Revived Koreas Join Chinese

UN Fights Off Banzai Attack On Waterfront

By Earnest Hoherecht TOKYO, Wednesday, Dec. 20 (UP)—U.S. 3rd Division troops in the Hungnam beachhead backed into a two by five mile escape pocket along the waterfront Tuesday as the revitalized North Korean army announced it would invade South Korea again with the help of the Chinese Reds.

In their fighting withdrawal, the 3rd Division doughboys abandoned Yonpo airport four miles southwest of Hungnam, leaving only "burglar alarm" outposts ringing the city to warn of new Red attacks.

Fighting with their backs to the sea along the vital waterfront escape docks, the rear guards beat off a succession of screaming "Banzai" attacks in which the revived North Korean army joined the Chinese Communists for the first time.

A vast Allied armada in Hungnam Harbor helped beat back the Red attacks with a flashing curtain of fire. The armada included three deadly rocket launcher ships very close in to shore as well as the battleship Missouri, six aircraft carriers, two cruisers and many destroyers and minesweepers.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur estimated the reconstituted North Korean army at 150,000 men, with 50,000 in reserve within the sanctuary of their Manchurian training grounds.

And the North Korean government, which has established its new capital in the mountain city of Kanggye only 20 miles south of the Manchurian border, said these forces would join with the Chinese Reds in a new invasion of South Korea.

A government broadcast from Kanggye said the Communist armies intend to invade South Korea, capture Seoul, establish a unified Korean government and drive American troops from the country. "Chinese volunteers units are being reinforced and they will fight and cooperate with the Korean peoples army to the final day of unification of Korea and until the invader troops of America are driven from the territory of Korea," the broadcast said.

"Participation of the Chinese volunteer units is not so unjust and illegal as America charges. It is perfectly rightful and legal." The broadcast quoted a statement "to the people of Seoul" from the supreme council of the Communist Korean government to sabotage United Nations forces in the Seoul area and prevent the city's destruction.

The South Korean government announced that Seoul would be defended and began drafting thousands of men between the ages of 17 and 40 for the fight.

Police Hunt Person Sending Bombs Thru Mail

LA CROSSE, Wis., Dec. 19 (UP)—Police today sought an unknown person who has preyed on a farmer's life by sending him bombs wrapped gaily as Christmas gifts.

One bomb was delivered through the mails to the farmer, whose identity was not revealed. A second was found yesterday in a church here. It was in a package bearing the farmer's address. The sender apparently hoped someone would mail it to the farmer's home, about 40 miles from La Crosse.

Both bombs were set to explode when the packages were opened. However, police said, the first bomb failed to go off when the farmer opened it in his farmhouse.

The farmer thought the contraption merely was "some sort of junk" sent by a prankster. He tossed it out his kitchen window and it fell into a snowbank.

Yesterday, a second gaily-wrapped package was found on a pew at Holy Trinity Church here. Shortly after it was found, the church received an anonymous telephone call.

"Have you mailed that package yet?" the caller asked. Later, the same person called again and said:

"You'd better get rid of that package if you know what is good for you."

Police called in postal inspectors and experts from the Wisconsin crime laboratory to work on the case. Detectives said they had several leads concerning "people the farmer had been having trouble with."

Youth Charged With '15 Cent' Knife Murder

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 19 (UP)—Police today charged 19-year-old Fred G. Postel as the "penny ante" murderer who knifed a 14-year-old boy to death because he refused to hand over 15 cents.

Officers, obviously angry over the killing, pushed a search for two others in connection with the killing.

Manuel Zapata, 17, told police he and 14-year-old David Rodriguez were walking home shortly after midnight when a man came up behind them and demanded their money.

"I had a nickel and gave it to him," said Zapata. He said young Rodriguez refused to hand over his 15 cents and was slashed to death as he protested, "I need the money for Christmas."

Young Zapata identified Postel as the killer during a police lineup of suspects. "That's him, that's him," Zapata shouted. Earlier this year Postel had given police the names of two murderers in another killing.

