#### Eastland Man Named Head Of Cisco Battery

### TWO ACE NEWSPAPERMEN BARRED FROM REPORTING KOREAN TRUTH

TOKYO, July 15 (UP)—Peter Kalischer of the United Press and Tom Lambert of the Associated Press have been forbidden by public information officers at Supreme headquarters to return to the Korean front.

Both correspondents had flown back here to rest up from covering the opening phases of the Korean war. They were preparing to return to the front today when Col. M. P. Echols, press relations officer at headquarters, informed them they would not be permitted to go.

Echols said he did not like the dispatches Kalischer wrote about the series of military reverses the United States has suffered in Korea. He said they "made the Army

look bad" and "gave aid and comfort to the enemy."

Echols said the facts reported in Kalischer's dispatches were correct but he did not like the way in which they were written. Earnest Hoherecht, U. P. manager for Japan, told Echols he would carry a retraction of any dispatch which the Army could prove was incorrect.

He added that the United Press intended to report defeats when there were defeats and would be glad to report victories when there were victories. Echols replied that he conceded the fact that front line reporters knew the situation on the battle field best.

The Associated Press Tokyo bureau said they were informed by

Echols that Lambert, too, was barred from Korea for writing dispatches that "gave aid and comfort to the enemy." The A. P. said Echols did not question the factual accuracy of Lambert's dispatches.

Kalischer was trapped behind the enemy lines in Korea with a unit of American troops for two and a half days. The Korean Communist radio at Pyongyang broadcast a false report that he had been captured. When he made his way back to the American lines, he wrote a frank and factual dispatch about his experiences and conditions at the front.

### Marine Corps Ask Women To Enlist Today

WASHINGTON, July 15 (UP)—The Marine Corps became the first of the armed forces today to ask its women veterans to volunteer for extended active duty so leathernecks can be released for combat.

It asked for women both in reserve and non-reserve status.

The initial quota will be for an unnamed but limited number of enlisted women in all ranks and a limited number of Lieutenants and Captains.

They would serve in the United States. The first contingent returning to duty East of the Mississippi will go to Camp Lejeune, N. C. Those West of the Mississippi will be assigned to duty at San Francisco and Camp Pendleton, Cal.

Meanwhile, women are showing up by the scores at enlistment centers. But all most of them get, if they are not nurses, is a polite "no thank you."

The Defense department says, for the time being anyway, that it needs very few women volunteers—except for the nurses' corps, medical specialists, and now the limited call for women ex-marines.

### Air, Army Chiefs Return To Make Report On Needs To Defeat Korea

WASHINGTON, July 15 (UP)

—Air and Army Chiefs of Staff returned today from Gen. Douglas MacArthur to tell President Truman how many billions of dollars and thousands of men are needed to beat back the Communists in Korea.

Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, air force and Gen. Lawton J. Collins, Army, flew back from Tokyo at 8:30 a.m. EDT.

Officials said the National defense department would ask budget bureau and White House approval for an emergency appropriation up to \$5,000,000,000. Others said that figure was too high.

Assistant defense secretary W. J. McNeill, however, had this to say:

"We haven't got the estimates prepared. We will not be in shape to prepare them for the next 10 days or two weeks. I am not in shape even to give my boss an estimate until we are able to determine what is needed."

A land, air and sea task force of 100,000 men and up appeared today to be a reasonable expectation. At least a limited call-up of armed service reserves seemed inevitable. There were unconfirmed reports that Truman would call up part of the National Guard.

Defense officials said there was no National Guard call planned as of today. That might mean merely that it would not come until next week.

Rumors of industrial mobilization and war time controls tended to wile some under insistence of White House intimates that the President is again both—at least for now.

Within the week he has told White House callers he did not believe such would be necessary. Truman hopes the emergency will be contained within Korea and that war time restrictions can be avoided. His intelligence reports do not detect indications that Communist aggression is about to break out elsewhere.

But the President has been saying in language spiced with profanity that he is disgusted with hoarders, especially food and auto

tire buyers. An intimate quoted him today like this:

"Sillest thing I ever heard of. The tire and sugar markets are glutted. Why would they hoard? The country is overflowing with food right now."

But the President also said no sound judgment could be made of the extent of the emergency and the burden upon the national economy until we actually begin to fight back in Korea. If the land is great enough, restrictions will be sought. A powerful brake against an administration request for controls is labor's opposition to being frozen in jobs or wages.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D. Tex., told questioners he believes a call up of reserves will begin next week. Officials confirmed reports that Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson wanted to ask budget bureau okay for an emergency appropriation of \$5,000,000,000 to \$8,000,000,000.

