## Indictments Against Horace Walker For Embezzlement Told

Three indictments of embezzlement, a felony, each containing four counts were filed against Horace Walker of Dallas in the 91st District Clerk's office in the Eastland courthouse, Monday at 9:09 a.m.

Warrants for Walker's arrest were served to Walker at his home in Dallas, Sunday, by Eastland County Sheriff Frank Tucker and Deputy Joe Faircloth, who were assisted by Dallas County Deputies Cole and Coomb.

Walker was returned to Eastland where he made \$1500 bond in each indictment.

The indictments, which were returned by an Eastland County Grand Jury last week, charged Walker did "fraudulently embezzle, misapply and convert to his own use, without the consent of Eastland county," a total of more than \$2,800, in twelve counts.

On one indictment, the first count charges that Walker, "on or about the 31st day of January, 1949, while an agent of Eastland county, did fraudulently embezzle, misapply and convert to his own use, \$100, without the consent of said Eastland county."

### A KOREAN TRUCE IS LIKE TRYING TO GET MARRIED

Getting a truce in the Korean war is like trying to get married. Both parties have to say yes. The United Nations coalition is ready and willing, and, in fact, is pressing its suit. On the surface conditions were never more favorable for the Allies than they are today. But the Chinese Communist are being coy and saying nothing that could be interpreted as meaning they are ready to talk terms.

Trygve Lie, Secretary General of the U.N., made a speech in Ottawa late last week which opened a door for a ceasefire in Korea. London picked up the ball properly and on Saturday indicated truce negotiations might be in the wind. Washington didn't deny it, and from the Korean battlefields came indications the Allies were standing by for developments.

Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet, Commander of the U. S., 8th Army, said that if so they probably will slip out quietly and Peiping will try to pretend there never was any such thing as the Korean "Police Action."

The second count of the indictment is for \$100, and the third and fourth for "over \$50."

### Acheson Upholds U. S. Sell-out

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today that concessions were made to the Russians at Yalta because of "grave danger" they would wait until we had spent our strength defeating Japan, and then "come in and do what they wished."

Also, Acheson told Senate MacArthur investigators, military leaders at that time anticipated a "very bloody and terrible" battle in attacking the homeland islands of Japan, and "it was of the utmost importance that the Russians should come into the war in the Far East in time."

In return for entering the war against Japan, Russia under the 1945 Yalta agreement won the southern half of the Sakhalin Islands and restoration of her former rights in Port Arthur and Dairen, Manchuria, and of her former interest in two Manchurian railways.

Republican critics of the administration have called the agreement a "sell-out" of Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist Chinese government by the United States.

The South has the following: George West (Tex.), Bruce Cumber, center; Cotulla, Lonnie Martin, tackle; Taft, Bob Flynn, end; Port Neches, Don Miller, guard; Wharton, Carl Shan-non, back.

These additions sweep the total of schools that have been represented in this game over a 17 year period to 219. Kermit is eligible to have two because it was a Class A finalist. Both Spinks and Brown were on the AP's all-state Class A eleven. Spinks has the singular honor of being the only Class A player to receive the honor unanimously.

### Texas Farmer's Prices Tumble

AUSTIN, June 4 (UP)—Prices received by Texas farmers have tumbled for the first time since October of last year, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported today.

The USDA, in a local market price report, said the mid-May index dropped one and half per cent from the previous record high level reported a month ago.

Small increases on corn, barley, grain sorghums, sweet potatoes, cowpeas, turkeys and eggs, were more than offset by lower prices on all meat animals, wheat, oats, cotton, cottonseed, potatoes and hay.

Meat prices took the biggest drop. The all-crops index showed a two point gain from the previous month, while the livestock and livestock products index fell off 18 points.

The index for all commodities stood at 393 per cent of its 1910-14 average.

### Athens Merchant Will Appeal

AHENS, June 4 (UP)—Through the medium of radio, Jap Lucas, Athens Hardware Merchant and Former Texas Legislator, is going to make an appeal in Washington to congress.

Lucas recently appealed to the office of Price Stabilization to relax regulations regarding hardware stores, and was instrumental in securing a change.

Now, Lucas has something else in mind—to appeal directly to representatives and senators in Washington.

Unable to appear before a congressional committee, because he didn't represent a national organization, Lucas has arranged with Radio Station KURD in Athens to record a 15-minute speech. He has purchased time over a Washington Radio Station (WOL) to broadcast the address Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 8:30 Washington time.

