## Wedding Today Will Climax Four Hour Courtship

EL PASO, Aug. 2 (UP)—A whirlwind romance between an Air Force Sergeant and an attractive British divorcee he wooed and won in four hours will culminate in marriage today.

Mrs. Winifred F. Spears, 36, arrived here last night from London on a rush into the waiting arms of S-Sgt. William C. Griggs, 23, of Biggs Air Force Base.

The couple happily said it was "love at first sight" that brought them together last February.

Last night's meeting was their first since the four-hour courtship in England, but it wasn't private by any means. A squad of Public Relations Officers from Biggs Base here and a platoon of reporters and photographers also, got into the act.

Mrs. Spears said she was "overwhelmed" by the reception. "Everywhere the plane stopped," she said, "There was a reception committee to welcome us."

Griggs soundly kissed his bride-to-be while champagne bubbled. Then he embraced her 12-year-old daughter by a former marriage, Antoinette.

Mrs. Spears told of Griggs striking up a conversation with her last February in England as he waited departure of a bomber being ferried to the United States. The conversation ended with a proposal and the British airline receptionist consented to marry him right then and there.

Griggs, however, had to depart for the United States. He failed a second proposal and Mrs. Spears again accepted.

Early today, Griggs obtained a five-day pass and said he would use the full time for a honeymoon. "There'll be another, longer honeymoon later," he added.

He said preparations for the wedding "have darned near tired me out. I'll be glad when it's all over."

The marriage was scheduled to be held about 6 p.m. (EDT) today at Las Cruces, N. M., 40 miles northwest of here.

Griggs has planned to "have the ceremony at Biggs Air Force Base, but he changed the plans when he learned that Mrs. Spears' pre-marital medical certificate, issued in England, could not be used in Texas. A three-day wait, would have been required before a new Texas certificate could be validated.

## \$18,000 Ash Tray Is Non Existent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (UP)—Some newsmen go too far in "reckless" stories about government extravagance, according to Sen. Clyde R. Hoey, D., N.C.

Hoey, chairman of a permanent Senate investigating committee, cited a story about a "\$18,000 ashtray" on the arm of President Truman's seat in his personal airplane, "The Independence."

He said the story by Jack Lait of the New York Daily Mirror on June 21) was an "outstanding misrepresentation of the facts."

Hoey said it was "so fantastic" he had his committee staff look into it. Investigators reported:

1. There is no ashtray on the arm of the seat occupied by Mr. Truman.
2. There is one in each corner of the worktable in the President's compartment at an estimated cost of \$1 each.
3. There are standard type ashtrays on the seats in the passenger and pilot's compartments.
4. Mr. Truman doesn't smoke.

## Tax Evaders Get Reinforcements

FORT WORTH, Aug. 2 (UP)—Reinforcements in the person of a 70-year-old Fort Worth woman were scheduled to go to the aid today of Marshall housewives squabbling with the government about payment of social security taxes for domestic help.

Miss Fannie Deloach said she would lend moral support to the militant housewives who refuse to back down.

Three of the 19 housewives are relatives of the sparkling-eyed Miss Deloach. They are Miss Ethel Sparger, a niece; Mrs. Dorothy Martin, wife of a nephew, and Mrs. Louise Littlejohn, a cousin.

Miss Deloach said her 77-year-old sister in Marshall, Mrs. W. L. Martin, persuaded her to "come down here and get in this fight."

## Red Cross Man Shot For Not Giving Relief

BONNER SPRINGS, Kan., Aug. 2 (UP)—Louis Ward, chairman of the Bonner Springs Red Cross chapter, was shot last night shortly after he refused a flood victim's demands for additional relief money.

Ward, 52, was struck in the back by a .22-caliber pistol bullet. He was taken to a Kansas City, Kan., hospital where his condition was "good" today.

Raymond W. Temberton, 42, was arrested an hour after the shooting. A .22-caliber pistol, three bullets discharged, was found in his pocket, Sheriff Ellsworth Edwards said.

