## Heavy Resistance Meets Advancing Force

### AMERICANS RUN INTO FIGHT WITH DIE-HARD COMMUNISTS

TOKYO, April 21 (UP)—United Nations Forces closing in on the Key Communist Bastion of Chorwon, 17 miles north of Korea's 38th Parallel, ran into heavy resistance today.

An 8th Army communique disclosed that the Reds were putting up a desperate fight against the attacking Allies just South and South West of Chorwon. Western anchor of the Communist build-up area for a Spring counter-offensive.

The new enemy stand came after a UN Task Force burst out of steep mountains and smashed across a flat plain to within five miles South of Chorwon. The Allies threw back a night counter-attack by 75 Reds after a three-hour battle.

Other UN forces eight miles to the Southeast for the third straight day charged a Chinese Suicide Battalion holding the last hill mass before Kumhwa, another Communist stronghold 20 miles North of the Parallel.

Some 10,000 rounds of artillery fire, air strikes, flame-throwers, bayonets and grenades have failed to dislodge the deeply-trenched battalion about 13 miles southwest of Kumhwa.

However, the communique reported UN forces made "substantial gains" south and southeast of Kumhwa against little or no opposition.

Still farther East, allied big guns plastered North Korean troops moving south to reinforce or replace battered Communist outfits North and northeast of the Hwachon Reservoir. The bombardment killed at least 275 Reds and sent several groups fleeing north.

Hundreds of other Communist troops along the front and behind it were killed by air strikes. A 5th Air Force summary reported that the toll of Communist troops killed or wounded in slightly more than 10 months of war in Korea passed the 100,000-mark today.

Lt. Gen. Earle E. Partridge, commander of the 5th Air Force, said the enemy casualties equal about 14 Communist divisions. Although the toll appears large, Partridge said, it actually is considered conservative and has been carefully checked.

Heavy ground fighting was underway only on the approaches to Chorwon and Kumhwa in Central Korea.

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### Beautiful Nurse Tells Jury Of Fatal Shooting At Beach

COCA, Fla., April 21 (UP)—A beautiful young Public Health Nurse told a coroner's jury here late last night, that her employer, Dr. Hans Strasser, brooded about his wife's infidelity before shooting her to death as she lay in bed nude beside the nurse's husband.

Dr. Strasser, Brevard County Health Officer, is being held in the County Jail on a charge of murdering his attractive brunette wife.

No verdict was announced after the coroner's jury heard testimony from Mrs. James R. Howie who worked as a nurse for Strasser. She told the jury about the shooting which took place early April 14 after an all-night drinking party in the Strasser home at Cocoa Beach.

Her husband, a technician at the nearby Patrick Air Base Long Range Guided Missile Proving Ground, was critically wounded in the shooting. He is at a Jacksonville Hospital where it was reported he will recover from a severe head wound.

After several hours of dancing and drinking by the two couples who were together in the Strasser home for a week-end house party, the curvaceous nurse said, Mrs. Strasser retired to the bedroom and came out about 3 a.m., partly undressed, to ask for cigarettes.

Since the party had run out of cigarettes, Mrs. Eileen Howie said, "it was decided that the doctor and I should go for them," because Mrs. Strasser and Howie were "too drunk."

On the way back from Coca on the mainland where they bought "cigarettes," the nurse said, Strasser suggested that they "go someplace since we will only find my wife and your husband in bed together when we get back anyway," Mrs. Howie said she declined.

When they arrived at the Strasser house, Mrs. Howie said they found her husband and Mrs. Strasser asleep on the bed in the bedroom. Mrs. Strasser was nude, she said, and Howie was fully clothed. Except for his shoes "which he always removes before going to bed."

She said she and the doctor went out to the screened porch where Strasser suggested they leave the house. Asked by County Judge V. R. Carlton, Acting Coroner, if the doctor made any other suggestions, she said Strasser remarked that:

"If I go back into the house now, I'll kill them both."  
"The next thing I knew, she said, 'he went back into the house. I heard a sound like a cap pistol.'"

She said she ran into the bedroom where she saw Strasser standing with a smoking revolver in his hand.

