

SEEN OR HEARD

YOU—Mr. and Mrs. Ranger—are a thorn in the side of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's effort to get higher service rates in their local exchange.

The telephone company, through its representative Ed Earpest of Fort Worth, admitted as much in a visit and two-hour conversation with us yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Earnest in the company of W. H. McAnally of Cisco, manager of the Ranger exchange, was here trying to convince us that the Ranger Daily Times should not adopt the policy supporting the citizens of Ranger and their duly elected representatives—the mayor and city commission—in their fight to get what they believe fair telephone rates for you users of the service, and the fight they are putting up against their suit in the 91st District Court for those higher rates.

The whole lengthy conversation was based on the primary thought that the telephone company was entitled to their requested raise and the adverse publicity they were getting from the Ranger Daily Times was unfair to the company Mr. Earnest and Mr. McAnally are hired to represent.

They have not now, nor at any time before, satisfied us as to how much their actual revenue in Ranger is from both their local and long distance service, nor did they seem to think that they would be able to satisfy our desire to know this after yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Earnest told us that he would see what he could do about our request for the statement of profit shown by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's long distance service in Ranger for the past year, but that under his company's present means of accounting the profits of the long distance service, there was no economical and presently feasible way to do this.

Earnest stated that it was not a matter of what the combined services here in Ranger were making, but that the local exchange was losing money at the rate of approximately one thousand dollars per month, and to avoid the confiscation of his company's property something must be done about that. We still do not know how much money leaves Ranger each month for long distance service in comparison with local service.

Nor could he satisfactorily answer as to why for many years the city of Weatherford had gotten their telephone service from the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, paying their employees about the same rate of wage, for many years at a lower rate than in Ranger, and not until recently had Weatherford granted the telephone company an increase. With that increase the telephone company agreed to purchase a lot in the city of Weatherford and spend a large amount of money in building a dial telephone exchange.

We also asked the gentlemen from the telephone company why the telephone users here were being asked to give the company a raise when part of the exchange that was supposedly for the users of their service in the city of Ranger was being used to supply telephone service to rural subscribers, denying townspeople the telephone service.

Asked why they did not expand their facilities in Ranger in order to care for everyone wanting a telephone, they stated that they first must have assurance for their company that it would pay to expand their facilities here by having their exchange show a profitable return on their present investment.

Why not turn that around and say that we might be more favorable toward giving them a raise, if they would show they are in good faith, and are going to provide, and make available first class telephone service to anyone in Ranger so desiring it. The shoe doesn't fit so well on the foot of the telephone company.

When they expand their facilities they immediately expect their net returns to grow with that expansion. For example if they doubled their investment in Ranger next year, they would have to show twice as much profit before they could get a fair return on their money. Regardless of how big the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, and the parent company, the Atlantic Telephone and Telegraph Company, get, they expect to keep reaping profits in line with their expansion.

They've taken this Ranger rate case to court. Mr. Earnest stated that they thought they had a pretty good case, which they must have according to their views, or they would have never gone to court, they would still be appearing before the city commission. They didn't expect the resistance they are getting from the people of Ranger. They probably expected us to throw up our hands at the mention of suing us, and beg that they accept anything they want, we didn't, and according to the mayor and city commission, we're not.

An important person holding a position in accordance with the one held by Mr. Earnest with Bell Telephone, doesn't go around paying social calls on newspapers, we imagine he would feel more at home with the representative of the paper seeking him out. You're resistance to their request for a raise must be doing some good or they would just ignore Ranger, and wait on the courts to decide the rate case.

Earnest couldn't understand the position taken by the Ranger Daily Times in its support of the city commission. He seemed to think that we should sit idly by and in no way try to let the readers of the paper know how their commission feels and their fellow citizens think in the matter.

The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company covers many of the major cities in five states, they base their outlook over that whole area, we think in terms of Ranger and what this action can do to our town. When we want to know how much money they make here from both of their services, it is with the desire to let you know how the raise would affect the economy of your town, not the five states covered by Southwestern Bell and their parent company, Atlantic Telephone and Telegraph Company, which through change in its accounting procedure went from the largest to the second largest organization in the world, will be affected.

If the raise is granted there may be some who can raise the price of their merchandise or get a raise from their boss that will offset it, can you? If a merchant raises his prices to pay his telephone bill and a competitor doesn't, which one will you trade. The telephone company has no competition in Ranger.

