From all published reports the preponderance of expressions of public sentiment on the government - MacArthur controversy seem to be in favor of the General's views. We believe, however, that many, refrain from making an issue of the matter out of deference to General MacArthur. It is not easy to criticize a man who has devoted his life to the service of his country even though you believe he is out of order and forced the issue, which resulted in his recall from service.

Although we have not made anything like a thorough canvass in Dimmitt or kept an accurate record, we believe that the ones we have heard express an opinion on the MacArthur controversy favor the government's action by a fairly large majority.

There is no denying, however, that there is a major split in public opinion and until the issue is settled once and for all the maximum strength of the country will not be exerted against the threat of communism.

The technical points as whether to bomb Manchuria, use the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa, etc., is a question to be weighed on an international scale by those who have all of the facts at hand. It would seem reasonable that the United States and the Western Pact Nations would avoid total war, or any act that would lead to total war, until preparations were advanced to a point that ultimate victory would be assured. Every reasonable effort, as for that matter unreasonable efforts, should be made to avoid a worldwide conflict. Experience has proven that appeasement has no place in the dealings with a dictator and we believe that we have ample evidence that our government will not practice appeasement.

Farmers Urged To Grow More Feed Grains

Farmers in areas where the wheat has failed are urged to consider the planting of grain sorghums, Martin L. Simpson chairman of the county PMA committee stated today.

"We don't want any farmer to plant grain sorghums at the expense of cotton because cotton is vitally needed in our defense effort. However, where growing cotton is not feasible the planting of grain sorghums will help out greatly in our drive for needed feed grains."

B. F. Vance, Chairman of the state PMA committee, has already announced that two state meetings have been scheduled by the Texas Agricultural Mobilization Committee to highlight the need for increased production of grain sorghums. These meetings will be held in Amarillo on May 2, 1951, and Abilene on May 3, 1951.

"With continued strengthening in consumer demand in prospect and with military requirements increasing there will be need for all the livestock, dairy and poultry products that can be produced from the feed supplies that are expected to be available in the next few years. Feed is the essential factor in maintaining livestock for the present high level of production of meats, dairy and poultry products and must be maintained for several years. While feed is available at the present time, the rate of feeding it at record levels and this constitutes a heavy drain upon the supply of feeds. Requirements may be expected to be even greater as consumer income expands with our progress in the national defense effort."

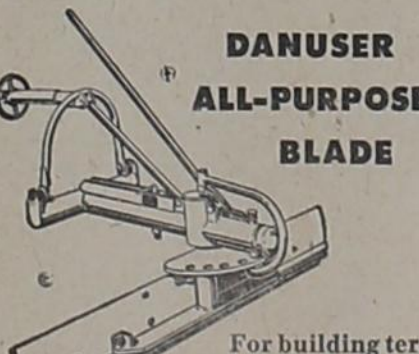
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BE PLEASANT TO SHOP IN DIMMITT

Chigger Season To Start About May 1

With a few well placed bites a tiny little six legged animal, so small it's hardly discernible without a microscope, can make a

red-eyed, itchy insomniac out of a sound sleeper.

Whether you call them red bugs, harvest mites, chiggers or *Eutrombidium alfreddugesi*, their scientific name, State Health Officer George W. Cox warns you're due to meet them this spring and summer, especially in lawns of Bermuda grass.

Chiggers, Dr. Cox says, can spot an unkept lot a block off, and take to those places like a hungry chicken takes to corn. When you're enjoying a lounge outside on a balmy spring evening, they'll go to work. The itching starts at bedtime and continues all night.

Seems as though chiggers have declared open season on humanity beginning about May and lasting until cold weather of fall and

winter reduces their (the chiggers') numbers. Contrary to common belief, Dr. Cox says they do not burrow into the skin, but merely attach themselves by their mouthparts and secrete blood until they're engorged.

That severe itching is caused by an anti-coagulant material they inject into their host, according to the health official. Favorite spots seem to be feet, hands, and stomach. Secondary infection in the form of boils and sores results from persistent scratching.