Ward told the sheriff that Temberton, a truck driver, came to the Red Cross office last night and asked for additional funds to buy food for his large family. Temberton's home was flooded July 13 and he lost most of his belongings.

Ward said he refused to give Temberton a grocery order because he was not eligible "at this time." He pointed out that Temberton earlier had received \$100 for food and \$200 for furnishings.

Temberton left the office, Ward said, but he was waiting for Ward two hours later when the Red Cross chairman closed his office.

"I'm going to kill you," Temberton was quoted as saying.

Ward said he replied: "I'm not armed and I don't want any trouble. All we've done here is to try and help you."

He then turned and ran as three shots were fired. One struck him, lodging between vertebrae.

Temberton offered no resistance when he was taken into custody an hour later on a Bonner Springs street.

He was questioned for two hours by sheriff's officers. They said he answered all queries about the shooting with, "I don't remember."

Sheriff Edwards said Temberton told him he bought the pistol yesterday for \$35 at a pawnshop but "he couldn't remember why."

Edwards said Temberton is the "father of 10 or 11 children, he's just not sure how many." The children range in age up to "16 or 17 years old," Edwards said.

## Seven Men, One Woman In Race

WICHITA Falls, Aug. 2 (UP)—The special 13th District Congressional election next month will be a seven man-one woman affair.

The midnight deadline for filings passed without additional entries for the top-candidate-take-all voting on Sept. 8 to pick a successor to veteran Rep. Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls.

Gossett left Congress Aug. 1 to become General Attorney in Texas for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Of the eight candidates, one wears the Republican label—Joe Jackson, oil operator, Wichita Falls. GOP leaders in the Democratic dominated North Texas district that the seven-way split of Democratic ballots will vault their man into Congress.

It was such a situation—with the Democratic vote split 10 ways—that sent Ben Guill of Pampa to Congress last year in a special 18th, Panhandle District election. Guill, lone Republican in that special election, lost his seat later in a regular election when he faced only one Democratic candidate, Walter Rogers, the party's official nominee.

Democrats opposing Jackson in next month's 13th district voting will be W. D. McFarlane of Graham, who held the Congressional job three terms until Gossett beat him in 1938; Frank Ikard and Walter Jenkins, both of Wichita Falls; State Rep. Doug Crouch of Denton; State Sen. Wayne Waggoner of Stoneburg; Mrs. Edith Williams, Jack County rancher, and James A. Benjamin, 82-year-old Benjamin attorney.

## Ft. Worth Firemen Ask Salary Boost

FORT WORTH, Aug. 2 (UP)—Fort Worth's firemen relied on civic pride today to get them a raise.

The firemen complained to the city council yesterday that the high cost of living was too much for their pay checks. They asked for a 20 per cent pay boost, effective Oct. 1.

Besides, they added, private first class firemen in Dallas get \$10 a month more than those in Fort Worth.

## Bankline Well Extends Briggs Owens Field

Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 Ted Hale, quarter-mile outpost to the Bankline Owens Field, five miles northwest of Eastland, produced a potential of 30 barrels of 41.2 gravity oil in 24 hours.

The well is in Section 42, Block 4, H & TC Survey. Flow was through a 12-64 choke with 320 pounds on casing and 135 pounds on tubing from 29 perforations.

Perforations were made at 0-293-98 feet. Total depth was 3,755 feet. Casing was set at 3,377 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 2285-1.

## Rabid Bats Ten Miles From Border

AUSTIN, Aug. 2 (UP)—Rabid Mexican vampire bats have approached within 10 miles of Texas and the State Health Department mapped plans today to cope with the threat.

Dr. Kenneth Young of the health department said the infected bats were reported in an area about 100 miles southwest of Presidio in the Big Bend Country.

No rabid bats have been found in Texas, Young said, but if they do arrive "we plan to go right to the caves and eliminate the bat first."

