

Water Conservation Meet to Be Held Thurs., Sept. 28

A preliminary meeting of Castro County farmers and business men was held in the county court room Wednesday night to plan a general educational meeting for all the farmers of the county later in the month. The date for the general meeting was set for Thursday, September 28, at 8:00 p. m.

The meeting Wednesday night and the one called for September 28, are the result of a general meeting held at Plainview recently, when representatives from practically all of the counties in the High Plains irrigation area met with members of the State Board of Water Engineers. Representatives at the Plainview meeting were told that in order for the Water Conservation Law, passed by the last session of the Texas Legislature with the approval of Plains irrigation farmers, to become effective and remain a law that the recognized irrigation districts would need to form Water Conservation Districts embracing all of the area getting its water from the same source. The engineers roughly defined the boundaries of the Panhandle-Plains irrigation district as the Canadian River on the north, the Texas-New Mexico State line on the West, the Caprock on the east, and about the center of the South Plains on the South.

Posie Cunningham, president of the local water conservation district, and Willis A. Hawkins, secretary, conducted the meeting Wednesday night. They explained that in order for the large Water Conservation District to be formed an election will be held embracing the entire Panhandle-Plains irrigation area. Although some points of the law were not fully explained it is believed that all landowners will be eligible to participate in the election which will make all of the land in the area part of the Water Conservation District. And then dry land farmers, or ranchland can be petitioned out of the District and not be subject to its regulations. However it was pointed out that if a well is drilled on a dry farm later the farm automatically becomes a part of the conservation

district. General opinion is that under the existing law, which will be administered by a governing board selected from irrigation farmers of the district, there will be few, if any regulations or restrictions imposed. The point was made that the district is being created and the governing board appointed chiefly as a matter of complying with the present State law which apparently is more desirable than a law which could conceivably be enacted and vesting administrative authority in a state agency.

All farmers of the county, and especially irrigation farmers, are urged to attend the meeting in the District Court room in Dimmitt on Thursday night, Sept. 28, when more detailed information about the proposed Water Conservation District will be available. These County meetings are pointing toward the organizing and notifying, by election, of the twenty-one county district.

Leaders in the legislative effort to get the law passed, favorable to High Plains farmers, are apprehensive that the present law will be repealed, possibly at the next session of the Legislature, if compliance to its provisions are neglected. They point out that this is a vital issue in the economy of this great irrigation area and that the cooperation of all the farmers of the area is vitally needed.