F-86 Jets Win Second Fight With Red Mig's

WITH U.S. 5TH AIR FORCE, Korea, Dec. 19 (UP)—Four heavily outnumbered American Sabre F-86 jet fighter planes today won their second battle in three days with 12 speedy Russian-made MIG 15 jets—damaging one and forcing all to break off the fight.

At the same time B-29 Superfortresses dropped 192 tons of high explosive bombs on Communist transportation and supply targets in Changju and Pakchon in northwest Korea with "excellent results." And other fighters and light bombers attacked enemy troops and other targets in good weather, with B-26 bomber crews claiming about 250 enemy troop casualties in the Chorwon area.

By mid-afternoon 345 combat sorties had been flown. Four Sabres, America's fastest jets with a speed of better than 701 mile and hour, tangled with 12 MIGS over Sinulju, where a MIG was shot down by a Sabre Sunday in the first encounter between them.

Maj. Gen. Earle E. Partridge, commander of the 5th Air Force, said Lt. Col. Glenn T. Eagleston hit the left wing and left side of one of the MIGS with machine gun fire and that the whole flight then headed over the Manchurian border.

The jets were flown by the crack pilots of the 4th Fighter Interceptor Wing. One of them was piloted by Lt. Col. Bruce H. Hilton of Stockton, Calif., who shot a MIG down in the first encounter Sunday between the Sabres and MIGS.

Local Dealers Wait Next Move From Auto Co.

Price Crawley, operator of the Crawley Motor Co., in Ranger, expected the General Motors freeze of 1951 models to be lifted in a few days. The automobile company, one of the largest in America, yesterday halted the sale of 1951 model Pontiacs, Chevrolets and Cadillacs.

Crawley, who is local Pontiac dealer, said he received a telegram from General Motors yesterday. The wire was dated 4 p.m. Monday and notified dealers of the sale stoppage.

If the dealer already has invoice and title on new cars in show rooms or on the way, then he can dispose of them, Crawley explained. The stop-order applied to new models under consignment and on which dealers have not received title since the order came out Monday.

The 1951 cars affected by the order will not be sold until General Motors changes the present "freeze" order, Crawley said.

J. Anderson, local Chevrolet dealer, said he was waiting further developments before commenting on the situation. He received a similar telegram from General Motors notifying him of the order.

Preslar's Son Graduates From Air Force School

MAXWELL AF BASE, Ala., Dec. 19—Lieutenant Colonel Sanford D. Preslar, son of Mrs. Cora Preslar of Ranger, was graduated Dec. 15 from the seventh regular course of the Air University's Air Command and Staff School.

Colonel Preslar was in Chief Supply Division, Quartermaster Section, Headquarters Third Army in Atlanta, Ga., prior to reporting to Maxwell to attend the school. He served in the European Theater of Operations during World War II.

The Air Command and Staff School, second highest educational unit of the Air University, is designed to prepare officers for the command of groups, wings, and comparable staff duties. This course is open to regular Air Force officers with six to eleven years commissioned service, reserve officers, between the ages of thirty-one and thirty-seven, and a quota of Army, Navy, and Marine Corps officers all of whom must meet certain eligibility requirements set by the school.

General George C. Kenney is Commanding General of the Air University and Brig. Gen. John A. Samford is Commandant of the Air Command and Staff School.

80 Priests Killed

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 19 (UP)—Eighty Catholic priests have been killed in Korea since hostilities started almost six months ago, the Vatican radio said today.

GI'S TO JOIN EISENHOWER AS SOON AS THEY'RE READY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (UP)—President Truman said today that American troops will be sent to Europe to join the Anti-Communist defense forces under Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower just as soon as it is possible to get them ready.

Mr. Truman appointed Eisenhower as supreme Allied Commander of the European defense forces at the request of the North Atlantic Pact council meeting in Brussels. The President conferred by telephone last night with Eisenhower, who was in the middle west. Mr. Truman told reporters that Eisenhower will come to Washington for a conference with him, then report to his European post as soon as possible.

Shivers Asks Volunteers For Civil Defense

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 19 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers called last night for more than a million Texans to volunteer for the civil defense chores necessary to "survive as a free people."

Shivers, in his weekly statewide radio broadcast, "The Governor Reports," said extensive plans have been made for comprehensive civil defense organizations throughout the state.

