Americans Stop Red Advance Near Seoul

UN FORCES IN KOREA TOTAL ABOUT 550,000 'POLICEMEN'

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—The United Nations have about 550,000 ground, air, sea, supporting and police forces engaged in Korea.

Assistant Secretary of State Dean Rusk told the House Appropriations Subcommittee some two months ago that 250,000 American forces were in Korea. His testimony, made public last night, said the Americans plus 250,000 South Koreans amounted to 85 per cent of the UN forces.

Rusk said 13 other UN nations have committed approximately 35,000 men, or 15 per cent of the force engaged. He added that talks were underway in various capitals to increase Korean manpower through replacements or entirely new forces.

Rusk's figures totalled 535,000 men, but they included 100,000 South Koreans assigned to security forces such as police. Official sources indicated today that replacements and new troops dispatched by the United States in the last two months boost the total to at least 550,000.

MAC RECEIVES WELCOME FROM PEOPLE OF CHICAGO

CHICAGO, April 26 (UP)—Chicago greeted Gen. Douglas MacArthur today with one of the biggest and most heartwarming welcomes ever extended in the Midwest.

The general, his wife, and their son, Arthur, landed from New York at midday for a triumphant two-day visit here and at Milwaukee.

Almost 6,000,000 persons were expected to see the Pacific hero, either in person or on television during his visit to Chicago, the nation's second largest city, and Milwaukee, where he lived as a youth and still maintains his legal residence.

Thousands of Chicagoans crowded the airport area to see MacArthur arrive and more than 3,000,000 persons lined a 23-mile parade route.

The MacArthur's 40-car motorcade moved at a rapid pace from the airport to the Loop. There the cars were joined by marching units that escorted them down Michigan Boulevard and State Street as the beat of drums echoed off the walls of surrounding skyscrapers.

The assembled throngs waved flags, cheered and showered MacArthur and his party with makeshift confetti and serpentine.

The city which became known as "the best damn soldiers town in the country" when its service clubs entertained 18,000,000 men during the war, went all out to demonstrate its hospitality to the general.

MacArthur was making his first visit here since May 5, 1937, when he and his bride, the pretty Jean MacArthur who accompanied him today, were enroute to San Francisco for assignment in the Philippines.

Laredo Businessmen Hammer Visa Mission

MEXICO CITY, April 26 (UP)—A delegation of Laredo businessmen ended its mission here today but warned it would continue "hammering" at the U. S. State Department to rectify the Mexican situation.

The group, headed by Publisher William Prescott Allen, came here to seek Ambassador William O'Dwyer's aid in making it easier for Mexican citizens to visit American border cities.

Allen explained that Mexicans from the interior must buy a new \$3 visa for each visit to the United States, while Americans may visit Mexican border cities without visas.

O'Dwyer was "most cordial" and expressed hope something would be accomplished within the next few months. In the meantime, he said, the businessmen would continue "hammering" for a visa change.

Shivers Signs 11 Bills Today

AUSTIN, April 26 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers signed 11 bills into law yesterday before taking off for the Interstate Oil Compact Commission meet beginning at Santa Fe, N. M., today.

One of the bills, sponsored by Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe makes it unlawful for anyone other than a blind person to carry a white cane.

Other bills signed by Shivers included:

A measure sponsored by Rep. John Crosthwait of Dallas which repeals the old hunting license and sets up the big-game license as the state's only hunting paper.

Oil Activity

Coast Guard Stages Full Scale Probe

MOBILE, Ala., April 26 (UP)—A tanker captain and his second mate who accused each other of negligence in a sea disaster which took 39 lives returned to the witness stand today at a Coast Guard investigation.

Capt. Edward C. Geick of the Esso Suez admitted late yesterday that his ship was traveling too fast in the fog-bound Gulf of Mexico southwest of New Orleans when it crashed with another tanker, the Esso Greensboro.

The Bayone, N. J., captain had testified tearfully at his first appearance on the stand that his ship was moving slowly and that he had ordered full speed astern when his radar screen told him a crash was imminent.

Identifying Dead Is Slow, Grisly, And Rugged Job

GALVESTON, April 26 (UP)—The slow and grisly job of identifying the bodies of 15 dead removed from the burned Esso tanker Esso Greensboro was still under way here today.

W. C. Brown, an embalmer at the Malloy and Son Funeral Home said all the bodies were charred beyond recognition.

"We removed 15," he said. "There may be more. So far we have identified eleven, but we are not giving out their names until the next of kin have been notified."

The 15 men were among possibly 39 killed before dawn last Friday when the Greensboro collided with the tanker Esso Suez in the Gulf of Mexico off the Louisiana coast.

Liquor Control Seizes Stills

AUSTIN, April 26 (UP)—Titus and Red River Counties led in the number of bootleg whiskey stills seized in March, the Texas Liquor Control Board announced yesterday.

A total of nine stills were seized, eight persons arrested and 830 gallons of mash and 15 gallons of whiskey captured during the month.

