Navy Air Blows Smash KoRed River Bridges

By Ralph Teasorth TOKYO, Friday, Nov. 10 (UP)—The U. S. Navy's biggest air strike of the Korean War smashed Yalu River bridge links in the Chinese Communist lifeline from Manchuria Thursday.

From aboard the carrier Valley Forge, United Press correspondent Jack Burby reported that Navy dive bombers hurtled out of the early morning mists and poured thousands of pounds of bombs on three international bridges across the Yalu River boundary between Korea and Manchuria.

U. S. airmen ran up a score of two Russian swept-wing jet fighters destroyed, another probably destroyed, one damaged and one probably damaged, while two Yak-type fighters were destroyed.

For the third day the Chinese and North Korean troops faded back from the front lines and avoided combat.

Phone Strike Hits Country

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (UP)—A strike aimed at the local and national telephone systems rolled westward across the nation today.

It involved only 17,000 workers at the 6 a. m. local deadlines but quickly mushroomed as hundreds more refused to pass through picket lines thrown around major telephone exchanges.

That was the reason for the jam-up in long distance service.

The strikers were employees of the Western Electric Company, manufacturing and equipment maintenance subsidiary of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 9 (UP)—Telephone installers went on strike today in 15 Texas cities, and long distance service logged down immediately.

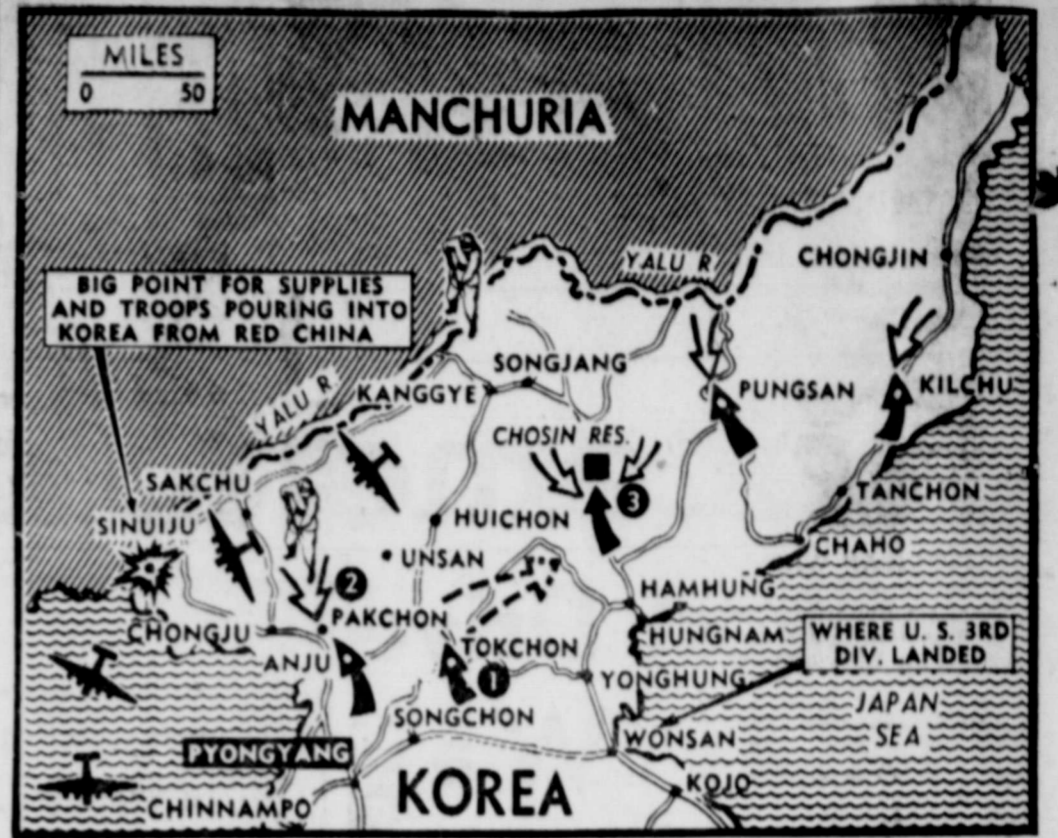
Pro Athlete Of Year To Be Presented With Belt Sporting Two And Half Lb Buckle Of Gold Set In Diamonds

