## PLUG 'N TRIGGER

First northern of the fall along the Texas Gulf Coast usually do no more than take the bite out of old so and make life more comfortable for the sportsman.

But, it is an entirely different story in the waters of the Gulf.

At the first breath of chilly winds, the mackerel, kingfish, blues, pompano, sailfish and marlin vanish. They head for warmer waters around the equator, where they will stay until the water warms up again next year.

Non-migratory fish start to feed up in anticipation of a long, hard winter.

Big sow trout that picked out a food-plentiful shallow flat head for deeper water and the company of smaller fish.

Shrimp leave the flats and get into deeper waters of bays and bayous there they stay until a real norther comes along. They move on out into the warmer waters of the Gulf.

As the Texas coastal section usually doesn't get a real cold snap until late November, the shrimp will be around for some time. And since shrimp is the favorite food of the speckled trout, the latter fish follow the shrimp into deeper water and school up.

The norther will blow water out and cause low tides. This will force the rat reds out of their favorite feeding grounds in the grass. They, too, will school and start feeding on the shallow reefs when the tide is high and congregate in deep water adjacent to the reefs when the tide is out.

The reds also like to feed in front of small bayous on an outgoing tide, catching the natural bait coming out with the current.

All of this adds up to good fishing.

Both trout and reds now will take almost anything thrown at them in the way of plugs, spoons, cut bait or shrimp. The sheephead will leave the shallow water bays and congregate in the deep water around jetties, pilings or coaks, feeding on barnacles or other crustaceans that live in these places.

Trout will come up after feeders, so the best fishing is from 18 inches to four feet deep with either artificial or dead bait.

Rat reds want their feed close to the bottom and will seldom rise, so bottom fishing is in order. If it is impossible to fish on the bottom due to shell or snags, use a slip cork to keep the bait from six to 12 inches off the bottom.

If the reds are feeding on a shallow reef, try a spoon with a popping cork to keep it off bottom. Chunk out and pop the cork, retrieving slowly. This method is hard on a casting rod, so if possible use a regular popping rod.

The sheephead still hasn't reach-

ed its proper place in the sun. They are easy to catch, good fighters, reach a weight of four or five pounds and do not require anything more elaborate than a cane pole and a small, heavy hook. This is necessary because the sheephead's small mouth is equipped with crushers (for breaking up their favorite barnacle foods) and he is able to twist a light, long-shanked hook.

Some fishermen use fiddler crabs for bait. To get these rascals, take along a shovel, find a bunch of small holes (about one-half inch in diameter) along the beach close to the water, and dig.

You'll turn up some crabs about three-quarters to an inch and a half long with a fiddle-shaped claw as big as the crab.

Don't be alarmed as this claw is a dummy and the crab uses it strictly as a bluff. Pick him up and throw him in the bucket.

When you are at the fishing spot, put the crab on the hook by running the hook through from the underside with the barb coming out through the shell.

Fish about six inches off the bottom.

Converted sheephead fishermen swear they are the finest eating of anything found along the Texas coast. They claim the fish make a wonderful chowder and are delicious broiled, baked or fried.

### Seven Intersectional Games. Major Conference Games Shape Up Banner Day For 1950 College Grid Season

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (UP)—Seven crackerjack intersectional games, along with decisive action in seven major conferences, make this a banner day in the 1950 college football season.

The most action will be packed into the Cotton Bowl at Dallas, Tex., for that arena will be the site of two major games instead of one—Oklahoma vs. Texas by day and Southern Methodist vs. Oklahoma Aggies by night.

But even this titanic twin-bill will be hard pressed to hold the spotlight as the best teams in every section clash with their neighbors or with talented "outsiders."

The Cotton Bowl extravaganza brings together four unbeaten teams. Not only that, but Southern Methodist, Oklahoma, and Texas are ranked second, third, and fourth nationally by the United Press football coaches rating board.

Oklahoma will be seeking to extend a 25-game winning streak, but the Texas Longhorns are a six-point choice to smash it just as Notre Dame's unbeaten string was ended by Purdue last week. S. M. U. was rated a solid 21-point choice over the Aggies in the pre-light battle.

### Male Students Can Apply For Naval ROTC

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 14.—Texas high school male seniors and graduates may obtain support for four years of college education if they apply for and pass Naval ROTC competitive tests December 9, Captain R. A. Knapp, University of Texas commandant, announced.