The board said Titus and Red River Counties had two moonshine stills apiece, while Bowie, Cass, Wood, Smith and Shelby counties had one still each.

Truman Will Try to Get Stronger Law

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—President Truman prepared to ask Congress today for a stronger defense production law to speed up the mobilization program and tighten price controls on food and rents.

A presidential message setting forth those and other recommendations for the law is scheduled to reach Congress later today. Administration leaders promised to introduce the measure in both chambers immediately and to begin hearings May 7. They hoped to get a new law on the books before most of the provisions of the present statute expires June 30. But they admitted it looked like a tough fight.

Defense mobilizer Charles E. Wilson, who had a hand in shaping the President's recommendations, said they would "plug some of the holes" in the present law and make for a generally "stronger" statute.

No major changes in the labor provisions of the present law will be recommended.

Principal stumbling block to quick action was expected to be Truman's farm price proposals. Informed sources said he would ask for a kind of parity "freeze" that would enable definite, dollars and cents ceilings on all farm prices.

Acheson Sounds Off on Formosa

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson disclosed today that Nationalist China agreed Feb. 9 to accept American military aid "for the defense of Taiwan (Formosa) against a possible attack."

He revealed that the United States, in a note to the Nationalists Jan. 30, announced its willingness to make arms available for defense purposes.

The dates given by Acheson amounted to an administration notice that its plans for sending a mission to Formosa and to provide arms help was arranged well in advance of recent demands for action by Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

The American note specified that the arms aid agreement would be retroactive to June 27 and that it would cover, therefore, shipments to Formosa since the Korean War began. Acheson in this connection said the first shipment of arms reached Formosa in December.

Navy Board Meets Today

KEY WEST, Fla., April 26 (UP)—A Navy board of inquiry met today to fix the blame for a "nightmarish" collision of a Naval plane and a Cuban airliner in which 43 persons plunged to an ocean death near President Truman's vacation retreat.

The twin-engine Navy plane with a four-man crew practicing blind flying, and the Cuban Airline's DC-4, with 34 passengers and five crew members, rammed together about noon yesterday over this southernmost tip of the United States. No one survived.

Navy rescue workers wearing face masks and foot flippers dived 30 feet to the floor of the Atlantic and brought up 17 bodies before darkness closed in last night. The bodies of two Navy fliers floated to the surface.

Ranger Citizens Told to Use Pen

Bascom Giles, State Land Commissioner, has informed the Times in a personal letter that he is extending his efforts to fight for a recapture of the Texas Tidelands which were stolen from this state by the land-grabbing federal government.

Giles has been gallant and tireless in his efforts to reclaim the off shore oil lands which was once part of the State of Texas. He stated that the people of Ranger should all write their Congressmen to "fight for the return of our lands".

Texas Senate Debates Today

AUSTIN, April 26 (UP)—The Texas Senate takes up debate today on a House-approved Conference Committee report on the controversial Truck Overloading Bill.

The measure, as worked out in conference by the two chambers, would require on-the-spot unloading of overweight trucks on the state's highways.

Yesterday, the House adopted the committee report 97 to 34 in the feature action of an otherwise detail-filled day of voting on scores of uncontented and relatively minor bills.

In addition to 51 local and uncontented bills, the House gave final approval to a proposed constitutional amendment. Sponsored by Rep. Jack Cox of Breckenridge, it would permit the University of Texas Board of Regents to broaden the field in which university funds may be invested.

The plan provides that the permanent university fund may be invested in bonds and securities not now permitted under the constitution.

Pumps Are Shut Down in Valley

WESLACO, April 26 (UP)—Irrigation pumps upstream from here on the Rio Grande were idle today to permit additional water to reach Matamoros and Brownsville.

The shutdown went into effect last midnight after the Valley Water Conservation Association received a complaint of insufficient flow near the mouth of the international stream.

The protest was filed by Mexico to the State Department, which relayed it to L. M. Lawson of El Paso, International Boundary and Water Commissioner.

Lawson informed the Valley Water Association. He said Mexico protested that the flow of water was less than the minimum of 35 second feet called for under international agreement.

Gordon Jackson, manager of the Water Conservation Association, said the flow had fallen as low as five feet recently.

The shutdown of upper Valley pumping will continue for 90 hours.

Sam's Will Is Probated

GALVESTON, April 26 (UP)—Sam Maceo, Galveston night club owner who died April 17, left his estate to his three small children, his will filed for probate with County Judge Theodore Robinson revealed today.

Just how much his property, which includes night clubs, beach front and property and oil interest, is worth won't be determined until an inventory is filed.

The application to probate the will, filed by Attorney Louis J. Dibrell, said only that the estate is "in excess of \$20,000."

Mrs. Edna Sedgewick Maceo, the widow, and Maceo's bookkeeper, Sam Serrin, were named independent executors without bond, and were also named trustees of the three trusts Maceo created for his two sons, Jay-R, and Eddie, eight years old, and his six-year-old daughter, Sledgie.

The widow gets half the community proper. And Maceo also provided that in event it turns out that he has separate property apart from their community estate, his widow will get half of that also.

