul," MacArthur reported.

Condition Unchanged

The condition of Dr. Edward Blackwell of Gorman, who has been seriously ill for some time, is reported to be unchanged.

Master Sergeant First Hero

WITH THE U. S. EIGHTH ARMY AT THE FRONT, July 13 (UP)—A slightly built, 24-year-old master sergeant from Texas became the first Korean war candidate for the silver star today by destroying two Communist tanks with a bazooka.

Ickes Lashes Gen. MacArthur As Unready

WASHINGTON, July 13 (UP)—Former Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes said today that Gen. Douglas MacArthur "was caught flatfooted in Korea."

Ickes assailed the United Nations commander in an article—"MacArthur The Unready"—published in the current issue of the New Republic Magazine.

He said President Truman's decision to intervene was "superb," but added:

"Thanks to General MacArthur, South Korea was ill-prepared to defend itself.

"All American troops, except a small group of drillmasters, had been withdrawn, leaving an inadequate army of South Koreans, without tanks, without heavy artillery, and with only a few airplanes, to repel the threatened invasion—by a well-trained, more numerous and more highly-equipped army, which was awaiting the proper time to overrun the border."

Ickes recalled that on Dec. 7, 1941, MacArthur "was caught off guard in the Philippine Islands despite the warning of the disaster at Pearl Harbor."

24 Pilots Enlist For Korea Duty

LONG BEACH, Calif., July 13 (UP)—An entire squadron of 24 Navy reserve fighter pilots volunteered for active duty as a unit because "we long ago decided that we would stick together," their commander said today.

It was as simple as that, said Lieut. Commander Collin Oveland, 32-year-old leader of the reserve fighter squadron 781 based at Los Alamitos Naval Air Station here.

"We talked about it over beers many times," said Oveland, handsome auto salesman from San Diego, Calif. "We long ago decided that we would stick together."

Every one of the pilots in the squadron and six ground officers volunteered for carrier duty. In addition, 35 of the group's 70 enlisted men also volunteered.

Finders Not Keepers, Detroit Police Rule

DETROIT, (UP)—Police resurrected an ancient law to prove that finders are not keepers.

Robert G. Thompson, 22, was arrested for failing to report to police when he found \$515 in a wallet. An anonymous tip to the owner, Raymond F. Willis, led to Thompson's arrest.

Officers said a state law not used for years requires finders to report lost property to two public offices within two days.



Day Announces For Re-election To Tax Office

Neil Day, incumbent tax assessor and collector, has made the following statement of his qualifications:

"In announcing my candidacy for re-election to the office of Tax Assessor and Collector, I do so with the knowledge that this is one of the most important offices in Eastland County.

"This office has the responsibility of assessing and collecting your taxes and in this manner secures the necessary money for the operation of your County Government.

For those of you who do not know me personally, I was born and reared in Eastland county. I am 43 years of age, married the former Miss Jane Angstadt, and am a member of the First Christian Church in Eastland, father of 4 girls and 2 boys, served with the U. S. Navy in World War II. I am a member of the American Legion Post No. 70 and V. F. W. Post No. 4136.

Since I have been your tax assessor and collector, expenses and costs of government have increased considerably, but your county tax rate of 60c per hundred dollar value has been maintained and this rate compares with the adjoining counties as follows: Earth county 74c; Palo Pinto county 95c; Callahan county 80c; Stephens county \$1.10; Brown county \$1.00; and Comanche county .85c.

While serving as your tax assessor and collector the tax valuation of Eastland county has been raised from approximately nineteen million to twenty-four million dollars. This has been accomplished by raising value on property carried too low and lowering value on property carried too high, and by placing value on new improvements of old property.

I became your tax assessor and collector about one year and three months after Eastland county had entered into a contract with Horace Walker to collect delinquent taxes. At the time this contract was made I was with the U. S. Naval Amphibious Forces near the Island of Java in the South Pacific.

It has been my desire to assist the tax payers with their problems in every way possible and I am sure that everyone realizes that the period that I have served as your tax assessor and collector

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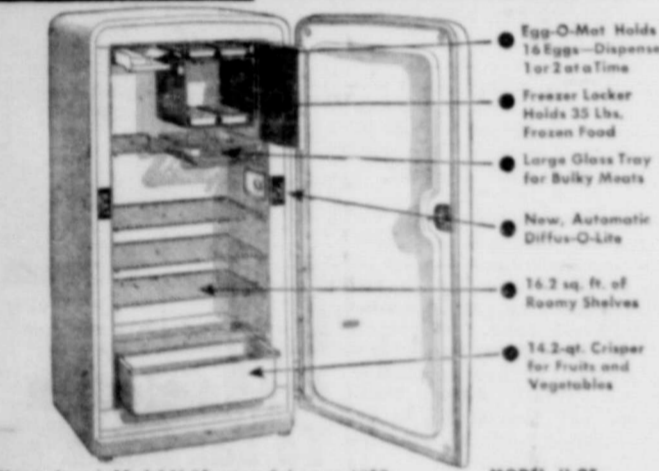

Force In Korea Gets Praise; Get Armor-Piercing Rockets

By Charles Corddry Press Aviation Writer AMERICAN AIR BASE, July 13—New types of armor-piercing rockets will be added to the armament of American planes in the Korean war. Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, U. S. Air Force Chief of Staff, disclosed this today in an exclusive interview with the United Press after he made a flying trip to several American Air Bases in Korea and Japan.

