Massegee - Comacho Pace Bulldogs By Rubber Toothed Loins 48 to 0

About 3,000 fans from Dublin and Ranger went to Bulldog Stadium last night to see what had been predicted to be a hard fought battle between two evenly matched teams, instead they saw Ranger, paced by Charles Massegee and Jimmy Comacho, show the rubber toothed Loins from Dublin their heels and blanketed them 48 to 0.

The dark spot of the game came in the third period when Charles Massegee, one of the best backs seen in this section in many years, came out of a pile-up with his leg broken.

Comacho, Massegee, Moreland, and Cole, running behind a line opening big hole and then following up with down field blocking, gained and scored at will against the Loins.

Ranger received the ball at the start of the game, they punted to Dublin, who also had to punt after being held to no gain.

Dublin's kick went to the Ranger thirty where it was taken back out to the 34 by Comacho. On the first play from scrimmage Massegee took the ball and headed over his own left guard and went the 66 yards for the tally. Massegee ran around or faked away from the would be Lion tacklers down to the fifteen yard line where he picked up two key blocks that opened the scoring door. Jimmy Comacho kicked the first of his extra six points to make it 7 to 0.

Ranger kicked off to Dublin, who moved the ball out to their own 19; where four downs later they lost the ball when they tried a bootleg run on the play on the fourth down only to be thrown by an alert Bulldog line for no gain.

Comacho, Massegee, and Moreland moved the ball down to the 5, where Moreland took the ball to the three only to lose to Dublin on a fumble.

The fumble slightly delayed the scoring. "Rabbit" Massegee took the Dublin kick on the 35 and ran back to the Dublin 20 yard line. Comacho was then handed the ball and the twisted, butted, and faked his way across for the score and kicked the point to make it 14 to 0.

Ranger again made points when Dublin was forced to kick from their own 15 yard line. The series of downs started for the Loins on the thirty, but they were penalized 15 yards, setting the ball on the 15.

Ellis kicked to Comacho on his own 45 yard line. He headed straight up the middle, cut over to the sidelines, dodging tacklers, picking up key blocks, to finally make his way across for the score to open up the scoring in the second quarter. Comacho's sights were again on the extra point.

Dublin took the kickoff on their own 25 and started a drive that moved the ball to the fifty yard line. There, Salyer the Lion quarterback attempted a pass that ended up in the hands of Defensive linebacker Wayne Hargrave on the Ranger thirty-four. Hargrave ran the ball back to the mid field stripe after the interception.

Comacho took the ball for a thirty yard romp to the twenty that nearly resulted in a score he cut back up the middle and was met by the 20 by the many Loins. Massegee was thrown for a loss of four, but came right back to pick up nine to put the ball on the 15 yard line.

Massegee again took the ball, this time to go all the way for the score, with Comacho kicking the point and ending the scoring in the first half at 28 to 0.

Dublin could not run, the Bulldogs pass defense had held them on the ground, and the number one boy for the Loins, Randolph, made few gains. Randolph is a coaches' dream, he runs hard and fast, and doesn't stop till he is down. He did the majority of the

ground gaining for the Loins. Dublin came back in the second half and started driving down the field and it looked as if the Loins were going to roar at last. The Bulldogs growled a little louder and the Loins were forced to kick. Comacho took the ball on his own ten and ran it out to the 28.

Moreland taking the ball on the first down picked up 19 yards to move the ball out to the Ranger 47. Charles Massegee took the ball, headed down the right side, outran half the Dublin team trying to cut him off, came to a complete stop on the 3 yard line where he was about to be tackled to make a tackler over run him, and then put it back in high gear to go over. That run covered 53 yards from start to finish.

Massegee was hurt on the kick off after Comacho had kicked the point to make it 35 to nothing.

Massegee had kept the Ranger fans standing all night with his beautiful running. He ran hard and fast, eluding tacklers at ever turn to spark numerous Ranger drives. He has teamed up with Comacho this year to form a running combination that was nearly impossible to stop.

After making it 35 to nothing in the third quarter, the Bulldogs kept moving in the fourth for two more tallies and one point to make the final score 48 to 0. Don Varner, outstanding tackle and defensive linebacker made the next Ranger tally on a tackle around from the ten yard line. The drive started on the Dublin 32, with Eddie Wallace picking up yardage, a pass from Cole to Cantrell gaining 14, the Ranger's J. L. Barnes took the ball the other way on an another tackle around for five, then Varner scored.

Coaches Warden and Ellis had sent in everyone on the Ranger bench in the late minutes of the third quarter. They sparked the drive that allowed Varner to score.

The last Ranger score was set up by a pass interception by Ger-

ald Bagwell, who had been playing heads up defensive ball all night long and saw service at the quarter back post.

Bagwell intercepted the ball on the Ranger 43 yard line. Guard Wayne Hargrave made nine yards on a tackle around, Billy Don Browning picked up 32 straight up the middle, Ranger was penalized 15 yards to put the ball back out on the thirty.

From the thirty Cole tossed a pass to Mendoza that went to the 11. Scott Forney made 3, Cole picked up two and Dublin was penalized five to the four yard line. Eddie Wallace put the ball inches away from pay dirt and Jimmy Cole snaked it over for the last touchdown.

Heads up ball playing on the right side of the Bulldog line by end Chico Mendoza, tackle J. L. Barnes, and guard Bobby Justice opened the gates for the backs to break away in to the secondary on their long runs.

Defensive Wayne Hargrave called the signals, Don Varner, Herbert Williams, Barnes, and Justice racked the Loins for losses at every turn.

