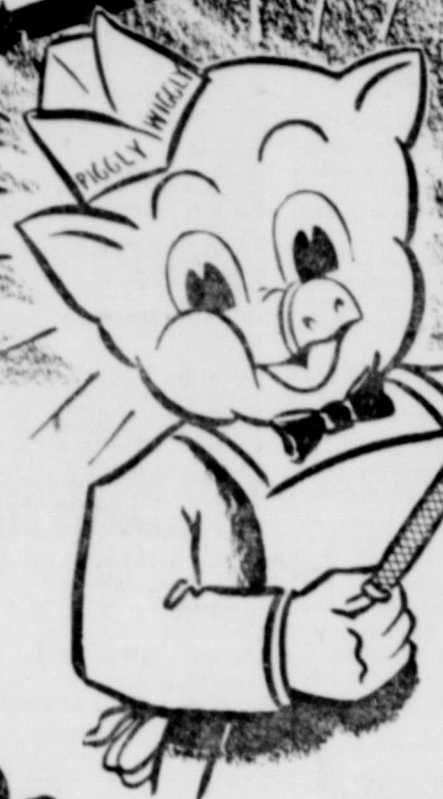

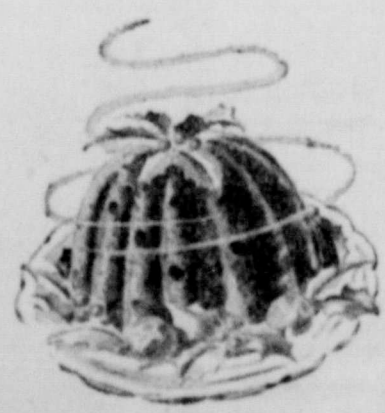

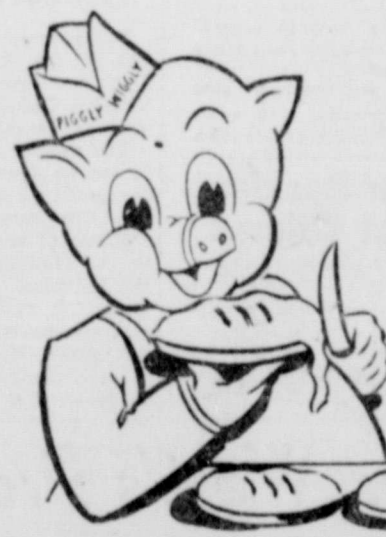

WOMEN PROVIDE CARE FOR KOREA

Scarce Materials Not Hampering Small Building

There can be a lot of construction work done in Ranger during the next year, but it will consist mostly of smaller buildings, according to Mr. J. D. Nichols, local lumber and building materials dealer and member of the National Retail Lumber Dealers Association.

"Larger homes and commercial and industrial buildings cannot be put up without securing permission in Washington unless they are designed to require a minimum of steel and copper, and few permits are being approved," Mr. Nichols said.

"On the other hand, no permit is needed to build a single-family home if it uses no structural steel and not more than 1800 pounds of other steel and 35 pounds of copper or 1450 pounds of other steel and 100 pounds of copper, not counting fabricated building products, such as heating and plumbing fixtures, whose weights need not be considered.

"In case of stores, garages, warehouses, and other commercial and institutional buildings, construction can go ahead without a permit if no more than 4000

pounds of steel and 200 pounds of copper are to be used in any calendar quarter. The same provision applies in the case of farm buildings.

"In other words, the size of a new building, except one intended for amusement or recreational purposes, is limited only by the quantity or critical materials it requires.

"Any type of repair and modernization work also can go ahead without special authorization from Washington, provided the necessary materials are available."

San Antonio's Livestock Show Has Good Start

San Antonio's 1952 Livestock Exposition appears headed for another record entry list, judging by the heavy demand for entry cards which flowed into exposition headquarters within two weeks after premium lists were distributed.

The third annual stock show and rodeo is to be held Feb. 15-24 at the Bexar County Coliseum.

Show officials said that requests for entry cards were running far ahead of previous years.

In the first two weeks after distribution of premium lists got under way, county agents, agricultural teachers and individual exhibitors applied for entry blanks covering a total of 3,161 animals. Bob Tate, general livestock superintendent, pointed out, however, that many of those will not be finally entered.

At San Antonio's 1951 show, a total of more than 3,700 head of livestock surged into the Coliseum grounds. On the basis of enthusiastic early interest, Tate said there is every indication that the entry list for the 1952 show will be much higher.

In the two-week period after the premium lists went out, exposition headquarters received requests for

entry cards for 600 steers, 911 lambs, 791 pigs, 441 breeding beef cattle, 53 dairy cattle, 232 breeding sheep and goats, 77 boys' dairy calves and 56 negro boys' pigs.