Lucas is contacting every member of congress and every senator, advising them of the broadcast and requesting they listen. It may be the first time such an effort has been made by an individual to reach congress through the use of radio. Officials of the Washington Radio Station have told Lucas it may set a precedent that will be followed in the future.

### British Troops Make Ready

LONDON, June 4 (UP)—Three thousand troops of the 16th Independent Parachute Brigade left for Cyprus today, ready for possible emergency duty in the Iranian oil fields.

Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery told the picked troops in a pre-departure speech that they are to be ready for "anything."

In case of a riotous outbreak in the oilfields, the government is prepared to use the troops to evacuate approximately 1,500 British women and children.

The "Red Devil" paratroopers will be ready if necessary to fly the 900 miles from Britain's Cyprus Island base in the Mediterranean to the oil fields at the top of the Persian Gulf.

Tehran dispatches quoted unconfirmed reports that there had been rioting over the weekend between workers and police in the oil fields area. A Moslem mob started the trouble by attacking two Catholic churches, according to the reports.

### LOCAL BUSINESS FIRMS ARE ASKED TODAY TO HELP OUT NATIONAL DEFENSE EFFORTS

Local business firms employing National Guardsmen were urged today to help out the national defense effort by permitting their employees to attend summer camp without loss of regular vacation pay.

Capt. Bruce Harris, commanding officer, Svc Btry, 648th Armd FA Bn, Texas National Guard, said full training of the unit depends upon leaving policies of local businessmen.

"Our country's security demands that the National Guard—a first-line member of America's National Defense Team—should be full trained. This can only be accomplished if every Guardsman sounds out his Army training with the intensive full-time experience and training provided in summer field camp," he said.

Capt. Harris appealed to Ranger and Eastland business firms to emulate the patriotic policies of thousands of large and small business establishments throughout the country. Some employers patriotically grant their Guardsmen-employees two-weeks leave and pay in addition to their regular vacation, others grant two-weeks leave and make up the difference between the employee's regular pay and his military pay for the period.

Captain Harris pointed out that the community and the country suffer a two-way loss in every instance.

### Young Sailor Asks That People Leave Him And Sweetheart Alone

WASHINGTON, June 4 (UP)—Tom Amburn, a weary young sailor, asked the press and "God-loving people" today to leave him alone with the dying sweetheart he loves.

The 19-year-old aviation mechanic's mate said his marriage to pretty Betty Thompson of Atlanta, Ga., had to be "indefinitely postponed" but he was "still in love" with the cancer-ridden 17-year-old high school girl.

Stopping here enroute from his home at Sioux Falls, S. D., to his base at Norfolk, Va., the embittered sailor told the United Press: "I didn't even think she would question my love for her, but I must keep the love of my people alive, as that is all I have left. The press is killing both."

"All I ask (and that is not much) is that we be left alone. If there is any mercy or humanity left in people now is the time to find out."

Amburn received an emergency leave from his commanding officer, Cmdr. H. E. Rand, to marry the girl at Atlanta. After a one day visit with Betty, Amburn flew home. His mother was reported "broken up" by the impending marriage.

When Amburn later said his marriage had been postponed in-

definitely, Rand canceled the sailor's leave and told him to report back to his base.

"I'm going to talk with my commander and see if I can't get another leave to Atlanta again," Amburn said.

Rand indicated at Norfolk he would fulfill Amburn's request. "If he calls the girl, tells her he wants to go there, and she wants him to return, I'll be glad to extend the leave," Rand said. "Otherwise I can see no justification for it."

Amburn said he would talk it over with his commander first. In Atlanta, Betty left no doubt she wanted Tom back.

Amburn said that he appreciated the public interest which "is all for Betty. She knows I love her and whatever I say or do is for the good of her and myself."

Amburn was bitter about publicity which he said made him out to be a "heel." He said this was the "most tremendous decision" of his life, and it involved factors which could not be explained publicly or understood.

Betty is to be graduated from Russell High School tomorrow. She has been told by doctors she may die in the early fall from the cancer which has spread to her lungs.

Businessmen in Defense Act Like 'Planned Economy' Boys

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—One of the many surprising things to watch in Washington is what happens to prominent Republican business leaders who come to town to take top jobs.

It is traditional that all businessmen hate controls and government interference with the normal practice of the free enterprise system.

There's Charles E. Wilson, Director of ODM, the Office of Defense Mobilization. Republican. Former president of General Electric. A rugged individualist if there ever was one.

What Mr. Wilson comes up with is a "three-year plan." It's in the best tradition of the economic planners. Its goal is to provide enough raw materials to supply both a defense program and a normal civilian economy by the end of 1953.

