

ASHINGTON—(NEA)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's Fourth of July speech before the English Speaking Union in London is being studied closely in Washington as a declaration of his political principles. If the Republican Party takes Eisenhower as its Presidential candidate in 1952, it will have to take the general's ideas along with the man. 