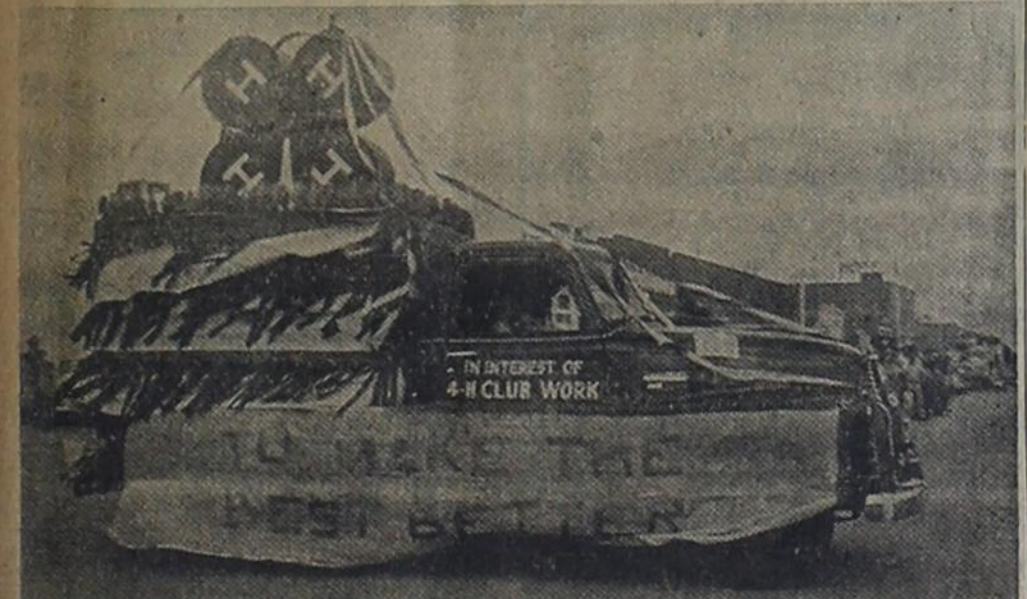

Texas Needs 1,500 New School Buses

AUSTIN, Texas Sept. 9 — Texans are now taking good care of their million and a half school children including the transporting of 320,000 of them 55,550,365 miles during the last school year, the Texas State Teachers Association pointed out today.

Nearly 6,000 public school buses carried the children to and from their home during the 175 school days last school term a distance equal to 2,222 trips around the world at the equator. The daily total of travel was 317,431 miles.

State school funds provided for transportation averaged a little more than \$30 per pupil for the year, or a total of \$10,346,175. Only children living two or more miles from their school are provided transportation.

A total of 25,212 more pupils were carried by school buses during the last scholastic year than during the 1948-49 term. The increase was partly due to the consolidation of more school districts and more districts qualifying for state aid, but most of it was caused by increased enrollment. Nearly 5 per cent more children were in the public schools last year than in 1948-49. Transportation increased on 6 per cent. The nearly 6,000 buses in use throughout the state are valued at \$17,492,869, according to a survey recently completed by L. H. Griffin, state school director of administration services.

His survey also disclosed that one-fourth of the school buses should be replaced with new ones. School buses are expected to give satisfactorily, economical and service for five years.

More than five per cent of the buses in use are ten or more years old. Another three per cent are nine years old and 17 per cent of the vehicles have been in service from six to eight years.

School buses traveled 126,218 miles daily over dirt roads and the remainder 191,213 miles on paved or gravel thoroughfares.

Buses and tires are now purchased through the state at a considerable saving to the individual school districts.

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

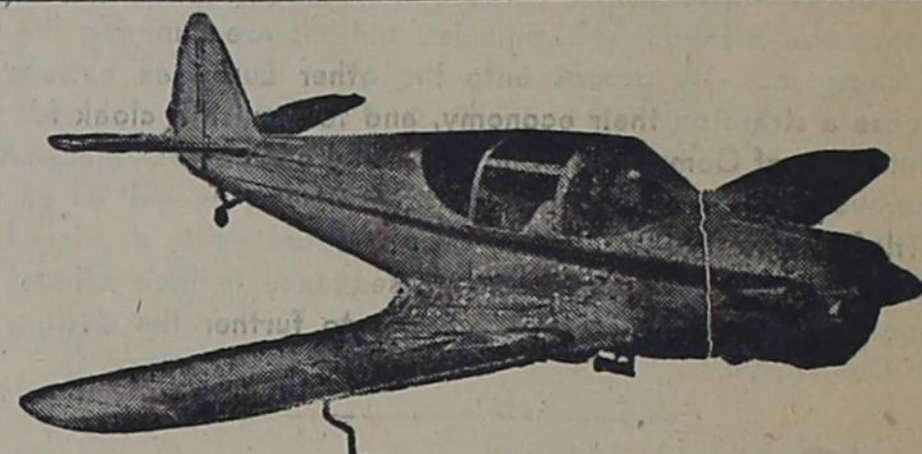

Sports Afield

by Ted Kesting

The modern deep freeze is a great boon to a sportsman. He no longer has to eat venison or duck or fish for days in a row. Now he can enjoy the meat and the thrill of his days afield weeks later.

But too many of us fail to prepare fish and game properly and are disappointed to bite into un-tasty meat. So here are some suggestions for freezing.

Immediately after your game is bagged, bleed it, then dress it as soon as possible. Big game should be aged to make it tender; keep it for 8 to 10 days at a few degrees above freezing. Game birds should be cleaned and plucked—the wax method is best. Wash all meat thoroughly in cold running water. In the case of fish, keep them in water as long as possible before you clean and freeze them. Try to freeze fish the same day they're caught.