### WILL GET A CHANCE

NEW YORK, April 21 (UP)—Uncle Miltie, the winter book favorite for the Kentucky Derby, gets a chance to redeem himself in local eyes today when he heads a classy field of 16 three-year-olds to the post in the historic Wood Memorial at Jamaica Race Track.

The Wood, which carries a \$40,000 added value, has sent six of its winners on to win the Derby and is regarded as the East's most important derby test.

Uncle Miltie, owned by J. J. Colando, is listed as a 7 to 2 choice at the present time to cop the Derby, and he probably will break from the barrier at about 5 to 2 in today's race.

### BETTE DAVIS IS WINNER

CANNES, France, April 21 (UP)—Bette Davis was chosen the "best actress" at the Cannes International Film Festival last night for her role in "All About Eve."

Miss Davis was nominated for a Hollywood Oscar for the same role, but lost out in the final voting to Judy Holliday.

The Cannes Judges picked an Italian film, "The Miracle of Milan," and Sweden's "Madamette Julie" to share the grand prize for the best film. "All About Eve" was given a special jury prize.

The show will be held in the Olden gym. Tickets are now being sold.

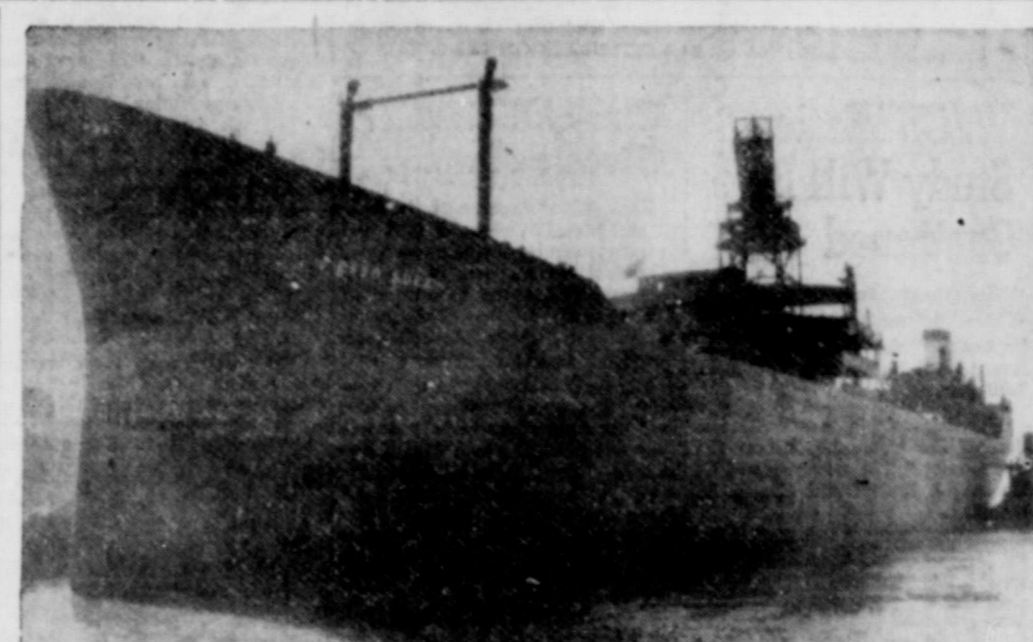
The players will present the minstrel in Cisco Tuesday night and later in Weatherford, with funds from those two shows also dedicated to the hospital fund.

### Four Survive Big Fire

CORPUS CHRISTI, April 21 (UP)—Four survivors of the burned tanker Easo Greensboro told today how they lay for seven hours on the "red-hot" engine room deck, gasping for breath in a two-inch layer of fresh air.

When the fire died down enough, the seamen cut their way through the ventilator, jumped overboard and were picked up by a rescue ship.

They were flown to the Naval Air Station Hospital here for treatment. None was critically injured.

### Republicans Want Full Probe Into MacArthur's Dismissal

WASHINGTON, April 21 (UP)—Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, R., Ia., said today Congress will not be "misled" by the Administration's reply to Gen. Douglas MacArthur's claim that the Joint Chief of Staff supported him on conduct of the Korean War.

Chairman William M. Boyle, Jr., of the Democratic National Committee countered by charging that Republicans have launched an "all-out effort to make political capital" out of MacArthur's dismissal.