## Girl Killed On Her Way Home

HOUSTON, Aug. 2 (UP)—A 16-year-old girl was killed last night, a few minutes after she called her mother and told her she would be riding home from work with a boy she knew.

Pretty Janie Lisiecke was killed at 9:10 p.m. when the car in which she was riding crashed into the rear of a parked lumber truck.

The youth driving the car, Thomas O. Haywood, 17, suffered cuts and possible internal injuries.

Police said the boy was blinded by the lights of an approaching car and crashed into the parked truck.

# UN Negotiators Refuse To Accept Red Demands On Zone

## New Navy Chief Is Carrier Man

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (UP)—Adm. William M. Fechteler, President Truman's choice for new Chief of Naval Operations, is a "battleship admiral" who recognizes that the aircraft carrier is now the "backbone of the fleet."

Navy Secretary Dan A. Kimball said Mr. Truman's nomination of Fechteler to succeed the late Adm. Forrest P. Sherman, the "flying admiral," signified no letdown in the role of Naval Aviation.

"He's always been for carriers," Kimball told a reporter. "The carrier is the backbone of the fleet like the battleship used to be, and he knows it. He's a heck of a good man."

Immediately after Mr. Truman nominated him yesterday, Fechteler, 55, left for Norfolk, Va., to wind up his duties as Commander of the Atlantic Fleet and to wait for the expected Senate confirmation.

The salty, square-jawed sailor, who has spent 39 years in uniform, told fellow officers he was "fully aware" of the responsibilities of the nation's CNO.

"It is a job of great responsibility under any circumstances," he said. "It is difficult to overestimate the responsibility of the job, or of anyone who attempts to fill Adm. Sherman's shoes."

Sherman died in Naples on July 22 while on a mission to bolster U. S. strategy in the Mediterranean.

## Dog Lover Dies In Mineral Wells

MINERAL WELLS, Aug. 2 (UP)—An inquest verdict was expected today in the death of Mrs. Myrtle Starnes, 57-year-old dog fancier, found dead in her home yesterday.

The body of Mrs. Starnes, who lived alone 13 miles south of here was found by neighbors who investigated after hearing her dog bark during the night.

Several unmailed letters to friends found in her house indicated she had suffered financial reverses from property investments the last several years.

## Investment Nets 2c In 19 Years

FORT WORTH, Aug. 2 (UP)—Police traffic Sergeant Dwight H. Johnson was seven cents to the good today after cashing in on a long-term investment.

The officer was in a Fort Worth bank with his 12-year-old son, when a teller recognized him.

It was 19 years ago, the teller recalled, that Johnson had never completely closed his school savings account. The balance was five cents, and the interest amounted to two cents, said the teller as he handed over the money.

# Motor Vehicle Law Will Call For Compulsory Inspection

(Editors note: The following is a true copy of the proposed Texas Motor Laws pertaining to the compulsory inspection, repair, or adjustments of vehicle that will operate on the Texas highways.)

AN ACT H. B. No. 223 Amending Section 140, Section 141, and Section 142, Article XV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to read:

Section 140. The following shall be a true copy of the proposed Texas Motor Laws pertaining to the compulsory inspection, repair, or adjustments of vehicle that will operate on the Texas highways:

AN ACT H. B. No. 223 Amending Section 140, Section 141, and Section 142, Article XV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to read:

421. Acts of the fifteenth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, Providing for the compulsory inspection, adjustment, correction or repair of motor vehicles; trailers, semitrailers, pole trailers, and house trailers under the supervision of Texas Department of Public Safety; providing that this act shall not apply to trailers or semitrailers the gross weight of which is four thousand, (4,000) pounds or less; requiring adjustment, correction or repair before issuance of inspection certificate; providing for the designation of official inspection stations for making inspections; prescribing the frequency of inspections

## UN Forces Gain Three Miles

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA, Aug. 2 (UP)—United Nations forces jumped off in a "rest pocket" offensive today and advanced more than three miles toward the Communist stronghold of Kumsong, 29 miles north of the 38th Parallel.

