

Swedish Architect Hopes To Sing \$10,000 Worth Here And Head Home

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (UP)—Bo Sundblad, Swedish architect and heir to a family bakery business, wants to sing \$10,000 worth in this country and then pack up his guitar and go back home to Stockholm.

"I have always tried to hold down appearances in my own country," the handsome, 34-year-old tenor confessed in excellent English. "I didn't want to be a hired singer. But here it is different. Here I have a goal."

The goal is a bread wrapping machine.

While his family baked, Bo has fiddled in the architect business and strummed his guitar and sung at exclusive private parties, including numerous parties attended by the royal family. Then came the bread-wrapping machine crisis.

"Dollars are extremely scarce in our country," Bo said, "it would be difficult for us to buy the machine from your country. So I look a very big chance and came over here to sing for you." He arrived a week ago.

It seems the family bread is unusual dark rye, baked in a round loaf and cut and wrapped in wedge-shaped quarters, so a suitable wrapping machine is hard to find. Also expensive.

"First I must have some of my Swedish songs translated into English," Bo explained. "Then I would like to go on television, and then I would like to get a job in some rather small place. I sing ballads with a story more than just love songs."

He doesn't think our own crooners need to get nervous about his arrival.

"I am not the type of singer girls swoon over," he said modestly. "We haven't anyone like Frank Sinatra in our country. I think you would find that our girls are very . . . ah . . . anxious about American singers. He bop is the highest fashion there."

Bo figures he's more the Burl Ives type. With a Swedish accent. He doesn't, however, look it. He was wearing a jaunty blue and grey striped bow tie and a sporty camel's hair overcoat when he was interviewed. He is tall, blond, slim, a bachelor, and also wealthy in Swedish crowns if not in dollars.

One of the songs he'll be singing, "I Lissabon," which means, he said, "In Lisbon," he wrote himself, and it currently is among the most popular in Sweden.

"I hope American audiences will like me. And I hope to get to see San Francisco," Sundblad said. "Ten thousand dollars is quite a bit of money. But then," he added grinning confidently, "this is America. Here people can still get rich by just thinking up a new kind of a buttonhole."

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Tex. Water Code Hearing Draws State Attention

The public hearing of the Texas Water Code Committee called by Senator Rogers Kelley, of Edinburg, beginning at 9:30 a. m. December 11th, in the Senate Chamber of the Capitol in Austin, is attracting wide-spread attention throughout the State.

"We had over four thousand copies of our Preliminary Report mimeographed, but the demand for copies exhausted our supply during the first week after its release on November 15th," Senator Kelley stated in Austin today.

"In addition, more than seventy persons and organizations have indicated their desire to appear at the hearing and express their views concerning the Texas Water Laws," Kelley continued.

"The genuine interest manifested in this coming hearing is most encouraging, and after we have listened to the recommendations of the citizens of Texas who will give us the benefit of their ideas concerning the revision of the Water Laws in this public meeting, the Committee will be able to prepare its Final Report for submission to the Governor and to the Legislature in a manner that will be of the greatest benefit to the State," Senator Kelley said.

All persons and organizations who desire to make recommendations to the committee at its final hearing in December, are urged to notify the Executive Secretary, L. Hamilton Lowe, P. O. Box 2331, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas, as soon as possible.

At the conclusion of this hearing in Austin the Committee's Final Report will be drafted and no more public hearings will be held prior to the convening of the 52nd Legislature in January.

Golden Gloves Training Gets Under Way

FORT WORTH, Dec. 5 (Spl.)—Thousands of young Texas amateur boxers will soon begin training as the Fifteenth Annual Texas Golden Gloves program gets underway.

Twenty-one regional centers are again expected to be represented when the program culminates in the five-night State Tournament at Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum Feb. 14, 15, 16, 17 and 19.

For those who win championships in their divisions at the State Tournament, there will be an all-expenses-paid trip to Chicago, where they will fight in the annual Golden Gloves Tournament of Champions.

Regional Tournaments are now planned for Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Brownwood, Bryan, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Harlingen, Houston, Lufkin, Lubbock, Odessa, Paris, San Angelo, San Antonio, Tyler, Waco and Wichita Falls.

The geographical distribution of the regional centers gives every amateur in the State an opportunity to qualify for the big State Tournament.

All Golden Gloves tournaments, as in the past, are sponsored only by newspapers and established civic organizations on a non-profit basis, with surplus funds going to recognized charities and development of amateur sports.

The program is sanctioned by the AAU, and all contestants must be registered with that organization.

In Texas the Golden Gloves program is sponsored and directed by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.
