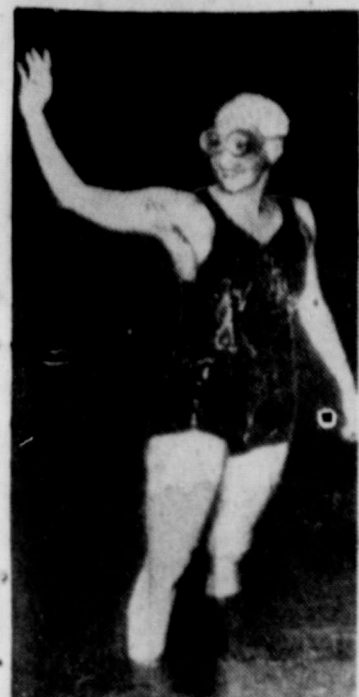

General Marshall Resigns As Secretary Of Defence

Truman Accepts Resignation With Great Reluctance Today

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (UP)—Defense Sec. George C. Marshall resigned today and will be succeeded by Deputy Defense Secretary Robert A. Lovett, it was announced by the White House.

Marshall quit for personal reasons other than health. His resignation came a year to the day after President Truman nominated him to be Defense Secretary to succeed the ousted Louis Johnson.

William C. Foster, head of the Economic Cooperation Administration, was selected to succeed Lovett as Deputy Defense Secretary.

Richard M. Bissell, Jr., now Deputy ECA Administrator will become acting administrator.

Marshall had said good-bye to the regular Pentagon press corps a half hour before the White House announcement. But he bound them to an agreement to say nothing about his resignation before it was announced by President Truman.

Marshall said that when he took the job a year ago he agreed to stay only until June 30, but remained longer because of the Korean situation and the Sino-Franco Japanese peace treaty conference.

Marshall, who will be 71 Dec. 31, appeared to be in excellent health as he bid farewell to newsmen in his office.

Mr. Truman, who regards Marshall as the greatest living American, accepted the resignation "with very great reluctance."

The resignation is effective at the close of business today. But Marshall apparently held himself ready for consultative assignments in the future because his resignation spoke of ending his "active daily service in the government."

The text of Marshall's resignation which was dated Sept. 11: "Dear Mr. President: "With deep regret I feel I must terminate my active daily service in the government, and therefore submit my resignation as Secretary of Defense to be effective within the next two weeks. "Of our original understanding prior to my appointment was that

"I have stated many times both publicly and privately my high regard for your many services to the country throughout your long and distinguished career as a government servant. "At this time I wish particularly to mention the tremendous strides that have been made, under your direct leadership, in establishing a sound basis for our military manpower and production program which already has tremendously increased our defensive strength.

"I understand fully and am sympathetic with the reasons for your resignation at this time, and I am most appreciative of your willingness to remain two months beyond our agreement in order to complete your activities concerning the universal military training act. "In again accepting your resignation from a position of high responsibility I realize how many times previously you have sought to retire to private life. But one time after another you have responded to the call to public service. "To all of these offices you have brought greater talent and wisdom. In fact, no man has ever given his country more distinguished and patriotic service than have you. "On behalf of our country I want to thank you for all you have done. On my own behalf, I want to tell you of my deep personal appreciation for the wise counsel and the unwavering support you have given me in these trying days. "You have earned your retirement many fold and I wish you many good years at Leesburg. "With every good wish, gratefully and sincerely, "Harry S. Truman."

Marshall was Army Chief of Staff during World War II. After a special mission to China, he became Secretary of State and fathered the so-called Marshall Plan of aid to Europe. After resigning as Secretary of State, he was called out of retirement by Mr. Truman a year ago to head up the Defense Department.

Marshall told newsmen he felt that "during this very critical year" in which he has been defense secretary, the Defense Department has had "very remarkable cooperation with Congress." He said "practically everything we have asked for has been given us" by Congress. He added that this included "some very serious requests."

He said a delay in the passage of some legislation was one of the reasons he was not able to leave on June 30.

Marshall said the entire staff in the Defense Department "nobly beginning with Lovett" has been a most efficient group.