The University is one of two Texas schools offering the naval program. A successful candidate will receive tuition, books, fees, uniforms and \$50 each month for four college years, beginning with the 1951 Fall Semester.

An applicant must be between the ages of 17 and 21. If he passes the aptitude test, he will be interviewed and given a physical examination. State selection committees will then choose the outstanding candidates to meet state quotas.

An accepted candidate may indicate one of 52 U. S. colleges

and universities with Naval ROTC units which he wishes to attend, and subject to quota limitations, he will be recommended for the school.

He may take any course leading to a bachelor's or higher degree. In return, he must participate in naval drills, three summer cruises and, if qualified, must serve two years of active duty in the Navy or Marine Corps upon graduation.

Application forms have been distributed to all Texas high schools, colleges, and Naval recruiting offices.

### US Warns Russia It Will Act To Protect Austria

FRANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 14 (UP)—U. S. High Commissioner John J. McCloy today ordered the immediate release of Baron Ernst von Weizsaecker, former Nazi diplomat serving a five-year sentence as a war criminal.

Weizsaecker formerly was a state secretary in Adolf Hitler's foreign office and his ambassador to the Vatican. He has been confined in Landsberg prison.

McCloy's clemency order reduced the sentence to "the time already served."

The high commissioner's office has been bombarded for months with letters protesting Weizsaecker's sentence on grounds he did Jews in the German embassy in the Vatican, gave them other help, and acted to relieve the hardships of the Nazi occupation of Norway.

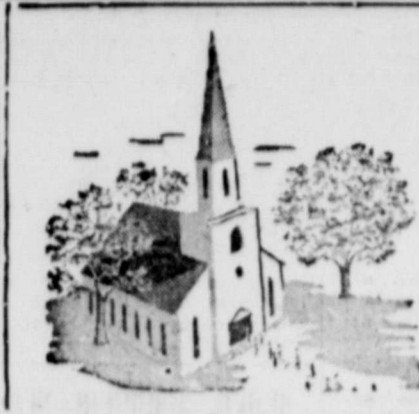

### Safety Experts To Study High Accident Rates

CHICAGO, Oct. 14—Accidents kill more young people than any disease. One out of 15 persons are disabled one or more days a year by accidents. Accidents are costing the United States \$14,000 a minute around the clock, day in and day out. Such inescapable facts as those will confront 12,000 safety experts and others concerned with accident prevention who will meet here Oct. 16-20 in the world's biggest safety convention. The huge drain of accidents on the nation's mobilization of manpower and material will be in the minds of the delegates as they discuss prevention methods in 200 sessions during the five-day convention. Eighty pages of closely printed program are required to list convention subjects ranging from rocket engines to throw rugs, and wonder drugs to drunk driving. All regions of the United States, Canada and some foreign countries will be represented in the throng which will crowd four of Chicago's largest hotels to learn the latest techniques and methods in traffic, industrial, school, home and farm safety. "The National Safety Congress is not a glamor convention," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council. "No uniformed parades, no bands or trick cars or beauty queens. But I know of no meeting anywhere which has had more influence on the day-to-day security and happiness of everyone in America. "Many of the things that seem commonplace today—the guards on an industrial machine, the traffic signal on the corner, safety lessons for school children—have been introduced or perfected at the Congress."



## Rayburn Will Speak At FHA Day At Fair

Sam Rayburn, speaker of the U. S. House of Representatives and guest speaker for Farmers Home Administration achievements day Tuesday, Oct. 16, at the 1950 State Fair of Texas.

Representative Rayburn will join FHA officials and the State Fair in a salute to farm ownership families on the third annual farm achievement day at the fair.

Some 300 families who have paid up farm purchase loans within the past year will be given award certificates. Three such

farmers, Merrill J. Stewart of Caviness, Lamar County; Harold J. Dostier of Blooming Grove, Navarro County; and Douglas D. Dudy of Eddy, Falls County—will be interviewed by Murray Cox of Radio Station WFAA and Layne Beatty of WBAF.

Family and county groups, about 6,000 people in all, are expected to arrive during the morning. After visiting livestock, farm implements, agriculture and other exhibits and touring the State Fair Midway, they will have a picnic lunch on the grounds.

The auditorium program, with L. J. Cappelman, State FFA director, presiding, will begin at 1:30 p. m.
