### 57,120 Americans Casualties In U. N. "Police Action"

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., March 31 (UP)—The United Nations announced today that its forces in Korea had suffered a total of 228,941 casualties by early March 31, 1951.

The UN's report showed that 25,374 soldiers had been killed in action, 128,394 wounded in action and 75,173 missing in action.

The American figures (as of March 23) were 8,511 killed, 37,918 wounded and 10,961 missing.

The casualty report, based on March 9 for purposes of figuring, covered the forces of 15 nations fighting the Chinese and North Korean Communists under Gen. Douglas MacArthur. Actually, the date of report varied from nation to nation as the UN secretariat gathered the casualty figures from the world capitals independently of the unified command.

The Pentagon in Washington estimated yesterday that Communist forces have suffered 760,300 casualties in Korea including 547,000 killed.

The Chinese Communists news agency reported yesterday that the UN forces had suffered 75,000 casualties between January and March 25, 1951 of them American.

The UN report said United States casualties were exceeded only by South Korean forces. The South Koreans reported 16,182 killed, 88,511 wounded and 63,959 missing—a total of 168,652.

### Still Police Action?

WASHINGTON, March 31 (UP)—The Defense Department today identified 26 more casualties in the Korean War.

### Cancer Drive Kickoff Set On April 2

HOUSTON—The 1951 Texas Cancer Crusade, which is launched every April throughout the state by the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society, will be "kicked off" with a half-hour broadcast over the Texas Quality Network, Monday, April 2, George E. B. Peidy of Houston, 1951 Chairman, has announced.

Launched with a brief talk by Governor Allan Shivers, the special broadcast will emanate from the Senate Chamber at the state capitol in Austin. The broadcast will begin at 9:30 p.m., with an introductory song by the University of Texas A Cappella Choir.

Following the talk by Governor Shivers, Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, Vice President for Field Activities of the American Cancer Society will speak; followed by Dr. G. V. Brindley of Temple, Executive Vice President of the Division; and Frank C. Smith of Houston, president.

The special broadcast was arranged by the staff of Radio Station KPRC in Houston and will be handled by Station WOAI in San Antonio. The program as expected to be broadcast by the complete Texas Quality Network: WFFA, Dallas; KPRC, Houston; WOAI, San Antonio; KRGV, Westlake; KVAL, Brownsville; and KRIS, Corpus Christi.

### Galveston Woman Indicted In Dallas

DALLAS, March 31 (UP)—Mrs. Sophia Beneditti, owner of a Galveston nightclub, was indicted by a Dallas County Grand Jury yesterday on charges of perjury during the trial of well-known Dallas hoodlum Leroy Goss.

The indictments accused Mrs. Beneditti of "deliberately and willfully" giving false testimony during the robbery trial here Jan. 10. Goss was convicted of the \$12,000 jewel robbery at the home of oilman Ray Hubbard April 2, 1950 and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Mrs. Beneditti testified that she saw Goss at her night club the evening of the robbery.

### BATTLE IS CARRIED BACK TO HOMELAND OF KOREAN REDS

TOKYO, March 31 (UP)—At least two American tank columns plunged across the 38th Parallel into Communist North Korea today.

Elements of two U. S. divisions carried the war back to the enemy homeland in the same area that Red China's New Year's Eve offensive smashed Allied lines on the Parallel exactly three months ago.

The American armored columns drove across the pre-war Communist frontier north and northeast of Seoul at 10:21 a.m. and 2:45 p.m. respectively to close with the weakened but still unbeaten Communist armies.

They were four days behind their South Korean allies, who lunged up the east coast and crossed the border in force last Tuesday. Two-day-old reports put the South Korean Capital Division 8

### Williams Reviews A Few Facts Regarding Local Administration

I am your present Water and Sanitary Commissioner and am proud of the job I have done for you good people who elected me. The raid came only 24 hours after 38 other superfortresses dumped 280 tons of bombs on four vital bridges across the Yalu River frontier in northwest Korea.

B-29 Superfortresses struck another blow today at Communist efforts to bring in reinforcements and supplies from Communist China.

**Escaped Convict Led Honest Life While In Texas**

GALVESTON, March 31 (UP)—An escaped convict who had led a "respectable life" as a businessman here for two years, faced return to the Ohio State Penitentiary today, because he gave his "old flame" the cold shoulder, police said.  
 Galveston chief of detectives, John Fox said the woman the convict scorned tipped off Ohio authorities to the man's whereabouts and local officers arrested him yesterday.