The Senate Investigation of MacArthur's discharge has been delayed to accommodate the general and permit Congressional action to be completed on the Draft Bill. The combined Senate Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committees are scheduled to open the inquiry the week after next.

Hickenlooper said he believed the Pentagon's answer to MacArthur was "unsatisfactory."

### CHAMBERMAID IS ARRESTED

NEW YORK, April 21 (UP)—A \$31-a-week chambermaid was held today on charges of stealing from \$50,000 to \$400,000 worth of jewelry from guests at swank New York hotels.

Police said Mrs. Julia Arbotofsky, 44, admitted carrying out the thefts over a period of about 2 1/2 years.

She was arrested at her Brooklyn home yesterday, where police found jewelry worth at least \$30,000 and more than 200 pawn tickets.

Detectives said Mrs. Arbotofsky only got about 10 per cent of the gem's worth from pawn brokers. Police said she worked in 35 different hotels and changed jobs often to cover her activities. She disposed of the loot in widely scattered pawn shops.

HOLLYWOOD, April 21 (UP)—Eddie Anderson, Rochester of the Jack Benny radio show, had horse trouble today on top of his woes, with his boss's Maxwell.

The Walnut Acres Thoroughbred Farms, Inc., filed suit against the Negro comedian yesterday for \$3,591. The farms charged Anderson failed to pay the feed bill for some of his race horses.

### Police Search For Eddie Hay

HUNTSVILLE, April 21 (UP)—Officers renewed their search today for Badman Eddie Hay, Dallas ex-convict who last night failed to keep an appointment to give himself up.

When he failed to show up long after the 5 p.m. scheduled time, officers assumed Hay had chosen to stay in hiding rather than serve a 12-year prison term for burglary.

He was also wanted for questioning in connection with the double-killing of a Dallas Gambler and tavern owner April 4.

Wednesday, Hay notified Wichita County sheriff Hammett Vance he would surrender himself at the Huntsville Prison at 5 p.m. yesterday. He originally had been scheduled to begin his prison term Monday when an appeals court denied his second appeal for new trial from the Wichita County sentence. He was free on \$7,500 bond and authorities began legal steps toward having the bond forfeited.

### Twelve Hurt In Bus Wreck

HOUSTON, April 21 (UP)—Twelve persons were injured, a school girl seriously, today when a school bus went out of control and overturned four times on the edge of Houston, police reported.

The bus was carrying 10 Orchard, girls and their coach to a volleyball tournament at Huntsville, when the accident happened.

Bus Driver Ruben Jackson, 22, of Rosenberg, told police that an oncoming automobile forced his vehicle onto the soft shoulder of the highway where it went out of control and overturned four times before plunging into a 12-foot ditch.

The name of the girl injured seriously was not immediately learned. She was rushed to a hospital unconscious. The others, including the coach, Miss Florence Roper, 23, were treated for cuts and bruises and held for observation.

The 10 girls were members of the Orchard High School volleyball team.

### LAWYER SEEKS \$80,000 FEE

LOS ANGELES, April 21 (UP)—An attorney sought \$80,000 today from the former Mrs. Minnewa Bell Ross, bride of Elliott Roosevelt, for his legal services.

Attorney John W. Walling, Jr., claimed the money yesterday in a suit filed as an attachment action against the oil and real estate fortune heiress.

Walling said he represented Mrs. Roosevelt from Dec. 17, 1949 until Dec. 5, 1950, but he did not explain the nature of his legal services.

He said Mrs. Roosevelt, who married the son of the late President in Florida recently, paid him only \$21,500 of a \$101,500 fee.

The heiress is the former wife of Dr. Rex Lam Ross of Santa Monica, Calif.

### Fire Destroys Drilling Rig

ODESSA, April 21 (UP)—A spectacular oilfield fire that destroyed a \$125,000 drilling rig in the Tex-Harvey Oil Pool today was attributed to a flying spark from a rotary table.

The fire broke out in the rig southwest of here yesterday and ruined all drilling apparatus except the 129-foot derrick. No injuries were reported.

