Although not very numerous, there exists throughout the city of Dimmitt what is termed "left-outs" in the paving.

This is usually a section of city street 50 to 150 feet long and extending halfway into the street and was left unpaved because the adjacent lot's owner would not agree to pay for it.

We would guarantee that these property owners have been swayed at many times, perhaps not to their face, but still swayed at. Another property owner who had to borrow to pave by or around his lot as more or less a public service, doesn't feel inclined to sympathize with the man who decided to use everyone else's paving and leave his own undone.

It is nerve-jolting to go over one of these left-out spaces. Situated as they are there is very little, if any, maintenance work done on them, consequently they are full of chug-holes and ruts. Sometimes, if a truck is parked on the narrow paving on the other half of the street, just the act of driving by is like threading a needle with a hemp rope.

We doubt that there are many cases of real need or poverty involved where property-owners refuse to do their share of paving. They must just think their money is more important than the respect of their neighbors.

Dimmitt has had to shoulder a heavy paving burden in a short time. Hart, probably one of the most progressive small communities in this area, is beginning its future paving system. Eventually there should be a regular lattice-work of farm-to-market paving over the entire county. Hart and Dimmitt will probably one day have all their streets and alleys paved.

There has been a tremendous improvement in about one decade. At the end of World War II the only pavement in Castro County was across the northwest part of the county at Summerfield and Highway 86 between Dimmitt and Tulla. That was all. Get caught anywhere else in a rain and you were in mud up to your ears. Since that time almost all the north-south streets in Dimmitt either have been or are going to be paved. Every highway and four or five farm-to-market roads have been paved, plus the addition of several highways. Great strides have been taken and there are more to come.

So everyone can get into the act,

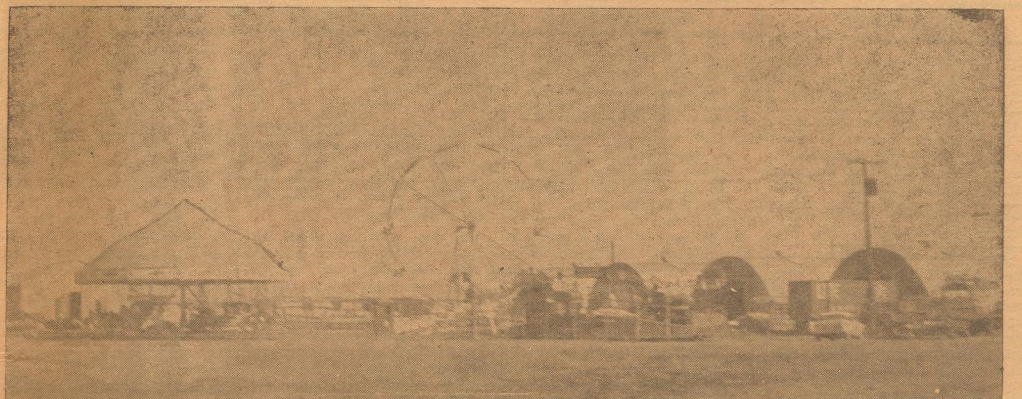
there will be a dog show to select the smartest dog, muttiest dog, ugliest dog, longest tailed dog, and best behaved dog, in that order.

Five County 4-H Members are Named District Winners in Awards Program

Five Castro County 4-H Club members were named District winners in the National 4-H Awards Program. They were Jack Sharp, Hart 4-H Club member, was named district winner in Boys Achievement. Verdona Curtis, Square-Flag 4-H Club member, was winner in the Individual Electric awards program. Virginia Huseman, Nazareth Club member, winner in the Frozen Foods Program; Mary Louise Taack, Hart 4-H Club member, winner in Home Economics; and Mary Helen Maples, Dimmitt 4-H Club member, was winner in Poultry Fact

Finding and Sears Market awards program.

By winning the District, which comprises 24 panhandle counties, the club members are eligible for State Competition and their record books are being judged on a State basis.

There are 18 National 4-H Awards programs and the Castro County Group won five of these in competition with club members from the other twenty four counties. Scholarship and other prizes are awarded to club members who win the State contest.

Dowty Receives JayCee Loan Scholarship

Ed Dowty, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Dowty of 109 NW 5th, has been named the second recipient of the Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce scholarship loan according to an announcement made last week.

Young Dowty had been next in line for the scholarship when it was passed up by Pancho Rubalcaba, of Hereford, who married and will not attend college.

Dowty plans to go to Texas Tech at Lubbock to major in engineering. He plans on using enough of the scholarship loan fund to pay his room and board, but will work for the remainder.

Also taking advantage of the fund to aid college students will be Miss Joyce Slough who will also use the fund to pay only part of her expenses.

Funds for this program were collected from over the county and at present there is about \$1,400 on hand—enough for these two students this year. However, according to Jay-Cee drive chairman Bill Reisdorph, this amount is only one-third of the immediate goal, since it will take about \$3,000 a year to keep four students from the county in college.

The fund was put in operation by the Jay-Cees to give county high school graduating seniors a chance to go on to college where they might have otherwise met with serious financial difficulties. Extensive tests are given the applicants and both Miss Slough and Dowty were highest in scores.

A trust fund has been set up in both the Hart and Dimmitt banks to be administered by Calvin Lippard, Charlie Hays and Dr. Charles Vandiver. Lippard was the instigator of the program and with Reisdorph has carried it most of the way.

Donations from anyone in the county who would care to be of assistance to a local college student, may obtain drafts from Reisdorph or Lippard or deposit to the fund account at either of the banks.

