Local Names Included In 1950 Directory

AUSTIN, Tex., March 24 (Sp.)—The 1950 edition of the Directory of Texas Manufacturers, just off the press, includes 19 firms in Ranger, in its descriptions of the 9,800 manufacturing companies in the state. The 306-page book lists all these businesses, first by location, second by the products they make. The directory also presents a concise analysis of every major city and town, giving the location of the city and its transportation facilities, the number of its retail and wholesale establishments and their volumes of business, and a listing of significant area resources.

Each firm in the directory is listed by its exact name and address, followed by the names of officers in the company, type of organization, date of establishment, products made, distribution area, number of employees, and home office location if it is a branch plant.

The directory will be useful to all businesses, especially to advertisers compiling mailing lists and to manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who want information on resources, transportation, the labor market, population trends, and competing companies as well as those whose products may serve them.

Social Security Administrator To Be Here Wed.

Glen McNatt, Field Representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Retail Merchants Association in Ranger at 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 28.

Mr. McNatt cautioned that those persons who became eligible on September 1, 1950, because of the amendments to the Social Security Act should apply by March 31, 1951, in order to avoid losing payments. This is because retroactive payments can be made for not more than six months.

Persons who should apply now include workers over the age of 65 who have had at least a year and a half of work under Social Security; children or other dependent survivors of World War II veterans, who are now given Social Security credits for military service; and workers over the age of 75 who can qualify even though they are still employed.

Persons who are not able to contact the representative should write the Social Security Administration, 308 Post Office Building, Abilene, Texas.

Construction Of Amarillo Plant Is Expected Soon

AMARILLO, March 24 (UP)—Construction work on an Atomic Energy Commission plant near Amarillo is expected to begin on April 1 at the site of the reclaimed Pantex Ordnance Works.

The announcement came yesterday from Joseph Turan, of the AEC's contract division at Los Alamos, N. M. Turan said the Walden, Fulton and Payne Construction Company of Lubbock, were successful bidders on the \$1,408,005 contract.

THREE DIE SEVEN HURT IN ACCIDENT

TEXAS CITY, March 24 (UP)—Three persons were killed and seven others were injured, four critically, in a three-way automobile collision three miles north of here early today.

State highway patrolman John Conner said the cause of the accident has not been determined, but added that one car rolled over and another caught fire.

"We don't know who was in what car, it was such a mess," he added.

Texas highway patrol dispatcher Gene Lane identified the dead as James Gregory Dixakis, 48, Baytown, Gregory Dixakis, 20, believed to be his son, also of Baytown, and Paul Dointos, 24, of Galveston.

The critically injured were listed as Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Martin, Vincent Gonzora, 21, and Cecil Fitzgibbons, 30, all of Galveston.

The Martins and young Gonzora were taken to John Sealy Hospital in Galveston.

Conner reported that traffic was blocked "a half a mile each way" for several hours after the accident.

New Insurance Rates Go Into Effect April 1

Paul H. Brown, Fire Insurance Commissioner for the Board of Insurance Commissioners in Austin, announced today through the Insurance Agents of Ranger that the deductible clause for tornado, windstorm, and hail coverages has been made optional, effective April 1, 1951.

All policies written or renewed after April 1st will be written with the same \$100.00 deductible clause that is now in force. For an additional premium the deductible clause may be waived from the policy. There is an initial waiving charge for each building or dwelling as follows: For 1 year, \$15.00; for 3 years, \$37.50; for 5 years, \$60.00. In addition to the above charge, there is a small additional premium based on the amount of insurance and the term of the policy.

Similar rules apply to farm and ranch property where there has been a \$50.00 deductible clause. The waiving charge is as follows: For 1 year, \$7.50; for 3 years, \$18.75; for 5 years, \$30.00.

All policies written prior to April 1, 1951, may have the deductible clause waived by the payment of the additional charges as mentioned above.

