Naval Reserve Ensign Fired For Writing "Nasty" Letter

WASHINGTON, May 31 (UP)—A Naval Reserve Ensign has been discharged for writing a "very nasty" anti-administration letter to an outspoken critic of President Truman.

The spokesman said Ensign W. A. Evans, Edgewater, Md., a 1948 Annapolis Graduate, wrote the letter to Alfred Kohlberg, a New York importer of Chinese goods and Chairman of the American-Chinese Policy Association.

The letter was quite critical of the president and secretary of the Board of Investigation in general, the spokesman said. "It was a very nasty letter that we revoked his commission."

Kohlberg charged last fall that Truman had failed to arrest 150 known Russian spies. In April, 1950, Kohlberg said he gave Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis., some "Communist data" to help McCarthy's campaign against the State Department.

Evans' discharge was brought up briefly yesterday as Adm. Forrest P. Sherman, Chief of Naval Operations, testified before Senate investigators on the dismissal of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Sen. Styles Bridges, R. N. H., asked Sherman if he knew about the Evans case. Sherman said he did.

"Do you think the sentiment which Lieutenant Evans' letter revealed is shared all or in part by our armed forces in the Pacific?" Bridges asked.

"No, sir, I do not," Sherman replied. "A very thorough board of investigation revealed it was not shared by his shipmates, which was the place that we investigated."

"I directed the Commander in Chief, Pacific Fleet, to convene a Board of Investigation and to determine what the state of affairs was on that ship. His recommendation to me was to discharge the officer and, except for his presence, the discipline of the ship was unimpaired."

He said Navy Secretary Francis P. Matthews fired Evans last Friday.

AMERICAN SABRE JETS SHOOT DOWN TWO SOVIET-BUILT MIGs

TOKYO, May 31 (UP)—American Sabre Jets shot down two Soviet-built Mig-15 jet fighters and damaged another in a dogfight over Northwest Korea Wednesday afternoon, the Far East Air Force disclosed today.

The Sabre jets were accompanying a flight of B-29s on a bombing mission against the important Chongju Railway Bridge. The Communists fighters ventured 50 miles into Korea from their Manchurian base in a futile effort to halt the attack.

The superforts continued on their bomb run while the blazing dogfight swirled around them. An Air Force spokesman said there were no American losses.

First Lt. Bobbie L. Smith, of Diamond, Mo., was credited with shooting down one of the Communist jets. He shared the second one with his wingman, 1st Lt. Otis "Flash" Gordon, of Jacksonville, Fla.

Gordon was credited with the damaged Mig. "We beat the Mig's attack on the B-29's twice," Smith said. "I made my first score in a head-on pass, hitting the Mig with bursts in the left wing. He started smoking and I saw a couple more of them trying to get at the bombers."

"I fired and hit the lead Mig. Then 'Flash' really plastered the wingman. The damaged Mig wingman broke away and headed for home and we both took out after the leader."

I hit him several times and the Mig began to smoke and wobble. When I ran out of ammo, 'Flash' moved in and knocked him down."

It was Smith's first kill. Gordon had been credited previously with one Mig damaged.

Rollback Order Brings Trouble

CHICAGO, May 31 (UP)—The American Meat Institute today predicted dwindling supplies and black markets in cattle.

Airlines Pilot Flies Over Pole

NEW YORK, May 31 (UP)—Charles F. Blair, Jr., first pilot to hop across the North Pole alone in a single-engine plane, viewed his flight today as a simple jaunt that airlines, and Russians could follow with ease.

Blair, a handsome, 41-year-old airline chief pilot, completed his transpolar trip from Bardufoss, Norway, to Fairbanks, Alaska, in 10 hours and 50 minutes.

He catnaped for an hour at Fairbanks yesterday, picked up a beef sandwich and flew non-stop back to New York in 9 1/2 hours, explaining he was scheduled to return to work for Pan-American Airlines today.

A crowd of about 2,000 cheered Blair as he landed his maroon Mustang, Excelsior III, at Idlewild national airport at 4:40 p. m. EDT. He averaged 375 miles an hour on the flight.

