

Reds Demand UN Seat As Peace Price

Massive Red Attack Expected

13 Enemy Divisions Reported North Of Border Ready To Launch Drive

By Earnest Hoberch. TOKYO Saturday Dec. 23 (UP)—Communist forces hit both United Nations fronts in Korea with fresh attacks Friday and Gen. Douglas MacArthur warned they were preparing to launch a massive new offensive into South Korea.

At the same time the Chinese Communist government formally rejected the United Nations cease fire appeal and declared MacArthur had "destroyed" the 38th Parallel as a "political and geographical boundary" with his Oct. offensive.

MacArthur's warning of a new invasion was issued in a communication only a few hours before the Peking radio broadcast Red China's rejection of the UN cease-fire appeal.

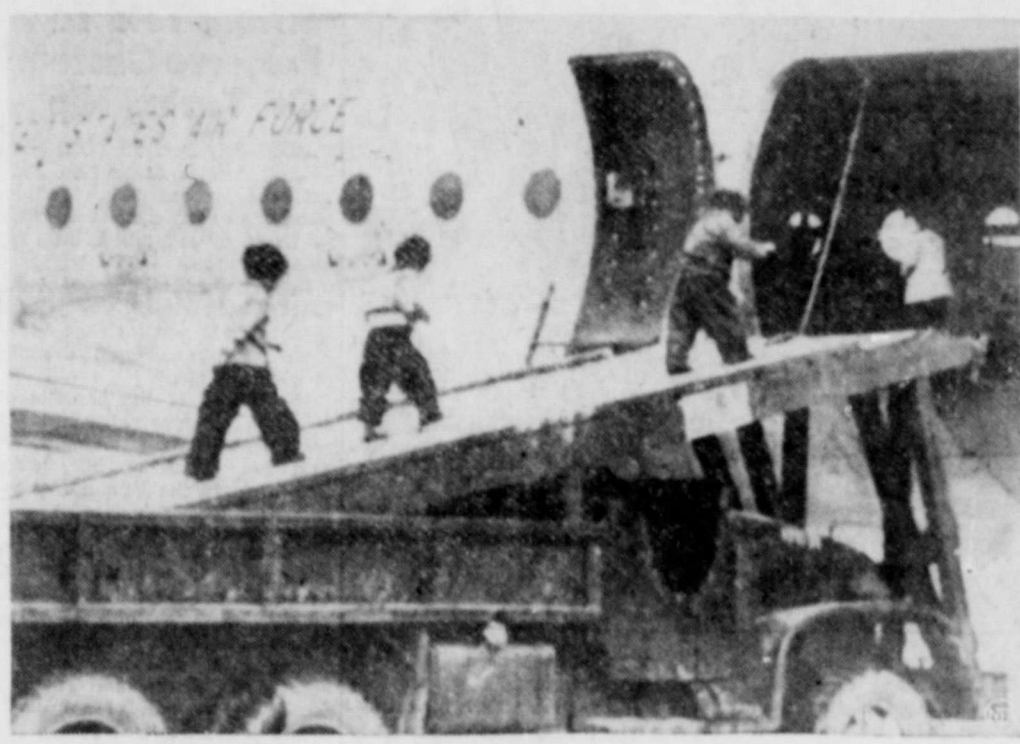

COMMUNIST MAY REFUSE TO RECOGNIZE 38TH AS FRONTIER

TOKYO, Dec. 22 (UP)—Communist China today rejected the United Nations appeal for a cease-fire in Korea, demanded a seat in the UN as its price for peace and hinted that Chinese Red troops no longer recognized the 38th Parallel as the frontier between North and South Korea.

Chou's statement was issued only a few hours after a warning by Gen. Douglas MacArthur that Red attacks in Korea are increasing in intensity and may be the overture to a massive new offensive into South Korea.

