Spain Moves Against Strikers

BARCELONA, Spain, March 15 (UP)—The government extended its retaliatory campaign from Barcelona to nearby towns today to smash the last signs of resistance from strikers protesting against the high cost of living.

Government orders for severe punishment and firing of strikers sent all in this port city of 1,125,000 back to their jobs following sit-down strikes and riots last Monday.

But in the port towns of Badalona and Mataro northeast of here, nearly half the industrial workers stayed away from their jobs.

Civil governor Eduardo Baeza toured the provincial area today and fresh arrests were anticipated. Reliable sources said nearly 1,000 persons have been arrested in Barcelona and surrounding towns.

CANTON, Tex., March 15 (UP)—Two aviation students were killed yesterday in the crash of a training plane a mile and a half east of Canton.

The victims were B. T. Sanders, 29, identified as the pilot of the light craft, and Billy Gene Eides, 25, both of Canton. They had been students for two months at Saline Wisener flying service here.

Cattleman Howard Heard witnessed the crash. He said the plane was gliding at low altitude and suddenly dived into a pasture.

DALLAS, Tex., March 15 (UP)—Ford W. Hall, associate professor of law at the University of Texas, was appointed today as attorney for the Office of Price Stabilization regional office in Dallas.

WASHINGTON, March 15 (UP)—Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson says the government is saving more than \$50,000,000 a year by cutting home mail deliveries to one a day.

Drilling Increases

DALLAS, Tex., March 15 (UP)—Drilling activity in United States and Canadian oil fields increased by 72 rotary rigs this week, the American Association of Oilwell Drilling Contractors reported today.

Machines built by the Diamond Match Company to manufacture wooden matches are two stories high, 90 feet long. Each machine is capable of producing 1,125,000 finished matches per hour.

The urban population of the United States totals 63.7 per cent, rural-nonfarm areas 20.4 per cent, and rural-farm areas 15.6 per cent.

Iran Votes To Nationalize Its Oil Industry

TEHRAN, Iran, March 15 (UP)—The Iranian parliament voted unanimously today to nationalize the country's British-run oil industry.

The 114 to 0 vote in the Majlis empowered the government to take over the British-owned Anglo-Iranian Oil Company, which controls all Iran's oil—24 per cent of the world's present output.

Anglo-Iranian funnels all production to western or pro-western nations.

The vote came only 24 hours after Britain disclosed that it had sent a note to Tehran contending that Iran's contact with Anglo-

Iranian could not be terminated legally until 1933.

More than 2,000 persons outside the Majlis cheered the vote. They carried national front deputies who worked for the nationalization measure on their shoulders. The national front is supported by the fanatical religious sect Fadayan Islam (crusaders of Islam), one of whose members assassinated Premier Gen. Ali Razmara March 7 after he refused to void the Anglo-Iranian contract.

Iran is one of the main sources of oil for the western powers' armies, navies and air forces. Nationalization of the industry significantly was supported by the Soviet Union.

California Charts Sunny Course With Smart, New Day and Nite Fashions
It's down to the sea in see-worthy fashions, say California's designers, for 1951 Spring-Summer styles. Long noted for originality and trend-making ideas that have caused the entire world to take notice, the current season offers such outstanding fashion news, predicted to stand out as California-designed wherever they are worn.
Lace plays a stellar role—not only in dresses for daytime and date-time, but for swim and play wear as well. Lace-printed cotton, lace overlay on gold and silver lame, elasticized lace, and lace over other fabrics is the big news.
Startling yet practical, these laces go into the water, take to sunning and active play wear, and become the highlights of after-five and evening hours.
Most new swimsuits depart from the strictly classic lines to give a more feminine approach to the details which set them apart. Especially interesting is the "peek-a-boo" look of black lace patterns on nude cotton or taffeta. There are cotton laces against solid fabrics in a variety of high shades to chart the new color course!