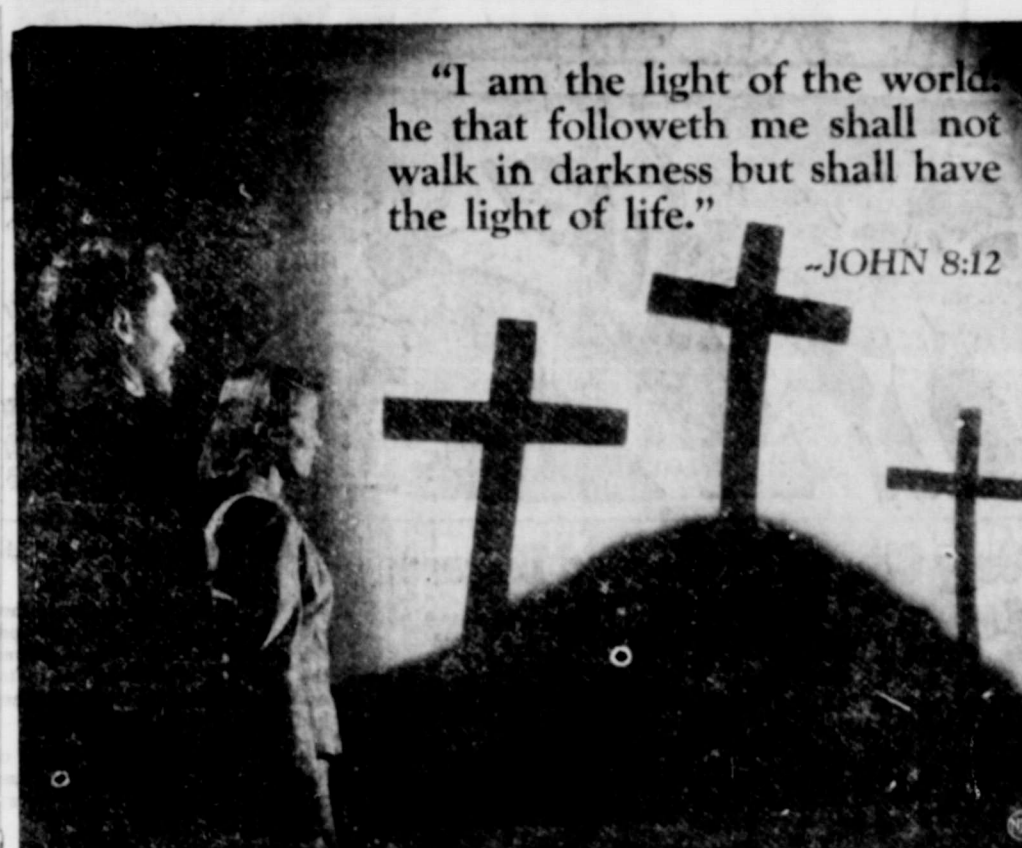
Attempt Made On Life Of Gambler

FORT WORTH, March 24 (UP)—Gambler Herbert (The Cat) Noble apparently went his name-sake one life better by emerging unscathed from the 10th attempt at his life.

Though officers in both Fort Worth and Dallas said they had no official report on the attempt, underworld sources disclosed that a bomb exploded in Noble's plane Thursday night as the gambler turned the ignition key at his ranch near Grapevine, north of here.

Wayne Tuttle, a Civil Aeronautics official, last night verified that the gambler's plane had been bombed but refused to elaborate.

He verified reports, however, that a section of the plane's motor was ripped out and part of the cowling hurled some 100 yards by the blast.

Conscience-Stricken Bank Embezzler Says He Stole Money

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 24 (UP)—A conscience-stricken young bank teller told a federal judge he used \$12,000 of his bank's funds in a three-month spree of gambling and horses and basketball.

The teller, Paul Foster, 25, appeared voluntarily in court on charges of embezzling after first telling bank officials about his crime.

Foster, father of a three-month-old daughter, said he had won a number of bets during his spurge and was able to return \$5,000 to the bank.