Deadline for livestock exhibition entries is Dec. 15. Premium lists may be secured by writing to W. L. Jones, secretary - manager, San Antonio Livestock Exposition, P. O. Box 1744, San Antonio, Tex. General "Mac" Says He Is Rebel-Yankee

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 19 (UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur termed himself a true "mixture of the blue and grey" as he dedicated a memorial to his southern mother here on the spot where she married the Yankee soldier who was to become his father.

The five-star general, removed from his Far Eastern command for disagreeing with the administration, flew here yesterday from New York to dedicate an enclosed garden walled in with red brick taken from the mansion where his mother, Mary Pinckney Hardy, was born.

The memorial also stands on the spot where she married MacArthur's father, Arthur, a Union soldier in the Civil War who later became a lieutenant general.

In an emotional voice, MacArthur told an estimated 4,000 persons including his wife—also a Southerner from Murfreesboro, Tenn.—and young son, Arthur, that "the Rebel yell and the sound of Dixie have been in my ears since birth."

Mary Pickford Making Movie

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (UP)—Mary Pickford, onetime "America's Sweetheart" will return to the screen for the first time since 1933 in a production of "The Library."

The film will be produced by Stanley Kramer for Columbia Pictures and star the silent screen heroine in a role Miss Pickford, now 58, called "an almost sacred responsibility."

*Details of the plot were not released in the announcement of Miss Pickford's return to the screen issued by Columbia.

The story, written by Daniel Taradash and Elick Moll, is reported to concern the influence of a librarian on a group of young persons.

Miss Pickford is the wife of band leader—television host Buddy Rogers. She was divorced from the late matinee idol Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., in 1935.

New State

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 19 (UP)—Congressional leaders reported no opposition today to President Miguel Aleman's request to make lower California Mexico's 29th state.

President Aleman said the Peninsula's population had increased 410 percent in the last 20 years, now totalling 226,967.

A total of 23,650 persons were killed or injured in traffic accidents in Kentucky in 1950, the equivalent of more than one percent of the state's population.

Reds Lose Hill To UN Division

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS Korea, Nov. 19 (UP)—A United Nations division captured another hill today on the third day of an offensive southeast of Kumsong on the mountainous Korean central front.

The UN troops struck north at dawn against light to moderate enemy resistance after beating off three successive Communist counterattacks ranging in strength from a company to a battalion.

The advance put the Allies nearly four miles north of the points where they crossed the Pukhan river in assault boats on a nine-mile front Saturday.

However, a Chinese battalion which had been enveloped by the fast-driving Allies in their initial

onslaught Saturday apparently escaped through a gap in the UN line.

The UN drive threatened to flank Kumsong, rumbled former Communist headquarters town 29 miles north of the 38th Parallel. Although Kumsong was abandoned by the Reds, they still dominate part of it from hills to the northeast, north and northwest.

The offensive also may serve as a spur to Communist troops negotiators trying to decide whether to accept a UN offer to make the present battline a cease-fire line of agreement can be reached on the remaining armistice terms within 30 days.

B-26 light bombers and Allied fighters smashed at more than 1,400 Communist supply trucks behind the enemy lines during the night and destroyed at least 105 of them.

The 5th Air Force reported that gun camera films showed that two American Sabrejets destroyed 4 Russian-built MIG-15 jet fighters, probably destroyed another and damaged three in a strafing attack Sunday on a new Communist airfield at Uju, just south of the Yalu River, Manchurian border.

"If I ride away from here I may make Yellow Hair go back. If I do not ride away he will come on. If you kill me I cannot go to him and he will come on."

"If I go, I go as a white man. If they will not stop I will come back with them. I shall be at Yellow Hair's side. But if I can stop him, all will be saved for the Sioux. Peace will be in this land of the Spotted Eagle."

"I am a traitor, yet who among you will say I have lied? Who among you will stop me and so lead all his people to their deaths? I have spoken. I go."

I did just that, turning slowly to walk, head-high, among them, my course laid straight through the

troubling crowd of warrior on-lookers. But a voice now fell across the circle of firelight, a guttural, vibrant voice. "Cetan, my son."

I stopped, turning with my answer to face him. "Aye, my father."

"You are not going. I think we will kill you."

A dozen braves seized me, threw me roughly against a convenient ceremonial pole, lashed me there with rawhide.

ABOUT three that morning, June 24, Yellow Bird came for me, a detachment of 10 heavily armed Sioux with him. They untied the bonds which held me to the post, leaving my hands bound. Yellow Bird led me away like a captive animal, a heavy leather lead-thong around my neck, five ugly-eyed Sioux on either side.

"Is your heart bad against me, my brother?" I had a real affection for this tall, clown-minded killer. If any among the Sioux would remain constant, it would be he. But his answer let me know where the wind lay before ever I heard my sentence.