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (UP)—Ezzard Charles and Bantam Ben Hogan were the apparent leaders today in the race for honors as pro athlete of the year, with the ultimate winner to get a \$10,000 belt which only Noor or Jake Lamotta would have the stamina and endurance to wear. The belt, which will go to the lucky winner, is not the type of trouser tackle which even those moneyed men would wear on their Sunday finest. Presented by Ray Hickok, Rochester, N. Y., sportsman, the buckle alone has two There are many candidates for this buckle, naturally. Each month the Hickok interests have polled the nation's sports editors to determine the pro athlete of the month—only the 12 winners eligible for the final vote. and one-half pounds of gold decorated with diamonds. With that sort of a weight, suspenders would be a precautionary necessity.

Charles, although an undersized heavyweight champion, probably would be able to single-handedly carry off the belt if he won it. But Hogan would have a struggle. An irate Mrs. Lamotta finally pried it off because it was tearing the bed sheets. But the winner of the \$10,000 beauty won't be able to go that far. If he ever laid down with that much gold on his stomach, he'd never be able to get up. As one member of the fight mob remarked after seeing it: "It must be wot 10 gees—'cuz I know a place where you could put it in hook for five!"

Texan Gets In Marine Corps The Hard Way

DALLAS, Nov. 9 (UP)—Hiram S. Johnson of Tyler, Texas, went back into the Marine Corps today—the hard way. When the ex-Leatherneck sought to sign up shortly after the Korean war broke out, only one thing stood in his way—the Marines didn't want married men. The tall, 21-year-old Texan saw only one solution. He would divorce his pretty, bunette wife, enlist in the Marines and then remarry. The "missus" vetoed the idea at first, but reluctantly gave in several weeks ago. "Just remember you've got to marry me back once you're in," Mrs. Johnson warned. A Tyler judge granted the divorce Monday, and Johnson and his 19-year-old ex-wife headed for the Dallas recruiting office. "Sign me up," he told Staff Sgt. Helen F. Wright. "Then name the news—the Marine Corps had revoked its rule about married men. "We've been taking married men for three months," said Wright. "Didn't you know?" Johnson was sworn in yesterday morning, and shortly afterward was remarried to his former wife. Then the couple went back home for a brief second honeymoon.

Abilene Woman To Represent Tex.

Mrs. R. O. Pearson of Abilene will represent Texas at the sixth annual conference of State Advisors on Women's Activities of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, to be held at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City, November 12th through 17th. It was announced today by Basil O'Connor, National Foundation president. Women from 48 states will attend the six day meeting and report on polio conditions in their respective states. The unexpectedly high incidence of polio this year, probably running second only to last year's, all-time record of 42,173 cases, will add more than 30,000 new polio victims to the list, Mr. O'Connor said. He reported that recent increases in the number of adult and respirator cases, the higher costs of polio care, plus 30,000 old cases still needing care this year have consumed the epidemic aid resources of the National Foundation and its 2,800 Chapters.

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Boyce House Gives You Texas

The city of Kilgore was named for "Buck" Kilgore, a colorful member of Congress many years ago. Champ Clark, who was Speaker of the House before and during World War I, tells in his autobiography of the celebrated incident of a door being smashed by the Texan.

Speaker Reed had all the exits locked so as to hold a quorum, but Kilgore kicked down a door. Clark chronicles, "He attained universal notoriety and immense popularity," adding that Kilgore's name was "fastened to a certain kind of shoe, designed especially for kicking and which was, for a time, immensely popular."

Kilgore also made quite a reputation as an objector. He relished this story on himself: "When I returned home to begin the canvass for my third term in Congress, which was a decidedly lively one, I asked one of my chief lieutenants what my enemies were charging me with this time. 'Oh,' he replied, 'just the same old charge—that of being a plain d— fool!'"