HEARING SET APRIL 11 ON TELEPHONE RATE INCREASES

The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has again caused the members of the Ranger City Commission and the Mayor to be cited for an appearance for a hearing on their request that they be allowed to raise their rates in Ranger.

The date of the hearing was set as April 11 at 1:30 p.m., at which time the representatives of the telephone company will present the judge of the 91st District Court their facts showing the need for a raise in Ranger; and the representatives of the city will show their reasons for not granting the raises.

City Secretary Lester Crowley stated this morning that the company was still unable to serve a citation on Commissioner Hershel Angus, who is on active duty with the Army in operation "Long Horn", but that the members served will appear at the hearing.

The city officials have not named their attorneys for the case, pending action by others they have contacted in relation to their fight against what they deem an unreasonable request for telephone rates by Southwestern Bell.

Should the judge of the 91st District Court see fit to grant the telephone company through an order of the court the increases they have asked, they would be temporary until a trial by jury would pass on the question.

In relation to this issue before the city, Mayor Price Crawley has repeatedly stated that their demands upon the telephone users here have not been fair, but that the commissioners have offered them a raise that in the eyes of the commission was fair.

Loyal Democrats Want Chairman Post At Meeting

AUSTIN, Mar. 29 (UP)—The "loyal" Democratic group in Texas has announced that it will oppose Wright Morrow if he seeks to retain his post as Democratic National Committee member from Texas.

The announcement paved the way for a possible knock-down political fight over the national committee's post.

So far, the silver-haired Houston attorney has no announced opposition, and political sources predict Morrow will bid for another term at the Democratic state convention May 27 in San Antonio.

However, the executive secretary of the loyal group, Fagan Dickson of Austin, says his organization will be armed for battle if that event occurs.

NLRB Rules Union Can Be Made To Take Oath

WASHINGTON, March 29 (UP)—A National Labor Relations Board examiner has ruled that an employer can require all officials of a bargaining union to sign non-Communist affidavits.

The ruling opens the way to a possible broad new interpretation of the non-Communist affidavit provision of the Taft-Hartley Law. The law requires top local and national officers of a union to sign such affidavits in order to use NLRB services for representation, elections and unfair labor charges.

The decision was made in a case involving the left-wing United Electrical Workers Union, which filed charges of unfair labor practices against the Square "D" company of Los Angeles.

The independent union, which has represented employees at the plant since 1948, made the charges after the company demanded that all union representatives, including minor officials, sign non-Communist affidavits as a condition for a new contract.

The facilities involved were purchased recently by Wunderlich and Aikin from United Gas Pipe Line Co., and include 678 miles of pipeline extending from Wheeler to Young County.

President Not Expected To Let Known His Plans

President Truman will stand up before a host of Democratic bigwigs tonight to launch his party's 1952 presidential campaign.

The chief executive will deliver the main address at the annual Jefferson-Jackson Day Dinner in Washington. The talk will be televised and will be broadcast over all major radio networks.

The high-ranking party leaders who will pay \$100 a plate for their dinners are hoping that Mr. Truman will tip them off on his own political plans. However, all signs indicate that they will go home still ignorant of the President's intentions.

But they're sure to get one thing for their money, succulent steaks which have been prepared especially for the occasion. Four truck drivers will rush six-thousand hot filet mignons from two downtown hotels to the National Armory, where the dinner is being held.

On the Republican side, Harold Stassen confirmed today that he was out to slow Sen. Robert Taft's presidential drive when he promised half his Wisconsin delegates to Gen. Eisenhower. And he hinted he might do the same thing with his 28 Minnesota delegates.

Stassen pointed out that the Atlantic Pact commander's name will not be on the Wisconsin ballot. And he said he thought it would be the fair, right and wise thing to do to allot half of any Wisconsin delegates he wins to Eisenhower.

In Milwaukee, Sen. Taft said he was "not surprised" at the outcome of the Maine Republican convention, which pledged nine delegates to Eisenhower and only five to him. Said the lawmaker: "The results of the Maine convention are satisfactory; it's about what we expected."

Murder Defendant Found Insane By Edinburg Jurists

EDINBURG, March 29 (UP)—A 70-year-old former Matton, Ill., man was declared insane yesterday by a district court jury in Edinburg. J. Sam Miller, who had retired and moved to McAllen from Illinois, was accused of fatally shooting his landlady, Mrs. Lorraine Berkowitz, then attempting suicide on March 13rd.