The additional funds would pay for expansion of the Army, Navy and Air Force partly for action in Korea and as a general hedge against world conditions. Return of nine aircraft carriers to active service was likely at once.

The emergency appropriation would hike 1951 fiscal year spending close to \$50,000,000,000. It would raise defense costs to about \$20,000,000,000.

The home front was reacting to bad news from Korea like a besting horse. Senate Democratic Leader Scott W. Lucas, Ill., demanded censorship.

"We have got to have legislative censorship to avoid legislative censorship," Lucas told the Senate yesterday. "We have got to have it and we have got to have it soon."

One newspaper, the Chicago Sun-Times, decided today to impose voluntary censorship upon itself. The Sun-Times announced that for the duration it would not report such things as troop departures or names, nature of destination of transports.

The only exception will be official announcements. It urged other newspapers to take such action also to safeguard the lives of "these Americans in present or potential danger."

### KO-RED FORCES GAIN HALF OF DEFENSE LINE

TOKYO, Sunday, July 16, (UP)—Outnumbered U. S. troops gave up the Western half of their shattered Kum river defense line today, after a 15-mile-long Communist beachhead outflanked it, and fell back on embattled Taejon.

Late dispatches from Korea said some light vehicles had been put across the Kum into the Communist beachhead, but no tanks apparently had got across. Airmen destroyed at least four and possibly as many as 14 tanks which the North Koreans were trying to float over in barges.

The American were reported standing fast under furious shelling in the sector due north of Taejon. But they were outflanked by the bulging beachhead on their left, where other U. S. forces were dropping back through the hills and valleys onto Taejon.

Both the field dispatches and MacArthur's communique reported further losses by the South Koreans along the right flank of the U. S. sector.

Thus the yielding defenses on either side set up the former provision capital, already abandoned by the Republican government, for an assault from two directions.

A U. S. field artillery position was overrun by the Communist fan-out from the beachhead around Konju, 19 miles Northwest of Taejon, MacArthur disclosed. He said "no further information was disclosed" regarding the overrun position.

Moral and combat efficiency remained excellent despite necessary withdrawals and holding actions," his communique said.

He credited supporting airmen with giving "splendid help" in inflicting heavy losses on Communist concentrations and attempted crossings.

South Korean troops made limited withdrawals to higher ground in the Chongju-Koesan area Northeast of Taejon, while North Korean forces continued a drive Southeastward along the Tanyang Hongju axis.

Thousands of North Koreans poured into a growing beachhead less than 20 miles West and Northwest of Taejon. Other Communist spearheads probed toward the key defense bastion from the Northeast.

American advanced headquarters in Korea reported that the enemy was setting up a pincers drive aimed at trapping the whole U. S. force in the Taejon area. It was expected to begin within 24 hours.

