Third Annual Field Day Held At Kokomo

The third annual conservation field day, under the direction of District Supervisor, L. R. Higginbottom, was held last week at the Kokomo Community Tabernacle. Kokomo is located about 10 miles northeast of Carbon.

More than 50 farmers and ranchers of Eastland and neighboring counties attended the meeting.

The morning program consisted of discussions on soils and soil capabilities. A brief explanation was made on the recent reorganization of the USDA and the basic objective of the Department of Agriculture.

M. T. Turner and E. E. McAlister, Soil Conservation Service technicians assigned the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, led in the morning discussion.

After a free lunch was served, L. R. Higginbottom introduced the Eastland County PMA Committeemen, A. Z. Myrick and E. E. Blackwell; and Emmett Powell, PMA Secretary of Eastland County. Each made brief talks regarding the cooperation between the United States Department of Agriculture agencies in assisting farmers.

Randall F. Reeves, Work Unit Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service at Rising Star, outlined the short tour on Albert Hendrick's farm.

The group observed several soils under field conditions. Favorable and unfavorable soil characteristics were pointed out with discussions on maintenance of improvement for those characteristics.

The meeting ended at 3:30 p. m.

The operators reported they were receiving from 35 to 40 cents per hour. They demanded a minimum of 75 cents.

The resignation of Mrs. Joe Frank Sparks, Jr., County Home Demonstration agent, was accepted by the commissioner's Court at their regular monthly meeting Monday morning, effective Sept. 15, John Hart, County Judge said today.

Mrs. Sparks assumed duties as home demonstration agent Feb. 15, 1950.

At that time there were eleven active home demonstration clubs, with 160 members enrolled. Under Mrs. Sparks program three new clubs have been organized with the total number of members enrolled rising to 250.

Former Sheriff Dies At Andrews

Relatives and friends in Eastland County have received word of the death of Samuel E. Nolley, Andrews County rancher and land owner, who during the hectic days of the Oil Boom was the Eastland County Sheriff.

Nolley died of a heart attack at 10 a. m., Sunday, September 2nd.

Funeral services were held in the Andrews Church of Christ last Wednesday. Rev. Sam Malone, pastor of the Southside Baptist Church in Seminole, officiated.

Nolley was the half-brother of Omar Burkett of Eastland-Cisco Highway, and the uncle of Mrs. E. T. Spence of Cisco.

During his career as sheriff of Eastland County he gained a wide reputation as a colorful and successful law enforcement officer. He had lived in Andrews County for the past 27 years and had extensive land holdings in the Andrews area at the time of his death.

Bridge Over The Leon Near Staff Strengthened

Commissioner A. M. Thurman of the German precinct was in Ranger Saturday morning and stated that the work of repairing and rebuilding the Staff bridge across the Leon had been completed, and the bridge was capable of carrying very heavy loads of farm products.

The bridge had been in such a bad state of repair for several months that it was unsafe for large loads to cross it, but Mr. Thurman states that now the bridge will carry any heavy weight load, which should prove an accommodation to the farmers in that area getting their products to market.

The Trade Extension Committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce made several trips to Eastland before the Commissioner's Court and had conference with Commissioner Thurman of the German precinct and Ed Castleberry of the Ranger precinct in regard to getting the bridge repaired.

The repair of the bridge at Staff will pave the way for a better portion of the farm produce to be marketed in Ranger that has been going to other towns.

The Chamber of Commerce committee located the 16-inch pipe and the T beams used on the job, and Commissioner Castleberry hauled them to the job at the bridge.

Officials Of Mexico And US Meet In Laredo

LAREDO, Sept. 11 (UP)—Plans for easing restrictions on Mexican-United States border crossings were discussed here yesterday at a conference of Chamber of Commerce officials from both nations.

Oscar Longbecker, manager of the Brownville chamber, and J. Guadalupe Caballero, Matamoros chamber manager, were appointed to work out an overall plan to be submitted to the two governments.

Delegates said they hoped to obtain unlimited crossings on all types of documents. As an alternative, they suggested unlimited crossings on special visas and cards for border residents.

Regular tourist permits would apply to people living long distances from the border.

Suit Against Baseball Is Delayed

CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 11 (UP)—A suit challenging organized baseball's "reserve clause" was delayed today while attorneys for the El Paso Baseball Club began preparing a new brief.

