Records Fall In Border Olympic Meet

LAREDO, Tex., March 10 (UP)—University and college track and field stars shattered four olympic standards.

Defending champion Texas A&M was favored to keep its title against Texas who as usual, offered a major threat.

North Texas State, 1950 champion in the college class, expected stiff competition from East Texas State.

Defending champion Odessa in the high school division was expected to walk off with that crown having qualified 15 men for today's action.

Preliminaries in the university and college classes were scheduled this morning with finals tonight, while the finals in the high school and junior college divisions were set this afternoon.

Odessa's Joe Childress, aided by a stout tail wind, ripped eight-tenths of a second off the 220-yard dash mark of 22.2 set by Charlie Parker of San Antonio in 1944, and equalled Parker's record of 9.7 in the 100-yard dash.

William Turner of Brady turned in a 22.1 record-setting performance in the 220-yard low hurdles, also eight-tenths of a second under the old mark.

Bill Walters of Victoria JC added three inches to the broad jump record by leaping 21 feet and 10 inches for one of the junior college marks, while Texas Southmost's John Porter set a new district mark of 130 feet 2 1/2 inches, beating the old record of 123 feet 7 inches.

Union Goes On Strike Against Five Airfields

SAN FRANCISCO, March 10 (UP)—The CIO transport workers union announced today that a Port Steward's strike has been called against five Pan-American Airways bases for midnight Wednesday.

The union said major bases at San Francisco, Seattle, Wash., Brownsville, Tex., Miami, Fla., and LaGuardia-Idlewild at New York would be affected by the strike. Spokesmen said about 4,200 Pan American ground and flight service personnel would observe picket lines.

A company spokesman said management had not been notified of the strike. He said the dispute involved wages.

The union said it would ask a pay increase in keeping with the "increased cost of living." Its contract with the company expired Nov. 30.

A & M Wins Easy 45-33 Victory Over Texas U.

COLLEGE STATION, TEX., March 10 (UP)—Texas A&M's cage magicians pulled a surprisingly easy, 45 to 33, victory over the Texas Longhorns out of the hat last night in the first game of a series to determine who represents the Southwest Conference in the NCAA basketball tournament.

The Aggies, sparked by speedy Jewel McDowell, trailed only in the first minute of play. From that point, the Steers played a hapless game of catch-up. A&M led, 21 to 10, at the half.

McDowell coupled smooth floor work with 14 points of scoring for individual honors.

The victory, played before a roaring crowd of 3,900 on the A&M campus, was a welcome one for the Aggies, who entered the game as underdogs.

If A&M wins the second game of the two-of-three series, scheduled at Austin Monday night, the Aggies will enter the western regional NCAA tourney at Kansas City.

The Cadets unleashed a deliberate attack last night, featuring steady teamwork, which sapped the Longhorns' confidence.

Hutton Probably Will Lose Chance At Mex. Divorce

CUERNAVACA, Mexico, March 10 (UP)—Barbara Hutton will probably lose her last chance for a quickie Mexican divorce today when the presiding judge is expected to refuse to handle the case.

According to Miss Hutton's attorneys Judge Alfonso Roquemé will probably base his action on the fact that Prince Igor Troubatsky and his wife are not legal residents of Mexico.

