Red Reinforcements Stream Down Coast

MacArthur Will Not Eat Lunch With Gov. Allen Shivers . . .

AUSTIN, June 7 (UP)—Whether it be because of political "meddling" or just that the General will be "too tired," Gen. Douglas MacArthur will not have lunch with Gov. Allen Shivers on his trip to Texas next week.

A spokesman for the General announced yesterday the General had called off the luncheon engagement—only three hours after it had been arranged.

Immediately, many sources speculated that the General was afraid of being accused of political meddling.

Gov. Shivers, who has been mentioned frequently as a likely opponent of Sen. Tom Connally in the 1952 elections, recently praised Gen. MacArthur's speech before the joint session of Congress.

On the other hand, Sen. Connally has generally stood behind the administration and Secretary of State Dean Acheson in the current controversy.

John Van Croukhite, an administrative assistant of the Governor, denied that the switch in plans had any political overtones, though.

"The General is just tired," he explained.

Rep. Jerry Steward, a member of the joint House-Senate Committee arranging for the MacArthur visit, said he had received

word from Gen. Courtney Whitney, an aide to MacArthur, asking that the luncheon date be cancelled "if possible."

"He explained that the General was afraid he would be too tired," Steward said.

Under the revised schedule, MacArthur and his party will arrive at Austin at 12:30 next Wednesday, one hour earlier than originally planned. He will go directly to his suite in the Commodore Perry Hotel and remain there until he delivers his address at 4 p.m. on the statehouse steps.

A minor change in the MacArthur visit to Houston was also announced yesterday. He will speak Thursday night at the Rice Institute Stadium at 8 p.m. instead of 7 p.m. to allow broadcasters to clear more radio time.

Beef Strike Is Underway

WASHINGTON, June 7 (UP)—Price Control Officials today predicted a quick end to the current "beef strike" as all available enforcement agents moved into major stockyards to track down possible black marketing.

Office of Price Stabilization Officials forecast that more cattle will appear on the market "shortly." They said beef prices then will drop to ceiling levels and the big meat packers will start buying again.

OPS Enforcement Director Edward Morgan said he sent agents "to the limits of our personnel" to the major stockyards to find out who is bidding over-ceiling prices for live cattle.

Meanwhile, a group of cattlemen led by former Gov. Roy Turner of Oklahoma, abandoned plans to see president Truman and price administrator Michael V. Disalle again on their protest to the beef price rollback order.

Beef and cattle industry representatives left Washington, apparently thinking they had achieved some success in their fight against Disalle's rollback order. But Disalle has said the rollback will stand.

OPS officials said the figures presented by the group to support their objections showed "nothing we didn't have before we issued the rollback order" last month.

The first step in the beef order—a 10-cent rollback in live cattle prices—went into effect Monday. Since then marketings of cattle have dropped about one-third.

Drunk Steals During Talk

HOUSTON, June 7 (UP)—Police Lt. Sid Roe lectured a drunk last night, ordered him jailed, then started to fill his pipe for a smoke. His tobacco was gone.

Then he learned the drunk had swiped it off the lieutenant's desk while he was being lectured.

Ft. Worth Man Found Out Cold At Shamrock

HOUSTON, June 7 (UP)—A man police identified as Alfred Alexander Chapman, 25, of Fort Worth, was found unconscious and bleeding from the nose late last night on the employees' parking lot at the Shamrock Hotel.

Detectives B. M. Squires and W. W. Walker said he was lying beside a car that they assumed was his. A driver's license on the steering post of the car listed the name of Chapman and the accompanying description "fitted him perfectly."

Officers said the man's wallet was missing and there were indications he was slugged and robbed. He was in a hospital today and police had not talked with him.

PEACE MAY BE UNDERWAY

WASHINGTON, June 7 (UP)—The Voice of America says Russia has sponsored a series of Korean peace moves.

"The moves," said a voice broadcast, "have been made through a number of indirect and unofficial channels—but such moves have to be made openly and not under the table if they are to be accepted as sincere."

"The United Nations does not propose to set up a black market in Peace."

