## Castro County Dairy Show to Be Held Here Friday

The Castro County Dairy Show will be held Friday April 7, at the Fair Grounds in Dimmitt. A total of 70 heads of the choice Dairy cows in the county have been entered and will compete for ribbons and banners. Four breeds, Jerseys, Guernseys, Brown Swiss and Milking Shorthorns will be represented. Judging will start at 10:00 a. m. with the Milking Shorthorn breed the first to be judged. Alton Chapman, district judge and Milking Shorthorn breeder of Floydada will place these entries.

Other breeds will be judged starting at 1:15 p. m. Koy Neeley of the Dairy Department of Texas Tech will place the entries in the other three breeds.

Hale Center, April 5—Funeral services for Dewitt Lamb, 58, former Texas newspaperman and father of Vic Lamb, Hale Center publisher, were held Sunday at Panama City, Fla., where he died in a hospital Saturday.

He was once editor and owner of the Mexia Daily News and had worked on the Castro County News at Dimmitt and the Avalanche-Journal at Lubbock in recent years.

Besides his wife and son here, he is survived by seven other children, including a daughter, Mrs. Hubert Johnson of Wichita Falls, and three brothers, including Charles Lamb of Flynn.

## OUR FAVORITE RECIPE

### HURRY-UP CORNED BEEF 'N CABBAGE

1 small head of cabbage  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 12-oz can corned beef  
Cut cabbage into large slivers and drop into boiling water. When a piece tastes tender but crisp, it's done. Drain off the water and stir in butter or margarine and salt. Cut corned beef into nice cubes. Add to cabbage. Now heat everything over very low heat, stirring until piping hot. Serves 4.

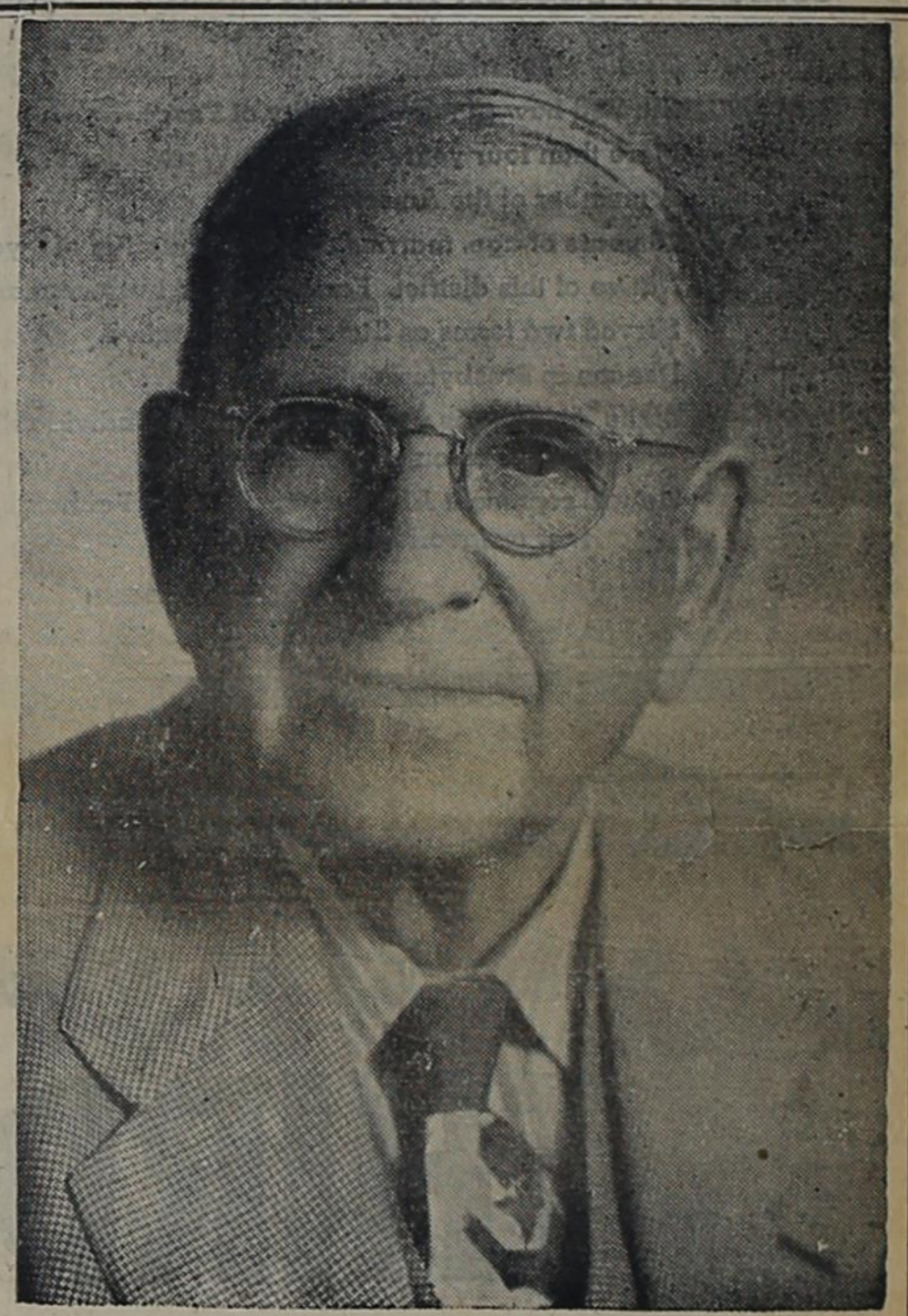

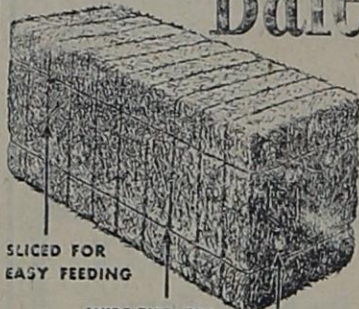