The will provides that portions of the three trusts shall be paid the children when they reach the ages of 21 and 24. Not until they are 27 do they get the full inheritance.

Lots of Wheat In This USA

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—The Agriculture Department reported yesterday that the nation's wheat reserves on April 1 totaled 709,000,000 bushels, or 45,000,000 more than the same date last year.

Of the total, about 291,000,000 bushels were held on farms and the rest in mills, elevators and warehouses, the department said.

FIGHTING IS ROUGH AS UN FORCES STAGE WITHDRAWALS

TOKYO, Friday, April 27 (UP)—United Nations forces on the west central Korean front withdrew another five miles Thursday but in the west they stopped Red Armies 17 miles northwest of Seoul.

Field dispatches said the new withdrawal placed the Allied line on the Pukhan River, a branch of the Han River running northeast to Chunchon.

"The latest withdrawal brought the number of surrendered miles to 27 since the Chinese Communists mounted their new thrust," United Press correspondent William Burson reported.

The high tide of the Communist advance previously was reported to be 22 miles.

UN troops fighting north of Chunchon on the central front pulled back to set up new lines north of the Kapyong Chunchon highway after blowing up the Mojin Bridge across the Pukhan River.

Eastland County Sheriff Frank Tucker revealed to the press yesterday that his department was holding William T. Jacobs, Ranger, under arrest on charges of swindle. Jacobs was arrested yesterday on the outskirts of Ranger by Deputy Sheriff Joe Faircloth. Jacobs will face charges in several near by counties as well as in Eastland County.

Joe Orsoco, Ranger, has been released on bond after being arrested Sunday by Highway Patrolman Terry Barratt on charges of transportation and illegal possession of beer. He had three cases of beer in his automobile when arrested by the officer.

Students Show Congress How

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—Three college students, from Texas, New York and Indiana, have given congressmen a lesson in action on the Grain-For-India bill.

The University of Chicago students drove into town with a ton of grain piled in their battered Chevrolet truck and presented it to Indian Ambassador Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit.

He termed it "a gift from the heart of the American people which will touch the heart of the people of India."

The students were William B. McDonald, Roaring Springs, Tex.; Charles M. R. Haines, New Rochelle, N. Y.; and George Weirbright, Syracuse, Ind.

The youths explained they collected the grain from farmers to dramatize the public's desire to relieve "abject suffering" in India.

Pompili Must Serve 10 Years

GALVESTON, April 26 (UP)—Lawrence W. Pompili, 28, whose operations several weeks ago landed an innocent Air Force veteran in the Houston jail, must serve 10 years for forgery.

Pompili was sentenced by District Judge Charles Dibrell in 56th District Court yesterday to serve two years each on five charges of forgery, the terms to be cumulative. He had pleaded guilty to the charges.

Court records showed that Pompili posed as an Air Force Colonel to obtain the papers of former Lt. Jack H. Culp, Sr., of Houston on the pretense of helping him return to active duty.

Posing as Culp, Pompili came here and obtained work at the National Hotel Company, then using the names of hotel company officials, he forged and passed checks amounting to more than \$2,000 and disappeared.

Culp was arrested and held for several hours by Houston police until they learned it was Pompili instead of Culp they wanted. Pompili was later arrested in Memphis, Tenn.

LEADS RODEO BOOSTERS

The money Appropriations committee today to give another \$6,421,000,000 (B) to continue their buildup of the military might.

The money is for use in the 1951 fiscal year which ends June 30. Congress already has provided the military establishment with \$42,474,000,000 (B) in this fiscal year.

The military budget for the July 1 will be about \$70,000,000,000 (B), officials said, or some \$10,000,000,000 more than President Truman forecast in his budget message to congress in January.

Appropriations committee approval of \$6,421,000,000 (B) for the military services to use this year was only \$275,000 less than requested. The atomic energy commission was voted a supplemental appropriation of \$46,800,000 (M), \$4,500,000 (M) under its request.

The committee instructed the atomic energy commission to re-evaluate its program and eliminate non-essential projects. It expressed doubt about the "immediate need" for projects at Lucky, O., and for town, Mass., but did not specifically prohibit them.

The \$6,421,000,000 (B) armed forces appropriation was broken down this way: Army, \$2,850,000,000; Navy, \$1,645,812,000 (B), and Air Forces \$1,925,000,000 (B).

The committee said that 45 per cent of the Army money is needed to support its manpower increase, and 55 per cent is necessary to continue the procurement program. It described the Army's new-type tanks as "superior to any used or in the hands of any potential enemy."

The Navy's money is for aircraft, guided missiles and for the activation of 34 ships. It was given \$2,244,000 to reopen the Bainbridge, Md., training center; \$3,150,000 for Elliott Annex, San Diego; and \$2,000,000 (M) for the receiving station at New Orleans.

The Air Force, which has increased in size from 51 wings to 81 wings in the last three months, was given its additional money for plane buying as well as to continue the buildup of its manpower.

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