The main forces gained 3,000 to 5,000 yards in their attack toward the anchor town of the Red line on the central front.

Patrols thrust farther and three back enemy patrols in brief platoon-sized skirmishes.

The attack, a reminder to the Reds of the potential striking power of Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's 8th Army, was made at a point about 65 miles northwest of Kumsong, where cease-fire talks are deadlocked.

Eighth Army spokesmen described the movement as a "limited objective attack" aimed mainly at a key hill position south-southeast of Kumsong.

Infantrymen jumped off before dawn, favored by clearing weather, fighter bombers streaked ahead of them to scatter small Red forces.

Their objective gained, the UN troops were reported trading small arms and mortar fire with enemy troops as night closed in.

Kumsong has become the principal enemy supply and reinforcement base since collapse of the old "Red" "iron triangle" to the southeast.

An 8th Army communique reported little more than patrol action along the rest of the 135-mile Korean front.

## Crackdown On Narcotics In Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, Aug. 2 (UP)—The district attorney's office today launched an investigation into alleged illegal sales of barbiturates and drugs.

District Attorney Stewart Heilman said two Fort Worth doctors and a druggist may be involved. He said the two doctors may be selling prescriptions to drug addicts.

Heilman also said there was a possibility that teen-agers may be buying drugs obtainable legally only with prescriptions.

BROWNWOOD, Aug. 2 (UP)—Funeral services will be held at 9:30 a.m. tomorrow for Wesley Miles Hall, 46-year-old Brownwood contractor killed yesterday when his automobile struck a bridge 10 miles west of here.

# CEASE FIRE TALKS HEAD FOR IMMINENT SHOWDOWN TODAY

UN ADVANCE BASE BELOW KAESONG, KOREA, Friday, Aug. 2 (UP)—The cease-fire talks in Kaesong, headed for an imminent showdown today.

The showdown may come at the 18th cease-fire session at 11 a.m. today (7 p.m. Thursday CST).

Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, chief United Nations negotiator, told the Communists flatly at Thursday's session that he would not accept a truce line which left the Allied forces open to a Red double-cross offensive.

Chief Communist negotiator Gen. Nam II said he would not accept the present front as the truce line as the UN demands.

At Thursday's meeting Nam II asked Joy a question which implied he thought the UN might make a sneak attack.

"The UN command has no intention of violating any military armistice agreed upon," Joy said and added bluntly:

"But neither will the UN command place itself in an indefensible position in the event of an armistice violation by the other side."

The Chinese Communist Peiping Radio reported that Nam II said in turn:

"The UN representative insists on creation of a military demarcation line crossing deeply over the 38th Parallel, giving as reason the construction of defense positions. This insistence, however, has no basis and not only shows lack of sincerity in the desire for a Korean cease-fire but is also unfair and is not reasonable. We cannot accept it."

At Thursday's session, however, Nam II seemed stalling for time. There was some feeling in UN headquarters here that he had asked for, and was awaiting, new instructions from the North Korean and Chinese Communist Commands in Pyongyang and Peiping.

## Suit Filed As Result Of Murder

LAREDO, Aug. 2 (UP)—A \$110,000 damage suit was on file today against a Laredo hotel where two men were killed two years ago, resulting in murder charges against broker George Ochoa.

The suit was filed in 49th District Court by the father of Henry Whittenburg, Jr., one of those killed. It charged hotel management with negligence in not having a detective on duty and in showing a man to Whittenburg's room.

A similar suit was filed against the hotel last week by the widow of James Lindsay, also killed.

Ochoa has been in a Mexico City jail for a year while U. S. officials try to arrange his extradition.