The attorneys agreed late yesterday to submit additional data in the \$300,000 Civil anti-trust suit filed against the major and minor leagues by El Paso owner Jack Corbett. In that suit, filed here last April, Corbett challenged organized baseball's right to "infiltrate the reserve clause on Mexican players."

Last season, Corbett was fined \$1,000 and suspended from baseball after he signed seven Mexican players. However, the suspension was later revoked.

Corbett charges the contracts were invalidated by minor league President George Trautman on orders from former baseball commissioner A. B. Chandler after Chandler was reported to have made a reciprocal "reserve" agreement with the Mexican leagues.

Corbett's case is generally regarded as a test of the validity of the agreement between American Leagues and the Mexican League.

India Tells Japs They Will Make Peace Treaty

TOKYO, Sept. 11 (UP)—India notified the Japanese government today that it will end the state of war with Japan simultaneously with the coming into force of the San Francisco peace treaty.

It was forecast that Burma, which like India boycotted the San Francisco conference, also would make a separate peace with this country.

The New Delhi government said in a formal note that it will negotiate a separate bi-lateral peace treaty "whereby the relations between themselves and the government of Japan will be brought into conformity with the amity which existed between them before the declaration of war."

India said it will stipulate provisions to guarantee itself the rights, privileges, indemnities and advantages assured the allied powers and other signatory nations by the San Francisco treaty. The Japanese government said it "heartily welcomes" the Indian declaration.

Bus-Car Collision Injures Sixteen

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 11 (UP)—Sixteen persons were injured yesterday when a Continental Trailways bus and a heavy sedan smashed head-on just outside the city limits.

Walter Wright, Jr., of San Antonio, driver of the automobile was most seriously injured. He received multiple fractures.

The heavy load bus ran into a roadside field. The demolished car remained on the highway.

Deputy sheriff Bill Hussey said an investigation indicated the auto was on the wrong side of U.S. Highway 281.

NAVIGATION ERROR BLAMED IN STRAFING OF KAESONG

TOKYO, Sept. 11 (UP)—The United Nations command announced tonight that a UN bomber pilot bombed and strafed the truce conference city of Kaesong Sept. 10, as the Communists had charged.

A pilot of the 3rd UN Bomb Group attacked the city which had been declared a neutral zone for the purpose of the armistice conference, by accident, a Supreme Headquarters statement said.

"The UN command regrets this violation of the agreed neutrality, which resulted from the pilot's error in navigation," the statement said. "Appropriate disciplinary action is being initiated. It is noted that investigation conducted by the liaison officers established the fact that no damage resulted from the attack."

The admission came after a long series of flat rejections of Communist allegations that UN forces had attacked Kaesong.

The first reaction here was that the admission might alter the entire situation.

Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway had suggested that the truce talks, which broke off July 23 on the allegation that UN forces violated Kaesong's neutrality, should be moved to a new site.

In official statements broadcast by Red radios, the Communists rejected this proposal and kept insisting that their complaints were justified.

A Supreme Headquarters statement admitted that a UN plane did attack Kaesong between 1 and 2 a. m. Monday, as the Communists charged.

"Far East Air Force reports that what appeared to be a bogie (plane) was detected by radar over Kaesong at 1:14 a. m. Sept. 10—subsequent (radar) transmission indicates the plane was one from the 3d Bomb group."

"The pilot reports having strafed lights at 1:36 a. m. Sept. 10 in what he claimed to be a different area, 1 1/2 miles in view of the radar plot must have been Kaesong."

"Faulty navigation on the pilot's part led to the error."

The latest Red statement was made by the Communist cease-fire delegation. It called Ridgway's proposal a "new trick" and demanded that he admit responsibility for alleged neutrality breaches.

However, Ridgway's proposal had been addressed to the Red commanders in chief, not the cease-fire delegation and the official reply was still to come.

The Reds also used the new statement, broadcast by radio Peiping, to boost a little about how the UN "had to agree" to accept the Kaesong site in the first place, stressing the high propaganda value the Communists put on the UN agreement to come into their territory for the conference.

Ridgway still was waiting for the official Red reply to his note. It must come from the Red commanders, North Korean Premier Gen. Kim Il Sung and Chinese Gen. Peng Teh Hui.

Peiping radio said today's statement was a "special dispatch" from Kaesong and was issued by the Red delegation there to cover the question of neutrality violations carried out by the UN "in order to obstruct progress in the Korean armistice negotiations."