"We must have in Texas at least 1,070,000 persons trained in first aid and 50,000 in home care of the injured," he said.

"In a very short while," the Governor said, "volunteer offices will be open practically everywhere—places where people can offer their services for any type of civil defense service."

Shivers said citizens meanwhile should notify their mayor or county judge of their willingness to serve.

"We have postponed as long as we dare the acceptance of a challenge to our prestige among the nations of the earth," said the Governor.

The Governor said sabotage was a top danger. Shivers outlined the mobilization of the state's police and fire facilities and other resources available for civil defense.

AMERICA LEARNING HARD WAY THE HIGH COST OF BARGAINING FROM WEAKNESS

By Phil Newsum United Press Staff Correspondent The United States is learning the hard way the high cost of bargaining from weakness.

Congress shortly will appropriate for national defense another \$18,000,000,000, a figure so high that only a banker or an adding machine can understand it. Ultimately, we will have the finest airplanes and the finest guns in quantity. Our armed forces will be around 10,000,000 men and women. But we haven't got them now.

Meanwhile, we're bargaining for high stakes on two sides of the world. And in a world where power is the only recognized commodity.

In Asia, we seek a cease-fire and peace in Korea. But we are forced to bargain under most unfavorable military conditions. Our military leaders have admitted that in order to fight at all in Korea we stripped our national defenses at home, and we used up most of our occupation forces in Japan.

Furthermore, it has been publicized that only one more division can be spared to Gen. Douglas MacArthur in his Korean fight.

The Chinese and Russians have been quick to take advantage. In recent weeks they have, if anything, become more insistent on their peace terms—our withdrawal from Korea and Formosa and admittance of China to the United Nations.

We are in the unfortunate position of being unable to enforce a cease fire ourselves and of having to continue to fight if the enemy wants to. Either that, or complete capitulation to his demands.

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But our own weakness is hurting us there, too. We have an army of about 1,000,000 men under Gen. Eisenhower. One fifth of that army would be German.

Eisenhower is a magic name in Europe, just as MacArthur is in Asia. But he has his work cut out for him. France and Britain have rejected Russia's protest against formation of German units in a European army. Their way of life is tied

irrevocably to ours. But our defeat in Korea hasn't made them any happier, especially coupled with the fear that Russia may spring at any time, using as an excuse for a general attack her warning that she will not tolerate a German army.

A lot of pacifist talk both in Britain and France springs from this fear.

Meanwhile, our own leaders wonder whether France, particularly has a real will to fight, and whether, by rearming Europe, we might not be presenting the Russians with a ready-made stockpile.

Biggest problem of all is the Germans. They don't want to join a European army except on terms of equality. The West Germans have been talking back boldly to the Russians, but their faith, too, has been shaken by the action in Korea.

Thus, the high cost of bargaining from weakness, and the necessity for making up our minds soon between Europe and Asia.

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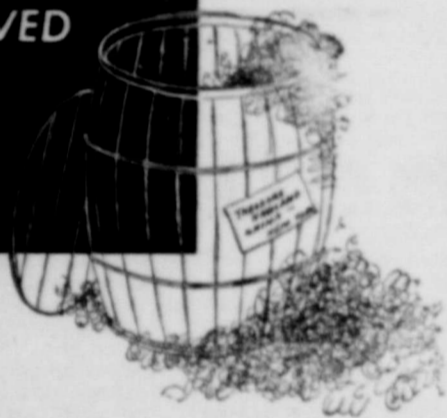
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Tall Blonde Boasts Of Being 'Sex Expert'

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Dec. 19 (UP)—A tall, shapely blonde who boasted of intimacies with 269 servicemen in her self-proclaimed role of "sex expert" was held here today for a lunacy trial.

The 36-year-old woman, whose identity was not revealed, had a collection of "case histories" on the sex problems of 700 servicemen.

Among them were complete reports on the 269 soldiers who, she said, had been her lovers. She denied, however, that she had ever had normal sex relations with any of the men.

The woman said her own marriage to an older man had failed. Agents of the FBI and Army counter-intelligence corps became interested when officers searched the woman's lush apartment and found biographical data on more than 700 servicemen.

