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

Regulations For Gas Piping

is service from the main to the meter at its expense nd customer shall install service from meter to build ng at his expense and shall own this portion of the line and be liable for its operation and upkeep.

The company shall ordinarily locate the meter at he curb line or not nearer than 1 foot outside property ine and customer shall bring his service to this point. If ustomer desires a different location, permission shall secured from company to set meter at different point. Where customer is required to furnish part of distribuion line, then meter shall be set at end of company's

If customer requires a meter to be moved for his invenience, then company may require customer to ay company its cost of moving service line and meter. Customer must install his half of meter riser in acrdance with drawing attached and in such a manner nat riser is vertical and so no strain will be placed on mpany's half of meter riser.

Customer must install gas stop at a point outside uilding so as to permit cutting off gas in an emergency r for repairs to house piping without using company's

Company may refuse to serve customer unless comany's rules and regulations are complied with and uncustomer's plumbing has been inspected and approvd by city plumbing inspector. Where no city inspectors available, then company may refuse to serve custo er unless it is satisfied that customer's plumbing is proerly installed and safe to use. The company, however half not be under any obligation or duty at any time to aspect the customer's facilities.

No person other than employees and agents of comany shall move or remove meters, make connections to disturb any piping on the company's side of the meter. If meter stop is closed, it shall not be opened under any onditions except by company, its employees or agents

Company shall not install meter or turn on gas unutlets are capped and if possible, unless customer, his mployee or agent are present.

The minimum size of pipe permitted on customer's ervice line shall be 1", if not more than 3 outlets are erved, and if length of service line does not exceed 60 eet. 