"His report was short and, if not sweet, was at least sufficiently comprehensive."

A Texas Congressman, according to Clark, in debate once generously offered to perform a surgical operation, free of charge, on the jugular vein of his opponent with a Bowie knife.

And though Joe Bailey was a great orator and brilliant debater, he was once set back on his heels in Congress. It was about 1900, Bailey, in the course of a speech, quoted Lincoln. Congressman Jonathan P. Dolliver of Iowa interposed, "I congratulate the Democrats on having attained, at the end of the century, the position occupied by the Republicans in the middle of the century."

A United States Senator once said, "The first month I was there, I wondered how I ever broke in—and, ever since, I have been wondering how the rest of them broke in."

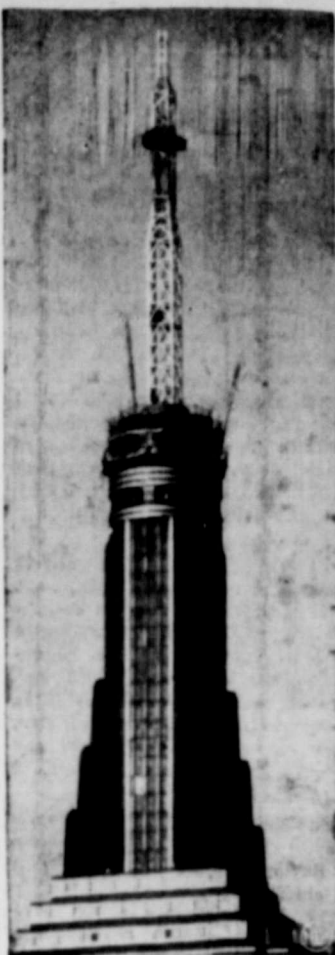

Wildlife Specialist Points Out Safety Measures While Hunting

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 9

This is the time of the year when hunting accidents take their heaviest toll of lives. Most accidents could be prevented if the simple rules of safety with firearms are observed. "Trigger happy" hunters, says R. E. Callender, extension specialist in wildlife conservation of Texas A. & M. College, endanger the lives of every other hunter in the woods and also cause much damage to wildlife. Their wild shooting leaves many birds and animals crippled and these are lost because they are not usually found until they are dead.

Practicing safety with guns in the fields and woods then, says Callender, is just a good conservation practice and it applies to both humans and wildlife. He reports that almost two-thirds of all hunting accidents result from three causes: Humans in line of fire, mistaking humans for game and hunting with the safety catch off on the rifle.

He points out that good sportsmanship is just good manners. It includes using the right gun for the right game, hunting only in season and not taking more game than can be used even though the bag limit may permit the hunter to take more. Bird hunters, he says, should use a trained dog to retrieve crippled birds. The careful and wise hunter puts out cigarettes and campfires, breaks matches before dropping them and leaves the area where he has hunted in good condition.

Here is Callender's code of safety for the hunter. Treat every gun as if it were loaded; it is usually the empty gun, they thought it was empty, that takes the most lives. Loaded guns should never be carried in an automobile. The gun barrel and action should always be checked to be sure there are no obstructions in either. The

gun should be carried so that the hunter always has control of the direction of the muzzle, even if he should stumble. The good hunter never pulls the trigger until he is sure of his target and never points a gun at anything he doesn't intend to shoot.

He says loaded guns should never be left unattended and that the hunter should unload his gun before climbing a tree or over a fence. Bullets fired at flat, hard surfaces, or at objects on the surface of water may ricochet and hit objects not thought to be in the line of fire. Last but very important, he says, gunpowder and alcohol should never be mixed for the results can be disastrous.

The intelligent hunter will be thinking about how he can aid in conserving the wildlife of the land

so that he and other hunters will have areas where they can continue to enjoy one of America's greatest sports in the years ahead. Wasteful and careless hunting habits on the other hand, says Callender, can destroy the protection, vegetation and even the wildlife itself. It's up to every hunter, he concludes, to see that this situation does not exist in the areas where he hunts.
