TOKYO, Saturday, Dec. 16 (UP)—American troops and planes killed at least 1,000 Chinese Communists in hurling back a daylong attack against the United Nations Hamhung beachhead Friday but other enemy forces exploded a new assault within 50 miles of Seoul.

Some 2,500 Chinese Reds hit the U. S. 3rd Division eight miles west of Hamhung under cover of a snowstorm in the initial assault against the shrinking northeast coast beach-

At least one 3rd Division platoon was overrun and pre sumed lost.

By late today, 10th corps forces had pulled back a short distance to new positions under steadily-increasing Com-munist attack. Exact extent of the withdrawal was not dis-

Chinese Rockets Not US Made

SEOUL, Korea, Dec. 15 (UP)-U. S. 8th Army technicians said today that rockets fired by the Chinese Reds and resembling some made in the United States were "not standard U. S. Army equip-

The technicians examined rockets" found in abandoned Chinese positions north of Pyongyang.

They said the rockets definitely resembled Americanmade missiles but were not prepared to say definitely whether they were of Ameri-

can manufacture. The rockets were not. brought into Korea by Unit-They are four feet long,

packed individually in wood en boxes and carry identification marks and a 1950 date U. S. artillery men said yesterday the rockets apparently were manufactured in the U. S, last June but were not brought to Korea by t h e Americans. The Chinese thus

could not have captured the rockets here, the officers said. Second Division artillery discovered "hundreds" of the rockets abandoned by the enemy north of Pyongyang

One front-line source predicted that the Reds would throw at least nine of the 12 to 14 Chinese divisions massed around the beach-head perimeter into the battle by late tonight. At full strength, the 14 divisions would total 140,000

"This atack is in force," a 10th Griselio Torresola, slain Puerto Corps spokesman said. "It is not one of the probing attacks which have searched out probabilities of the perimeter border in the last three days. That's all we can tell

As the battle mounted in fury, tanks were rushed to the heaviestengaged areas west of Hamhung to reinforce armored units already

Closest military objective to the Chinese attack was Yonpo Airfield, on the coast four miles southwest of the port of Hungnam. Air Force and Marine cargo aircraft and fighters still were operating from

Yonpo in mass. The attack was not yet in sight of the vital air base and it was not known whether it even was directed at that objective.