The other \$7,000 he said, had been made up by an uncle. Foster first went to his employers, then to federal authorities, and explained how he had taken the \$12,000 by altering the balance in the foreign exchange department of the bank.

A subsequent investigation by FBI agents led to charges that Foster embezzled \$1,844.84.

Foster told the judge several of the bets he made, beginning last December, had been on games involved in the recent basketball scandal in the east. Other bets, he said were made on big seven conference contests.

The remorseful teller pleaded guilty to four counts, two of embezzling and two of altering bank records, but sentence was postponed until April 6.

Mayor Crawley, Candidate For Second Term, Reviews Local Progress Of Past Two Years.

In asking the voters of Ranger for a second term as Mayor, I am doing so with the sincere conviction that a study of our record will reveal that I am justified in asking, and that you will agree that I am entitled to re-election. If I may, I should like to review some of the accomplishments of the past two years.

On May 1st, 1949, when the present Commission, consisting of myself as Mayor, O. G. Lanier, N. M. McCallum, A. H. Williams and H. E. Angus Commissioners, was following the financial situation:

A note to the Commercial State Bank, executed in April, before we took office the first of May, \$10,000.00; Due the bond interest and retirement sinking fund, \$7,500.00; due by the Water Works to the general fund, \$5,600.00; payroll and other obligations necessitating their borrowing the first week they were in office from Commercial State Bank, \$6,000.00. Total operating indebtedness faced by the Commission the first month they were in office \$29,100.00.

As compared to now:
Due for borrowed money, none; due sinking funds, none; due by Water Works to general fund, none.

In addition the city had in operating funds as of March 13, 1951 a net difference to the good, as of now and the time they took office of \$38,600.00. We respectfully submit to you that the above work we have conservatively and wisely handled your funds during the past two years, I do not intend the above statement as a criticism of the preceding administration, who had as you will remember, suffered a severe drought during their administration which made necessary the expenditure of a very considerable amount of money for moving the intake at the lake, for pipe lines, pumps, and other items necessary to supplement the water supply, and to prevent Ranger from having to ship in water by rail. The figures are given to show the financial handicap with which we entered office, and how we met it.

BAYONETS, HAND GRENADES USED TO PRY REDS FROM HOLES

TOKYO, Sunday, March 25 (UP)—Allied troops pushed relentlessly toward the 38th Parallel north of Seoul yesterday. They used bayonets and hand grenades to pry Chinese out of holes and caves which formed the last major Red defense line in South Korea.

The battle raged only a few thousand yards north of where Gen. Douglas MacArthur a few hours earlier had watched American artillery prepare the way for an assault on the last heavily entrenched invading force.

MacArthur said during a flying visit from Tokyo that he is ready to negotiate "at any time" with the Communist Commander-in-

Engineer Charged With Homicide

HOUSTON, March 24 (UP)—A 64-year-old engineer whose train killed a motorist was under a charge of negligent homicide today and city and county officers said it was the first time in memory that they could recall such a case.

The engineer is A. J. Pate of Houston. The victim of the accident was Ivan J. Parish, 34-year-old pipe line worker from Center. Parish was killed instantly Thursday night when the Southern Pacific passenger train smashed into his automobile hurling it some 71 feet.

Police filed the negligent homicide charge after Pape said in a written statement that his train was going 55 or 60 miles per hour.

Sgt. H. L. Ellisor of the accident investigation office said trains are limited by a city ordinance to a speed of 18 miles an hour inside the city. The accident occurred at a grade crossing five blocks inside the city limits.

Pape was held in jail for nearly three hours before he made bond.

Chief in the field. But at the same time he authorized the allied troops to cross the 38th Parallel again, "if and when" it is "tactically advisable."

United Press Staff Correspondent Robert Vermillion reported that United Nations troops suffered casualties in the hand-to-hand fighting north of Uijongbu, eight miles north of Seoul. But they continued to advance. Vermillion said, and pushed the Chinese back 1,000 yards.

