## COMMIES THROW AMERICANS OFF OF OLD BALDY MOUNTAIN

TOKYO, Sunday, Sept. 10 (UP)—The swiftly changing tide of battle in the Korean war swung to the Allied side today, with the threat to Taegu eased and a solid defense line guarding the northeastern approaches to Pusan restored.

Only at the extreme ends of the 100 mile defense perimeter were the Americans and South Koreans meeting

The Communists threw the Americans off "Old Baldy" mountain near Masan twice Saturday and held it at sun-

But Red spearheads slashed through rugged mountains to within six miles of the Korean east coast today, threatreach the small room where they ening not only to cut off the Pohang airstrip but also t oencircle the entire South Korean third division.

The northeastern end of the Korean defense perimeter continued to be the most critical, with the Reds driving to exploit the wedge driven earlier this week between two South Korean divisions about halfway between Angang and Pohang. By late Saturday, the Reds had pushed eastward another four or five miles.





But Communism within the United States is quite a different thing. Here it appears as a threat to that great good that we call democracy; and worse still, it seeks to overthrow the Christian religion which has been the sure foundation of our freedom and our integrity. Toward Communism in Russia we may take an attitude of sympathy, hoping that a great nation will move on to higher ground, though we recognize the right of the Russian people to choose their own political and economic system. So we say to each other, "Hands off" of the internal affairs of other nations. But we ought to be mightily concerned with the appearance of Communism in the U. S. A. Perhaps here, however, we ought to be on our guard against the reality rather than the name. It is one thing to belong to the Communist Party, which looks us squarely in the face and announces its position. It is quite another and a more dangerous thing to be a Communist and not let it be known. It is the under cover Communism which threatens us most.

Communism sets itself up as a religion, denying God and the Christian Faith; it would close the doors of the Church. Do you support the Church, or could its doors close so far as you are concerned? There are sixty million people in this country who are not members of any Church; they are the Communists we should fear. Godless women and men, intent on themselves or some political party as the chief good, irreverent and devoted to material ends-these are the Communists whom we Americans should fear and seek to change.