Hoover disregards the fact that
adoption of his recommendations
would mean the surrender of vast
areas of the world to Communist
aggression, including the industrial
power centers of continental
Europe, and that this would mean
the collapse of the Atlantic Alliance,
and then either war between the Com-

ion. Under these circumstances,
we prefer to follow the present
american policy of building up
strength wherever possible, as en-

Original Santa
Claus Was Tall,
Rode Bony Mare

It's little wonder that Saint
Nick is especially generous to
the American people. . . History
proves that the Americans have
done a lot for Saint Nick!
According to research experts
with the World Book Encyclo-
pedia, the Americans have given
Saint Nick a new name, a new
face and figure, and a new means
of transportation.
The original European version
of Saint Nick pictured him as a
tall angular man who rode on a
bony gray mare. Both the horse
and Saint Nick looked as if they
hadn't had a good meal in some
time. The Saint had deep sunken
eyes and wore a flowing thread-
bare cloak and black skullcap.
The early English settlers in
this country started giving Saint
Nicholas his "New Look." The En-
glish children adopted the den-
dary Christmas figure from the
Dutch, but the English children
had trouble pronouncing "Saint
Nicholas." Somehow the name
changed to "Santa Kalooz," and
finally it was corrupted to "Santa
Claus."
However, this was only the be-
ginning. In 1809 Washington Ir-
ving, in his "Knickerbocker's His-
tory of New York," wrote of the
Saint as the guardian of New
York City. Irving described Saint
Nick as a jolly fellow with a
broad-brimmed hat and huge
breeches. He taught Saint Nick
to smoke a long pipe, and in the

Britons Told To
Preserve Custom
Of 'Taping Nip'

LONDON, Dec. 22 (UP)—The
British Medical Association Jour-
nal told Britons today to pre-
serve one of the customs of "Mer-
rie England" and take a little nip
on Christmas.
In an editorial entitled "A
Toast to Bacchus," the journal
said medical opinion has never
been against moderate drinking
of wine and ale.
In defense of the benefits of
drinking, the journal said beer
and wine contain vitamins. It
said four pints of beer daily
would satisfy the human require-
ments of riboflavin.
"Missionaries have sometimes
quite properly tried to suppress
the evils of drink among their
native converts only to find
them falling mysteriously ill," the
journal said. "The ban on native
beer removes the native's only
source of vitamin-B complex."
The journal said it feared the

labor government's national health
service would halt the practice of
some hospitals providing patients
with free beer as part of their
treatment.
At least one hospital will, in
the future, give its patients free
magazines instead of beer, the
journal said.
"The modern planned state is
the direct inheritor of the Purit-
an tradition," the journal said.
"Yet a little of Merrie England
still lingers on in the season from
Christmas to New Year, and its
symbol is the glass that cheers."

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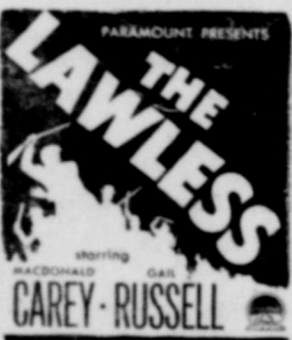

At Houston, Coach Johnny Kitchen's husky Austin Maroon's version of the single wing attack will be pitted against Coach Dan Stallworth's Baytown Ganders, who reportedly use some 14 variations of the T-formation.

Hightower's Scots and Stallworth's Ganders, who are slight favorites among the gentry who set the odds for a living, use the Notre Dame box and split-T, respectively, as their basic offensive patterns. But, they don't stick to those methods.

Both Austin and Baytown were expected to be in fair physical condition for their game in Rice's new 70,000-capacity stadium at Houston.

Austin's big line, averaging 188 pounds on offense and 197 on defense, may be the answer to Baytown's precision-blocking split-T attack built around the passing of quarterback Gerald Orton and the running of Jimmy Walsley and Tom Brundrett.

Incidentally, Austin has never lost a semifinal game, Baytown has never won one. Each has reached this stage of the state race twice previously.