Detective Tom Farley said many letters in the file were from officers and men overseas and contained information of military value.

However, the former Austin, Texas, woman claimed she gathered the information for a "survey" on "sexology". She said she wanted to be a social worker. County Health Officer Dr. G. D. Boyd ordered her committed to the San Antonio state mental hospital pending a lunacy trial.

Federal officers declined comment on whether they would file charges against the voluptuous blonde, who claimed the Army's criminal investigation division had cleared her in an investigation a year ago.

Police found a list of book titles dealing with Soviet Russia, the Near East and world politics pasted inside one notebook.

The blonde said the list was merely one made while attempting to "educate" her estranged husband, whom she admitted took a dim view of her "sexology survey". She said the list had no special significance—that she read

"everything I can get my hands on."

She said she questioned servicemen about their military duties "because you can tell something about a man's brain by his job."

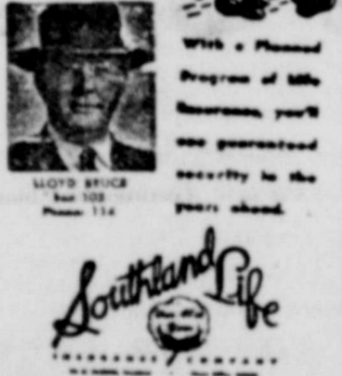
Other questions she asked in her questionnaire dealt with physical characteristics, background, pre-marital and post-marital sexual relations.

The presentation came at a barbecue given the Red Raiders by Lubbock business men.

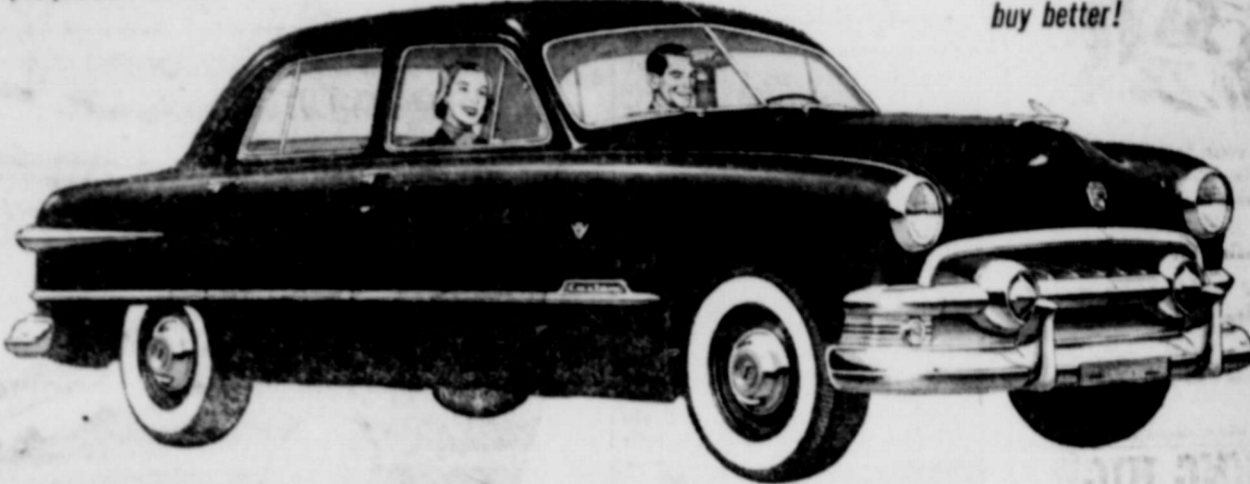

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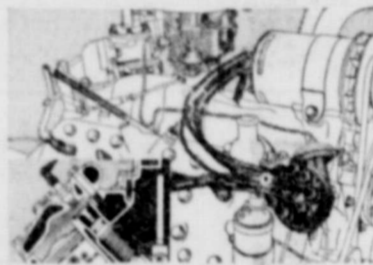

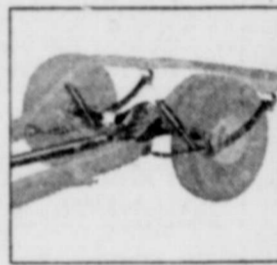

AIR FORCE RESERVISTS FLY CARGO PLANE 'SLICK WITCH'

ABOARD C-46 "SLICK WITCH" OVER KOREA, Dec. 19 (UP)—The old correspondent's cry, "anybody here from Chicago?" works fine on the crew of this plane. Everybody here is from Chicago—or thereabouts.