Intelligence officers said they believed the Reds were preparing a new defense line two to five miles north of Uijongbu, across the entire western front.

U. S. paratroopers to the east of Uijongbu held positions about eight miles from the 38th Parallel, while Americans and Belgians hit the firmly entrenched Communists on the west. The Reds were dug into rugged hills northeast and northwest of Uijongbu.

"The Chinese let us get within hand grenade range of their holes before they fought," said Lt. Col. Julian W. Levy, Augusta, Ga., who commanded one of the assault units.

"The only way to get them out is to dig them out with bayonets," he said.

Northwest of Seoul, South Koreans met only light resistance from scattered groups of North Koreans as they cleaned out the area.

Earlier, desperate Communist rear guards nearly 1,000 strong had counter-attacked UN forces northeast of Seoul in an attempt to delay a new Allied crossing of the Parallel.

Summer Tour Is Planned By Truman

WASHINGTON, March 23 (UP)—President Truman may fight back against attacks on his administration by making a "stump tour" in the early summer, it was learned today.

Truman was back at his desk for a personal survey of the wounds suffered by some of his appointees in Congressional investigations during his three-week Florida vacation.

McAllen Paving Proposal Offered

McAllen, Tex., March 24 (UP)—A unique paving proposal, under which all streets would be paved at no direct cost to adjacent property owners, will come up for vote here "soon."

As outlined at a public meeting yesterday, the plan calls for a bond issue totaling \$1,500,000 to cover cost of paving every street in town.

Mayor C. W. Davis said increased tax valuations on the present property with unpaved streets would be sufficient to handle about half the cost.

He indicated an election on the proposal would be called soon.

Harvey Can't Come To Hunt Cause He Drinks

Only Clinic For Dreaded Disease Swamped By Hopeful Sufferers

 TACOMA, Wash. (UP)—Requests for admittance to the world's only clinic for treatment of the dreaded, incurable disease of the nerves, multiple sclerosis, have sky-rocketed into the thousands.

The clinic director and founder, Dr. Hinton D. Jones, said: "Unless we acquire more clinic space soon, I don't know what we'll do."
 "Since Nov. 24, 1950, we have received thousands of letters, telegrams from outside the state of Washington, requesting permission to come here to St. Joseph's Hospital. They're still coming, day and night."

He said an article written about the clinic in a national magazine has been largely responsible for the deluge of requests.

Booked Up Solid
 "We are booked up solid until May," the doctor said, "but—excuse me, I must answer the phone."

It was a call from Logan, New York. Another doctor had a patient who wanted to come out to Tacoma. Dr. Jones said into the mouthpiece, "Does your patient know that we can't promise anything?"

From 3,000 miles away came the inevitable answer, "Yes, but they want to come anyway." Dr. Jones told the doctor he was swamped, but to "come on out anyway, I'll find a place for you."

The jovial looking doctor turned.

ed in his worn swivel-chair, and in a hopeless gesture said, "that's what it is every day—we're jammed, but I just can't turn them away."

Patients Grateful
 Outside the cluttered little office, there was the mumble of nearly 50 people; some in wheelchairs, others seated elbow to elbow in a maze of walking canes, waiting to take daily treatments that three years ago were unknown.

Moving out into the hall, the doctor started edging through the long corridor, nodding at each patient. In return, he received frequent tugs on his sleeve and from each one, a smile of undying gratefulness.

Throughout his personally conducted tour through the clinic, the doctor introduced patients from all over the United States and Canada. His running conversation went something like this:

"He couldn't talk or see when he came here and now his speech and sight are as good as anyone's—She couldn't feed or dress herself, but she climbed aboard a plane in Miami Springs, Florida, and flew out here by herself; we didn't believe it when she told us her story upon arrival."

One 17-year-old youth was carefully edging along a corridor, clinging to the wall for support and moving just a few inches at a time. He smiled as the doctor came up to him.