"Flying over the north pole was a rather easy feat," the haggard, sleepy-eyed pilot said after holding hands with his attractive wife, Janice, and their 14-month-old son, Chris.

He said a Commercial Airline could operate across the frozen polar wastelands and "that goes for the Russians, too."

Blair's face was sunburned because the plexiglass canopy over his cockpit offered him little protection from rays of the midnight sun during his 3,400-mile flight from Bardufoss to Fairbanks.

He told his son the flight gave him a chance to "say hello to Santa Claus and I dropped a note to him over the pole."

WACO, May 31 (UP)—The Bryan Air Force Base will formally open June 1 as a Jet Training School.

The base will be under jurisdiction of the flying training air force, headquartered here. It will be commanded by Col. James Crawford McGehee.

Solemn Day Is Observed

The nation observed one of its most solemn Memorial Days in the great "iron triangle" supply area of the East Central Korean front Thursday but elsewhere they hot pursuit of the Chinese Communist army was stalled by rain, mud and increasing Red resistance.

United Nations forces brought the great "iron triangle" supply bases of Choswon and Kumhwa within artillery range but have not yet opened fire on them.

Both sides regrouped for the next battle on roughly the same ground they held when the Communists opened their ill-fated spring offensive five weeks ago.

Allied forces attacked only on a narrow sector of the east central front, driving to close the last mile of a trap around an undetermined number of Reds in the Inje area.

Some trails were believed still open to the Communists in the last mile of marshland and rugged mountains at the eastern tip of the Hwachon reservoir.

The Reds sought frantically to keep the trails open. They stabbed again and again at Allied lines northeast and southeast of Inje. The Communists were driven back after a five-hour battle late Thursday.

On the western front the Reds hammered Allied lines with one of their heaviest artillery barrages of the war. Five Chinese guns poured shells into Allied positions for 75 minutes at the rate of seven or eight shells per minute.

WASHINGTON, May 31 (UP)—The Defense Department today released a new total of 67,427 American Battle casualties in Korea, an increase of 611 over the total reported one week ago.

The casualties reflected the total of those whose next of kin have been notified through last Friday. It takes from one to three weeks for such notification, so the actual number of total casualties is somewhat higher.

The total casualties include 11,413 deaths, 44,705 listed as wounded, 9,987 missing, 115 captured and 1,207 who previously were listed as missing but have returned to duty.

Full - Scale Price War Starts Today In Oklahoma City Drugs

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 31 (UP)—A full-scale price war was declared here today as one drug chain announced it would slash the price on items "every family needs."

Merchants here have skirmished on the fringe of an all-out price cutting battle ever since the U. S. Supreme Court decision that they did not have to observe "fair trade" prices unless they actually had signed agreements to do so.

Don F. Mashburn, manager of the Katz Drug Store Chain said he would announce price cuts today on "real stuff every family needs—not just spot items like we've cut before."

Three other big chains—Walgreen's, Veazey's and Hyde's—promptly took up the challenge and said they'd "meet all new prices or sell under them."

Until today, at least, the price slashing among the city's large drug chains was confined principally to drug and cosmetic items. While the price cutting was expected to extend over more items Hyde's and Veazey's indicated they would confine their "specials" to three days each week, beginning Thursday.

At these two chains prices yesterday were up to the fair trade levels.

Homer Hyde, owner of the Hyde Chain, said it had been his policy "for years" to run three-day specials on weekends.

"But you can quote me as saying our stores are definitely not retreating from this battle," he said.

At Katz's and Walgreen's, both national chains, prices yesterday on 10 items were lower than "fair trade" levels.

Alka-Seltzer, with a fair trade minimum of 54 cents, was priced at 42 cents. Camay Soap was down from 10 to 5 cents.

Other items below fair trade prices, with old prices in parentheses, included Phillips' Milk of Magnesia (50) 46 cents; Colgate's Toothpaste (47), 34; Halo Shampoo (89), 63; Anahist (98), 69; Halacol (1.19), 81; Mentholatum (36), 24; and Syrup of Peppin (47), 37.

Buyer reaction to the price cuts so far has been only mild because of the limited number of items affected. But expansion of the price war was expected to touch off a giant buying wave.