Matter of fact, the whole troop carrier wing of 1,400 men of

which this plane and crew are a part is from Chicago. The wing, composed of Air Force reserves was reactivated as a group early in August. They've been flying men and supplies around Korea in their C-46 Curtis Commando transports ever since.

Your correspondent was waiting in a passenger shack of an airbase in Japan to board the "Slick Witch" when a familiar looking figure walked in—a huge dark, tough-looking man in immaculate naval uniform with three stripes on the sleeve. I called out: "Hey, Butch." He looked around startled and then came over to me grinning.

He was Commander Never Player of Alamenda, Calif., who was gunnery officer on the Battleship Missouri in 1946 when I was on the Missouri during its trip to Istanbul and other Mediterranean ports. Player is one of those persons whose nickname sticks to him like a leech. He is known as Butch wherever he goes.

We talked over old times for a while and then went out and boarded the "Slick Witch." Player was bound for a Korean port to take over as executive officer of a naval troop transport.

We took off with a cargo of 4,000 pounds of Christmas packages for troops in Korea. The two-engine plane, climbed above the clouds over Korea Strait. There was an orange sunset to our left.

By the time we crossed the Korean shoreline it was dark and the harbor lights of Pusan winked hello.

The pilot, Capt. Merle J. Lee, 28, of Berwyn, Ill., a Chicago suburb invited me to sit in his seat for awhile. That's a privilege frequently accorded to correspondents on transport planes. I always accept but I'm always afraid I'll kick some knob with my feet or hit a ceiling handle with my head and set us awry.

After passing the harbor lights of Pusan it was overcast above and dark below. Black outside and groaning engines—the feel

of flight and of void—these were about the only sensations coming to a man in the pilot's seat. Once a series of red semicircles appeared below—fires in bleak mountains.

Back in the fighter radio compartment S-Sgt Leroy W. Samuelson, 24, of Elgin, Ill., a flight engineer, talked with Corp. Daniel Johnson, 24, of Chicago, the radio operator. Samuelson, one of the

few men in the wing not from Chicago, is an Air Force "regular."

I asked Johnson what he did in the last war and he said, "same thing—radio operator on a troop carrier in Europe."

After the war he studied mechanical engineering at the University of Illinois. He got out in June and soon got a job but:

But after being here a while and seeing those wounded we bring out on litters and knowing what they had to go through I'm glad to be here to be of some help. And I think the rest of this outfit feels the same way."

