KOREDS THREATEN TAEGU; BREACHING NO RETREAT POINT

U. S. Drive Goes Eleven Miles More

TOKYO, Wednesday, August 8 (UP)—An American offensive that has driven 11 miles along the Korean south coast in two days removed any immediate threat to the port of Pusan today. But a perilous situation developed to the north where the Communists breached the Nakdong river defense line and began pouring troops through Taegu. South Korean emergency capital, was in danger. Reports from Korea said some 3,000 Communist troops had crossed the Nakdong through gaps in the American line northwest and southwest of Taegu. Lt. Gen. Walton Walker, commander of ground forces in Korea, sent to the Nakdong front fresh units of American troops who arrived only recently from the United States.



AMERICANS BEGIN OFFENSIVE—Some 15,000 Marines and other troops in the first major American offensive (1) West of Masan toward Chinju (2) encountered fierce opposition. To the North, units of the 34th and 19th regimental combat teams fought to contain the Red beachhead across the Nakdong River near Pungong-ri (3). Aim of this Red thrust is to cut vital U. S.—U. N. supply line from Pusan (4) to Taegu (5). No major action was reported on Taegu front. On Northern line, held mostly by South Koreans, bitter fighting was reported around Andong and Yongdok, but battle lines remained unchanged. (NEA Telephoto).

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (UP)—President Truman today accepted the resignation of Carroll L. Wilson as general manager of the Atomic Energy Commission. Wilson will be succeeded temporarily by Carleton Beals who has served as deputy general manager for the past two years.

Dr. R. Collins Set To Teach County Teachers

ABILENE (Sp.)—Dr. Robert A. Collins, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Hardin-Simmons University will conduct an education workshop for teachers at Eastland High School Aug. 14-15. It will be for the preparation of the opening of school.

Dr. Collins, who teaches education at Hardin-Simmons, is rated high among men in the field of education. He is listed in Who's Who Among American Men in Education.

Dr. Collins, who received his Bachelor of Arts degree in education from Simmons College in 1912, received his Ph. D. degree from the University of Texas in 1935 and has been associated with Hardin-Simmons since that time.

Officer Says MacArthur To Win In Korea

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (UP)—A high ranking Army officer said today that Gen. Douglas MacArthur may be able to launch the eventual all-out counterpush in Korea without any additional U. S. divisions of ground troops.

HE SAID THAT MORE ARTILLERY AND TANK BATTALIONS PROBABLY WILL BE REQUIRED, BUT THAT THE MAIN NEED WILL BE FOR SUPPORTING AND SUPPLY UNITS. HE MENTIONED AS EXAMPLES CHEMICAL, ENGINEERING, MEDICAL, ORDNANCE, AND SIGNAL UNITS AS WELL AS VARIOUS TYPES OF QUARTERMASTER COMPANIES OR COMPANIES.

The American divisions and other outfits already fighting in Korea also must have individual soldiers as replacements for casualties. Major American outfits now in Korea are the Army's four infantry divisions—the First Cavalry, Second, Twenty-Fourth and Twenty-Fifth—and Fifth Regimental Combat Team, and the Third Provisional Brigade of the First Marine Division.

THESE U. S. TROOPS, ALONG WITH THE SOUTH KOREANS STILL IN ACTION, PROBABLY BRING UP THE NUMERICAL STRENGTH OF MACARTHUR'S FORCES TO NEAR THAT OF THE ESTIMATED 22,500 TO 100,000 NORTH KOREANS ON THE BATTLEFRONT.

A military spokesman said that this fact, along with the domination of the air and sea—could put MacArthur's forces on a fairly even terms with the North Korean Communists.

DOVER, England, Aug. 8 (UP)—Florence Chadwick, a dark horse in the 1950 English channel competition, broke the women's record today by swimming from the French coast in 13 hours and 23 minutes.

That was an hour and 18 minutes better than the time Gertrude Ederle made in her famous swim 24 years ago.

Seventeen-year-old Shirley May France of Somerset, Mass., the youngest swimmer ever to get within scoring distance, started 32 minutes after Miss Chadwick but soon fell behind and had several hours yet to go when her rival waded ashore. She abandoned her attempt.

PRESIDENT TO GET WARTIME PRICE GRIP

Senate Committee Gives Truman Almost Free Hand

WASHINGTON, August 8 (UP)—Speaker Sam Rayburn told President Truman today that he expects the House to pass legislation tomorrow giving the chief executive war powers over the national economy.

Rayburn reported at a White House conference of Congressional leaders with the President that the House will not vote on the bill today because several members have gone home to cast their ballots in primary elections.

But the speaker said the House may act today on amendments to the control legislation and that the House banking committee may come up with suggested additions.

The house, after four days of fruitless debate last week, was taking a new start on the economic control legislation. The Senate banking committee yesterday approved a bill to give Truman an almost free hand in imposing price-wage-rationing controls.

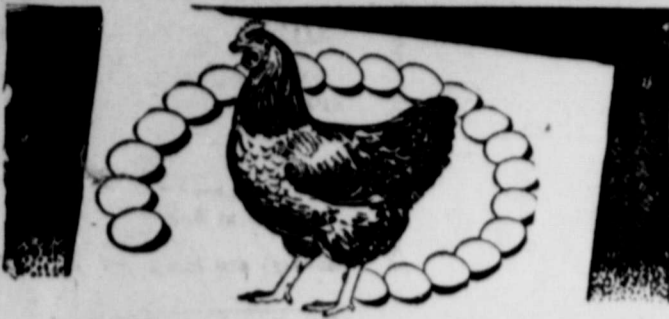