You can use cellophane, plastic bags or aluminum foil for packaging; a stockinette over this keeps the package in better shape. Label with the kind of meat, date of catch, hunting license number and the freezing date. When first put in the freezer, leave some air space between packages.

Game fish, birds and meat are thawed and cooked the same as domestic varieties. However, game should not be held, after thawing, for any great length of time before cooking.

It takes about two hours per pound to thaw meat at room temperature. If you're in a bigger hurry, it takes 45 minutes per pound in front of an electric fan. If placed in a warm oven, at 200 to 250 degrees, it takes only 25 minutes per pound. Uncooked meats should never be refrozen. Cooked meats can be refrozen for two to four weeks. Be sure and keep the meat in its unopened package while thawing so it will not be exposed to air and possibly become tainted.

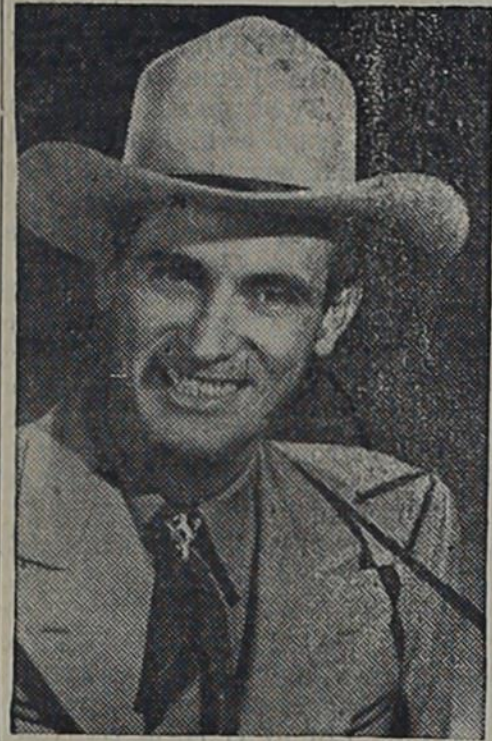
Cook and season thawed game and fish the same way you would fresh foods.

Now here are a few additional

hints: large game should be butchered the same as beef. Tough portions of venison may be ground and mixed with pork or veals for meat balls; it also makes fine mince meat. When it is frozen, ground meat will keep for four to six months; liver, heart and kidney for three to six months. Lean fish can be stored for six to eight months, the most fatty fish no longer than three to four months.

The big thing to remember is that your meat will be only as good as the condition it is in when you freeze it.

The couple are both graduates of House High School. They plan to make their home on a farm near House, New Mexico.

