414 Pine Street received the following letter from her son Howard who is with the Armed Forces

I just read this interesting article in yesterdays "Army Times".
I got quiet a thrill out of it. I supyou had already heard about it but I'll send it anyway just to show you that Ranger's name is traveling around the world.

We haven't done anything here but upload trains and that has been pretty good. The weather is fine too, only a little chilly at night. I pulled guard last night and now I'm suffering from the loss of sleep. We will parade in Mannheim tomorrow morning and Lawton and I are going on pass tomorrow afternoon

I was really surprised the way the people speak English here. Nearly every German I have seen speaks English enough to get by, I think they have learned it begging for cigarettes and trying to

sell liquor.
I'll finish this letter now; we had the big parade yesterday and I got to go on pass and I really took the town in. I walked many miles looking at the city and there was lots of it completely destroyed. It is a larger city than I thought, I really had a good time. Lawton and I stayed out until 3:30 and when we got to the gate we had to walk about a mile in the rain. I forgot to turn in my pass and I was put on a detail with about 20 others. That really fouled up my Sunday's sleeping.

I had to clean the packing grease off of my pistol today and