Spokesman for the Tex-Harvey Oil Company, owner of the rig, said a rotary table spark apparently caused oil to ignite as the crew was "drilling in" the No. 4-10 Floyd Well at 7,950 feet.

### Town Turns Out For Mac

NEW YORK, April 21 (UP)—The big town put on the biggest celebration in its history today for Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

East side, west side, all around the town, 7,500,000 persons cheered the general and his family on a 37-mile parade. That was almost twice as many as the 4,000,000 people who turned out for Charles A. Lindbergh after he flew the Atlantic and for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower when he returned victorious from the battlefields of Europe.

### Chances For Settlement Faded Today

DANVILLE, Va., April 21 (UP)—Chances for a settlement of the three-week-old Southern textile strike through the wage stabilization board faded today after management rejected a union proposal.

George Baldani, vice-president of CIO Textile Workers Union, suggested that the wage board be asked to make "a final and binding agreement" for the Big Dan River Mills here.

Baldani said this would be a "fair and honorable solution which would bring an end to the strikes immediately." The union's contract with Dan River usually sets the pattern for negotiations at other southern mills.

But Basil Browder, Dan River vice president, turned down the proposal on grounds that the WSB has not been completely organized nor its powers defined. He said it was not clear whether the Dan River situation would come under the board's jurisdiction.

### Sixteen Laws Are Passed

AUSTIN, April 21 (UP)—Sixteen new laws were on Texas' Statute books today following a mass signing by Gov. Allan Shivers.

Among them was a bill changing the name of Texas State University for Negroes at Houston to Texas Southern University, effective immediately. The measure was sponsored by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston.

The Governor vetoed one measure, by Rep. William S. Fly of Victoria, which would fix the pay of Justices of the Peace in counties between 28,500 and 38,000 population. Gov. Shivers said it was a "bracket" bill.

Other measure approved included: A bill by Rep. O. E. Latimer of San Antonio eliminating wine only stores. The measure, effective immediately also permits railroad dining cars to carry miniature liquor bottles across the state instead of unloading them at the state line, but it prohibits their sale.

A measure by Sen. Rogers Kelley of Edinburg authorizing the District attorney and an investigator. It's bill goes into effect immediately.

### Sixty Homes Are Damaged

WICHITA FALLS, April 21 (UP)—More than 60 homes were damaged, scores of power lines knocked out and three persons slightly injured last night when a fast-moving squall line whipped across Oklahoma and Texas creating one small tornado and several heavy windstorms.

The tornado dipped into the outskirts of Wichita Falls and almost destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Hawkins, but neither was hurt.

A torrential rain followed the twister and almost an inch of rain in 10 minutes. A flash flood washed one automobile into a drainage ditch but the occupant remained in the vehicle until a wrecker removed the car. He was not hurt.

DIVINE GETS FIVE YEARS

HOUSTON, April 21 (UP)—Former police sergeant C. C. Divine was under a five-year sentence today following his conviction on a charge of accepting bribes to allow a night club to operate after curfew.

Divine was found guilty by a jury in district Frank Williford's court last night. It imposed the maximum penalty allowed under law.

Divine sat stiffly in his chair as he heard the verdict, but his wife fainted.

When she was revived a few minutes later, she walked over and slugged a state's witness who was talking to assistant district attorney Charles Haden.

The witness, Mrs. Henry George, was struck once on the jaw by Mrs. Divine's closed right fist. Haden broke up the dispute. The jury returned the verdict after deliberating one hour and 40 minutes after hearing district attorney A. C. Wisborn tell them that Divine "is guilty as hell."

AMARILLO, April 21 (UP)—Morris Fields, 26, who lost his left leg in a farm accident recently, was pleasantly surprised when a group of nine neighbors moved onto his farm with plows and tractors.

They plowed out dead wheat for fields, and readied the land for planting of feed. Two Amarillo gas dealers donated a truck load of gasoline for the project.