Take the case of Eric Johnston, director of the Office of Economic Stabilization. Another Republican. Supposed to have had ambitions to be GOP candidate for President at one time.

Profits are, of course, the number one sacred cow. When OPA Administrator Chester Bowles started talking about profit regulation in the last war, his own ceilings fell in on him and knocked him out of office.

In the matter of wage controls, Eric Johnston also condones a line that no big businessman would be expected to endorse.

Or take an upcoming case in international relations. It concerns the new omnibus foreign aid bill. It would put Marshall Plan fourth-year operations, third-year military assistance and the Point Four program all under the same roof in the State Department.

"State Department" and "dog house" are now the same thing in the minds of many people. Anything that comes out of there or goes into it is considered automatically no good.

It so happens that this plan for centralized control and unification of all foreign aid programs was perfected by a couple of Massachusetts Republicans named Thomas D. Cabot and Charles C. Coolidge. They were appointed Director and Deputy Director, respectively, of the Office of International Security Affairs by Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

Way down east in Boston, they just don't come any more conservative than the Cabots and Coolidges. Yet these two Yankee, after studying the situation thoroughly, came to the conclusion that putting all foreign assistance programs under State Department control was the only plan that made any sense.

Lane's Deals Make Chisox Big Threat in Three Years

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Transforming the White Sox from frightful tail-enders to pennant contenders in three years, Frank Lane out-traded David Harum, Trader Horn and even Branch Rickey.

General Manager Lane talking Mahatma Riskey out of Shortstop Chico Carrasquel for \$35,000 was the biggest steal since Peter Minnet bought Manhattan Island from the Indians.

With the Chicago Americans badly in need of a first baseman who could hit the ball for distance, Lane slipped the Senators Southpaw Bob Kuzava and Second Baseman Cass Michaels for Eddie Robinson and Ray Scarborough.

Requiring authoritative hitters to swing before and after Robinson, Lane first made a deal which many suspected scrapped up the 1951 flag for the Red Sox. Pitchers Scarborough and Bill Wight clinched the case for the Sox, they argued.

But Lane got the clouter and sustained attack he wanted in the person of Al Zarilla, a highly competent right fielder and the league's fifth best hitter last season, currently among the runs-batted-in leaders.

AND it was remarked by some knowing baseball men at the time that the White Sox were obtaining more pitching in Joe Dobson and his jughandle curve than they were giving up in Scarborough and Wight. That's the way it has turned out to date. Dobson at once became Paul Richards' ace.

Lane gave up Outfielders Gus Zernial and Dave Philley, but landed clever operatives and more speed in Orestes Minoso and Paul Lehner. The versatile Minoso, who also plays the outfield and first base, plugs the hole at third base while giving the White Sox the Negro attraction the Comiskeyes have lacked on Chicago's south side. The Havana Special is batting .355.

Nellie Fox, the lead-off man batting .362, came from the Athletics for Catcher Joe Tipton. Catcher Aaron Robinson went to the Tigers for Southpaw Billy Pierce, Southpaw Bob Cain to the same club for Saul Rogovin.

Catchers Gus Niarhos and Phil Masi were pick-ups—the former from the Yankees, the latter from the Pirates. Outfielder Ed Stewart came from the Senators. Randy Gumpert was obtained from the Yankees on waivers.

Weatherford Fire Damage Estimated At \$1,000,000 Or More Yesterday

WEATHERFORD, June 4 (UP)—Damage was estimated at \$1,000,000 or more today in the Sunday fire which gutted the Hopkins Building, a three-story landmark on the city square.

There were 10 apartments on the top floor of the old building, and all the occupants escaped safely. There were no injuries, either among the residents or the crew of firemen who responded from several surrounding communities.

Besides the living units, the building, owned by Clarence Hopkins, housed five stores and 12 business offices.

Fire authorities said the entire structure and its contents were a loss. Damage estimates, all unofficial, varied from \$1,000,000 to \$2,500,000.

Among the stores in the building were a Safeway grocery, a drugstore, a ladies ready-to-wear shop, a Montgomery Ward mail order house, and a specialty shop.

The Texas Highway Department maintained an office on the second floor, as did several real estate firms, dentists, lawyers and other professional people.

The blaze was discovered about 9:20 a.m. Fire officials believed it started in the ground-floor grocery and spread quickly upward to envelope the entire structure. At the height of the blaze, the south wall caved in. When the fire was controlled nearly five hours later, the remainder of the building was a blackened skeleton.
