## Truman Convinced He Could Win Election Should He Choose To Run Again 1952

### Planes Fight In Korean Sky; Largest Number Of Jets In History Bid For Superiority

#### Most Impressive Air Victory For 5th Air Force Since December 21 Dog Fight With Red Planes

TOKYO, April 12 (UP)—U. S. Superfortresses and Jet Fighters destroyed or damaged a record 22 Communist planes today in beating off the greatest enemy air challenge yet to American air superiority over Korea.

Some 210 to 220 aircraft tangled in the cloud-flecked skies over Northwest Korea in two major battles, one of them the greatest jet combat in history.

The Reds threw 95 Russian-built MIG-15 Jets against 114 to 124 U. S. Bombers and Jet fighters in the two battles. They ended with five MIGs shot down, two probably destroyed and 15 damaged.

Two battle-damaged B-29s landed at Aitard held Korean airfields, but no other damage was reported to the U. S. aircraft.

The Communist challenge tend-

ed to confirm recent intelligence reports that the Reds were massing aircraft in Manchuria for an all-out air offensive.

In the day's first battle, 80 enemy jets—the biggest single Communist Air Armada yet encountered over Korea—ripped into 30 to 40 B-29 Superfortresses and 72 escorting Sabrejets and Thunderjets over Sinuiju, south of the Manchurian border.

The MIGs not only failed to prevent the B-29s from bombing the Yalu River frontier bridge at Sinuiju, but lost three planes shot down, two probably destroyed and 14 damaged in the battle. The B-29s accounted for one of the enemy planes destroyed and one damaged, and the rest fell to guns of the escorting fighters.

Never before in history had so many jet fighters been engaged in a single battle.

The B-29s rode through intense flak and swarms of Communist Jets to drop 300 tons of bombs squarely on the Sinuiju bridge. It was their heaviest attack of the war on a bridge and crewmen re-

ported direct hits on the span, one of the main points of entry for Communist reinforcements and supplies from Manchuria.

Not long afterward, 12 F-86 Thunderjets tangled with 15 MIG Jets Southeast of Sinuiju and destroyed two and damaged another. The battle swirled from 34,000 feet down to 4,000.

"This is the biggest day for the 5th Air Force since Dec. 21, when Sabrejets claimed six MIGs destroyed and another six damaged," a 5th Air Force announcement said.

### Ranger Will Renew Questions

ARCHER CITY, April 12 (UP)—Texas Ranger Jim Geer said today he would renew his questioning of ex-convict Walter Brown in an effort to locate a large quantity of stolen explosives reportedly hidden along several North Texas roads and highways.

At the same time Geer announced that he did not believe the amount of nitroglycerine and dynamite taken in the burglary was as large as originally reported.

Officers yesterday found two bottles of nitroglycerine, one buried in a river bank six miles from Wichita Falls and another small cache hidden only 50 feet from the heavily traveled bridge at the edge of the city.

He said blasting caps, which he believed to be all those taken, were recovered. Fifteen were found in a car driven by Robert Packard, 35, who admitted taking part in the burglary.

Geer said Packard admitted taking only about 10 quarts of nitroglycerine and the caps. The four concerns hit by the theft had reported 350 quarts of nitro, 14 cases of dynamite and 350 explosive caps missing.

"Everything that Packard has told me so far has checked out," Geer said, "and I have no reason now to doubt what he said about the amount he stole."

Brown, he said, had refused to make any comment on the case yesterday after the "ten-time loser" was implicated by Packard.

Packard and two other men were arrested Tuesday in a car parked near a Vernon lumber company. Officers found a whisky bottle filled with nitroglycerine in the car and Packard said they planned to use it on the company safe.

The explosives were taken from a magazine used jointly by the Mendenhall Torpedo Co., Pan-American Geophysical Co., The Dupont De Nemours Co., and Wellex Jet Services, Inc.

### Ranger Citizens Feel Truman Is Wrong According To Survey

Citizens of Ranger seem to feel that Harry S. Truman, President of the United States, has overstepped his boundaries in the firing of General Douglas MacArthur as Commander of forces in the Far East, according to a survey conducted by a representative of the Ranger Daily Times today.

Citizens from all walks of life were halted during the day and asked "What is your reaction to the measure taken by Truman to remove General MacArthur from his Command?" The answers are as follows:

Branth Garner, The Picture Show Man: "What else could you expect from a little man like Truman. I think he has played hell in general and that now he has finally made a hole in one."

Allen Rushing: "I am inclined to take General MacArthur's side because he has lived with those boys and knows what is going on

over there. He knew just what the score was and what was needed to win. He hasn't even been back to this country since 1937 but has devoted his life to duty. Then he is removed without trial or warning."

Mrs. L. W. Bowen: "It is no time to have Truman making moves of that type on personal reasons of likes or dislikes. MacArthur should have stayed."