Dr. Cox says chiggers are tough to control in heavily wooded sections, but in lawns, camp sites, and picnic grounds where grass can be cut close, the job can be done inexpensively and without much trouble.

He recommends dusting or spraying the area with crude benzine hexachloride at the rate of 2 to 5 pounds per acre.

"Your summer will be more pleasant for the effort," the doctor advised.

Three little girls helping to make these recitals good ones either in the duets or with readings, were Mildred Conrad, Lorene Albracht, and Arlene Leinen.

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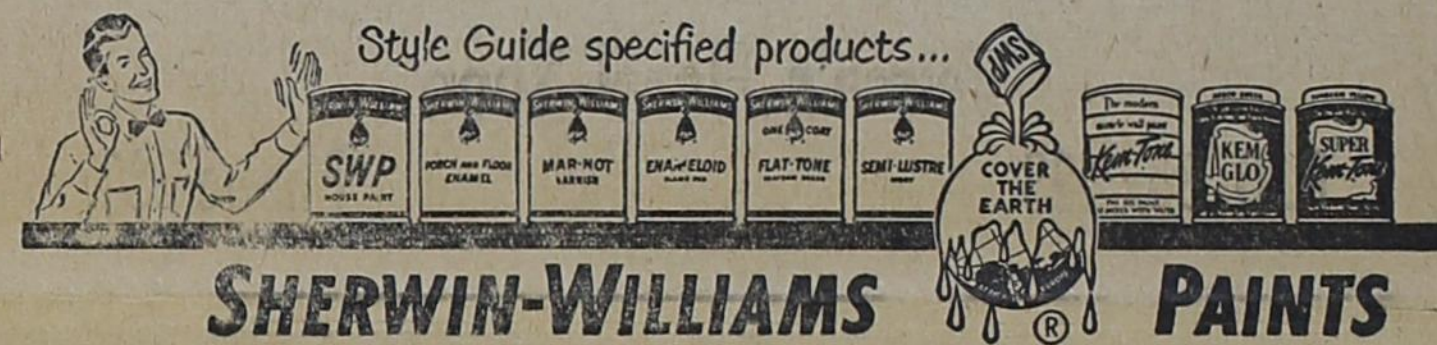
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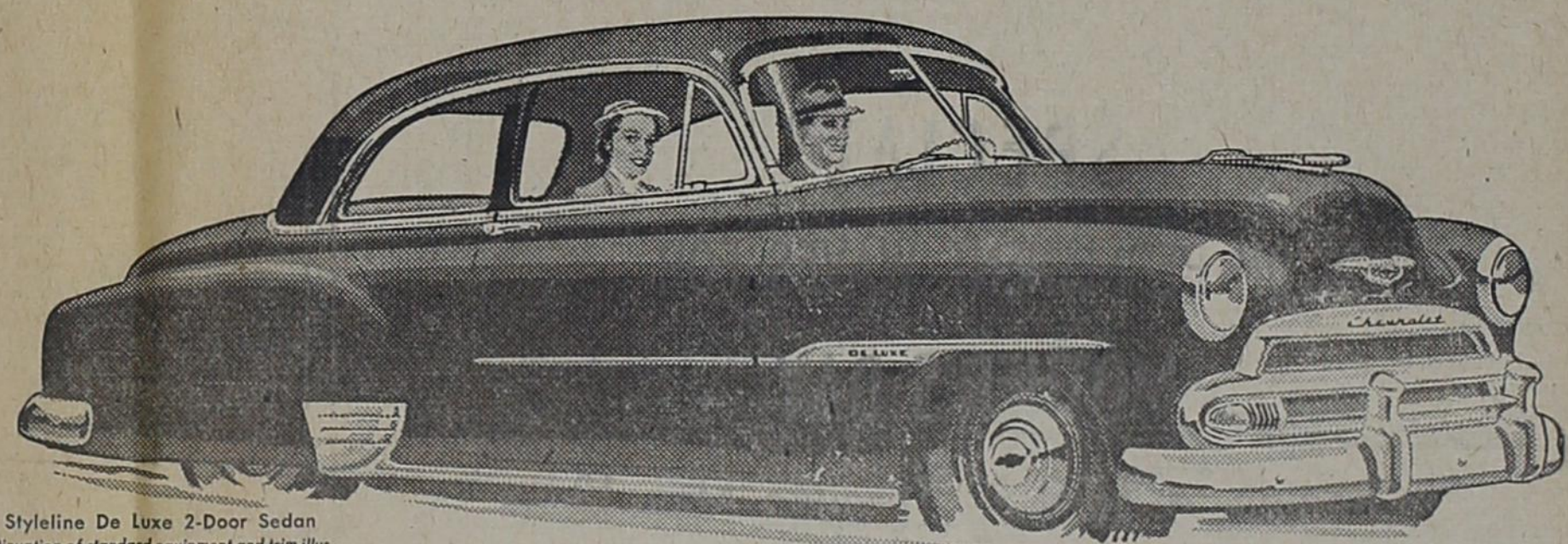