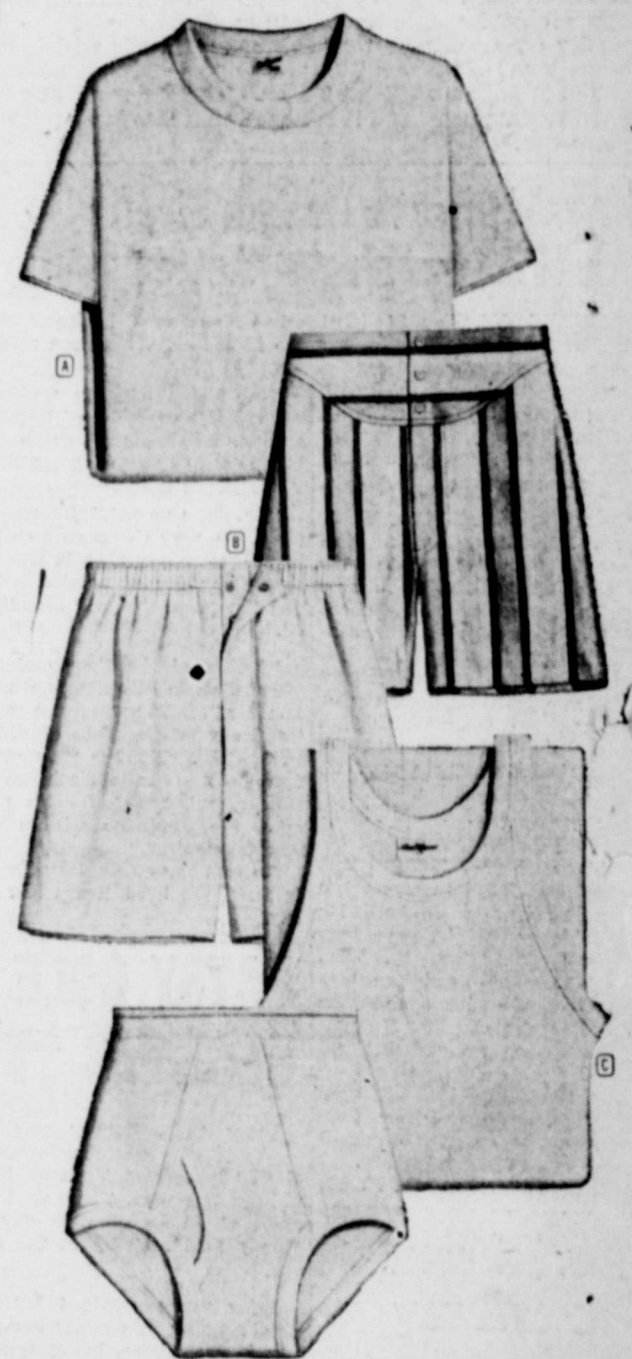

Testimony by Texas cattlemen which was brought out in Washington this week proved that Price Administrator Mike Disalle's order on the cattle price roll back was the most arbitrary order ever issued.

Texas Cattleman Ray W. Wiloughby, President of The Texas

and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, was a key witness before the Senate and House Committees on Banking and Currency and the House Committee on Agriculture which are investigating effects of the April 30th OPS rollback order which will endanger the livelihood of thousands of small ranches and farmers.

This is another example of the growing loss of control of the individual states over their own properties to the Socialistic inclined Federal government. Time was when a man could build up a fortune. Today, he must slave