"My heart is bad. There wasn't so much as a hint of regret in his tones. "If Crazy Horse tries any of his big talk to prevent the peeling-off of your skin there'll be trouble."

We entered Sitting Bull's lodge, which now had the side-skins down tight. Sitting Bull, Crazy Horse, Gall and White Bull were present. "You may go," Sitting Bull directed Yellow Bird. The latter gave me a hard shove forward into the tipi, so that I would have fallen face into the fire, bound as I was, had not Crazy Horse sprung up. In one smooth move the war chief checked my fall and severed my bonds.

"It is not good for a chief to stand among his equals bound like an animal."

"A dog that will bite shall be muzzled," snapped Sitting Bull. The others nodded grunting assent.

"Cetan," Crazy Horse began, "there are no more pretty speeches. Every vote here but mine would have you given the Fox Lodge traitor trial, even as the Mouse had it. But I have argued for you, not because I love you and you are my son, though both of these are true things, but because you are a great warrior. You have lived among us with bravery always."

"Some among us"—here his gaze lingered speculatively on Sitting Bull—"do not have so long a memory as Crazy Horse."

"ALTHOUGH you are ready to be trayed, you stand forth like a man, saying, 'This I am going to do, and I am not afraid of any Sioux.' And in my visions, even as you have said, I have seen you are sick of heart and will be bad medicine for us."

"Because he honors my vision of this, Tatanka Yotanka who has the final word in all points of our law, has consented to place your fate on the knee of Walkan Tanks."

"When the sun tops the hills of the Greasy Grass, you will be made ready. You will be stripped naked, with no weapons. I looked at him hard. His face was graven as granite. But in his eyes was something I had never seen there before.

"It is fair," I answered, adding softly, "my father."

Anything Can Happen In The Southwest Conference Race

Rice and Texas Christian, a pair of clubs which were not counted in when observers passed out the pre-season laurels, battle for the Southwest Conference leadership this week with oft-beaten Southern Methodist shaping up as a spoiler of championship hopes.

While the Owls and Horned Frogs stage a real battle for survival at Fort Worth, SMU's pas-happy Mustangs journey to Waco for a crack at Baylor's title aspirations.

These are the only two conference games on tap, as Texas and Texas A&M take their usual week off in front of their traditional season-windup game, at College Station this year. Arkansas winds up its campaign against Tulsa at Fayetteville.

But, they will add up to as fine a card as any presented this topsy-turvy conference season.

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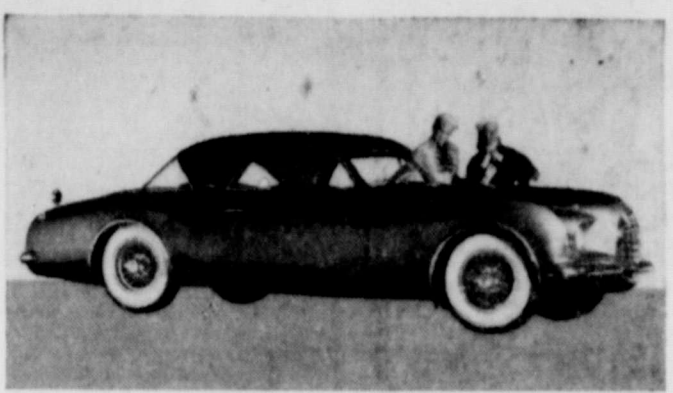

Better Calves Expected Here

Dairy cows bred now will fresh on the later part of next August and be in production all next fall and winter says Clyde Hickson, Cisco, artificial breeding technician for the Eastland County Dairy Association, sponsoring organization.

For a very reasonable fee dairy cow owners in the county or within 30 miles of Cisco can breed their animals to some of the best bulls in the country it was said. Besides Jerseys there are also bulls of the Holstein, Guernsey and Shorthorn breeds available.

More than 1,500 cows in this area have been artificially bred since the program was instituted by the dairy association in the early part of February of 1949 according to A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, president of the group.

The North Texas Artificial

Breeding Farms near Dallas who cooperate in the breeding program keep the very best bulls obtainable. Some of their Guernsey bulls are only recently imported from the Guernsey Islands where the breed originated.

In the next several years the dairymen and dairy cow owners of Eastland and adjoining Counties will fully realize the value of artificial breeding to bulls of the caliber used, believes many interested in the progress and advancement of the dairy industry in that area.

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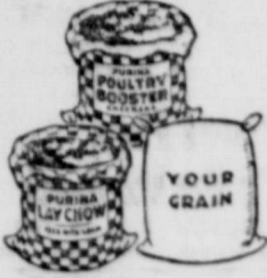
