

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

In World War II the division Momote airstrip fought one of the wildest battles in the Pacific. Against great odds the men of the 1st held the strip until the bulk of the division arrived. Approximately 4,500 Japs were killed in the battle for the Admiralties.

This 7th was one of the spearhead units invading Leyte in October, 1944, and for this action the division won a citation, with subordinate units also cited. It was the first American to enter Manila in the dash upon the Philippines' capital in January, 1945. 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
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
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
