## Air Force To Call Up 150,000 Reservists

### ORGANIZED RESERVE WINGS, AIR NG DUE MARCH 1-MAY 15

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UP)—The Air Force announced today that all of its remaining organized reserve wings and most Air National Guard wings—a total of 150,000 men—will be called to active duty between March 1 and May 15.

The callup includes 12 Air National Guard wings, 21 reserve training center wings, a "major portion" of individual reserves, and "an undetermined number" of unassigned volunteer reserves.

The Air Force already had called up 10 National Guard wings and a tactical control group, four reserve wings and 50,000 individual reserve officers and airmen.

An undesignated number of smaller reserve and National Guard air units also have been ordered up.

The Air Force announced its new mobilization plans as administration leaders started the big push for congressional approval to draft 18-year-olds.

The Air Force mobilization will bring it to an overall strength of 971,000 "as soon as possible." The Air Force now is aiming at a 100-group force by early 1953.

For security reasons, the identity of the guard and reserve units was not revealed.

DALLAS, Tex., Jan. 18 (UP)—Maj. Harry Reed, Oklahoma City, commanding officer of Marine Fighter Squadron 112, announced today the unit will go into federal service March 1.

The squadron is composed of more than 200 officers and enlisted men from the Dallas-Ft. Worth area. It will be stationed at the Naval Air Station, Grand Prairie, for 30 days, then transferred during April to an unidentified destination.

### Italy Commies Riot Against Eisenhower Visit

ROME, Jan. 18 (UP)—Authorities counted one dead and 31 injured today in Communist-inspired riotous protests against the arrival in Italy of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The Communists called a general strike in Rome to begin at 5:30 p.m. (9:30 a.m. EST), including a one-hour strike of all city transportation workers.

The government tightened security measures to safeguard Eisenhower and prevent further violence.

But Communist sources said they expected the protest demonstrations to continue with bigger turnouts scheduled in Milan, Turin and Naples.

Police at Adrano on the island of Sicily were forced to open fire on a demonstrating agricultural workers last night when they refused to disperse.

One worker was killed by police bullets and 10 workers and 21 federal carabinieri police were injured. Reinforcements were sent to the island city.

The Communist newspaper Avanti in Rome called Eisenhower a "Gaullester" (Nazi overlord) and said "all Rome is raising a cry of protest" to his being here.

### Cavalry Medal Available To Texas Veterans

Officers and enlisted men, or their next of kin if the soldier is deceased, who served in the two brigades of cavalry organized by the State of Texas under authority of the War Department, between December 8, 1917 and November 11, 1918 are entitled to the Texas National Guard Cavalry Medal, Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry, the Adjutant General pointed out today.

These units were never drafted into Federal service and therefore were ineligible for the Victory Medal. So the U. S. Congress, in 1924, authorized the insurance of this distinctive medal for personnel of the 1st and 2nd Cavalry Brigades.

The medal is free. Persons who consider themselves eligible for one of these medals should write the Adjutant General, Austin, stating their length of service and name of unit.

### BULLETIN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UP)—President Truman said today that wage-price controls will be imposed as quickly as practicable.

The President was asked at his news conference about reports that the controls might be ordered within a few days. Mr. Truman said he thought defense mobilizer Charles E. Wilson covered the situation in a speech last night at Philadelphia.

Wilson said controls will be imposed as quickly as possible. He set no date but a general price freeze, accompanied by a rollback perhaps to Jan. 1 of prices hiked recently, will be ordered in about a week. A "looser" order "stabilizing" wages will come later.

### 'Butcher' Billy Denies Knowing Of Murder Spree

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 18 (UP)—Badman Billy Cook's spirits rose today, although the time was drawing close for his return to Oklahoma where he must stand trial for the kidnap slaying of five persons.

The weak-eyed little ex-convict perked up for the first time since his capture Monday. But he still denied remembering anything about killing eight asserted victims.

Cook apparently had forgotten even where he was being held and asked a county jail guard where he was.

"Don't you know?" the guard answered.

"Well, I know I ain't in Mexico," the suspect said. "They don't have beds in their jails."

Mexican authorities took Cook into custody at Santa Rosalia, 600 miles south of the border.

Capt. Earl C. Riley, chief jailer here, said Cook managed a wan smile when asked if he felt better. The 22-year-old former convict received from a dysentery attack after treatment with sulfa and penicillin. He now is eating hearty meals, Riley said.

