Big riddle in Washington is what can be accomplished by a full-dress investigation of U.S. foreign policy, stirred up by General MacArthur's return? Closest partilel in recent years would seem to be the Pearl Hashor investigation at the end of the lark war. It took seven months, proved little or nothing that wasn't known before, ended in a divided report on strictly political lanes.

Any discussion of foreign policy is a good thim, however, if argued on fact and not on emotional appeal. Frincipal harms that might be done would be to force revelation of Joint Chiefs of Staff secret plans.

At one point during primary campaigns, after Governor Dewey of New York had lost several midwestern state ballots, there was a small boom for a Vandenberg-Dewey ticket. The Michigan senator scotched it. If that ticket had gone through and won, with the Michigan senator in first place, Governor Dewey as the elect id vice president would today be president.