The voice said the West's refusal to accept the indirect peace moves has left Jacob Malik, the Soviet delegate at UN, "caught with his pants down."

Secretary of State Dean Acheson and all other state department spokesmen repeatedly have told news reporters that there was nothing to reports of Communist peace feelers.

The voice, which is operated by the State Department, said in an overseas broadcast, however, that "the evidence available indicates there is a good deal of fire being the peace rumor smoke."

The voice said Russia started the peace feelers, when they failed to get the proper reaction from the west, denied them.

"The Soviet delegate to the UN has just been caught with his pants down," the voice said. "Malik denied that the Soviet Union had tendered any peace feelers looking toward a settlement of the Korean war."

"There have been rumors of Soviet peace moves to end the Korean war. The moves have been made through a number of indirect and unofficial channels. But confirmation of them was given from an objective source, Seven Graftstrom, Swedish delegate to the UN. Additional confirmation was given by the Swedish Foreign Ministry."

MV School Consolidated With Eastland

The Eastland County School Board voted the consolidation of Morton Valley's Common School District with the Eastland Independent School District at a meeting this week, Carl Elliott, board secretary, has announced.

Morton Valley's district, which has 93 scholastics next fall, has been contracting with the Eastland district for the last two years for their students to attend Eastland schools.

Under Article 8, Senate Bill 116, Elliott explained, after a district has been dormant for two years the county board is authorized and required to consolidate the dormant school district with another district or districts.

A dormant school district is one which has not maintained its schools.

Elliott explained that the action of the board was a formality and constitutes no change in the status of students in the Morton Valley district since they have been attending Eastland schools for two years. They will continue to be transported to and from Eastland schools.

Elliott also announced that D. D. Franklin, president of the Morton Valley School Board, has been appointed as a trustee for the Eastland Independent district by virtue of the recent consolidation.

TORNADO RIPS WHITE DEER

WHITE DEER, June 7 (UP)—A small tornado ripped through a section of the small community last night, injuring five persons and wrecking 15 homes and two schools.

The tornado was one of several reported in the Texas Panhandle. Damages were expected to be heavy but none of the five injured persons was hurt seriously.

The twister, described as "small but noisy," flattened hundreds of power lines and left most of the southwest part of town without lights during the night.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. reported only one emergency long distance circuit still operating into the Carson County community.

The twister whipped down out of heavy thunderclouds that hurried rain and hail over a widely scattered area as they moved eastward across the state.

At Wichita Falls, hailstones as big as baseballs poured down shortly after midnight, coating streets with three inches of mashed ice in spots.

The hail, accompanied by a two-inch downpour of rain, severely damaged young cotton and other crops in the area.

The weather bureau in Amarillo, headquarters for the Texas Panhandle, reported that several tornadoes were observed in the area late yesterday and last night but the one at White Deer was the only one to cause damage.

Both the White Deer Elementary School and the Graydon High School buildings were virtually destroyed by the twister which left some 50 persons homeless.

Geyga Baten, a White Deer resident, said the funnel-shaped cloud was seen approaching a hesh town about five minutes before it struck, giving residents a chance to run to their storm cellars and probably preventing a greater toll of injured.

A Red Cross unit from Panhandle, 14 miles west of White Deer, rushed relief supplies to the area and an emergency unit from Amarillo set up a generator in the area to provide temporary power.

Most of the homeless were taken in by relatives and friends in other sections of the town or by residents of nearby Panhandle.

MacArthur Fired Because He Wouldn't Make A Deal With Red China, Brewster Says

WASHINGTON, June 7 (UP)—Senate Republicans contended today that the "real reasons" for Gen. Douglas MacArthur's ouster still are shrouded in official secrecy. But a Democrat said the public has the full facts.

As the investigation entered its sixth week, it seemed likely there would be no agreement regarding either the factors or the justification in President Truman's dismissal of the Pacific Commander on April 11.

Republican Sens. H. Alexander Smith, N. J., and Owen Brewster, Me., told a reporter in separate interviews that only "superficial" and unconvincing reasons have been advanced by the administration for relieving the "old soldier."