The statement said that until the question of the incidents is settled, the truce talks can not be resumed.

Despite the continued stalemate in resuming the talks, the UN made no move to break up its advance truce camp at Munsu. A soldier operator remains on duty to make regular checks by radio telephone with the Communists in Kaesong to receive messages for the UN. The only one received so far has been new Red protests about neutrality violations.

FORT WORTH, Sept. 11 (UP)—A 54-year-old Fort Worth woman became Tarrant County's 62nd traffic fatality of the year when she died last night of injuries received a few hours earlier.

Mrs. R. S. Chaney was injured fatally when the car in which she was riding overturned on Hwy. 80 near Arlington Downs. The accident occurred when the vehicle struck a soft spot on the highway shoulder.

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Korean Amputee Marries Girl He Met By Mail

JOLIET, Ill., Sept. 11 (UP)—Pvt. and Mrs. Hubert Reeves began a marriage Monday that millions of Americans are watching as a test of young courage.

Reeves is a quadruple amputee of the Korean war.

The 19-year-old soldier was married Sunday to Beverly Jean Hall in the First Baptist church.

More than 600 persons crowded into the church, which normally holds only 450. They watched as Reeves, seated in a wheelchair, gave the responses to the ceremony without taking his eyes from his dark-haired bride.

Beverly, 18, the girl he met after she wrote him letters to cheer him up, gazed back.

A tense quiet settled over the guests when it came time for putting the ring on Beverly's hand.

The ring lay on the bandage covering what is left of Reeves' left hand. At the proper time, he lifted it up to Beverly who looked at her finger through it then slid it onto her finger herself.

Soldier Found Dead In Car

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 11 (UP)—A soldier tentatively identified as Cpl. Ivan E. York of Schulenburg, Texas, and Fort Hood was

found dead in his overturned car seven miles west of here early Monday.

Also in the wrecked vehicle was Kenneth Robertson, 28, of San Antonio, believed to have been a hitchhiker.

Officers said York's car was overturned near a culvert on high way 90. He apparently was killed instantly. Tentative identification was made from papers found in the driver's pockets.

Robertson was hospitalized in San Antonio. Extent of his injuries was not determined immediately.

Many women in the audience wept openly during the ceremony. Gifts from all over the nation poured in on the newlyweds, bringing tangible proof of the widespread well wishes for the teenage couple.

Both of Reeves' feet and all but one of his fingers were amputated after he suffered severe frostbite during the winter campaign in Korea. He had been in combat scarcely a month.

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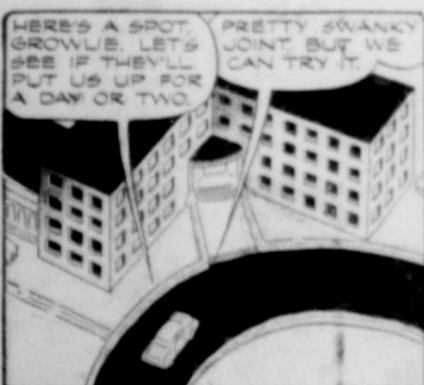

School Enrollment Up In Houston

HOUSTON, Sept. 11 (UP)—The first day enrollment in Houston's Public Schools yesterday totaled 99,715, an increase of near eight per cent over last year's first day enrollment of 86,822.

The governor's office announced the appointment of Robertson to attend the conference which opened Sunday and will end Sept. 18.

