The toll in Texas from last Friday at 6 p.m. through early cluding 20 fire deaths, 32 miscellaneous a n d the remainder from traffic.

N. K. Woerner, statistican for the department of public safety said the violent death toll for a similar period last year was 51, including 25 traffic victims.

A United Press survey showed Texas leading the nation in holiday fatalities. Thirty-three violent deaths

were reported during the Labor Day week end, of which 29 were traffic. The longer July 4 holiday claimed 54 lives, including 33 in traffic.