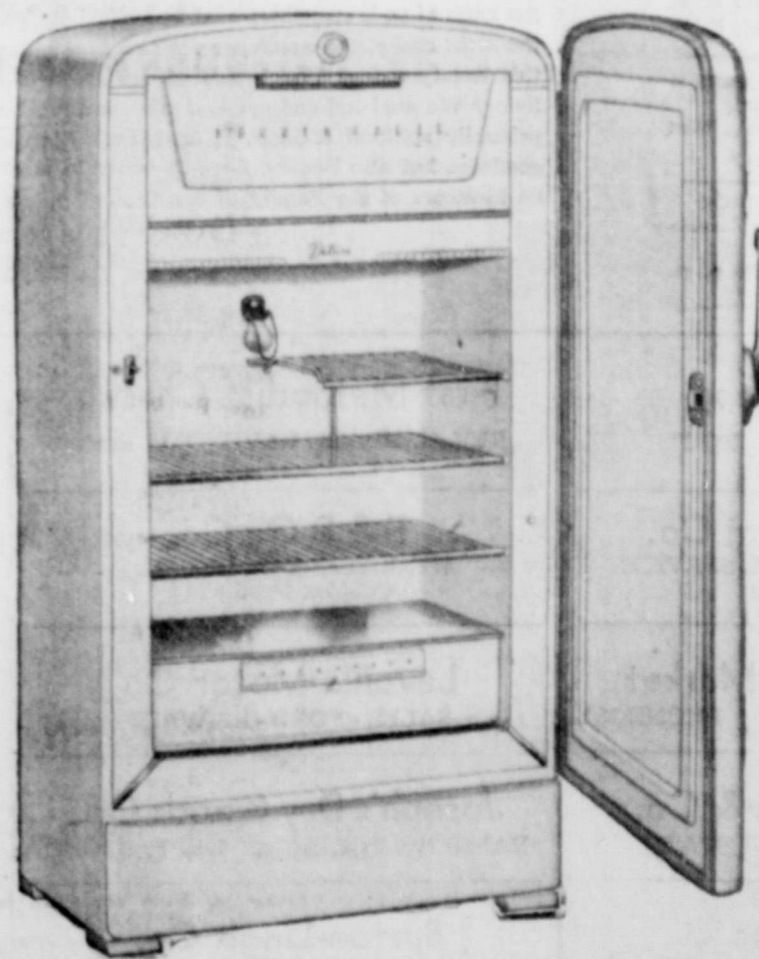

Ranger's Back To Church Movement

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the latest in a series of articles written by a member of the Ministerial Alliance during its "Back To Church" movement in Ranger.)

By Rev. Garland Lavender, Pastor Methodist Church. For an effective evangelism that is true to the peculiar tradition of the Christian Church, the congregation, not the preacher, must be the center of activity. It is the congregation that is responsible for those in the community who are not in the right relationship to Christ and His church. To be effective, evangelism must be "the outpouring of the church's life," the congregation's constant and uninterrupted program of building Christ's kingdom.

Three things should always be in the thinking of the congregation: First, retention of those who are in the church; second, reclamation of those who have lapsed from the church; third, recruiting of those who have not been won to Christ. Together, these three constant goals which mutually complement each other, constitute the whole program of evangelism. For the purpose of retaining and constantly strengthening those who are in the church, the congregation must use its influence to keep the home, the church and the public school spiritually effective.

For the purpose of reclaiming those members who have lapsed, and winning those who have never been in the church, personal work on the part of Christians and special preaching services with a distinctly evangelistic aim and appeal must be utilized. The regular services of the church, including the Church School and all other activities within the church, are important factors for all three purposes mentioned above.

Too often, parents are stumbling blocks instead of lighthouses absenting themselves from the services of the church and manifesting an attitude of indifference which lessens the respect of their children for the church and its

program. Too many Church School teachers set a pattern that separates their pupils from the church instead of drawing them to her, by failure to attend the worship services or by being unfaithful, undependable, neither devoted, zealous nor mindful of the many ways in which they ought to be cooperating with all other leaders in the church. However, in spite of all the leaks in the stream the Church School continues to be the largest river that feeds into the ocean of loving, effective, service to a needy and sinful world—the church of the living God.

Let the citizenship of Ranger become increasingly aware of our responsibility to our churches, and let us join the ranks of those who "March to Church in March."

OIL TAX HEARING

The most complete, point-by-point analysis of the oil and gas operators' share of the state tax burden presented the Legislature in recent years was laid before the House Revenue and Taxation Committee Wednesday night.

As sole spokesman appearing on behalf of the state's oil and gas producers, Andrew M. Howsley, Association General Counsel, gave the Committee statistics which showed that the operators' taxes now provide more than 30 per cent of the revenue raised by state government, contrasted to 11.6 per cent in 1940. He pointed out that if the 1940 ratio between the amount supplied by the oil operators and that furnished by other taxpayers had been maintained through the past decade, the state would today have annual revenue totaling almost one billion dollars.

He pointed out that the cost of government has more than doubled in the 1940-49 period, but the petroleum industry's share in the cost has tripled during that period.

"We do recognize, as do you, that the oil and gas industry is an important segment in the economy of Texas," he said, "but we feel certain that it is not so large as to justify the large share of the financial burden that we have on us for governmental costs."

He called attention to indications that "some rather large economic forces are in play in Texas other than that provided by oil and gas."

In addition to paying roughly one-third of the county ad valorem taxes on state-wide basis and heavy payments in school districts, the industry's state tax bill totaled \$108,765,000 last year from these sources:

Carbon black manufacturing	2,097,000

The Legislature's own Legislative Council Research Director also called attention to fluctuations in revenue depending so heavily on the industry's operation. It was suggested that budget makers agree on a dependable estimate of oil revenue and fix operating costs on that basis. If more revenue came in than was expected, then it could go to permanent improvements and not impair operation costs.