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BULLDOGS GETTING READY TO MEET STAMFORD FRIDAY NITE

The Bulldogs of Ranger are giving out the chatter at the workouts this week with the chant of "get a Bulldog." Stamford has the same nickname as the home team and the Bulldogs of Ranger are out for blood.

Stamford will not offer the same opportunity for the Ranger team to run wild that the Jacksonville "Tigers" presented here last Friday. If you attend the game to be played this Friday you will see two good ball clubs on the field instead of one. Stamford scrimmaged Abilene before the season and came out on top to the tune of 18 to 0. Last Friday they played their first game of the season with Haskell and again came out at the top of the heap by 19 points for them and none for Haskell.

The Ranger team can win this next game if they play like they did against the "Tigers"; especially the first three or four plays of the game. The local squad knew nothing about Jacksonville and the only way they could find out was to get there "fustest with the moses," by the time the "Tigers" got over the hard licks by the Ranger line, it was our ball game by about 33 points.

There is a definite need for improvement in the tackling and downfield blocking for Ranger-Coaches Warden and Aills are grooming their boys on that end of the deal all this week. Also getting the wrinkles ironed out is the spread formation that Ranger used some in the last game. The coaches are working on the timing and ball handling on that formation for the next week.

One position that was well played last week was that of defensive left half. Gerald Bagwell turned in a good game at that position on defense for Ranger. He made good, hard, key tackles for Ranger to stop Jacksonville gains, more than once.

Van Fleet's Army Has Reds Shouting 'Uncle' Over Radio

TOKYO, Sept. 12 (UP)—The Peiping Radio complained bitterly today that Gen. James A. Van Fleet's United States 8th Army has been "openly inviting" full scale war by its vigorous "killer" attacks on the Korean front.

The broadcast, by the mouthpiece of the Chinese Communist government, tended to confirm a statement Van Fleet made at the front a few hours before that the Reds are "hurting . . . in bad shape" and "will want peace before winter . . ."

Peiping complained that Van Fleet openly admits "the American forces are taking advantage of the breaks they have forced in (true) negotiations to launch attacks in the hope of grabbing more Korean territory."

"He has made it clear that he is for war, not negotiations."

The Peiping broadcast strengthened the belief of many officials here that despite all their blustering and their incessant allegations that the United States is trying to wreck peace negotiations, the Reds really need and want peace.

Van Fleet has made a series of statements on the military situation, emphasizing that he had nothing to do with armistice negotiations but has the job of killing Communists until they say "uncle" to his United Nations army.

NLRB Bars Texas Attorney For Fist Fighting

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (UP)—A Texas lawyer has been barred from practicing before the National Labor Relations Board for two years because he punched another attorney during a hearing.

The lawyer is John L. Camp, 45, of Houston, a former judge and one-time football star at Hardin-Simmons College. The lawyer he assaulted is NLRB attorney E. Donald Wilson.

The fracas occurred during a trial examiner's hearing in October, 1949, when Camp was representing the Ohio Oil Co. in a dispute with the CIO Oil Workers Union.

Camp admitted he stepped up behind Wilson, who was questioning a witness, swung him around, hit him in the jaw, knocked him down, and then jumped on Wilson and hit him "squarely in the eye."

A three-man board majority ruled that "conduct of such character should not and will not be tolerated." The board conceded, however, that the assault was a result of "sudden loss of temper" and was not premeditated.

Doctor Warns Of 'Grandma' Cures

HOUSTON, Sept. 12 (UP) — A Chicago doctor says grandma's dose of "physic" and latterday cathartics are one of mankind's most dangerous and often fatal habits.

The warning was sounded by Dr. Phillip Thorek, clinical assistant professor of surgery of the University of Illinois. Thorek was one of the specialists addressing the Texas Academy of General Practice yesterday.

He told delegates that it was the cathartic which "keeps our mortality rate in appendicitis sky high."

"Some states are trying to legislate against the selling of cathartics across the counter," he said. "The one state where you cannot buy a cathartic except by

a doctor's prescription is the one state where the mortality rate from appendicitis has dropped."

Dr. Thorek explained that each human body has its own daily, or every two days, or once a week habit, adding that it didn't matter what the habit is.

"But when the habit changes, then we suspect trouble," he said. "A sudden change in bodily habit may mean anything from something you ate to cancer of the bowel."

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
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