But investigating Committee Chairman Richard B. Russell, D., Ga., said "I doubt very much if anything new can be developed" regarding the dismissal. Russell emphasized that he was not judging the propriety of the action taken by the president.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson, who returned (at 10 a.m. EDT) for a sixth day on the witness stand, apparently kicked up a new storm late yesterday by reading from a heretofore top secret.

The dispatch disclosed that MacArthur and two other top U. S. Military Commanders urged shortly after V-J day that the United States use its postwar aid program to promote a "compromise" between the warring Chinese Nationalist and Communist factions.

Some Democrats said that it answered long-standing Republican charges that the State Department sought to "pressure" Nationalist Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek into a coalition with the Reds and used American aid to try to accomplish this end. Many Republicans claim that this effort paved the way for Communist control of the China mainland.

Brewster contended that Acheson was singing his "swan song" as Secretary of State, and was seeking to justify past administration mistakes by "going back 10 or 12 years" to explain Far Eastern policies and claim they were "right and consistent."

He claimed that it now was "apparent" that MacArthur was fired because he opposed making a "deal" with Red China which would have turned Formosa and a United Nations seat over to the Communists in return for a Korean cease fire.

"It comes out now that MacArthur had to go to permit such a deal to the Communists in January and MacArthur just wouldn't take it."

UNITED NATIONS IN SIGHT OF "IRON TRIANGLE" TODAY

TOKYO, Friday, June 8 (UP)—Communist reinforcements from Manchuria streamed down both coasts of Korea today to try to save the "iron triangle" defense position. Red troops prepared to make a "stand or die" defense of their Central Korean Bastion.

Four United Nations columns, led by tanks, were within sight of the "iron triangle." The Reds counter-attacked desperately and threw up their biggest artillery barrages of the war in an attempt to halt the Allied push.

The Allies routed isolated groups of Chinese holding hill positions south and southwest of Kumhwa and scored gains of 3,000 yards during the day. UN tanks rumbling up narrow valleys paced the advance, and there appeared to be few strong ridge positions remaining to the Chinese read guards South of Kumhwa.

On the western front, a tank-infantry task force drove 5,000 yards ahead of front lines below Chobon before running into a battalion of Communists and turning back.

TWO VANISH IN EUROPE

LONDON, June 7 (UP)—The head of the American Section of the British Foreign Office and a Foreign Specialist on Far Eastern Affairs have vanished in Europe.

French and British secret police checked reports today that the pair fled to Russia.

The Foreign Office identified the men as Donald MacClean, 38, head of the US Department and husband of an American, and Guy Burgess, 40, an expert on Japan who recently returned from Washington. They have been missing since May 25 and have been suspended from their posts.

MacClean had access to top-secret exchanges between the American and British governments, but the foreign office said there was no reason to believe the men had taken secret documents with them.

News of their disappearance caused a sensation in Paris diplomatic circles. One high western diplomatic official exclaimed:

"Oh my God, there goes the tripartite files on the big four-deputies meeting if this is true."

The Foreign Office would neither confirm nor deny reports that the men were headed for Russia. They were seen last in Paris. Scotland Yard and British Intelligence Agents were sent to join French police in their search.

Ernest Davies, the British Deputy at the four-power meeting in Paris, said he was "amazed" at the disappearance of Burgess. Another western diplomat who knows Burgess said he was a "great student of Marx and Lenin but he used his knowledge to confound the Russians."

MacClean has an American wife, it was learned. He was married in 1940 to Miss Melinda Marling of New York City and Massachusetts (no town available). They have two sons. Mrs. MacClean and the boys still are in England.

Court Action To Be Taken

AUSTIN, June 7 (UP)—Court action against Southwestern Bell Telephone Company aimed at stopping use of its facilities in transmitting horse racing information to Texas bookmakers was expected to be filed today by Attorney General Price Daniel.

It was reliably reported last night that the action was being prepared. Daniel, however, declined to comment, saying "I have nothing to say until official action is taken."

The attorney general was in a closed conference with his staff until almost 11:30 p.m. last night. He said afterwards that Galveston was the only place in the state still "running wide open" on bookmaking.

It was believed that state action against Southwestern Bell would be patterned after a similar move against Western Union, which was enjoined against furnishing race information to bookmaking establishments.