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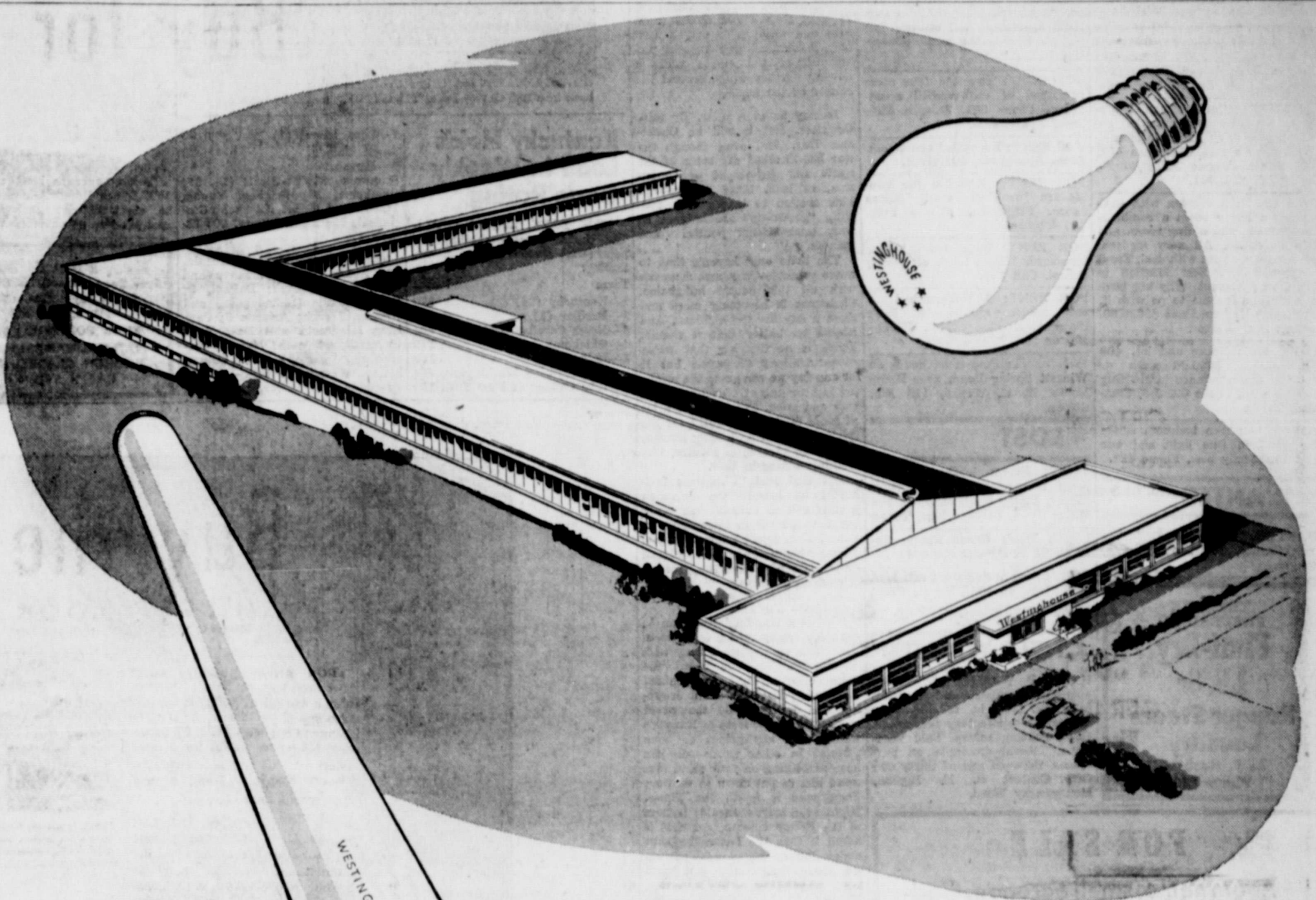

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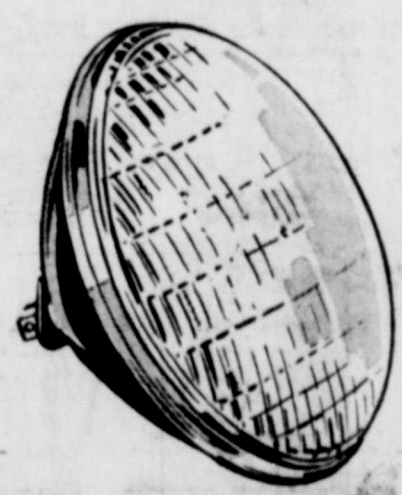

Amarillo Kicks Out Lynch As Sandy Coach

AMARILLO, Dec. 19 (UP)—Howard Lynch, who guided Amarillo to eight district football championships in 14 years, was "out" today as coach of the Sandies.

The Amarillo school board met last night and decided "unanimously" not to renew Lynch's contract.

The Amarillo eleven made poor showings the last two seasons. Lynch, one of Texas' best known schoolboy mentors, joined the Amarillo school system 21 years ago as line coach under Blair Cherry, who steered the Sandies to state championships three years straight before joining the University of Texas.

Taking over as head coach in 1937, Lynch directed Amarillo team to eight district championships and piled up an enviable record of

126 victories, 29 losses and one tie. However, the Sandies won only four games and lost six this year. They won three and dropped seven in 1949.

His teams won the 1940 state schoolboy championship and lost to Waco in the 1947 finals.

