Government Hunts Way To Lease The Texas Tidelands

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (UP) The government still is studying the legality of issuing federal leases on oil-rich tidelands off the coasts of Texas and Louisiana.

Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman said his department has decided that it does not have auth-ority to issue such leases. But he said other agencies of the govern ment's executive branch are study ing statute books to see if they could administer the submerged lands under existing laws.

"No decision to proceed under any existing provision of law has n made as yet," he said.

Chapman gave his views on the disputed tidelands issue in a letter to Sen, Tom Connally (D. Tex.), who sent a telegram protesting against "the Interior Department or any other executive agency un dertaking to take over the tide lands oil by executive order of otherwise." Connally's protest was the latest of many against a re

federal leases on the oil lands. Congress has considered legisla tion giving states title to the land but has failed to reach a decision The legislators will take up the matter when they convene in Janu-

Connally told Chapman that any scheme "to seize or otherwise conthat any government official authorizing such action would be subject to impeachment.



Nc. Commerce

Section 1. The fire limits of the City of Ranger, Texas which have been duly set by ordinance heretofore, and which said limits have been incorporated into this ordinance are as follows:-Beginning at the intersection of eln and South Commerce Streets; thence in a northerly di rection along South Commerce Street to the intersection of North Commerce Street and Cherry Street; Thence in a Westerly direction along Cherry Street to the intersection of North Marston and Cherry Streets; thence in a southerly direction along North Marston Street to the in tersection of West Main Street; thence in a westerly di rection along West Main Street to the West Boundary of lot 4, in Block 1 of the Hodges-You thence in a southerly direction along the West boundary line of said lot 4, Block 1 of the Hodges-Young-Rawls Addition to the alley between West Main and Pine Streets. thence in an Easterly direction along said affey between West Main and Pine Streets to the intersection of South Marston Streets; thence in a Southerly direction along South Marston Street to the intersection of said South Marston and Pine Street; thence in an Easterly direction along Elm Street to the intersection of said Elm Street with South Commerce Street, the place of beginning. This area to comprise lots 1 to 4 of Block 1 of the Hodges-Young Rawls Addition, the North One-half of Block 5 of the Ori ginal Town, and all of blocks 11, 12, 13, 14, 19, 20, 21, 22 27, 28, 29 and 30 of the Original Town of Ranger, Texas.

Section 2. Hereafter it shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person or persons, firm, or corporation to sell or offer to sell, or to have stored upon their premises within the fire limits of the City of Ranger, set out herein above, any fireworks of any character. The term fire-works within the scope of this ordinance to include firecrackers, torpedoes, pin-wheels, roman candles, sky rock ets, screaming minnies, or any fireworks not herein named, save and except that it shall not be illegal to sell caps for use in toy cap pistols.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation hereafter offering for sale fireworks from a location outside the fire limits of the City of Ranger, Texas, shall first secure a permit from the City Secretary of the said City of Ranger Texas, which permit shall state the name and address o the purchaser, the location from which sale or sales are to be made, and shall pay to the City of Ranger, Texas, a fee of \$5.00 for said permit.

Section 3. Hereafter it shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person or persons to throw, light, ignite, or in any manner set off, or help to set off fireworks of any character within the fire limits set out hereinabove.

Section 4. Any person or persons violating any of the provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum of not less than one dollar, nor more than One Hundred Dollars.

Section 5. The passage of this ordinance is for the immediate preservation of life and property of the Citizens of the City of Ranger, and there is hereby declared to exist an emergency and it said ordinance shall therefore be in effect from and after its passage.
