SANTA COMING DECEMBER 19

Ranger Merchants Plan Bargain Days And Yearly Yule Program

Merchants present at a meeting of the Retail Merchants Association Monday afternoon formulated, discussed and then adopted unanimously plans, for pre-Christmas bargain days in Ranger, later opening hours for the stores after December 19, plans for the Christmas decorations for Ranger, and a committee was appointed to collect funds to sponsor the Retail Merchants annual Christmas celebration in Ranger.

The members present at the meeting yesterday afternoon agreed to set December 7-8, 14-15, and 21-22 as special Christmas bargain days in the Ranger stores. All these dates fall on Friday and Saturday, making the final three weekend shopping days before Christmas bargain days.

Beginning December 19 with the arrival of Santa Claus and his reindeer in Ranger, the local stores will remain open until 8:00 p.m. each evening.

Plans were also made to begin work immediately on the Christmas lighting for Ranger.

It was also noted at the meeting that through the generosity and cooperation of the Ranger merchants last year, all new Christmas lighting equipment was purchased to replace the old Christmas decorations.

In addition to sponsoring the visit of Santa Claus and four of his reindeer here December 19, the Retail Merchants Association hopes to add to the new equipment bought last year to make this Christmas bigger and better.

This is the one Retail Merchants sponsored project in Ranger each year, that of decorating the town and bringing Santa Claus here for the children.

A committee was appointed to begin the collection of funds for the Christmas program and each merchant will be contacted by a member of the finance committee for their donation.

War Veterans, accused Russia of preparing war.

He attacked the presence of Russian occupation troops in Austria, Romania, Hungary, Poland and East Germany.

Tito said the Russians were keeping occupation troops in Austria because of Trieste—the free territory jointly occupied by Yugoslavia in one zone and the U. S. and British in another.

He said Russia could continue its control of Hungary and Romania under the guise of guarding communications lines to troops in Austria. He said the same aim was behind Russian troops in east Germany and Poland.

Tito said he favored disarmament proposals, but did not believe they would work until all members of the UN accepted the principle that all disputes should be settled in a peaceful way on the basis of equality.

"This disarmament can be achieved," Tito said.

No Agreement Reached On Korean Armistice

Four MIG 15's Fall Before UN Sabrejets

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Nov. 27 (UP)—U. S. Jet fighters shot down four Communist jet planes and damaged four more in six dogfights over Korea today, but ground fighting subsided.

American F-86 Sabrejets sent four of the enemy's sweepback wing MIG-15 fighters crashing to earth and damaged another in a single 15-minute air battle in "MIG Alley." In the fight, Maj. Richard D. Creighton of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, destroyed his fifth MIG to become the fourth jet ace in history.

Only one American plane was lost in the six dogfights—an F-80 Shooting Star.

An 8th Army communique said Allied troops today retook two advance positions on the central front which had been lost to bugle-blowing Chinese attackers last night.

However, the communique reported nothing but patrol activity from the rest of the frozen front, which will become a permanent cease-fire line if the remaining armistice terms are settled within 30 days.

Chinese Communists set off a series of brilliant green, red and yellow signal flares during the night. No attacks followed, however, and it was believed the Reds might be celebrating the agreement on a tentative truce line.

Allied observers expect the ground fighting to die down altogether, while the truce teams at Panmunjon try to complete their agenda before the Dec. 27 deadline. If they succeed, the opposing armies would have to give up any terrain they took in the interim and return to their present positions for a cease-fire.

But the war will go on unabated in the air and at sea.

More air battles flared over northwest Korea Tuesday.

Pilot Brings Crippled B-36 In Safely After Crew Jumps

FORT WORTH, Nov. 27 (UP)—Sixteen crewmen aboard a crippled B-36 parachuted to safety after a veteran parachute jumper delivered an emergency lecture by radio instructing them how to abandon the giant bomber.

The airman sat in the apparently doomed craft and listened to the capsule course on parachuting delivered yesterday by an ex-paratrooper, Sgt. Grigsby, a Negro, from the Carlwell Air Force control tower.

The Air Force refused to disclose the sergeant's first name.

At the end of the lecture, the crewmen leaped from the plane and landed without incident within a two-mile radius—except for Sgt. William I. Roten who hung helplessly in a pean tree for 30 minutes before he was cut loose.

Two crew members remained with Capt. Clarence E. Horton of San Antonio, Tex., when he brought the big ship in for the delicate landing in a heavy rainstorm.

Horton said mechanical "scanners" aboard the plane detected a failure of the "position arm pin" on his left wheel shortly after the jakeoff from the base. The

ship was on a routine training mission.

One tire on the wheel was turning opposite from the other causing them to scrape together.

"We didn't try to get the gear up then, but called the tower and told them we believed we had an emergency," Horton said.

For six hours, the bomber circled the Fort Worth area trying to remedy the failure on instructions radioed to the plane by Col. Thomas P. Gerrity, commander of the 11th Bomb Wing.

When all efforts failed, Gerrity gave directions that the crew abandon the plane.