## Duties Won't Stop Ike In '52

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (UP)—President Truman said today he does not think Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's assignment in Europe would interfere if the General wants to enter politics in 1952.

to be operated by an applicant; prescribing certain requirements in manner of displaying inspection certificates; providing the operative date of this act; providing a saving clause, repealing all laws or parts of laws in conflict herewith; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

Section 1. That Section 140, Article XV of Senate Bill No. 172, Chapter 421, Acts of the Fifty-fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, be and the same is hereby amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 140. Compulsory inspection. (a) It shall be the duty of the Texas Department of Public Safety to require every owner of a motor vehicle, trailer, semitrailer, pole trailer or house trailer, registered in this State, to have the mechanism, brakes, and equipment upon such vehicles inspected at State appointed inspection stations or by State inspectors as hereinafter provided, except that provisions relating to the inspection of trailers and semitrailers shall not apply when gross weight of such trailer or semitrailer and the load carried thereon is four thousand (4,000) pounds or less.

(b) If such inspection discloses the necessity for adjustments, corrections or repairs, the mechanism, brakes and equipment shall be adjusted, corrected or repaired before a certificate is issued as hereinafter provided. The owner may have such adjustments, corrections or repairs made by such qualified person or persons as he may choose, subject to reinspection as hereinafter provided.

(c) Official inspection stations appointed and supervised by the State of Texas shall make all inspections pursuant to the provisions of this section, except as provided in subdivision (d) hereof. The Department shall cause one (1) inspection to be made in the year commencing with the effective date of this Act, and annually thereafter. The periods of inspection shall be fixed by the Department. The Department shall have power to make rules and regulations with respect to the periods and the character and extent of the inspections to be made.

(d) The Department may, in its discretion, permit inspection as herein provided to be made by the State Inspectors under such terms and conditions as the Department may prescribe.

(e) No license of a motor vehicle shall be issued and no transfer of the title to a motor vehicle shall be made unless such motor vehicle has been inspected under the terms of this Act within twelve (12) months prior to the issuance of such license or transfer. After the period designated for the inspections, no person shall operate on the highways of this State any motor vehicle registered in this State unless a valid certificate of inspection is displayed thereon as required by this section and any inspector or patrolman of the Department of Public Safety, or any sheriff or deputy sheriff, who shall exhibit to his badge or other signs of authority, may stop any motor vehicle not displaying this inspection certificate and require the owner or operator to produce an official inspection certificate for the motor vehicle being operated.

(f) Any person operating a motor vehicle on the highways of this State, other than a motor vehicle license in another State and being temporarily and legally operated under a valid reciprocal agreement, in violation of the provisions of this Act, or without displaying an inspection certificate shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction be punished as provided in Section 143.

(g) The Department may appoint and remove such patrolman assistants, inspectors and employees at it may deem necessary to carry out the provisions of this Section, prescribe their powers and duties, and fix their compensation within the amounts made available by appropriation.

(h) The provisions of this Act shall not apply to the vehicles referred to in paragraph (a) of this section when moving under or hearing the current "Factory Delivery License Plate", current "Intermittent License Plate".

Sec. 2 That 141, Article XV of Senate Bill No. 172, Chapter 421, Acts of the Fifty-fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Sec. 141. State Appointed Inspections. (a) The provisions of this Section shall be located anywhere in the State, and should any be established or appointed, there shall be at least one (1) for each County. The Department is authorized to furnish instructions to, and supervise office an inspection stations for corrections, adjustments, repairs, and inspection of motor vehicles, trailers, semitrailers, pole trailers and house trailers for the proper and safe performance of steering mechanism, brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, and such other conditions to assure that such vehicles are in conformity with this Act. Every person desiring to operate as an official inspection station shall file an application for a certificate of appointment with the Department.

"The application shall be made upon a form prescribed and furnished by the Department, and shall set forth the name under which the applicant transacts or intends to transact business, the location of this place of business within the State, and such other information as the Department may require. If the applicant has or intends to have more than one place of business within the State, a separate application shall be made for each place of business.

