The latest date a producer may obtain a prior approvel for contour listing or chiseling row crop land is une 1, 1948, and prior approval for summer fallowed acreage must be obtained by June 15, 1948. Summer fallowed land must be plowed one time by June 1948 in order to qualify for payment.

The budget for this county was greatly decreased from 1947, and some practices have been limited. Producers desiring any information in regard to the 1948 ACP Program are invited to contact the Castro County ACA Office.