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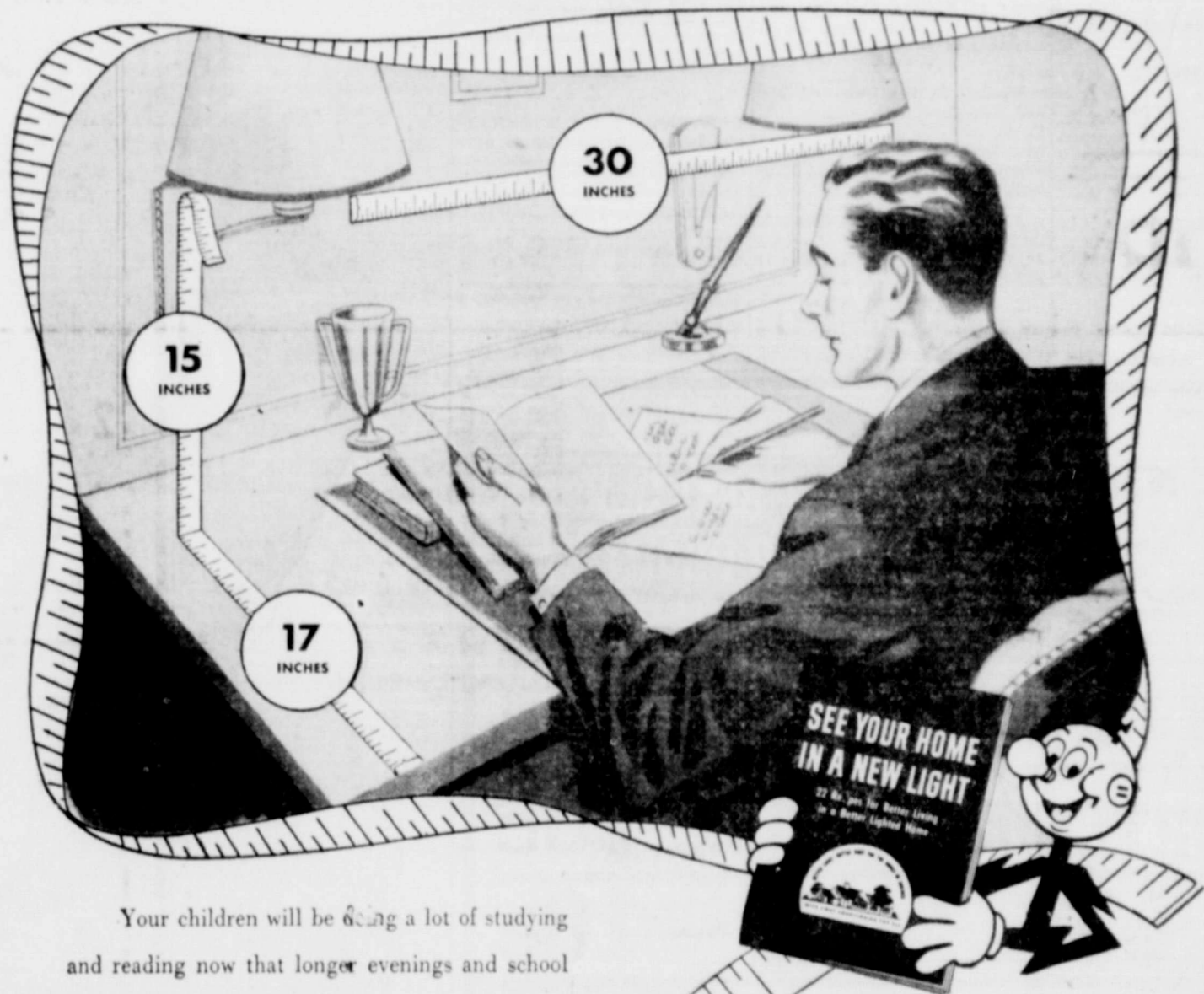
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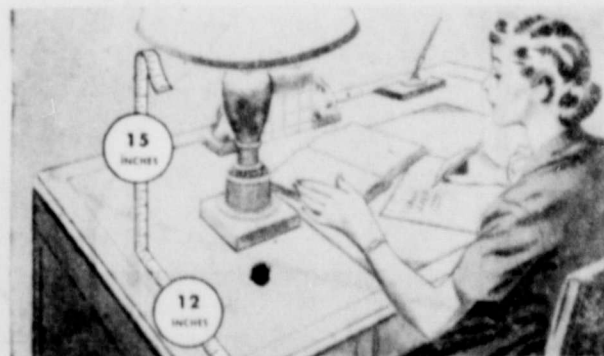
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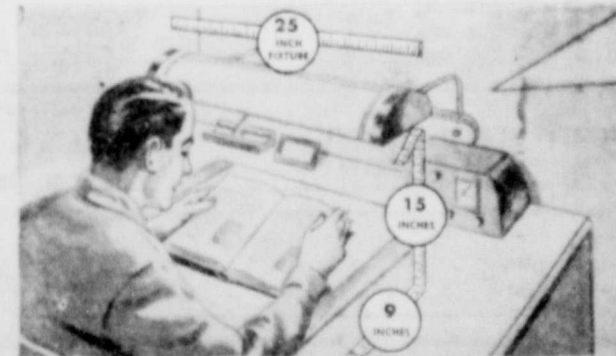