"If the applicant is an association, the application shall set forth the names and the addresses of the persons constituting the association, and if a corporation, the names and addresses of the principal officers thereof, and any other information prescribed by the Department of purposes of identification. The application shall be signed and verified by oath or affirmation by the owner if a natural person, in the case of an association, by the member or partner thereof; and in the case of a corporation, by an executive officer thereof or some person specifically authorized by the corporation to sign the application, to which shall be attached written evidence of his authority.

"Only such locations which fulfill the Department's requirements and whose owners or proprietors comply with Department regulations shall qualify and be appointed and issued a certificate. Upon approval of an application, the Department shall issue to the owner a certificate of appointment as an official inspection station for the place of business within the State set forth in the application.

"Certificates of appointment shall not be assignable, and shall be valid for the owners whose name issued and for the transaction of business at the place designated therein, and shall at all times be conspicuously displayed at the place or which issued.

"Upon being advised that applicant will be approved, the applicant shall provide the bond hereinafter required and a fee of five dollars (\$5) which shall constitute the certificate fee, until August 31st of the odd numbered year following the date of appointment. Thereafter, appointments shall be made for two-year periods and the certificate fee for each period shall be Five Dollars (\$5). All certificate fees shall be placed in a fund in the State Treasury to be known as the Motor Vehicle Inspection Fund and shall be used by the Department in the administration of this act.

"(b) Every owner of an official inspection station be required to furnish a bond payable to the State of Texas in the amount of One Thousand Dollars, (\$1,000) to indemnify the State against the violation of any of the terms of and conditions of this Act. Any inspector or any official employee of any inspection station issue an official certificate of inspection without having made an inspection of the vehicle for which it is issued or who shall knowingly or willfully issue an official inspection certificate for a motor vehicle or vehicles, the mechanism, brakes, and equipment of which are not at the time of such issuance in good condition and in conformity with the laws of this state shall forfeit said bond to the State of Texas.

"(c) Any owner of an official inspection station who by himself, agent, servant, or employee, violates any provision of this Section shall, upon conviction be punished by a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.) and the certificate shall be automatically cancelled and shall be surrendered to the magistrate before whom convicted and forwarded by such magistrate to the Department. The Department may for cause, upon notice in any administrative hearing, cancel the certificate of any inspection station and the decision of the Department in respect to the cancellation of the license of an official inspection station for cause, or the refusal to reissue a license to an official inspection station shall be final.

"(d) The fee for compulsory inspection to be made under this section shall be One Dollar (\$1). One fourth (1-4) of such fee shall be paid to the Department and shall be set up in a special fund in the State Treasury for the purpose of paying the expense of the operation of this law. If the inspection discloses the necessity for adjustments, corrections or repairs, such motor vehicles shall be re-inspected free of charge after the adjustments, corrections or repairs have been made.

Any such vehicle under the terms of this Act if involved in an accident subsequent to the required inspection shall return to said inspection station after adequate repairs are made for a second and re-inspection procedure. The Department shall have the power, from time to time, to adopt such rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, as it may deem necessary, to effectively accomplish the purposes and enforce the provisions of this section. All such rules and regulations shall be promulgated and a certified copy filed in the office of the Secretary of State and shall become effective thirty days thereafter. Copies of such rules and regulations shall be posted at the courthouse door of each of the several counties of this state and copies thereof made available by the Department to any person making request thereof without charge.

"(e) No certificate of inspection shall be issued by any inspector or any inspection station until the mechanism, brake, and equipment of the vehicle inspected shall have been found to be in proper and safe condition and to comply with the laws of this State. No person shall make, issue or knowingly use an imitation or counterfeit of an official inspection certificate.

Sec. 3. That section 142, Article XV of Senate Bill No. 172, Chapter 421, Acts of the Fifty-fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Sec. 142. Establishment of Standards of Safety. A. The Department may establish uniform standards of safety, not consistent with law, with respect to brakes, lights, horn, mirrors, windshields, windshield wipers, steering mechanism wheel alignment and such other equipment or attachments as it may deem necessary. Such standards of safety shall be posted in every official inspection station. Every motor vehicle inspected shall be required to conform in all respects to the standard of safety established pursuant to this section.