Feels Relieved
 "I'm getting better, am I not Doctor? I feel almost as if I had

awakened from the dead," the youngster said.

Back in his office, Dr. Jones said an average of eight new patients arrive daily, some making the trip from hundreds of miles away without knowing if they had the tortuous M.S. or not.

According to the doctor, 25 or 30 people are turned away because they do not have multiple sclerosis.

"M. S. is far worse than polio," said Dr. Jones, "and thousands of cases have come to doctors' attention since our clinic opened three years ago."

"You've seen the terrible problem facing us. Federal aid is being sought by representative Thor C. Tollefson of Washington. In the meantime, we will take in patients just as long as it's humanly possible."

Yankee Thugs Are Captured In Arizona

KINGMAN, ARIZ., March 23 (UP)—Federal Bureau of Investigation held three New York teen-agers for further questioning today after they admitted robbing service stations in Arizona and three other states on a cross-country crime spree.

The trio was arrested late yesterday by an FBI agent and John Coats, a state motor vehicle division inspector, who recognized them from descriptions furnished by a Mesa, Ariz., service station operator robbed earlier this week. The youths were armed when taken into custody.

William A. Murphy, special agent for the FBI in Arizona, identified the suspects as Victor Joseph Mastrangelo, 18; Franklin George Mraz, 17, and Robert Charles Mattson, 17, all of the Bronx, N. Y.

He said Federal Dyer Act charges probably would be filed against the trio in Phoenix today but it was not known whether robbery charges would be pressed.

Meanwhile, two girls, 14 and 15, also from the Bronx, were detailed as Duncan, Ariz., after authorities found them walking along a highway. They said they had been with the trio but were abandoned several days ago.

Murphy quoted the youths as saying they "got tired" of the girls. They were with the youths when they held up service stations in Ohio, Missouri and at Brownwood, Tex., Murphy said.

The three youthful gunmen were captured following a statewide search touched off when they robbed Elbert Kupis, owner of a gas station east of Mesa, of \$75 yesterday. Kupis told sheriff's deputies he fired at the youths as they fled in a car.

Under questioning, the FBI man said, the youths admitted stealing \$87 from a New Mexico man and firing at his truck. The trio told authorities they came west in a car taken from a Bronx, N. Y., garage owned by Mastrangelo's father.

Suicide Verdict Is Returned In Officer's Death

SAN ANTONIO, March 23 (UP)—A 32-year-old Lackland Air Force Base Officer was found shot to death on a deserted country road near here last night, an army prayer book crumpled beneath his body and a .45 caliber pistol nearby.

The officer, Lt. Col. Leon R. McMullin of San Antonio, had been missing from his home since yesterday morning. He recently was transferred here from Reese Air Force Base at Lubbock and his wife said he had been "acting strange."

Justice of the peace M. D. Jones returned a verdict of suicide. He said he had been told by the widow that McMullin felt his new assignment was "too big for him."

McMullin was a former master sergeant. He had been recalled to duty March 5 and was to report to Lackland. A veteran of the China-Burma-India Theater in World War II, he held the distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with four Clusters. He was graduated as a pilot from Brooks field in 1941.

Mrs. McMullin said the Colonel dressed in his uniform yesterday morning, went to his car, then returned to change into old civilian clothes.

He removed his watch and ring, handed his wife his will, picked up his nickel-plated .45, and drove away, she said.

Mrs. McMullin notified police of the disappearance about 8 o'clock last night. Deputy Sheriff Bob Beckman and two policemen went 10 miles west of San Antonio on a rural road, where Beckman earlier had seen McMullin's car. The officers found the colonel's body about 100 yards from the auto.

Lt. Col. McMullin had been assigned to Headquarters Squadron at a basic military training group at Lackland.

 streets have been rough, and even dangerous during rainy weather. To remedy this situation the Commission in 1950 paved with asphalt material, from Pine street over the hill, front and back, and down mesquite street to connect with existing paving. We know that this has contributed to the comfort and convenience of many of our citizens.