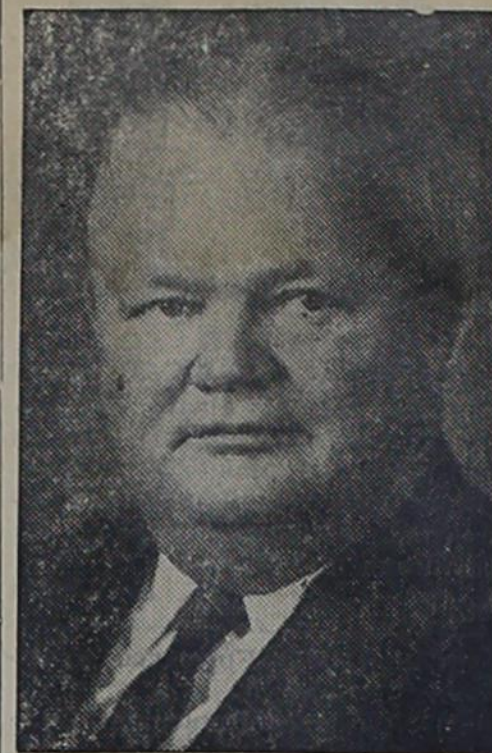

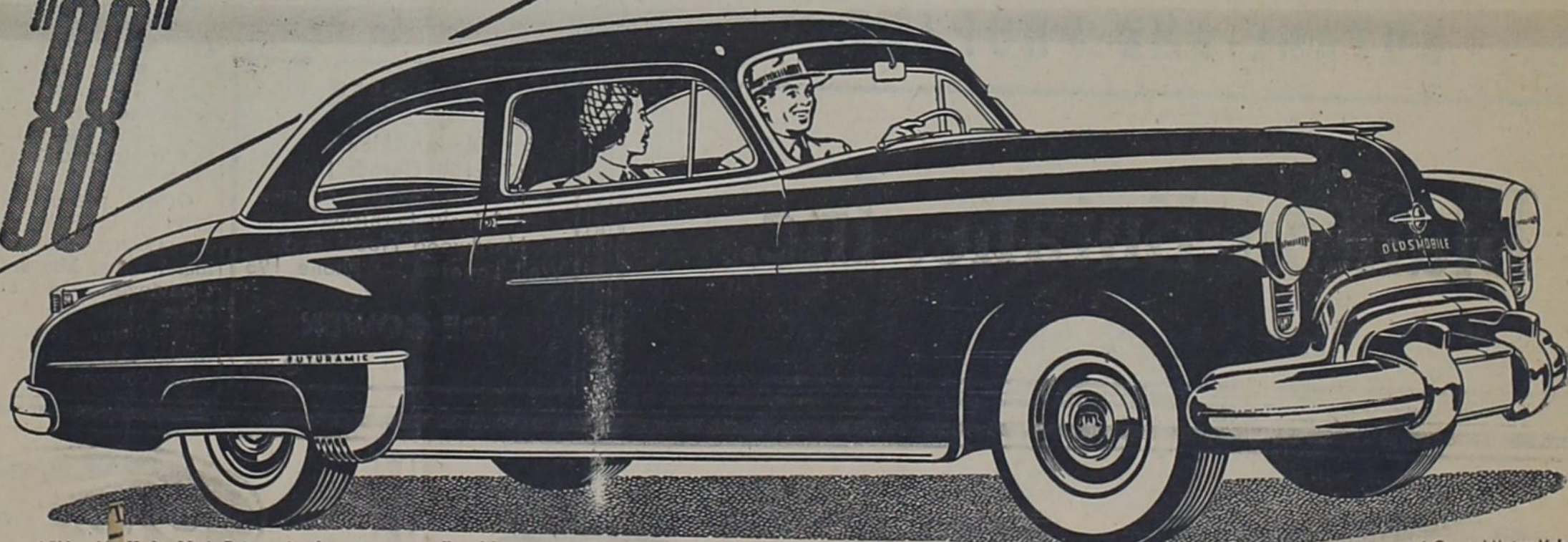

Dr. Cox Identifies Symptoms Of Rheumatic Fever

AUSTIN, TEXAS, September 14. While the specific cause of rheumatic fever has not been discovered, several factors associated with it and its onset and recurrence are now generally recognized, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Rheumatic fever is serious because it may affect the heart. Age is important. Rheumatic fever usually begins in childhood at about 5 or 6, although adults may have it. There is a susceptibility to the disease which causes rheumatic fever to be more common in some families than in others. The other factors which may favor its onset, combined with an individual's susceptibility, are frequent chilling, damp or over crowded living quarters and a poor diet.

The early signs and symptoms may be slight. Some of them, which may occur singly or in combination are: failure to gain weight, poor appetite, pallor, repeated nosebleeds, low persistent fever, and frequent complaints of pain in the arms, legs or abdomen. These symptoms do not necessarily mean that a child has rheumatic fever, but they do indicate that he is below par and should be examined by a physician and his advice followed.

The more characteristic signs include painful, inflamed joints. The child may be irritable without good reason, cry easily, or develop other nervous habits. It is vitally important to spare the heart unnecessary work for as long as the disease is active and for a period of convalescence afterwards. A child with rheumatic fever should remain in bed until, in the physician's opinion, it is safe for him to get up.

It is important that the manufacturers and businessmen accord the group from Washington a good reception as it is the opinion of Mr. Guill that this meeting could do the Panhandle a lot of good.

More complete details will be announced later as the arrangements materialize.