"(b) The Department shall furnish to inspect on stations certificates of inspection, serially numbered, each of which shall, when issued, bear the registration number of the motor vehicle for which issued and shall be countersigned by the inspector or person in charge of the inspection station, and shall bear the true date of issuance, and shall be valid for the period not to exceed twelve months from the date of issuance, but in any event such certificate shall be valid after the first day of the next ensuing period of inspection. One of such certificates of inspection shall be designated for the windshield of any motor vehicle, and shall be pasted in the lower right hand corner of the windshield. A certificate issued on a vehicle other than a motor vehicle shall be attached to such vehicle as the Department may require.

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Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force ninety (90) days after its passage, but in no event earlier than July 1, 1951.

Sec. 5. If any portion of this Act is held unconstitutional by the court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions shall nevertheless be valid the same as if the invalid had not been a part hereof.

Sec. 6. All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict only.

Sec. 7. The fact that the public welfare, health and safety require compulsory inspection of ways of this State creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and said Rule is hereby suspended, and that this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

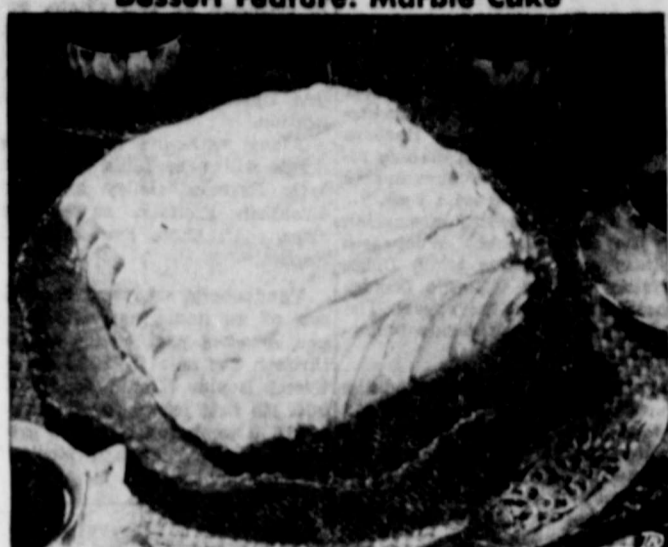

## Louis Set For Crack At Title

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2 (UP)—Joe Louis, showing his finest condition in years, said today he was ready for a championship battle anytime now—and the sooner the better.

Still slightly perplexed after his hard-fought 10-round decision over Cesar Brion last night, Joe said he was just "waiting" to see what happens in the Ezzard Charles-Joe Walcott situation.

"I can't say how long I can wait for a shot at the title," Louis said, "but as long as Walcott holds the crown I'm going to be waiting for a crack at it."  
Louis looked very sharp in his battle with Brion last night, but Brion, fighting from a crouch, slugged it out with the former champion to win the hearts of the 15,000 fans.

In one round, the fourth, the two men stood toe-to-toe and slugged for the full three minutes as the crowd went wild. Two judges gave the round to Brion, but the referee, Fred Apostol, the former middleweight champion, gave the edge to Louis.

In the late rounds, Louis had Brion in trouble, but the Argentine battler never left his feet, although he was groggy once in the seventh. It was a well-known weakness—no defense for a left— that proved Brion's downfall.  
Brion said after the fight he figured it was all even going into the seventh. Most judges' cards upheld that opinion.

It was then that Brion changed from a crouch to a stand-up position. Louis started peppering him with wicked lefts that cut Brion's face to ribbons and he bled profusely throughout the remainder of the fight.

CUERNAVACA, Mexico, Aug. 2 (UP)—Prince Igor Troubetzkoy temporarily blocked Barbara Hutton's \$100 Mexican divorce to-day with a federal court appeal that may last "at least a year."

