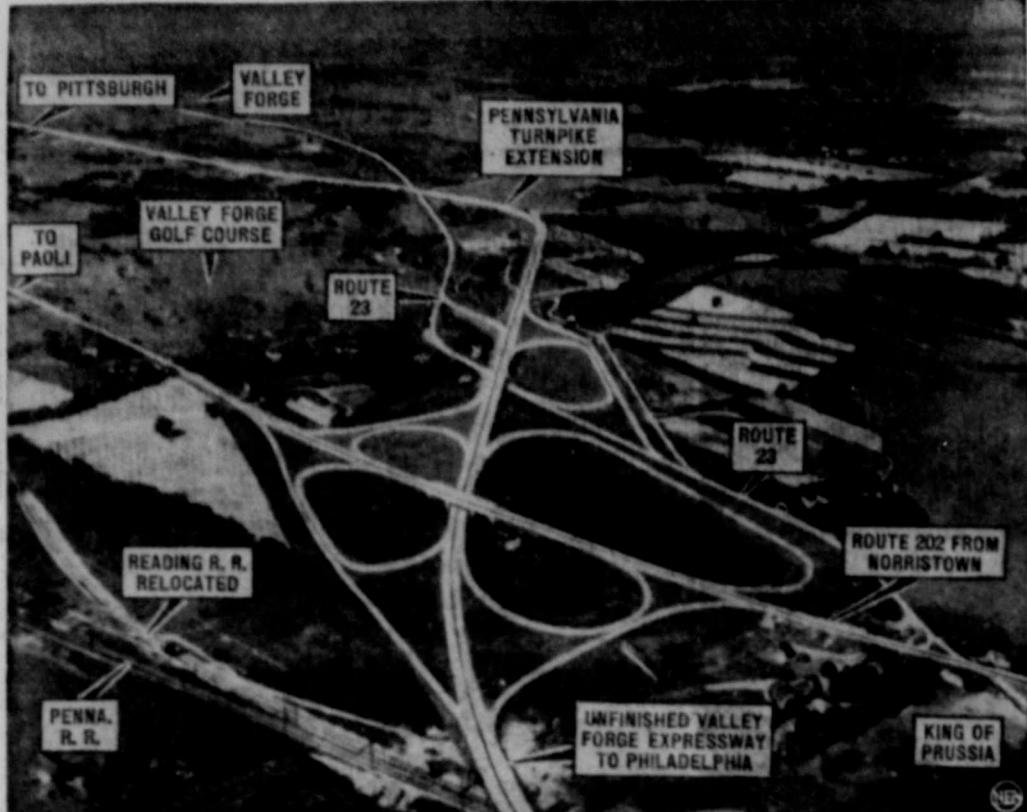

ALL ROADS LEAD TO THE TURNPIKE—Here is a photo-diagram of the new eastern extension of the famed Pennsylvania Turnpike, now open to traffic. The maze of roads forms a clover-leaf pattern of approaches and exits at the King of Prussia terminus about 15 miles from Philadelphia. The turnpike now runs from the outskirts of Philadelphia to the outskirts of Pittsburgh, and further extensions are underway.

SCENES AROUND RANGER

The score at the end of the first half stood at 126-0. When the "track meet" was finally finished, Georgia Tech massacred Cumberland 222-0. This was in 1916 when the largest score in football history was registered. And the 222 points were scored in 44 minutes, the game being stopped one minute before the end of the third quarter. In that game, Jim Preas kicked 18 extra points the first half. George F. Allen, captain of the Cumberland team made his team's longest gain—a five yard loss.

This little note of football oddity is recorded in the "Football Thesaurus" by Duke Houlgate. It came out in 1945 and has every game played by about 150 teams up to that time. There have been other high scoring games including the 1916 Rice-SMU tilt, when after the Mustangs had scored the first points in the game, Rice went on to smother them 146-3. In 1917 and 1919 Texas A&M was undefeated, untied and unscored on they totaled 270 points in 1917 and 275 in 1919. And in 1920 the Aggies beat Daniel Baker 110-0. In 1925 Texas Tech ran up a 120-0 score against Wayland.

TCU and LSU have played some of the tightest games in football. In three games the two teams scored a total of 14 points between them. In 1931 the Horned Frogs beat LSU 3-0; a year later the score was a 3-3 tie and in the 1935 Sugar Bowl TCU defeated LSU 8-2.