Mrs. Moreland Dooley: "I think it is a very stupid move and that Truman should be impeached."

Edward "Twister" Palston: "My reaction to the news was at first one of not giving a hang either way. I don't figure in national affairs and don't plan on it any time soon. However I think that it was a grudge move by Truman who is nothing but a Yankee and that's what you can expect from those

### Slot Machines Are Outlawed

AUSTIN, April 12 (UP)—The House of Representatives sent to the Senate today a bill outlawing slot machines in Texas as both chambers opened a full-scale investigation into charges that a House member had sought a payoff to insure the measure's defeat.

By an overwhelming 133-5 vote the House yesterday approved the bill which makes it a felony to own, manufacture, store, sell, rent, lease or transport slot machines and marble tables.

Conviction under the law is punishable by a two to four-year penitentiary sentence.

The bill was passed after House members beat down several amendments including one to exempt non-profit religious, fraternal, veterans and charitable organizations from the act. They also killed a proposal to exempt five-ball pinball machines which pay off only in free games.

The House ordered by a vote an investigation into the alleged payoff after Rep. Paul S. Wilson of Geneva threatened to sue the Houston Press unless it apologized for the story that touched off the affair.

Monday, the newspaper reported that a "deep East Texas" House representative had been in Houston soliciting funds from club operators to insure the slot machine bill's defeat. At one time the newspaper said, the representative was accompanied by a state senator.

Sen. Otis Lock, of Lufkin, chairman of the Senate's general investigating committee, said the newspaper should "either say its charges are idle talk or give us some facts to back them up."

Lock said his group definitely intended to investigate the charges.

In other action, the Senate approved a measure increasing the drivers' license fee from 50 cents to \$1.00.

The lower chamber passed a measure providing for elections on whether a city's governing body shall enter into contracts with the federal government for construction of public housing projects.

The House oil, gas and mining committee sent out for floor action a measure giving power to the Railroad Commission to set a minimum price on natural gas. The committee approved the measure by an 11-8 vote after a two-hour hearing.

### Price Regulation To Be Discussed At Breckenridge

FORT WORTH, April 12 — A Meeting for merchants of the Breckenridge area will be held April 17 to discuss federal price ceiling regulations.

The clinic will begin at 10:30 a.m. in the Breckenridge school auditorium and will be held by two price experts from the Fort Worth District OPS. They will be Finis A. Wilson, chief of the Industrial Materials and Manufacturing Products Branch, and Herbert E. Terrell, chief of the Food Branch.

Terrell has had extensive experience in the food business in both Wichita Falls and Navasota. Wilson, also a businessman, was with the old OPA.

The meeting has been arranged by Fred Ward of the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce. Ward requested OPS officials to hold the meeting. All merchants in the Breckenridge area are urged to attend the meeting.

All merchants are reminded that it is their individual responsibility to secure copies of federal price ceiling regulations, and this meeting provides them an opportunity to secure them and also receive explanations without having to journey to Fort Worth.

Ellis H. Boyd, Fort Worth District Director of the OPS said that deadlines are rapidly approaching for several types of business, and that doing business without complying with the regulations will be in violation of the federal laws.

### New Course Added

FORT WORTH, April 12 (UP)—A department of Military science and tactics will be activated this fall in Texas Christian University's AddRan College of Arts and Sciences.

The new department will be activated in September when TCU begins ROTC training program. It will be headed by an Army officer, college officials said.

AUSTIN, April 12 (UP)—Texas' draft call of 3,112 men for May has been cancelled as have pre-induction physical examinations in May for 6,807 men, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, State Director of Selective Service announced yesterday.

The state call for 2,075 men in April will be filled, a spokesman at State Draft Headquarters said. Cancellation of May's quota was ordered yesterday by Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national director of selective service.

He sent the following telegram to state headquarters: "Delay issuance of calls on local boards for May inductions pending further instructions. Instruct local boards to issue no further orders to report for induction under any calls already made on them for May."

Wakefield did not know if a call for June induction would be made.

BROWNSVILLE, April 12 (UP)—The case of two Brownsville policemen charged with robbery by assault will go to a jury following final arguments today.

### RIDGWAY MAKES FLYING TRIP TO TOKYO COMMAND

WASHINGTON, April 12 (UP)—President Truman, who hopes his administration will be remembered for peace, found none today as he ended his sixth year in the world's biggest job.

All around him there is trouble—some of his own making, much of it forced upon him by the course of events. But, nonetheless, the deepest trouble of his career.

The nation's attitude today is far different from six years ago this day when the sudden death of President Roosevelt thrust Truman into the presidency. So is the political atmosphere—so broad as well as at home.

Then, a stunned nation took Truman to its heart and pledged him full cooperation in meeting the crisis created by FDR's death. Today, the nation is split by his decision to fire Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Six years ago, politics was put aside temporarily. Today, his political feet are talking about trying to impeach him. According to pollsters, his political stock is at an all-time low. But he is firmly convinced he can be re-elected—if he decides to run again in 1952.