The Joplin, Mo., youth will be transported to Oklahoma City, where a federal grand jury will be convened Tuesday to consider an indictment against him under the Lindbergh Law. The federal statute provides a possible death penalty for kidnaping.

Cook has boasted of killing the entire Carl Mosser family, of Atwood, Ill.—two adults and their three small children—and two unidentified men. He also is wanted in California for slaying Robert H. Dewey, Seattle, Wash.

His prosecution will be based on deaths of the Mossers, who gave Cook a ride only to have him shoot them down.

### Minor Fires Keep Firemen Busy Wed.

Local fires hit the firemen in two shifts yesterday. At noon Wednesday, firemen rushed to Olden to extinguish a pasture fire. Two hours later that same fire jumped the highway and ignited some waste oil on a nearby pumping well. Firemen put out the fire with recently-acquired foam.

Later that afternoon, a grass fire on the Caddo highway was put out. Wednesday's outbreak of minor fires kept Ranger firemen busy from 12 noon until 8 at night.

### Even Reds Awed By B-36 Bomber

LONDON, Jan. 18 (UP)—Several members of the Soviet embassy staff were among hundreds of persons at Northolt Airport today to watch a U. S. Air Force giant B-36 atom bomber make a demonstration flight.

As the bomber, flying low over the field, dipped its wings in salute, one of the Russians said in English:

"It is beautiful—and how big!"

## Reds Begin Southward Surge

### 4th Day's Lull Shows Signs Of New Offensive

TOKYO, Friday, Jan. 19 (UP)—Communist troops began an ominous southward surge all across Korea Thursday. They almost trapped a United Nations armored patrol in the rapidly-filling no-man's-land south of Seoul.

The patrol fought its way out of Kumyangjang, 23 miles southeast of Seoul, against two companies of Communist troops moving in to fill the ground between Red lines and the U. S. 8th Army.

The UN forces escaped a flanking threat in a sharp fight. They killed or wounded 25 Reds and captured one Chinese prisoner.

The lull in major ground fighting went into its fourth day amid "grogginess" signs that the Reds were preparing for what might be an imminent new offensive.

American forces on the central front also clashed in a sharp fight with about 2,400 Reds in the hills 10 miles northeast of Yongju.

But in abandoned Wonju, superior Communist forces on ridges outside the city watched without moving while an American company reconnoitered the flattened city and withdrew.

Intelligence and aerial reconnaissance reports said Communist forces were moving south toward the battle line all along the 140-mile trans-Korean front.

Now that Communist China has rejected the United Nations appeal for a cease-fire in Korea, it was believed the Reds would not long delay an all-out offensive to push the 8th Army back into the old Pusan beachhead.

### Johnson Sends Letter About RJC Facilities

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson has sent a letter giving more information concerning Ranger Junior College's offer of its facilities for use in the military training program.

The letter was addressed to Times publisher Joe Dennis, who with several other Ranger citizens telegraphed Johnson, Sen. Tom Connally and Rep. Omar Burleson last week, offering RJC's facilities for training of military personnel.

The letter from Sen. Johnson read as follows: "I have been extremely interested in the problem which Texas colleges will face in the event of total mobilization, or large scale drafting of college age men. I have been in touch with the Department of Defense, and they state that the position of the Services is that, under present circumstances, facilities for training are adequate, but that plans are being laid for possible future expansion. The Services are cataloging their estimated needs at various levels and considering available facilities."

Johnson then suggested that an inventory of RJC's training capacities and facilities be prepared and made available to each of the Services.

"The Office of Education," the letter went on to say, "at the request of the NSRB, has undertaken the establishment and maintenance of a central inventory of college facilities. This information will then be made available to all agencies and departments of the federal government for their use in planning and developing programs."

### RJC Tries To Stay In Cage Race Tonight

RJC will be trying to stay in the running for the conference championship when they meet Weatherford Junior College here tonight in the recreation hall.

The Rangers were upset by Cisco, 61-58, last week and need to win this one tonight to keep on even terms with the other teams in the cage race. Another loss will just about eliminate the defending champion Rangers from repeating this year.

You can chalk up that Cisco loss strictly to an off day for RJC. Coach Boone Yarbrough said none of his players, except T. Wilson, played anywhere close to the form they usually show. But if the practice sessions are any indication of a game's outcome, Ranger should defeat Weatherford.

Before the Cisco game, the Rangers looked sharp in practice, and last. Yesterday, the boys were a bit ragged in scrimmages which may mean they have Weatherford on their mind and aim to do something about it tonight.