One of the more humorous gridiron incidents took place in 1923 Colgate had a game with little Niagara College. Niagara had very few reserves and its coach Pete Dwyer, decided that the only way his small squad could make a showing was to play a shortened game. Accordingly, he requested that the quarters be

limited to 10 minutes. At the last minute, however, Colgate insisted upon regulation periods. In retaliation, Dwyer gave his 11 starters some startling instructions: If they won the toss, they were to kick off but not a Niagara player was to make a move to tackle the Colgate ball carrier. So... Niagara kicked off; Colgate ran for a TD while the eleven Niagara players on the field and a handful of subs on the bench applauded politely as 6 points were scored. Niagara kicked off again and again Colgate ran to a TD while Niagara players clapped hands. This maneuver was repeated a third time before the Colgate coach and other officials, in a dither, reached the Niagara bench and agreed to a short game. Colgate won 55-0.

In 1931 Oregon Coach Fat Spears became a little disgusted with his team. He sat in the stands during the second half as Southern California whipped his team 58-0. The first regular football game might have been back in 1869 when Rutgers and Princeton met with 25 students on each side. The game started at 3 p. m. Nov. 6, and with a few spectators sitting on fences, Rutgers won 6 goals to 4. Kentucky accepted a challenge from Centre College in 1891. Kentucky didn't know much about the game of football, so before and during the game the Centre team had to show Kentucky how to play. Centre won 70-0 but Kentucky wasn't scored upon after "catching on."

Sewanee, University of the South Tenn., former gridiron great, played over five games in five days in 1899. They beat Tulane 23-0, Texas 12-0, Texas A&M 10-

won 55, lost 1, tied 1. When Minnesota tied Michigan 6-6 in 1903, Sig Harris, the Gophers 140-pound quarterback was picked up with the ball by several of Michigan's biggest players, carried across the goal and Michigan demanded a safety.

Noire Dame's famous George Gipp was needing a substitute kicker who was not doing so well. The sub handed the ball to Gipp who proceeded to drop kick it 62 yards. Officials halted the game to measure the kick. It was the third longest drop kick on record. The longest was by Princeton's James Hazell in 1882 which went 65 yards.

In the 1929 Denison game, Elmer Rogers of Ohio Wesleyan was on his way for along touchdown run when his belt broke... his pants dropped him on the 6-yard line. The 1920 James Millikan University-Terre Haute game was never finished. Every man on the Millikan squad scored in the 158-6 rout before the Terre Haute team walked off the field with 8 minutes left in the game. Yale and Princeton played four and a half hours in 1881—the longest game on record. West Virginia was leading Marshall 82-0 in 1915 and Marshall was determined to score. And they did on a pass play that found the receiver balanced on one of his teammates' shoulders behind the goal.