Eventually the trust fund will be self-supporting. While there is no absolute requirement, students who use money from the fund are expected to repay it, without interest, after they graduate and find a job or other income. In case of military service following college this may be deferred until discharge. Repayments made into the fund are expected to maintain it at a static level in five to six years so that no additional contributions will be necessary unless additional students are offered the opportunity of taking part in the program.

Bobcats Ready For Hereford

The Dimmitt Bobcats, riding a two-game victory streak, run into the tough Hereford Whitefaces Friday night at Hereford beginning at 8 o'clock.

The Whitefaces, oldest continual gridiron foe on the Bobcat schedule, have a solid team this year. They dropped their first and only game to the powerful Canyon Eagles last week, 17-8. Since Canyon is supposed to have considerable football ability this year, that score is not considered shameful for Hereford.

Dimmitt coach J. D. Covington thinks Hereford will be stronger competition than Lockney was last week.

Although out-of-town sports-writers had picked Lockney to win, the Bobcats showed no indication of having heard of this and proceeded to hand Lockney a 26-0 drubbing. Although Lockney was a tough team, they could never get to moving and threatened to score only twice. Last year Lockney dropped Dimmitt twice—the first time 32-0 and the second time in bi-district play-offs which took first downs to break a 13-13 game's end tie.

Jimmy Curtis emerged as another back to watch when he led with 42 yards in rushing department, mostly in 2, 3, and 4-yard bites. His teammate Norman Nelson also took short gains to reach 32 yards rushing against the terrific Lockney line defense. Carlos Barnes picked up a plus 34 yards which included an 18-yard run in the second quarter. James Collins shared the nearly-equal ground gaining with 30-yards.

Dimmitt unlimbered a wicked passing attack that had been held under wraps during the earlier Springlake game. Carlos Barnes

proved his ability to hit a target when the extremely leaky Bobcat defensive line would give him time to draw back his arm. Several of his best passes were made with a Lockney arm around his neck. Total yardage passing was 92. Junior Coffey received a Barnes pass early in the second quarter for a Dimmitt touchdown, followed by a reception by Norman Nelson on the next play.

Jimmy Curtis kicked four times for 179 yards, an average of 44.5 yards.

Tackle Don Warren proved to be a rough man to handle as he knocked off 13 Lockney runners on defense. Guard Ben Holcomb and end Hal Ratcliff also turned in outstanding performances on defense, as did halfback Norman Nelson. These men and the rest of the Dimmitt team proved such a formidable combination that Lockney was unable to get past the 50 yard line more than a couple of times.

In two games Dimmitt has yet to be scored on.

The Dimmitt freshmen and B teams will play similar teams from Hereford Thursday evening beginning at 6:30. Movies of the varsity game with Hereford will be shown at 8 p.m. Monday in the cafeteria.

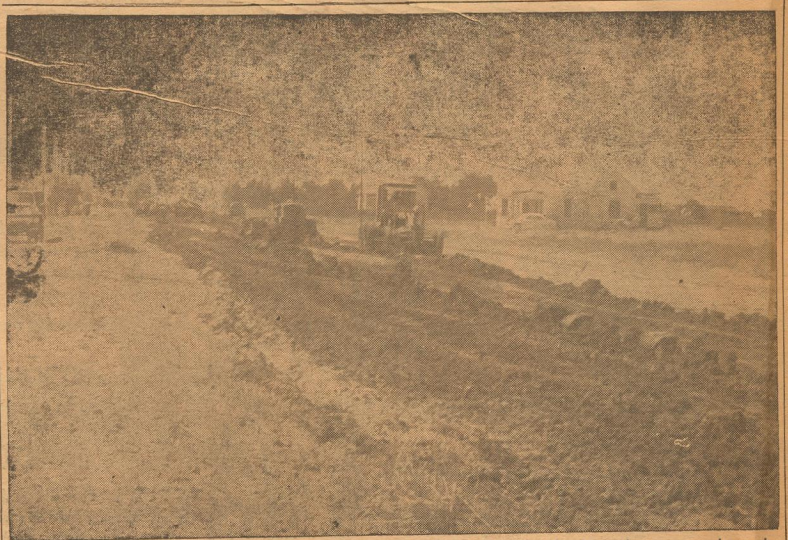
Dimmitt Nears Goal In Stadium Drive

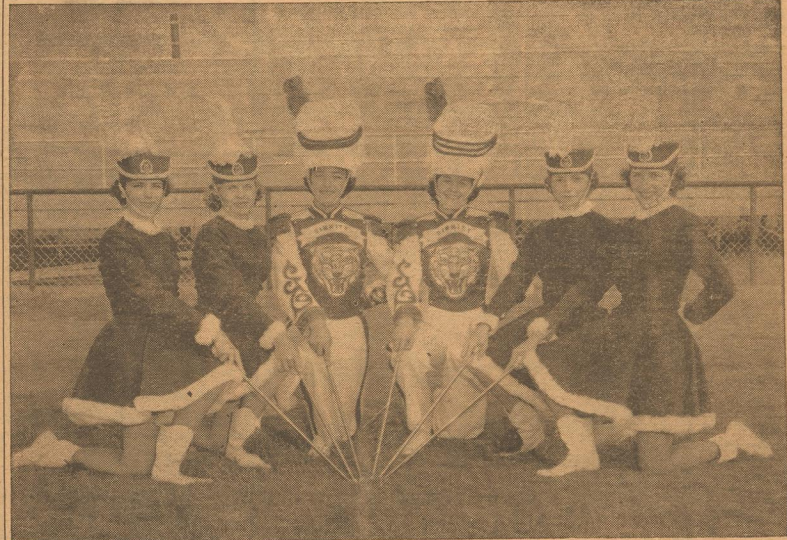