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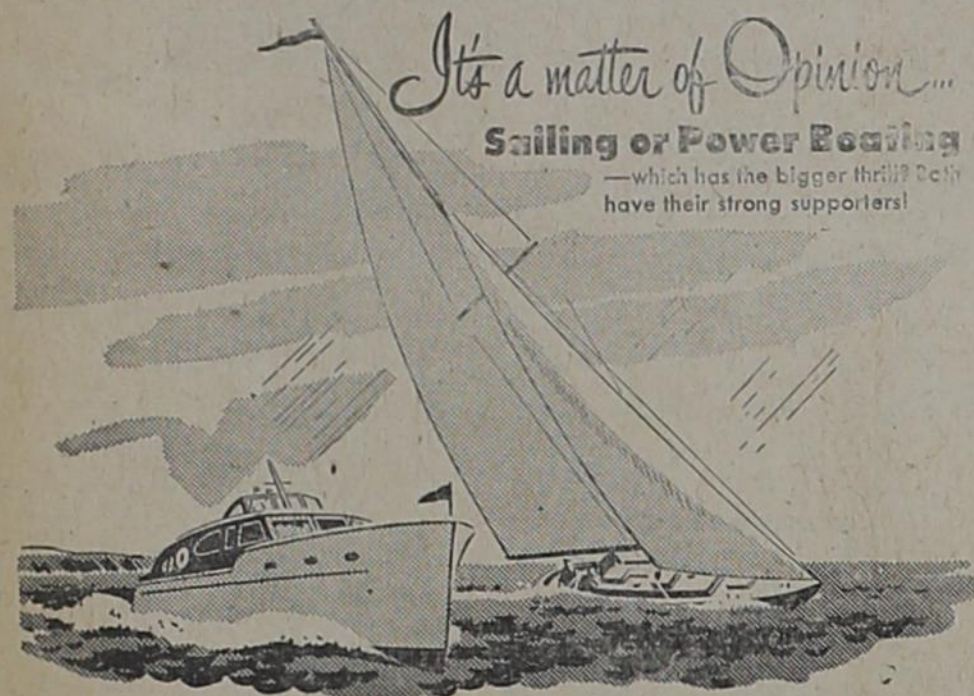
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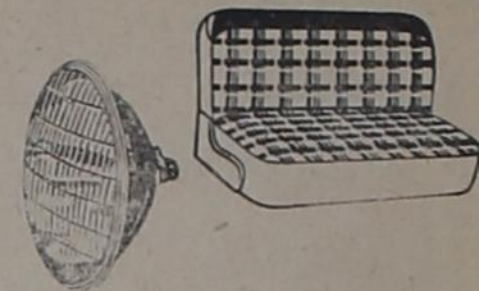
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FRIO NEWS