to pay his government taxes. What the people are failing to realize is that the very foundation on which America was built is being torn down by too many government controls. The country was founded on the principal that Americans were to live in freedom and not have a lot of controls over their heads. 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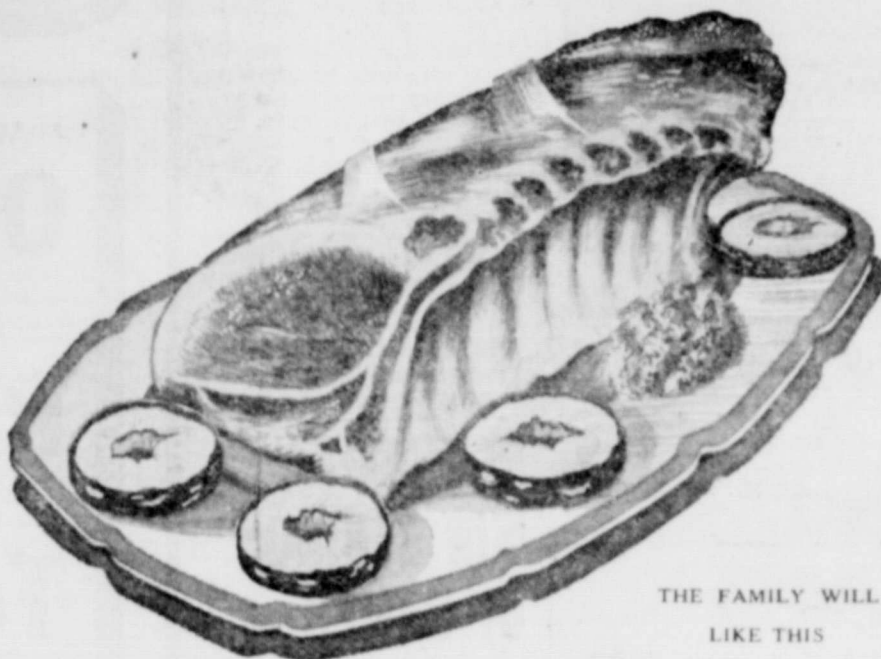

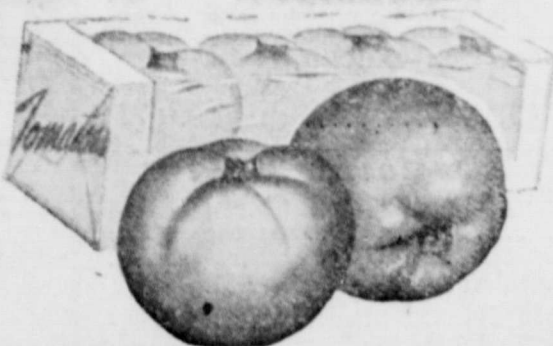

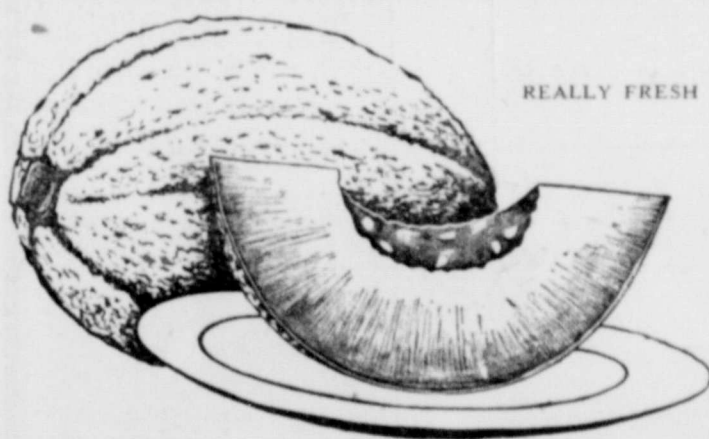

responsibilities?" Smith asked. "Well, sir," said Sherman—who knows that congress provides the money that makes the ships go—"I am reluctant to be the first military man to say that he has enough force to do everything he might be called upon to do. "But I would say this: That I

think the Navy is in good shape—its combat readiness and morale are excellent."

**MACARTHUR CALLED IT**

**WASHINGTON, May 31 (UP)**—Adm. Forrest P. Sherman testified today that Gen. Douglas MacArthur believed last December that an Armistice should be arranged in Korea "on best terms available as soon as possible."

The chief of Naval Operations disclosed the deposed Far Eastern Commander's December armistice views as he testified for a second day before the Senate Committee investigating MacArthur's dismissal.

Sherman previously had added to his testimony, started yesterday, about American hopes of getting the United Nations to impose a naval blockade on Red China.

He said this country has moved quickly to enforce an economic embargo against China. But, he said, "there is still much to be done" by other UN Allies to stop the flow of vital goods which he said helps to keep Chinese Red forces in action.