The contemplated action appeared to be outgrowth of four days of secret testimony taken by the House Crime Committee probing activities of the Maceo interests on Galveston Island.

Felix H. Demary of Orange told the committee he furnished race information from a border cafe, just across the Louisiana boundary, to the Maceo establishment.

Demary said Maceo was his only client and paid \$200 a week for the service. Committee sources said that Demary received his information from a syndicate-controlled race horse service channelled out of New Orleans.

Mexican Women Must Say Out Of Camera Rang

ZAPATA, June 7 (UP)—Mexican women living along the Rio Grande may go on swimming naked, but they'll have to stay out of camera range of a Hollywood film company on location here.

The women, who live along the border in government compound living quarters, have harassed production frequently by swimming into range of the cameras for a closer look at the motion picture stars.

Director Elia Kazan, who said he was not unappreciative of the display, yesterday appealed to Mexican authorities to persuade the swimmers to stay out of camera range.

The Mexican officers promised more decorous swimming in the future.

FORT WORTH, June 7 (UP)—A Missouri nurse with a "show me" attitude invaded the Land of Brag today, pretty thoroughly convinced that most Texans handle the truth recklessly.

That's what brought Miss Evalene Dampier, a dark-haired practical nurse from Lebanon, Mo., to the Lone Star State. She thinks Texans are liars.

Miss Dampier came to Texas at the invitation of the Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Assn., which swallowed its pride and sponsored a contest on "Why I Think Texans are Liar."

Miss Dampier had little trouble in winning the contest and the expense paid trip that went with it.

Madisonville cattlemen who met the train that brought Miss Dampier to Fort Worth more than two hours late, had two avowed purposes: To show her a good time, and to get her to change her mind about the veracity of Texans.

Miss Dampier, who admitted to being 31, said she had met "some nice Texans."

But on the other hand, "part of them are pretty low down," she smiled.

She said her dislike for Texans in general grew out of an acquaintance with a Corpus Christi pipeline worker in Missouri.

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Wildcat Is Stacked SE Of Eastland

A wildcat has been staked seven miles southeast of Eastland by Fred Birdsong on the No. 1 W. T. Duncan.

Location is 834 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of Section 8, Harvey Kendrick's Survey. A cable tool project, stated depth is 1,600 feet.

Four miles west of Eastland, J. J. Lynn has completed the No. 1 A. Dulin, as a producer with a gauge of 92 barrels of 40.2 gravity oil in 24 hours.

Flow was through 18-64 choke with 400 pounds on casing and 165 on tubing from 96 perforations at 3,256-68 feet. Location is Section 47, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Four miles southeast of Eastland, T. W. Eagleston will drill the No. 1 Adams in a Strawn tool.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 35, Leagues 3 and 4, McLennan CSL. Projected depth is 1,700 feet with cable tools.

In the Briggs-Owens area about five miles northwest of Eastland Cooper and Hamphill spudded in Wednesday on their No. 2-B J. S. Hart, located 660 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of the northeast corner of Section 75, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Fits were being dug for another Corjer Hemphill location, the No. 5, J. S. Hart, 330 feet from the north and 651 feet from the west lines of the northwestern quarter of Section 58, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

About three miles southwest of Eastland, Oil Associated, Inc., was drilling near 4,000 Thursday. Plans call for drilling to the Ellenberger lime where an electric log will be run to determine oil and gas possibilities.

Southwest of Cisco the Wilcox Investment Co., No. 1 J. R. McElreath drilled to 2,266 feet where pipe has been set in the Strawn Sand sector. It was given hydraulic treatment Monday, and the well flowed when opened Wednesday.

OKLA., June 7 (UP)—"Please, daddy, come home—mother leaves us alone all the time."

A. J. Speers said today this plea from his 9-year-old daughter brought him flying home from South America on a trip that ended in the death of his wife, the mother of four children.

Speers, 35, faces preliminary hearing next Tuesday on a charge of first degree manslaughter.

Speers admitted at his arraignment yesterday he slapped his wife once before she fell and struck her head on a pressure cooker in the kitchen of their small home. She died a few minutes later.

