## Justice Dept. Says No Commies Sneak Into US

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (UP) The Justice Department said today there is no evidence that Communists are crossing into the United States in the guise of im-ported Mexican farm workers. A spokesman said the border,

like any place where aliens might enter, is being carefully watched at all times by immigration and naturalization inspectors and FBI agents. Reports that Communists have resorted to the Mexican ruse are current on the West Coast. The spokesman said that among

the hundreds of thousands of Mexican farm workers who have entered, there has been "only one case of a Mexican laborer being indentified definitely as a Com-munist." He said this did not occur recently.

The spokesman said there is no basis for reports that Communist literature had been found on Mexcan laborers. He said immigration officers constantly turn back laborers who do not have proper work certificates.