Complete week-end wardrobes are possible with as few as four pieces or as many as twelve different numbers.
Blouses, skirt, and jacket are combined for traveling, with shorts pedal pushers added for sportswear. The short shorts are brief, sometimes cuffed, often with trouser pleating, but always with slim and flattering lines. The Bermuda or walking short is shown, but takes second place to the shorter version.
California continues to promote the casual type of dressing for various occasions! This season gives this theme universal approval. Sleek lines, coupled with unusual detailing on the finest of imported and domestic fabrics adds up fine fashions that find wide acceptance with those who enjoy the California way of life.

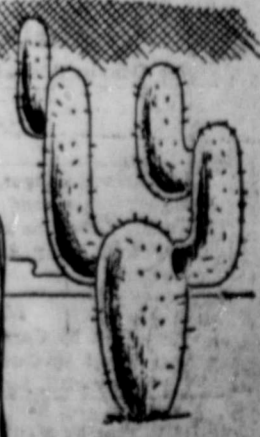

The best time was turned in by Johnny Crawford of Texas who bettered his old 200-yard backstroke record of 2:29.2 by 3.9 seconds.

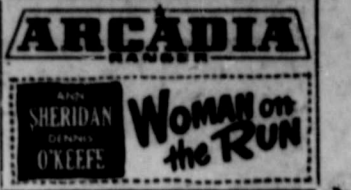
Eddie Gilbert churned to first places in the 100 and 220-yard freestyle events and bettered two marks.

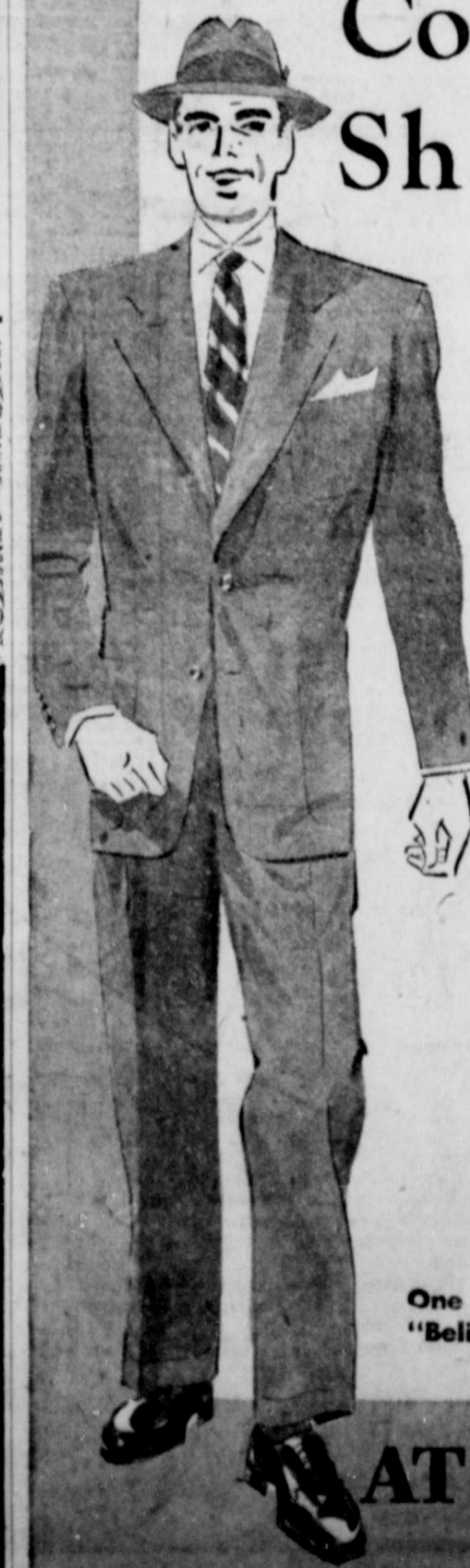

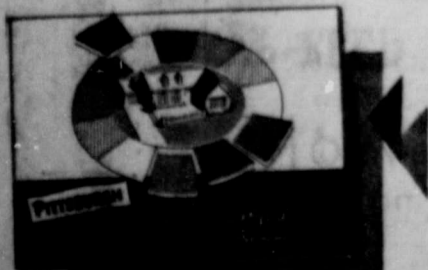