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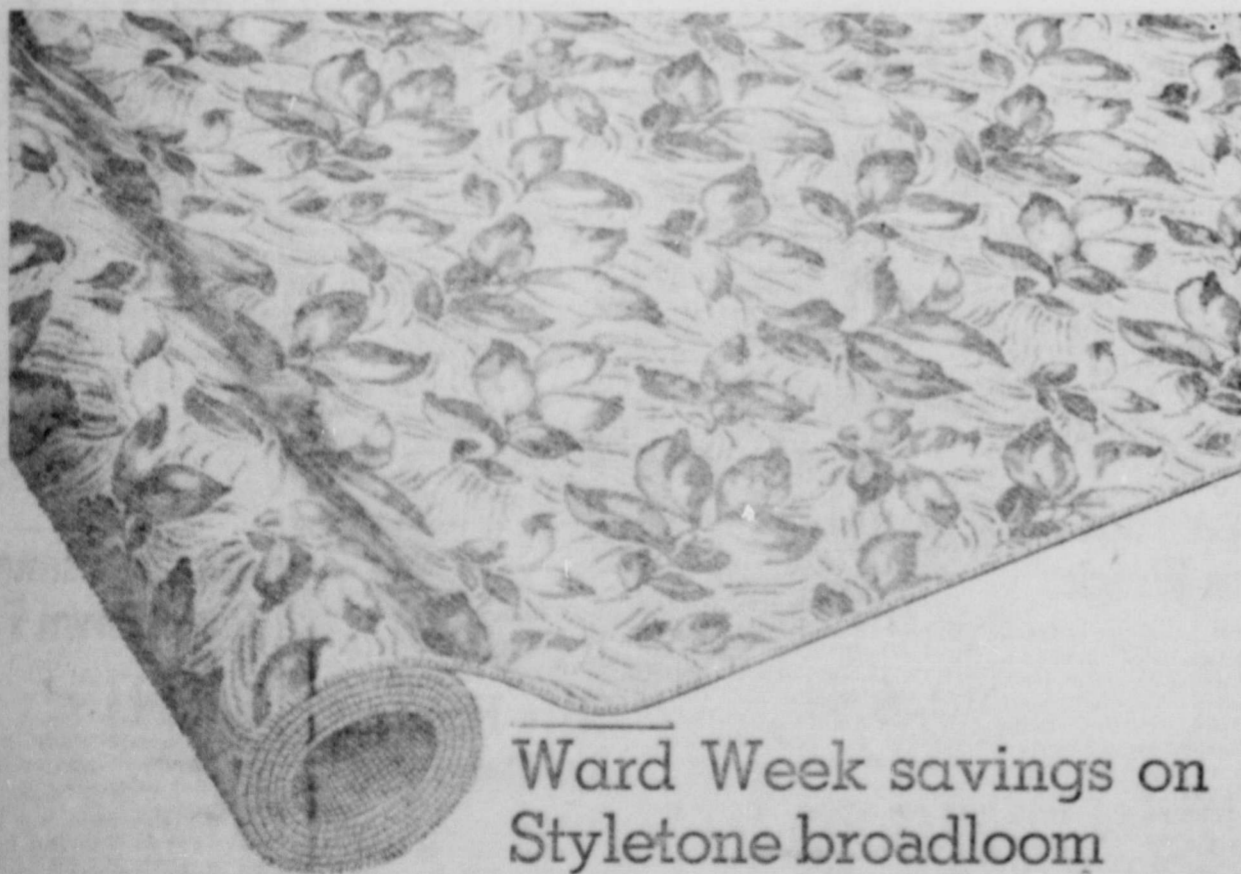

WASHINGTON, April 21 (UP)—President Truman received scattered boos and applause as he arrived at Griffith Stadium to throw out the first ball in the delayed baseball opener between the New York Yankees and Washington Senators, yesterday.

The demonstration—a mild one—came as Mr. Truman made his first public appearance before a non-political gathering since he fired Gen. Douglas MacArthur last week.

### State Claims Doctor Sane

ALBUQUEQUE, N. M., April 21 (UP)—The State today began attempts to prove that Dr. Nancy Campbell, accused kidnaper, was sane when she abducted nine-year-old Linda Stamm last Nov. 10.

After the defense rested the first of the state's expert witnesses—Dr. John Meyers, practicing psychiatrist here, expressed the opinion that the prominent, Santa Fe Gynecologist was "capable of distinguishing right from wrong."

He made his statement after hearing Dr. Campbell's history and details of the case explained by prosecutor H. A. Kiker.