Grigsby then was called to the microphone. Most of his "students" in the crippled plane in the air had never jumped before, although all of them had undergone parachute training.

They listened intently to his directions, and then the jumps began.

"You bet I was scared," said T-Sgt. Robert M. Robinson of St. Petersburg Fla., after he was on the ground. "Everything happened so fast there wasn't much time to think."

Maj. Robert H. Sikes of Breckenridge, Tex., said that it never entered his mind that his chute might not open, but just the same he was "scared plenty."

All of the parachutes landed in the rain-soaked fields around the base, except Roten of Dallas, who was hung up by the lines of his chute and spent his half hour within 45 feet of the ground waiting for somebody to cut him down.

Medical attendants with a ladder arrived and accomplished the task.

Thirty-two minutes after the last crewman leaped from the plane, Horton brought her in. A puff of smoke went up when the faulty tire hit the runway and a long skid mark was left behind. Otherwise it was routine.

Those who rode down with Horton in the ship were Lt. Col. Paul R. Paskvan of La Grange, Ill., and 1st Lt. Ernest O. Benefield of San Antonio.

Horton said the cooling effect of the rain apparently helped prevent a blowout of the tire when the plane landed.

Eastland County Scene Of Three Weekend Wrecks

Eastland County was the scene of at least three automobile accidents over the two-day weekend.

can F-80 Shooting Star jet fighter-bombers in an unsuccessful attempt to break up an attack on Communist railway targets.

One F-80 was shot down and the pilot killed and one MIG was damaged in the 20-minute dogfight just south of the Yalu River Manchurian border. The Shooting Stars nevertheless claimed to have destroyed or damaged eight enemy locomotives and 45 railway cars in their attack.

Out to avenge their dead com-

rade, 19 American Sabrejets jumped 18 MIGs south of the Yalu during the afternoon. The Sabres caught the MIGs at 35,000 feet, split the enemy formation, and hounded the Reds almost to ground level.

One after another of the MIGs was sent crashing to earth. First reports said four had been destroyed, one probably destroyed and two damaged. However, this figure later was revised to four destroyed and one damaged.

All Sabrejets returned safely to base from the 20-mile dogfight. Eighty other MIGs were sighted during the battle, but none joined the fray.

The U. S. Navy announced belatedly in Tokyo that the U. S. Destroyer Hyman was hit by a Communist shell while dueling with enemy shore batteries in Wonsan harbor last Saturday. It caused no casualties and only minor damage.

Radio Peiping had claimed that Communist batteries at Wonsan sank an Allied destroyer Saturday.

The Navy reported that the Battleship Wisconsin has arrived in Far Eastern waters to relieve the New Jersey as flagship of the 7th Fleet.

Small A-Bombs Ready For Use

FORT HOOD, Tex., Nov. 27 (UP)— Practical use of the Army's new atomic weapon for ground fighting was proved in recent desert tests, Army Chief of Staff Gen. Lawton Collins said here last night.

Such a tactical weapon exists and soon could be brought to bear on an enemy force, the general said at a news conference during his inspection visit of the First Armored Division.

Plans are under way for training units in technical know-how for use of the new Atomic weapon. The Army plans to call up three additional National Guard divisions to make a total of 21 divisions, Collins said.

With the added strength of regimental combat teams and other units of less than division size, this would give the army a total strength of about 27 divisions.

Barkley Tours Naval Fleet

TOKYO, Nov. 27 (UP)— Vice-President Alben W. Barkley inspected U. S. Navy fleet facilities at Yokosuka, Japan, today.

Barkley toured the base by automobile. He then boarded the British light cruiser HMS Belfast, flagship of Rear Admiral A. K. Moncreiff, senior British naval commander in this area. He also visited wounded in the Yokosuka Naval Hospital.





Tech's split-T—which functioned merrily in a 40-14 win over New Mexico last week—will once be quarterbacked by Junior Arterburn, a senior, and Jerry Johnson, a freshman. Playing their final college football will be Arterburn, tackle Jerrell Price, guard Jack Cockburn center Aubrey (Red) Phillips, linebacker John Paul Jones, quarterback Fete Edwards and halfbacks Bill O'Grady and Bobby Close.

Hardin-Simmons last week downed Arizona University by a mere 14-13 count, but the stadium was muddy.

Diabetes Cases Grow In Number

AUSTIN, Nov. 24 — Diabetes, a disease for which modern medicine can do much, took a toll of 887 lives in Texas during the past year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"While the communicable diseases such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria and smallpox are causing a decreasing number of deaths each year in this State, diabetes is now taking an appalling number of human lives, especially in the middle-aged group," Dr. Cox said.

"Until recent years diabetes was not noted as a major health problem but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures, which made the disease more easily diagnosed.

"Diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attack the white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions are factors, since it seems that a fact that those who do not indulge in luxurious living and whose occupation calls for manual labor are not frequently affected. Simple living, wholesome diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes. An annual physical examination, with a blood or urine analysis, is important to determine whether or not the disease is present in the