Weatherford is undefeated in conference play, downing Decatur 32-23 and Clifton 49-40. In the Decatur game, Weatherford held them to one field goal during the first half. RJC defeated Decatur 64-45, by the same margin of 9 points, but scored twice as many points as Weatherford did against that team.

Ranger now has won four games and lost four. They defeated Decatur in an earlier non-conference game 65-55, Lon Morris 62-60 and Cisco in a non-conference tilt, 50-36. Their losses were at the hands of the Hardin-Sommons Buttons 62-34, 48-47, Howard County 74-37 and the second Cisco game. RJC will meet the Graham Junior Chamber of Commerce team, here, Saturday night.

Justice of the Peace M. D. Jones returned a verdict of suicide in the death of Daniel Lopez. Officers said the youth was involved in a fight with his younger brother. His mother reprimanded Daniel and slapped him.

Last night she found Daniel hanging from the tree.

## US Set To Accuse China As Aggressor

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UP)—President Truman promised today that this government will proceed vigorously to have the United Nations brand Communist China as an aggressor in Korea.

The chief executive was questioned at a news conference about the next move by this country in the wake of the Communist rejection yesterday of a UN cease-fire appeal.

He said American representatives in the United Nations will bring everything to bear, and vigorously, to obtain adoption of a UN denunciation of Communist China as an aggressor.

As for the Chinese rejection of the UN compromise, the President declined to comment. He said Secretary of State Dean Acheson covered the situation thoroughly yesterday with his entire approval.

Acheson said then that the Chinese reply was completely unacceptable. He also denied that the American vote for the UN cease-fire plan constituted an effort to appease China.

Asked about a report that this country would encourage a diversionary movement in the Far East by Nationalist troops under Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, Mr. Truman declined to comment.

### VA Big Spring Hospital Needs Doctors, Nurses

The Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring has issued an urgent appeal for more doctors and nurses.

Dr. L. B. Andrew, manager of the recently activated V-A hospital, said that he plans to open an additional ward as soon as enough professional personnel can be obtained.

The installation was designed for a 250-bed hospital but is not operating at full capacity, Dr. Andrew said, because of a shortage of doctors and registered nurses.

Nurses' salaries range from \$3,400 to \$5,400 per year depending upon experience, education, and training, he said. Doctors' salaries also vary with qualifications.

Application forms are available at any major V-A installation, Dr. Andrew said, and completed application forms should be sent direct to the Big Spring V-A hospital.

### Korea GI's Are Hopping Mad At 'Politicians'

SOMEWHERE IN CENTRAL KOREA, Jan. 18 (UP)—American GI's in KOREA are getting hopping mad about this war.

And their wrath is directed at one general classification: The "Politician."

That is one of the most used words in Korea today. Get two or more GI's talking over their troubles and by the time they finish all the blame has been heaped on the politicians.

The "politicians" are responsible for prolonging the war, for failure to bomb Manchuria; for the failure of new equipment or replacements to arrive on time.

"Wait until we get home," they threaten. "Those politicians sit around, and say 'we will not leave Korea.' Why don't they come over here and then say 'WE!'"

It's a natural American reaction to gripe. But these men—once so near to victory—have now lost the burning urge to fight. They honestly doubt that they would gain anything if they took all of Korea—and their officers know it.

Meanwhile, any and all politicians are taking a beating. They are accused of electioneering while American lives are lost unselfishly.

There is no low morale in the ordinary sense. The GI's continue to do their jobs like well-trained soldiers they are. And they will fight as long as they get orders to do so.

But they believe someone is trying to "save face" at their expense and they don't like it.

### UN Infantrymen Complete Weird 24-Hour Patrol Behind Enemy Lines While Nearby Superior Red Troops Refuse To Attack

SOMEWHERE ON THE CENTRAL FRONT, Korea, Jan. 18 (UP)—A company of United Nations infantrymen finished a weird 24-hour patrol today behind enemy lines and into the blasted city of Wonju.

The troops, led by Capt. Forrest A. Walker of Kansas City, Kans., came back intact with 17 prisoners and an account of being stalked by superior enemy troops who were afraid to attack.

Walker's patrol was ordered into Wonju to determine the location and strength of the enemy after UN forces relinquished their bitterly-held perimeter less than two miles south of the city last Monday.

"It wasn't a pleasant sensation," Walker said. "We went into Wonju unmolested but there were Communists in the hills. We could see them moving on the ridgelines. We found and burned buildings which they recently occupied. We

had our campsite reconnoitered by numerous enemy patrols which came within 300 yards of us.