Six years ago, the nation was on the verge of victory in the world's greatest war and Russia was an ally. Now, the United States is stalemated in a small war that could explode into a big one. Russia is regarded as the sworn enemy of the free world.

Lt. Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, new Supreme Commander for Korea and the Far East, made a flying trip to Tokyo today and conferred for more than an hour with Gen. Douglas MacArthur, his ousted predecessor.

He took off again for the Korean front at 7:30 p.m. (5:30 a.m. EST).

The nature of Ridgway's talk with MacArthur at the U. S. Embassy, official residence of the Supreme Commander, was not disclosed. However, it was assumed they discussed arrangements for MacArthur's departure.

Ridgway arrived at the embassy and left on the return trip to Korea still clad in combat fatigues with a grenade fastened to the paratrooper's harness.

Soon after Ridgway left, MacArthur drove to supreme head quarters in the downtown Dai Ichi Building across the street from the Imperial Palace for perhaps the last time.

A silent crowd of several thousand Americans and Japanese watched him stride, smiling, into the building that has been his headquarters for 5½ years for perhaps the last time. His white-helmeted honor guard saluted smartly.

### Eastland County Has 10 Known Slot Machines

AUSTIN, April 12 (UP)—On the basis of Federal tax payments, Dallas County leads the state in the number of slot machines, information released by Attorney General Price Daniel revealed today. Dallas has 1579.

Daniel said the total on slot machines, as shown by federal tax records, came to 9,555—the greatest number of any state in the nation.

The attorney general released a breakdown county-by-county list on the number of one-armed bandits and similar gambling devices in Texas. However, he stipulated that "the newspaper man make it clear that these county lists do not necessarily indicate the present situation as to the number of existence of slot machines in any county."

The list showed the number of slot machines on which federal taxes have been paid since last July 1 and through the present date. Eastland County has 10 known slot machines.

### NEW RATES ANNOUNCED

Al Larson, local manager of the Texas Electric Service Company announces a new schedule of electric service rates. Mr. Larson said the new rates approved represent an average increase of only approximately 10 per cent and will affect all electric service, except power sold for resale. Similar rate increases have been approved in other areas served by the company.

The new schedule to become effective with the next monthly bills raise the average household bill about 40 cents a month or about 1-1/3 cents a day. This is the first general rate increase the company has asked in more than 25 years.

"We've reduced rates many times, the last time in 1946, when a reduction of 11 per cent in overall revenues was made. We were wrong in 1946 when we assumed that inflation had stopped; but until now we've been able to maintain our services at the lowest rates in our history."

"We have fully used our advantages of growth, more efficient generating units, helpful financing and reserve capacity in making previous reductions and in meeting the cost of increase of the last several years. We now must look to increased revenues from increased rates just as other businesses have had to do."

"With the new rates in effect our revenues still will be less than if figured at our 1946 rates."

"The increase we ask is the very minimum to meet present conditions and to provide good, dependable electric service."

"We feel that if prices and costs level off at this time, we will be able to make it through with the required increase. We earnestly hope, as does everyone, that control of inflation will be accomplished."

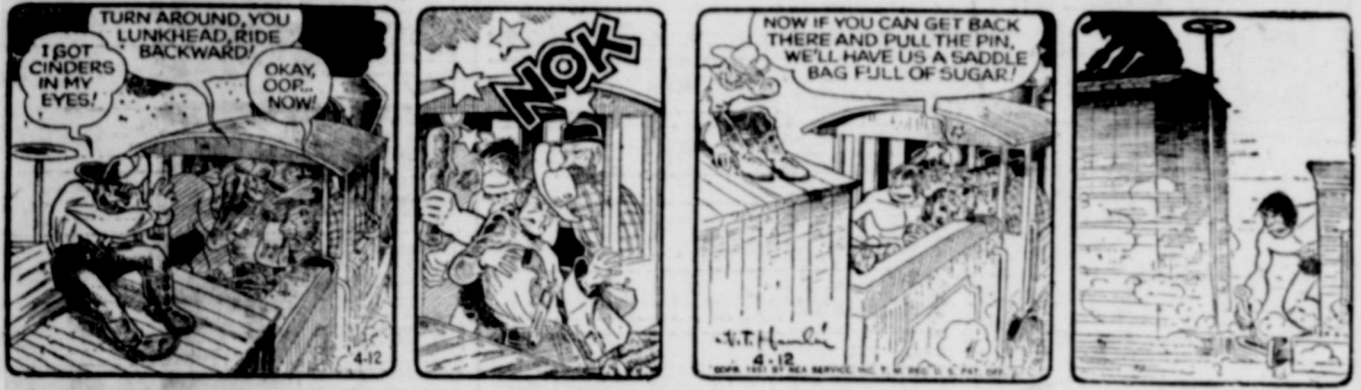