Early in 1950 the Commission entered into a contract with the

Texas Electric Service Company calling for the replacement of the old obsolete street lights, which were only burned to around 11:00 p.m., with modern mercury vapour lights, which burn all night, giving your town a modern attractive appearance, and at the same time giving our merchants the protection of brightly lighted streets and alleys.

In addition to the paving with asphalt materials, we have chattered approximately 125 blocks of city streets, giving all-weather street to areas that formerly were only graded dirt streets.

One of the first acts by the present Commission upon entering in to their offices was the study of the parking problem along the main street, and principal side streets, it was discovered in this study that there were cars parked on main street that were allowed to stand in the vary same spot for as long as two weeks without once being moved, which obviously was greatly hindering shoppers, who could not in some instances park in the same block with the store in which they wished to shop, after a great deal of study and correspondence with other cities with comparable problems it was the decision of the Commission that the answer to the problem was parking meters, and consequently parking meters were installed in Ranger in July 1949, a step in which Ranger was followed immediately

by Cisco and Eastland. This action has resulted in the greater convenience of everyone in shopping in Ranger, and in addition has added approximately \$500.00 per month to the city's revenue, with a like amount being paid to the firm from whom the meters were purchased. When the meters are paid for, which at the present rate should not take too long, the City will get the entire receipts of from \$900.00 to \$1,000.00 per month, which on a yearly basis would require a quote approximately \$450,000.00 in increased tax valuations to offset.

Another step taken during the past two years by your present Commission was the creating of a Local Housing Authority, which provided a way for Ranger to gain approximately \$434,000.00 in new housing, and which will result in a substantial portion of that amount being spent in Ranger. This housing can never cost the taxpayers of Ranger a single penny, and will provide modern standard housing for families who could never afford the comfort and convenience otherwise, at the same time giving the City an attractive new addition consisting of all modern brick constructed attractive houses, and while the Housing Authority will not call the payments they make the City "Taxes", they will pay in an amount comparable to the amount that would be paid in taxes from housing of like valuation, and it will still mean new money in the city treasury.

Inasmuch as at the present time there are approximately 20 families employed by an oil company, who for the convenience of their operation, would like to locate in Ranger, but have not been able to find suitable housing, the importance of the housing project has become very evident. At an average of \$300.00 per month, this twenty families would mean an additional \$6000.00 per month spent in Ranger.

Your Commission has co-operated with the schools, and the Ranger Junior College in every way possible, realizing that the splendid progress and prestige gained by our schools will reflect in the increased growth of the town, to this end we have willingly made available to them our men and materials and machinery in any undertaking.

During the past two years many items of machinery and equipment have been replaced, new fire hose purchased and equipment and machinery repaired and put into first class condition. In some instances entirely new equipment that he have never had before has been purchased, making available to the taxpayers better service at less cost. Of course there are still items that are needed, but it has been our policy to not obligate the City for long term purchases. We have paid cash for everything as we went along.

In October of 1950 the Commission began investigating the advantages of entering the Texas Municipal Retirement System. Our study of the plan, which was enacted by the State Legislature, revealed that it would not only be a boon to City employees, but a safe guard for the tax payers, consequently in November of 1950, the Commission enacted an ordinance calling for participation in the plan, effective January 1, 1951. Under the plan, which is administered by a board of directors appointed by the Legislature, City employees who have reached the age of sixty and have fifteen continuous years of service, or who have thirty years of service, regardless of their age, are eligible for retirement on a monthly allowance considerably more than they would receive under Federal Social Security, which is not available to Municipal employees. Inasmuch as Ranger has a considerable number of elderly men who will in the next few years be able to retire, leaving their jobs open for younger more aggressive and efficient men, without such a plan it would seem to be an obligation on the part of the City to retain for so long as they were able to work at all.