When the economic embargo is in full effect, Sherman said, "the sweep-up process of a complete naval blockade" will then be in order.

The Navy Chief testified about MacArthur's armistice views after Sen. H. Alexander Smith, R., N. J., brought up the disputed issue of who first considered the possibility that UN forces might be driven out of Korea.

In December, MacArthur was operating under the pressure of heavy Chinese Communist attacks which had forced the UN Armies into retreat. He expressed his armistice views to Gen. J. Lawton Collins, Army Chief of Staff, who was visiting his headquarters. Collins relayed them to the other military chiefs here, Sherman said, in a message on Dec. 4.

"Fix me up with a couple of singles with baths, will ya boy," Crosby was reported to have asked Night Clerk Art Cameron.

Cameron gave the singing star and his similarly-dressed companion an icy stare and replied, "we are booked solid—for days."

Crosby and Morrow started outside to get into Crosby's convertible when Ray Morrison, a bellhop, recognized "der bingle."

Morrison quickly fixed the situation. They were escorted to plush twin suites on the seventh floor.

Cameron said he had no idea who Crosby and Morrow were. "I thought they were a couple of bums or Indians from up north," he said. "It was all a mistake."

## NEGRO GIVEN DAY'S DELAY

SAN ANTONIO, May 31 (UP)—Attorneys for Emma (Straight Eight) Oliver, 40-year-old San Antonio Negro woman scheduled to die in the electric chair next Wednesday, were granted a one-day postponement today in their fight for a new trial.

The convicted murderess, who is convinced she won't be the first woman to die in Texas' electric chair, was brought here last night from the Huntsville prison and placed in the Bexar County jail.

District Judge P. C. Sanders issued a writ of habeas corpus and a bench warrant for the woman's appearance here Tuesday shortly after the State Board of Pardons and Paroles refused her clemency.

At today's brief hearing, the prosecution said it was ready to proceed but the defense counsel said additional time was needed to prepare arguments and a postponement until 10 a. m. tomorrow was granted.

The jail is a familiar place to Straight Eight. She has a record of 59 cases against her in a long career of crime dating back nearly 20 years.

She refused to talk to reporters "on advice of my attorneys" and when a photographer attempted to take her picture, she quickly turned her back.

Before leaving Huntsville, she was quoted as saying "God has seen a way to spare me." She was convicted of a knife slaying and sentenced to die in the electric chair.

During the same period, 14,425 tons were sent to Russia from Malaya, he said.

### Negress Will Get Hearing

SAN ANTONIO, June 1 (UP)—A hearing on the new trial motion for Emma (Straight Eight) Oliver, Negress condemned for a murder, was set for today in Judge P. C. Sanders' District Court.

The Negress, who is convinced she will be spared from the electric chair, was brought to Bexar county jail from Huntsville's death house to attend the hearings.

Judge Sanders summoned the woman on a habeas corpus and bench warrant and will hear arguments on whether she was deprived of her constitutional rights by being sentenced without counsel present.

Attorneys Sam Harris and Theo Pat Henley had been scheduled to present their case for the condemned woman yesterday, but were granted a postponement until today after reporting more time was needed to prepare their case.

The board of pardons and paroles has denied clemency in the case and Emma Oliver faces electrocution next Wednesday. If carried out the death penalty would be the first exacted against a woman in Texas.

### Vegetables Can Be Spring Tonic, Says Eastland Home Demonstrator

"Fresh vegetables can be the  
"spring tonic" for lagging appetites,"  
says Mrs. Ethel Sparks, East-  
land County home demonstration  
agent. She believes they give your  
appetite a lift, for "fresh, crisp  
and attractive vegetables offer  
vitamins, minerals and good eating  
for family meals."

Mrs. Sparks explains that the  
Texas Food Standard recommends  
three different types of fresh veg-  
etables every day. The green and  
yellow group includes beans, peas,  
asparagus, carrots, greens, a n d  
yellow squash; another group in-  
cludes beets, okra, corn, white  
squash, onions, celery, radishes,  
and half mature beans and peas;  
and the third group is either  
sweet or Irish potatoes.