Vandenberg's visit gave an obvious lift to pilots and ground crews, especially at the advanced Korean base where F-51 Mustangs are being operated on what appears a shoestring basis. This correspondent accompanied Vandenberg, Maj. Gen. Earle E. Partridge, commander of the Fifth Air Force, and other high Air Force officers on their flight in a C-47 transport.

Vandenberg closely questioned pilots on the combat effectiveness of their F-50 jet shooting star fighters and found them enthusiastic in their praise of the plane. The airman said the shooting stars were able both to give punishment and to take it. Some of the difficulties will be overcome, Vandenberg said, with the arrival of new equipment.

This will include electronic aids of all kinds and "new discoveries in the rocket field". He said these are new types of armor-piercing rockets and are on their way from the United States.

Vandenberg said fighter forays have had a great deal to do with the relatively slow progress of the North Koreans in the last few days.

He quoted Lt. Gen. Walton L. Walker, commander of the Eighth Army, as saying that the Reds would have been much farther along had it not been for the Air Force operations.

As for the F-50, Vandenberg said the pilots have a feeling of security in it because of its demonstrated ability to absorb battle damage and act as a stable platform for rockets and guns.

"It is very pleasant to know that we have weapons that can turn rapidly to the offensive against attack from the air if there should be one," Vandenberg said.

Mexico Doesn't Plan Recognize Franco Spain

MEXICO CITY, July 13 (UP)—The foreign ministry reaffirmed today that Mexico does not plan to recognize the government of Franco Spain.

"The government of Mexico has fixed its position on the regime of Gen. Francisco Franco in Spain and ratifies that there will be no resumption of relations with that country," acting Foreign Minister Manuel Tello said.

Reports to the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission indicate increased water hazards in Texas from the common use of rubber life rafts.

According to the executive secretary several near tragedies have been averted because the standard collapsible rafts, as well as ordinary automobile and truck inner tubes became deflated in deep water.

The Texas situation was pointed up by the recent news report from Grand Junction, Colorado, about two navy officers drowning in Cottonwood Lake when their rubber raft collapsed far from shore.

Safety experts have noted that most persons venturing into deep water on inflated automobile tires cannot swim and thus are helpless when the makeshift preserver loses its buoyancy. The commercial variety of rubberized raft is generally considered sink proof since they have separated air compartments. If one compartment becomes deflated, others usually keep it afloat.

A Stephenville man paid a stiff fine for pursuing the old sport of catching fish with his hands. Arrested by Warden D. W. Bowers of San Saba, the man was assessed \$63 covering fine and costs for grabbing.

In his report covering the infraction which occurred in the Colorado River, Bowers said the man "had caught several catfish under rocks with his bare hands."

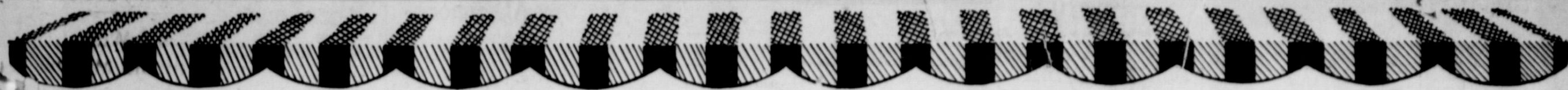

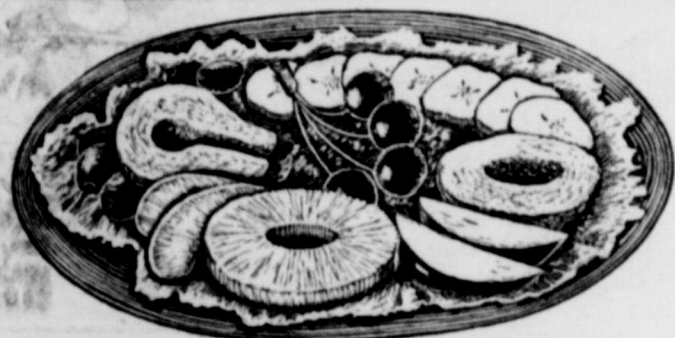

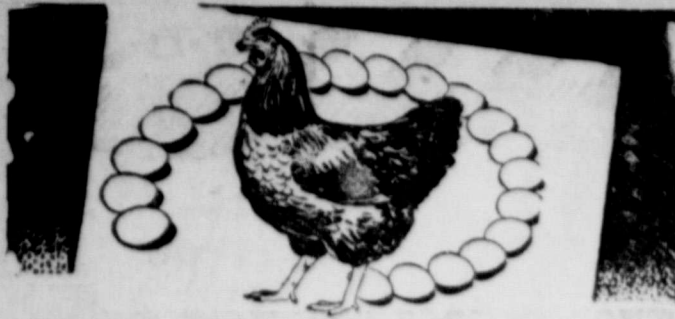