Meyers' testimony contradicted that of Dr. Franklin Ebau, Head of the Psychiatry Department at the University of Colorado School of Medicine in Denver. As the final defense witness today Dr. Ebau elaborated on his examination of Dr. Campbell which he said revealed "definite organic impairment."

Ebau earlier said that in his opinion Dr. Campbell was "incapable of knowing the nature and qualities of the act (kidnaping Linda)."

The psychiatrist testified that his examinations showed a "hostility toward men" and "sexual deviation" in Dr. Campbell as well as an "impulsive personality and considerable anxiety."

HOLLYWOOD, April 21 (UP)—Actress Martha Vickers said today she has hired an attorney to file her divorce suit against Screen Star Mickey Rooney because their attempts at reconciliation have failed.

"We might as well get it over with," Mrs. Rooney said. The couple's on-again off-again reconciliations have kept the film capital buzzing for months.

### Senators Have A Scuffle In Office Building

WASHINGTON, April 21 (UP)—A Republican and two Democratic senators staged a scuffle in the senate office building today after a bitter debate on Gen. Douglas MacArthur and Far Eastern Policies.

The fracas involved exchanges which included "dirty words" and "pro-communist" charges but no blows.

Actual participants were Sens. Homer E. Capehart, Ind., Herbert H. Humphrey, D., Minn., and Herbert H. Lehman, D., N. Y.

A fourth senator, Robert A. Taft, R., O., helped settle the scrap which followed bitter comments during a debate being recorded for radio broadcast.

Capehart claimed Humphrey called him a "very dirty name". He agreed with a reporter that it was "the famous White House S.O.B. without the initials." Humphrey heatedly denied that.

### Cons Suspected Of Arson Says Warden Duffy

SAN QUENTIN, CALIF., April 21 (UP)—Two San Quentin Convicts are "definitely suspected of arson" in a \$3,000,000 fire that destroyed the prison's jute mill, Warden Clinton Duffy said today.

A third convict, Ray Taber, 47, Oakland, is believed to have some knowledge of the fire, Duffy said.

Thirteen guards and convicts sufficed injuries, most of them minor burns and smoke inhalation. The fire broke out at 1 p.m. yesterday when 700 of the mill's 850 were returning from lunch.

### BASS LOSES HIS AUTO

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., April 21 (UP)—George W. (Jettie) Bass, Kingpin of the Dallas underworld who was shot down in a police trap here, lost his expensive automobile today.

Jefferson County Authorities attached the 1951 model car to pay more than \$1,000 in hospital bills here.

Bass was riddled by machine-gun bullets as he and two companions fled from an apartment rental office here April 3 after the safe had been blown open.

Bass has shown improvement at Jefferson-Hillman Hospital but still is listed in serious condition. Nick Casco, 36, and Tommy Pate, 36, both of Dallas, also are under arrest on burglary charges in the same case.

### ARMED FORCES NEWS IN PARAGRAPH

Non-commissioned officers of the Army will once more wear the traditional large chevrons which were in use at the end of World War II. The Army also announced the renewed use of overseas bars to denote service in Korea. Individuals will be entitled to wear one bar for each six months of such service, as in World War II.

Soldiers fighting in Korea are being granted special five-day recreational leaves in Japan on a small group rotational basis.

United Nations Identification shoulder patches in Korea now include the famous Black Diamond of New Zealand.

Thailand Army nurses have received courses in air evacuation techniques from U. S. nurses at Haneda Air Base, Tokyo.

### KERR DIDN'T LIKE SPEECH

WASHINGTON, April 21 (UP)—Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D., Okla., said today he is convinced Gen. Douglas MacArthur's proposals for the Far East "would hurt us downward on the awful road to total war."

In a statement on the speech MacArthur made to congress yesterday Kerr said:

"I looked for unity. I didn't find it. I watched for an acknowledgment of the necessity to maintain the integrity of civilian control of the military power. It was not there.

"I searched for language that would give hope of a limited conflict and a purpose to prevent the spread into worldwide conflagration. He did not provide it."

Kerr also said he heard nothing to promote cooperation with America's Allies. He said MacArthur "did not even mention the United Nations."