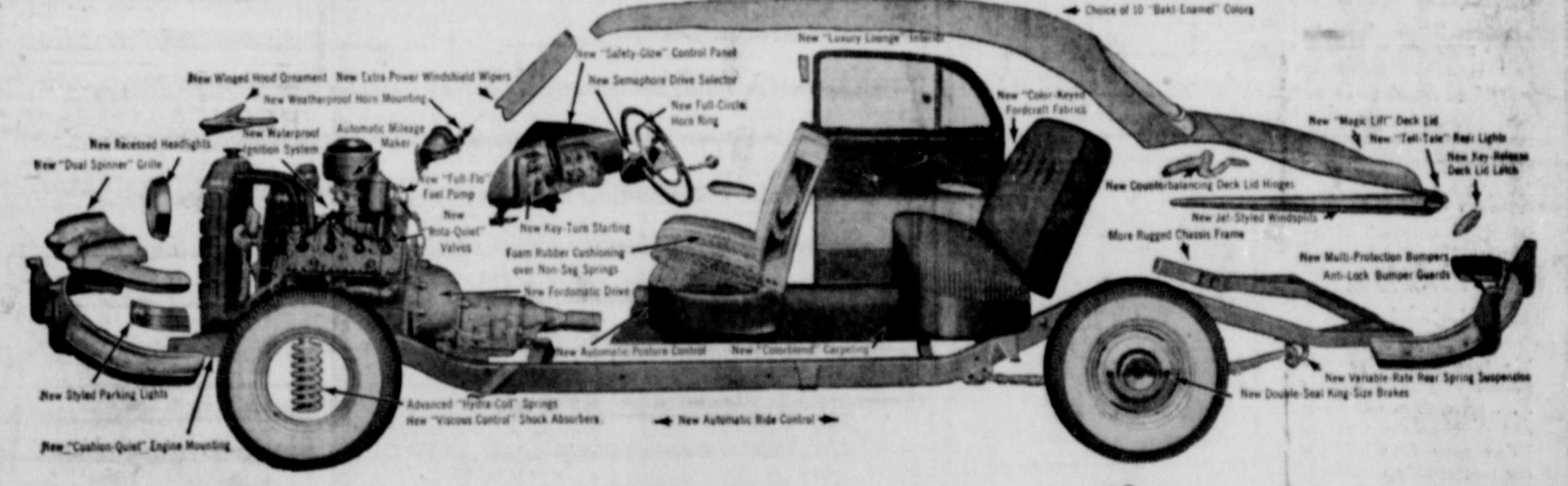

Survey Of War Correspondents Shows They Remember Odd Things About Experiences In Korean War

TOKYO, Nov. 27 (UP)—It's strange what the mind retains of the things the eye picks up, and what little flashbacks it gives from time to time from a person's past.

To catch some of the small pictures reporters carry around in their heads about Korea, a survey of several United Press war correspondents was made.

Each was asked, without prior warning as to what kind of question was to be asked, to name something that frequently came to mind about Korea.

Charles Moore said he thought of the large loads Korean women carry balanced on their heads — "a Korean grandmother can carry a heavier bundle on her head than I can carry on my back."

Frank Tremaine remembers a big lithograph picture of Lenin lying on the ground when the Marines went ashore at Wonsan. There were Marines walking all around and over it, yet it was strangely clean and untouched. Hadn't been stepped on.

Earnest Hohrecht remembers a 15-year-old Korean boy sitting by the Han River at Seoul. All his possessions were in a big bundle wrapped in black cloth and strapped to his back. He was burning.

Virtually every house was a fire. The flames rolled slowly, lighting up the valley. Not a soul was in the village except one white bearded old patriarch who wore a robe and one of those elaborate high hats of woven horsehair which old Korean men wear as an emblem of the dignity of their station in life.

Deliberately and slowly, he was walking back and forth across the road, filling a small dipper with water from a drainage ditch and pouring it on the flames of his house. That was all he could do.

"He knew he couldn't save it," Symonds said. "His family probably all were dead. It was a scene that seemed to epitomize the Korean war."

Robert Bennyhoff remembers "flower day" at the 38th Parallel. "It's something I'll remember a long time—those sweet characters with the flowers," he said. "You probably never head of any army with flowers, but that was the day it happened—the day the 3rd ROK Division first crossed the Parallel. "Those silly guys had bunches of flowers in their hands, flowers in their hair, flowers braided around their truck hoods and cabs and wreathed around their artillery pieces."

"They were sublimely happy at finally crossing the Parallel. They were like children celebrating the end of the school term. They'd run up to you and hand you bouquets. Everybody was walking a long laughing. Their guns were burning."

Garbo (one of the Manhattan boys Garbo's and no relation to Greta), noticed the way men and women began telling him their innermost secrets when he first began painting portraits 15 years ago.

"Women like to talk about their dreams and their unhappy love affairs," said Garbo, who has done portraits of President Truman, the late Gen. H. H. Arnold, and numerous society women, including Margaret Whitney.

"Men like to talk about big business deals they've put across, or how they started with nothing and worked up the hard way."

After 15 or 20 sittings, with the subject doing most of the talking and soft music playing in the background, Garbo says the most jittery debutante is as tranquil as a Mona Lisa.

"One big industrialist who had got so relaxed during his sittings that he had a recording made of the background music I played, plus the soft swish of the brush on the canvas," Garbo, who is a boyish looking 32, said modestly. "It worked so well he would start to doze before the sitting was over."

The portrait artist claims no special credit for all this.

"The so-called blight of today is the transitory nature of everything. People have no sense of security—no sense that what is here today will be here tomorrow," he said. "Women are especially conscious of the quick passing of their beauty. When they realize that their beauty is being recorded in oils, to last for generations, it has a calming effect."

Garbo, who does most of his painting in a studio in his home at Belle Harbor, Long Island, where he lives with his wife, says he doesn't paint just to give psychiatric help to mankind. This phase, he added, is just a by-product of the art.