"We didn't find them in the open," the husky, six-foot Negro captain said. "It was like a city of the dead. But they were in the hills and all-around — in small groups to avoid detection from our planes. They could have attacked us easily with a force much larger than my company. Why they didn't is a mystery. They let us walk in and walk out again."

The city of Wonju was "completely leveled" except for portions of the south side, Capt. Walker said.

"It was deserted like a ghost town you see in the movies. There were only a handful of civilians around," he said. "Our planes and artillery certainly did a thorough job of knocking it out."

At a village 4 1/2 miles south of Wonju the company surprised two Red patrols asleep in houses and

### 45,137 American Casualties In Korean War

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18 (UP)—The Defense Department today reported 45,137 American casualties in Korea through last Friday midnight.

This figure represents the cumulative casualties for which next of kin have been notified. Because of the time required to notify next of kin, today's figure does not actually represent all casualties up to midnight Friday.

The time lapse usually is one to three weeks.

The new figure is 2,424 higher than the last one issued a week ago.

Today's casualty summary listed 26,956 Army, 496 Navy, 7,332 Marine Corps and 353 Air Force.

The totals included 6,509 killed in action, 29,951 wounded in action and 8,677 missing in action.

Total deaths were 7,303, including those killed in action, a total of 772 who died of wounds and 22 found dead after previously having been reported missing.

The Army had a total of 5,786 deaths, the Navy 64, the Marine Corps 1,321, and the Air Force 132.

**B-36's Drop Make Believe Hydrogen Bombs On Flight**

LAKENHEATH, ENG., Jan. 18 (U.P.)—Six giant American B-36 bombers that landed in England Tuesday from the United States dropped make-believe hydrogen bombs en route and were intercepted over England by British jet fighter planes.

Lt. Col. John Bartlett, operations officer on the flight from Fort Worth, Texas, declined today to disclose—presumably for security reasons—whether the bombers appeared without warning to the British fighter pilots.

"All I can say is that normal interception took place," Bartlett said. "But when they intercepted us they sure did a good job. They were all around us."

Crew members of the 7th Bomb Wing of the 8th Air Force who flew the planes on their 5,000-mile flight said the British jet Vampires and Meteors swarmed around the bombers while the 10-engine bombers were flying at

The U. S. Navy, which questioned the ability of the Air Force bombers to deliver atom bombs anywhere in the world, claimed during the unification row that modern naval jets could "shoot down" B-36's if mock air battles were staged. The Air Force did not take up the challenge.

First Lt. C. E. Horton of San Antonio, Texas, who made the flight, said as many as 20 British-jets—believed slower than modern U. S. Navy jets—zoomed around his plane at one time over Britain.



**Pocket Sized Radio Put On US Market**

BY ELIZABETH TOOMEY  
NEW YORK, Jan. 18 (U.P.)  
The words "excuse me, I'm wanted on the telephone," are showing up in the strangest places.  
Like in the third row, center of a theater, or a crowded street corner, or even a suburban golf course—all spoken by people who aren't even close to a telephone.  
It's not a sign of the frayed nerves of the times that start bells ringing in the ears. It's a sign of progress—a pocket-sized radio which pages a man to the telephone.

The idea first occurred to Sherman Amsden, president of a telephone answering service, in 1933. But the six-ounce plastic receivers just started going into men's pockets and ladies' purses recently.

"Aircall" was originated for doctors, and they still make up 90 per cent of our subscribers," said Amsden. "But we're letting other people have it, too, just exploring the field." He has frequency assignments and construction permits in six other cities—Miami, San Francisco, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Detroit. Residents of those cities will get the pocket radios, he said, as soon as equipment is available.

Every now and then a subscriber, say he's a doctor, lifts the receiver from his pocket, puts it to his ear, presses a button and listens intently for one minute. The receiver is six inches long and less than two inches wide, with a flexible antenna sticking up three inches from the top of the case.

A pleasant female voice is calling code numbers. Every subscriber has one. If he hears his number, he goes to the nearest phone, calls the telephone answering service and gets his message.

"Code numbers are sound-recorded on motion picture film and encased in plastic sticks," Amsden explained. "To page someone, we hang his code stick on a special transmitting machine, the stick passes an electric eye, and the number is amplified and broadcast."  
Reception is good within a 25-mile radius, the silver-haired developer added. "Everyplace but in the subway."