Fox identified the escaped convict as 34-year-old Theodore Urban, who "just walked out" of the Ohio pen in August of 1948 where he was a trusty.

He has been living in Galveston under the name of Thomas Edwin Daren, and was assistant to the superintendent of an ice company, Fox said.

The detective chief said Daren had admitted he was Urban, who was serving one to 16 years on conviction of shooting with intent to kill, and from 10 to 25 years on an armed robbery charge.

Urban, Ohio authorities told local officers, had served eight years of the sentence when he escaped and came to Galveston.

"No one here knew of his prison past," Fox said. "He was well liked and respected and apparently was on his way to being a successful businessman."

He had met a woman here and was engaged to marry her, the officer said. He had purchased a home, furniture and some land and had even bought an interest in a grocery enterprise.

"Regardless of his past, I believe he was trying hard to make good," his employer said. "He was entirely trustworthy and an A-one man in every respect."

Fox said Urban's only mistake was in turning his back on his girl friend back in Ohio, whose name was not disclosed.

**Oklahoma Pilot Killed In Plane**

ALTUS, Okla., March 31 (UP)—A 36-year-old pilot was killed yesterday when two crop-dusting planes collided 150 feet in the air.

David O. Reid, of Altus, a World War II glider pilot, died when his craft plowed into the ground after the collision.

The second pilot, Everett Clark, 38, Erick, Okla., escaped injury when he managed to land his crippled plane.

Reid and Clark had just completed a dusting job in a wheat field and were approaching each other. Both men tried to avoid the collision by pulling their planes into sharp climbs.

"The woman wanted to join him here, but had been given the cold shoulder," the detective said. "She took her grievances to Ohio authorities who in turn notified us."

When Fox walked into the lee concern to arrest him, the man the officer knew as Daren quietly surrendered and said:

"You don't need to say anything, Johnny, I've been expecting you."

Urban has asked permission of police authorities to marry his Galveston sweetheart before being returned to Ohio. At present he is being held in the county jail.

TEMPLE, March 31 (UP)—Percy L. Koch, 62, of (420 Coule St.) Borger, was found dead in his bed at a Temple rooming house last night.

Authorities believed he had been dead for about 15 hours.

fronted or was forced upon me. I can't tell you what promoted me to make a referendum that has caused so much to do about. It served its purpose a lot more than you may think, and if it is contrary to the City Charter it is null and void just like many other motions on the books.

Now the police issue: No, by choice was I nor am I responsible for it coming before the Commission. I am glad that we gave each one a separate hearing even to the mistake of pledging to them each and everyone that he could open up and talk frankly and

we would not disclose their identity. That pledge we have not violated to this date, and I do not think the twelve pages of notes would help things today. In fact I am glad they were destroyed. This stir up was not passed off lightly as some would have you believe, nor was the petition with more than three or four hundred names on it. The issue was reconsidered time and again. One of our most influential citizens appeared and demanded that we put the policemen back on and I refused to make the motion or vote for it under pressure at that time. It was agreed to meet in special call meeting at a later date, which was done, the date and time set and all city officials and this citizen was notified and the same issue was again reconsidered with citizen not appearing. I had talked with him a day or so before the special call meeting and thought that he was resigned to drop the whole thing, until a little over a week before the deadline for filing for this coming election when ex-policeman approached me and asked me to do something that I did not feel like it was my place to do, nor under the conditions

There is as much difference in the quality of title information as there is in people and personalities. Most attorneys try to protect their clients against the hazards of irresponsible and sub-standard abstracts, and they should. Waiting for the best, where waiting is required, will pay big dividends in the long run.

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**COHEN "MUST BE CRAZY" TEXAS INVESTIGATOR SAYS**

AUSTIN, March 31 (UP)—A member of the House Crime Investigating Committee commented today that Mickey Cohen "must be crazy" when advised the West Coast Gambler may be on his way to Texas.

However, Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, member of the five-man committee which subpoenaed Cohen to appear at a Tuesday meeting, said that "if we hear he's in Texas, the committee probably would get together."

But Carr stressed that he was voicing only his opinion and was in no way of speaking for the committee.

He smugly remarked that Cohen "must be crazy" to make the trip after being cited for contempt for failure to appear Tuesday.

Committee Chairman Fred V. Meridith of Terrell declined to comment.

Cohen was arrested early today at Imperial, Calif., for speeding and told traffic officers he was on his way to Texas.

Deep running lures used in deep water adjacent to shallows have been the finish, with its violent wiggle and crawdad action have been accounting for the larger bass.