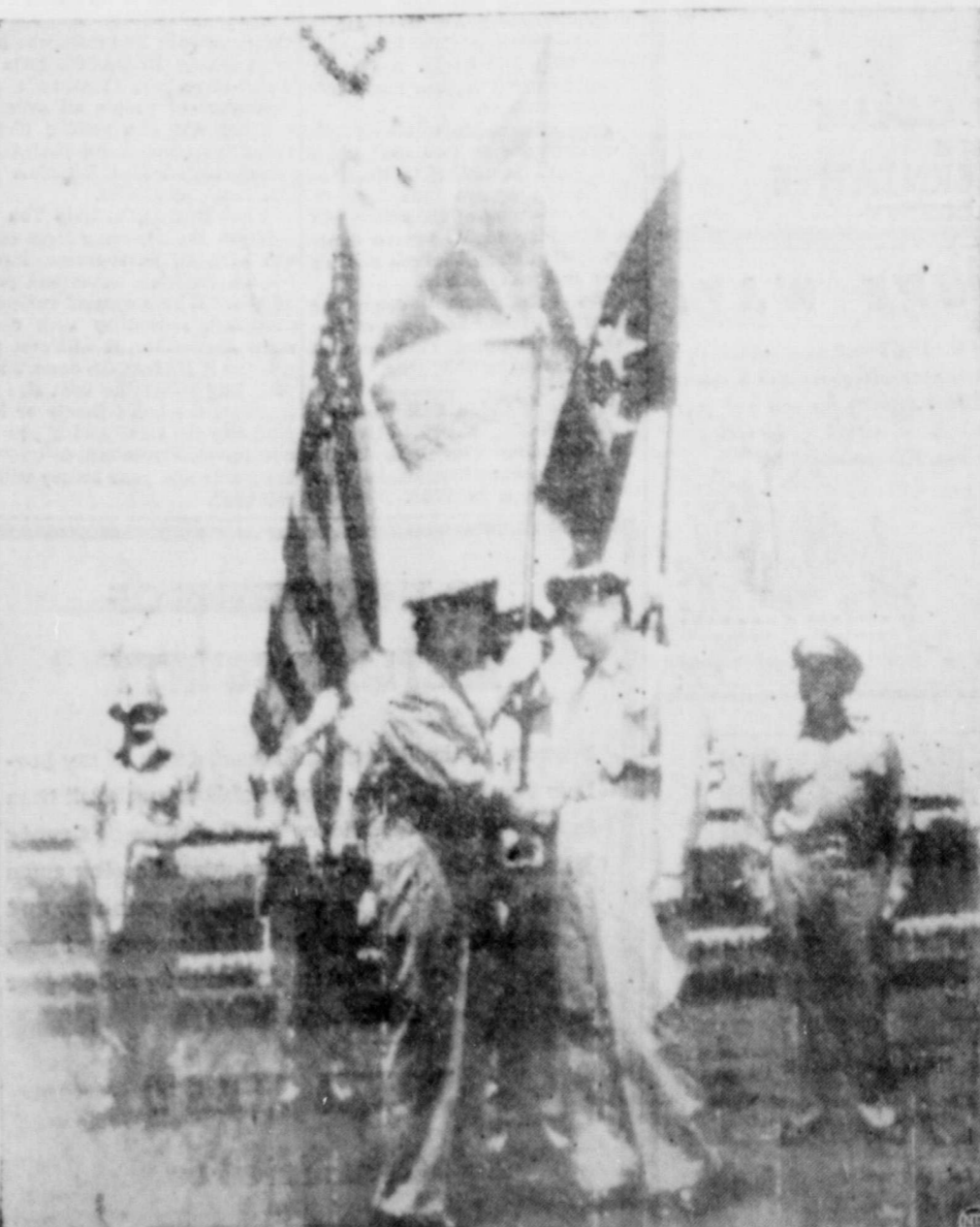

The trees are preaching! Let's listen! What is that twisted tree saying to you and to me? What is the second and smaller tree telling you of life, as it twists about the other? "Only God can make a tree"; but even God's purpose to make a strong and straight tree sometimes fails. Why did not this tree grow tall and upright and sturdy? Why ill-formed and crooked and misshapen?

And so are some of us. Why do not women and men grow upward toward God and the good? Why have lives become twisted and gnarled and unattractive? Has the tree a lesson for us here? Most twisted trees were bent when they were young; some storm or some accident worked its evil will upon them. They were intended to grow straight and strong and beautiful; the seed was good, the soil was right; but they did not get the right start. When they were young some sinister influence left its mark upon them for all the years; they have grown in twisted shape because some force shaped them that way. How can we protect young human life from such twisting and scarring? The good heritage is not enough; the comfortable home is not enough; unless we elders see that this fine young life gets its chance to grow straight and true.

The neglected child of the street or of the lane gets an early twist; the storm of human wickedness and evil is too great for the young life to take; he is subjected too early to the sights and sounds of the women and men who have wrecked themselves.

The pampered child of the foolish parent who is too busy or too careless to guide the developing spirit gets twisted too soon. There are rules that must be learned if one is to play the game of life successfully; there are good habits that must be formed under patient discipline and by good example.

The frightened child who has been compelled to listen to quarreling and scolding elders gets an unhappy fear and disrespect for human contact. He has a right to live in an atmosphere of patient good will and of forbearance, but he is misdirected by selfish and unkind words and deeds.

The sour and the surly children of loveless homes and communities bear the marks of misdirection forever; every child has need of love and kindness and justice and patient understanding; these make the healthful air of human development.

Prayer and reverence for God and the good, loving fellowship in ways of integrity and of helpfulness make the right soil for straight-growing persons. As the twig is bent, so grows the tree.

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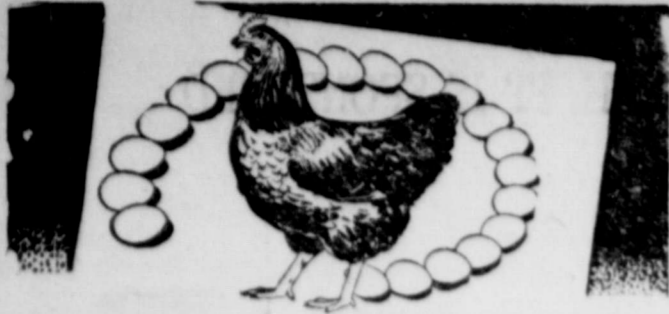