The Ranger pass offense and defense was vastly improved over that shown in previous games, with the Bulldogs taking four Lion aeriels during the night.

The game last night gave the Bulldogs the undisputed right to bi-district, although they have one game left next Friday with Comacho here.

As a surprise to every one the Eastland Mavericks rose up out of nowhere and defeated the Clacko Lobos 13 to 6 to erase any claim they might have to the title, that leaves Comacho in the way for a clear title.

Metals Rain On Earth From Stratosphere

CHICAGO (UP)—Photographic emulsions sent into the stratosphere in giant plastic balloons show that some nuclear particles which make up the cosmic ray have masses greater than that of iron.

Dr. Herman Yagoda of the National Institute of Health made the disclosure in a paper read to the American Institute of Physics. Yagoda said heavy tracks were found in the emulsions and that they were made by heavy nuclear particles. These rare visitors from outer space had not been observed previously because of their absorption or destruction in the stratosphere.

Yagoda said such studies indicate that the earth is constantly receiving a rain of hydrogen nuclei of tremendous energy and a sparse dusting with most of the members of the periodic system of the elements, including copper, bromine and even tin.

- 1 Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952.** On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. This law was designed to protect you against financially irresponsible drivers and owners of motor vehicles involved in accidents. It affects all drivers and motor vehicle owners (except Federal, State, County and City-owned cars).
- 2 What Must You Do After An Accident?** Under existing laws, you must file a written report to the Department of Public Safety if your car is involved in an accident where there is a death, an injury or property damage in excess of \$25. Under the new law, a written report must be filed within ten days if your car is in an accident resulting in death, injury or property damage in excess of \$100.
- 3 You Don't Have to Carry Liability Insurance, But . . .** If you are not insured against bodily injury and property damage liability, you must be able to deposit with the Department of Public Safety security equal to the estimated damage, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to cover all claims growing out of an accident anywhere in Texas in which you or your motor vehicle were involved. If you cannot establish financial responsibility for the future, your driver's license and your motor vehicle license plates are automatically suspended.

Texas Top Ranking 4-H'ers



TRIPS to the 90th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago were given four Lone Star State club members for their outstanding records in the 1951 National 4-H Canning, Field Crops, Garden and Girls' Record programs. The state winners and brief outlines of their records follow:

Better methods of doing everyday homemaking skills proved to be a challenge to Patsy Harris, 16, of Plainview. Her selection as state winner in the 4-H Girls' Record program proves that this versatile young miss is a first-rate housekeeper and manager. Patsy has been in club work seven years and has completed 30 projects, among which are poultry, clothing, canning and home improvement. Her record shows 59 garments made, 2,588 jars of food canned, 630 chickens raised, as well as meal preparation and gardening. One of her favorite projects was the refinishing and upholstering of six pieces of furniture for her bedroom. She is active in all community activities, speaking before groups and on the local radio station and gives generously of her musical talents throughout the county. Montgomery Ward provided Patsy's trip award.

Growing a garden has served a three-fold purpose for Joyce Weber, 16, of Victoria, state winner in the 4-H Garden program. Joyce has supplied the family with a variety of fresh vegetables, reduced the cash outlay for food, at the same time promoting relaxation and good health. Her trip award was presented by Allis-Chalmers. During the four years she has carried gardening she has raised 3,265 pounds of food, canned 887 jars of it. She has also been in clothing for the seven years of her 4-H Club work and taught crafts not only to club girls but to adults as well. Mrs. Fonda Graham, county agent, says that Joyce is known throughout her community as a gracious hostess and for her winning smile.

All of these activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

For making an outstanding record in her food preservation project Virgie McCarley, 18, of Quitman, was named State champion in the 4-H Canning Achievement program. Experimenting with new ideas, she has broadened her knowledge of better homemaking methods through her 4-H art. Home canning also has made it easy to follow the nutrition yardstick and keep the budget low. During seven years in club work, she has canned 471 quarts of food; also made 95 garments, improved 24 bedroom articles, and carried a landscaping project for five years. Two years ago she entered East Texas State Teachers College but still carries 4-H demonstrations on canning and clothing and continues active in church work. Kerr Glass furnished funds for Virgie's trip to Chicago.

Utilizing improved field crop methods has earned state honors for Ray Riley, 16, of Hart, in the 4-H Field Crops program. Long hours and much effort went into learning good farm practices and expert use of farm machinery, but the increase per acre production of food, feed and fibre crops has more than compensated. Seven years in 4-H work, and much individual research and experiment, particularly in the field of seed selection, has brought Ray the title of the youngest licensed certified seed breeder in the State. He has completed 56 projects, is an outstanding leader and has trained judging teams for the last three years. A total of 230 acres in field crops has yielded him an average of \$83 an acre. International Harvester provided Ray's Chicago trip award.

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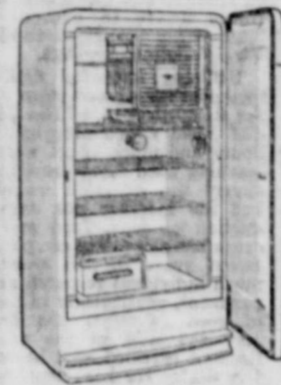


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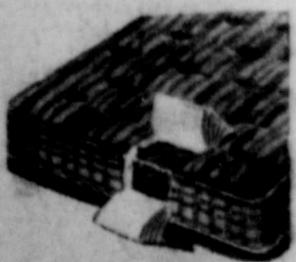
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