A spokesman for the school board said the group offered its "sincere appreciation" for Lynch's longtime service, and hoped he

would stay with the school system in another capacity.

Lynch, whose salary as head coach was \$6,000 per year, is a past president of the Texas High School Coaches Association and now is a director of the organization.

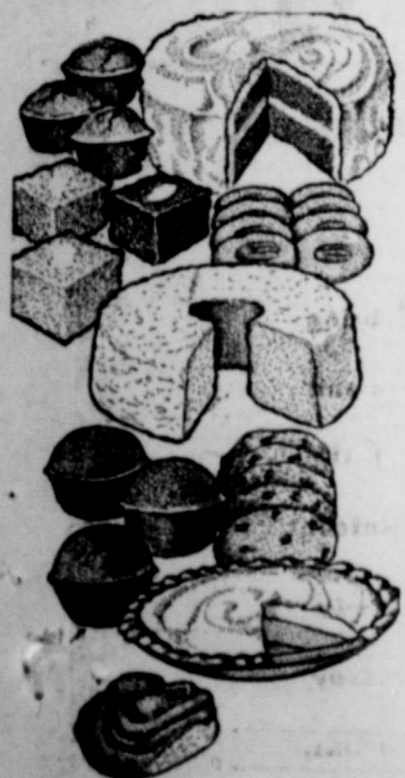

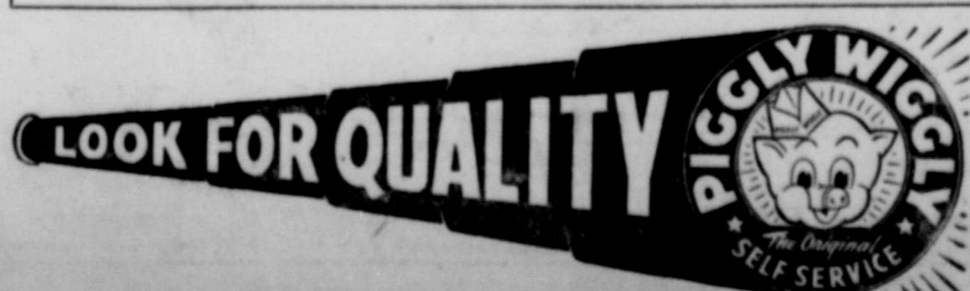

Tape Recording May Replace School Teacher

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (UP)—A tape recording dramatizing the day's history lesson may replace the history teacher in the next few years, Richard C. Brower, Minnesota's supervisor of radio education said in discussing the imminent teacher shortage.

School children don't need to anticipate a whole day of classes coming from a loudspeaker, with nothing but a record player where the teacher used to be.

Magnetic tape would only be an aide to the schools. You couldn't do away with the human element in teaching," Brower said. "But with the drastic shortage of teachers coming as men and women go back into the service, we must expect to have less qualified adults teaching our children. Tape recordings of educational programs will be a tremendous help."

Here to discuss his state's radio education program with other educators, Brower said that Minnesota had offered to tape its library of 800 educational programs for any or all of the 48 states that are interested.

Colorado has indicated interest, and so has Rhode Island. Mississippi ordered some tapes as samples," the former history teacher said enthusiastically.

"We have programs dramatizing everything from arithmetic to art. We try to avoid straight lectures. It's especially effective in literature classes. A teacher could put a recording under her desk and play

Dread Cholera Strikes India Killing 500

CALCUTTA, India, Dec. 19 (UP)—Dread cholera was reported sweeping two villages in the remote hills of Orissa province on the east coast today with 500 persons already dead.

Press dispatches said bodies littered streets, sidewalks and railway stations at Rantalai and nearby Puri.

Emergency hospitals set up by state authorities were overflowing. A dozen persons waited for each bed emptied by death.

The epidemic struck Rantalai while the village was jammed with 40,000 pilgrims seeking a cure for other illness from a

shepherd boy "miracle healer," 12-year-old Nepal Baba. Nearly 250,000 sick and afflicted had come to Rantalai in the past six months to receive his specially prepared powdered tree bark which believers said cured everything from leprosy to an ingrown toenail.