He won a three-day suspension of the 38-year-old Woolworth heiress' new decree while Judge Alfredo Guillen Gallardo decides whether to accept the appeal. The judge said he may decide tomorrow.

Prince Igor's lawyers asked the court to set aside the 12-day-old divorce as unconstitutional on the ground that Miss Hutton was not a legal resident of Mexico when she filed suit in February.

If Judge Guillen Gallardo decides to hear the Prince's appeal, the decree will be held up indefinitely until he hands down a decision.

Troubetzkoy's attorney Victory Velazquez said it is "almost certain" the court will consider the appeal. "Very likely the divorce will be annulled within a few weeks," he said.

"But even if the judge rules unfavorably," Velazquez said, "we'll carry the case to the supreme court, although that may take us at least a year."

Miss Hutton's attorney, Jose De La Sierra, said he is "confident" the judge will refuse to consider Prince Igor's attempt to upset the divorce, because "everything is legal."

But Moser denied that the Daily News' information came from the committee.

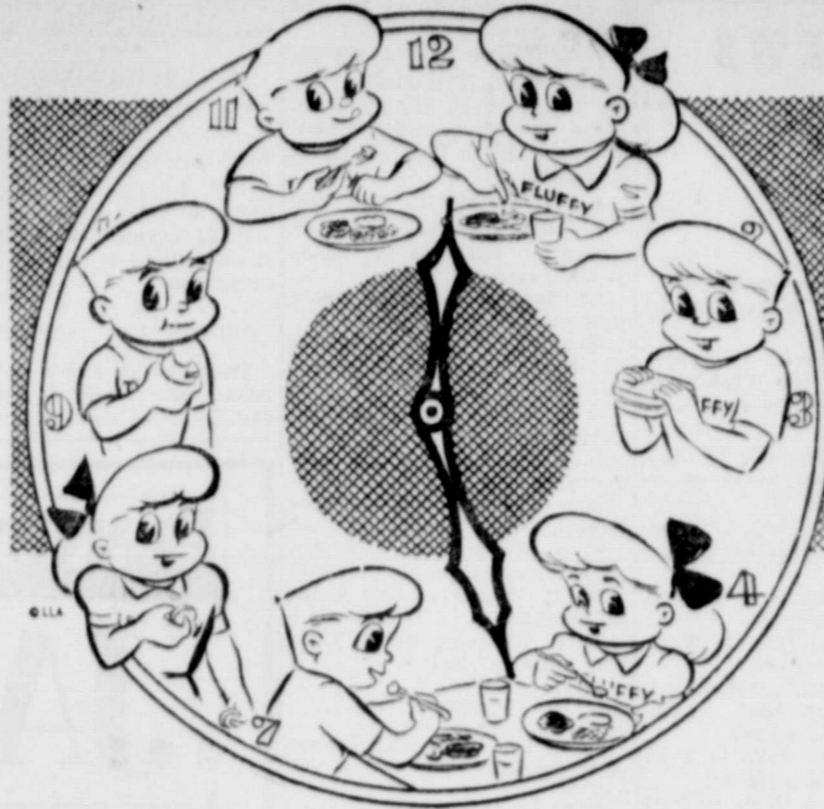

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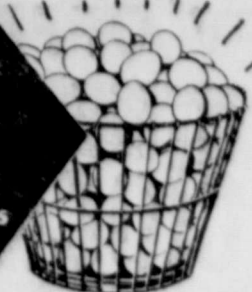

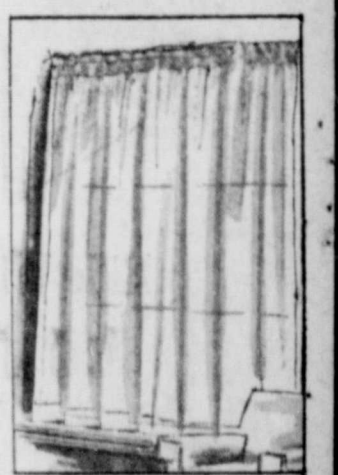