Speers testified that letters from his wife "sounded funny" and he placed a telephone call from South America where he worked.

He said his daughter, Ruby Pearl, 9, answered and said: "Please, daddy, come home. Mother leaves us alone all the time. She's out on a date."

Speers' law name and his wife was killed following an argument Monday.

A second man involved in the tragedy, Carl Barton, about 29, has been charged with adultery.

The complaint charges Barton with "dating" Mrs. Speers since her husband left for South America to work for an oil company last January.

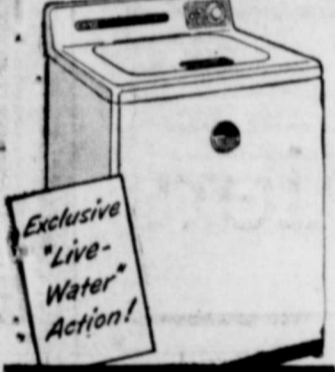

Plane Falls In San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, June 7 (UP)—A giant C-97 Military plane crashed on takeoff today from Kelly Air Force Base, carrying its entire crew of nine to death and gutting two business buildings by fire in its spectacular plung.

Kelly Authorities said none of the crew survived. The four-engine plane was operated by the Military Air Transport Service (MATS) with headquarters at Kelly.

Mrs. Sophie Zrenner was walking near the Grey Eagle Cafe at Somerset Road, about 2 1/2 miles southeast of the Kelly Reservation when the plane hurtled to earth. Flaming gasoline burned her critically and set fire to the cafe, destroying it.

Before it finally smashed to earth in a blast of flame, the craft clipped two utility poles and tore down high-voltage elec-

tric wires and dipped a wing into a filling station, setting off a roaring fire fed by gasoline and oil.

Mrs. Josephine Laque, who lives on Somerset Road not far from the Grey Eagle Cafe, had a worm's-eye view of the tragedy.

"It came over my house at tree-top level," she said. "One of the engines was missing fire. Over the road of the engines, I could hear the screams of the men and I could see them waving frantically."

Louis Guana, owner of the wrecked Gulf Filling Station, was sitting in his automobile when the crippled plane screamed over. "The wing that dipped down just missed my car by inches," Guana said. "I heard the crash, but I didn't see it. I got out and ran."

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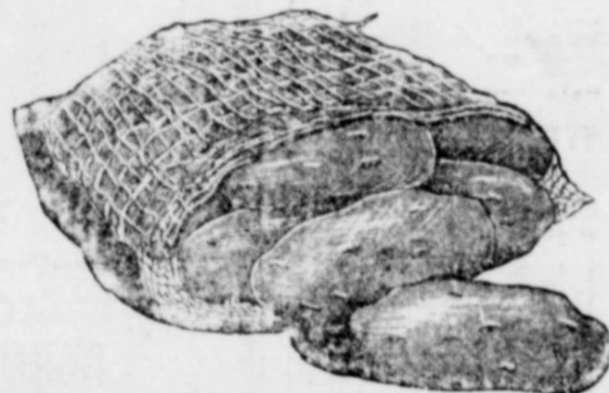

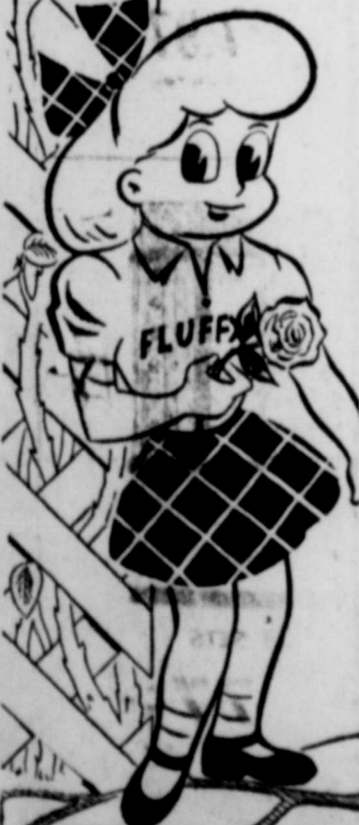