The jury deliberated only five minutes before returning its insanity verdict. Miller will be committed to a Texas State Hospital, but must face the murder charge if ever declared sane.

You Are the First-Aider

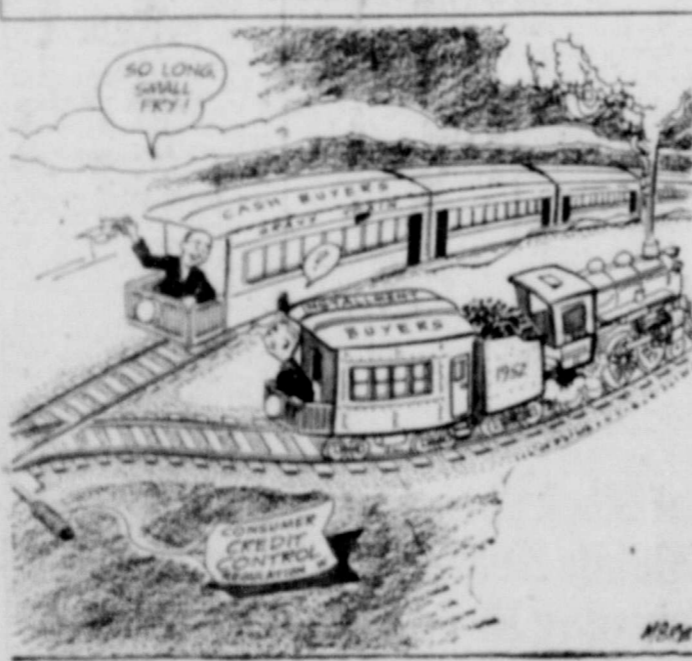
- 1. Place your hands on the flat of the victim's back, below the armpits, with your thumbs barely touching, fingers spread outward and downward.
2. Rock forward slowly, keeping your elbows straight, until your arms are nearly vertical, thus exerting a steady downward pressure.



- 3. Now rock backward, relaxing pressure. Slide your hands outward to grasp the victim's arms just above the elbows. Continue to rock backward.
4. As you rock backward, rock and pull the victim's arms toward you until you feel tension in his shoulders. Start over with Step 1. Repeat the full cycle about 12 times a minute.

Important: When the victim begins to breathe on his own, synchronize your efforts with his breathing until he breathes strongly. Then stop.

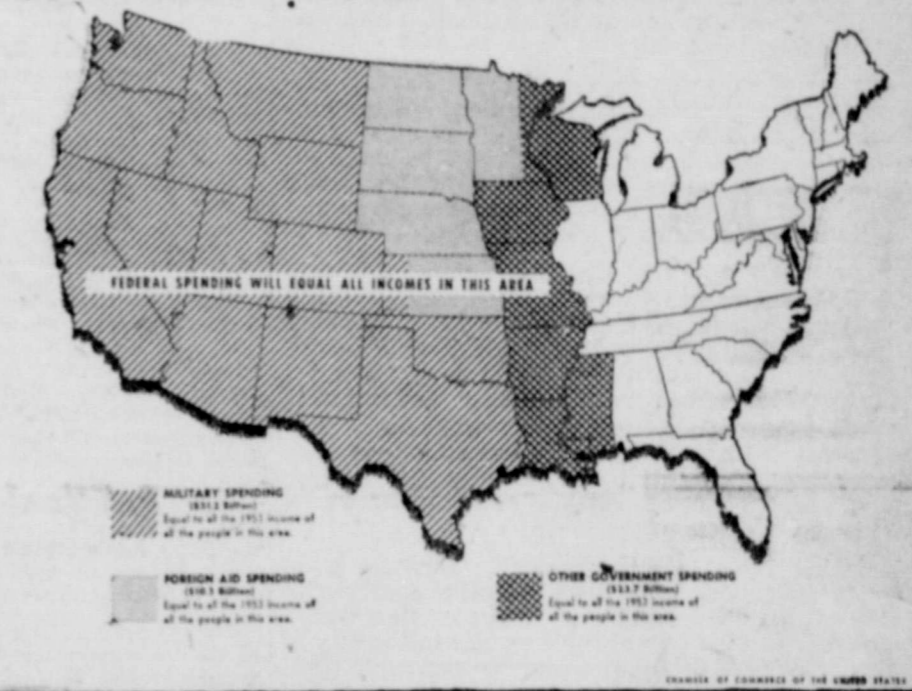

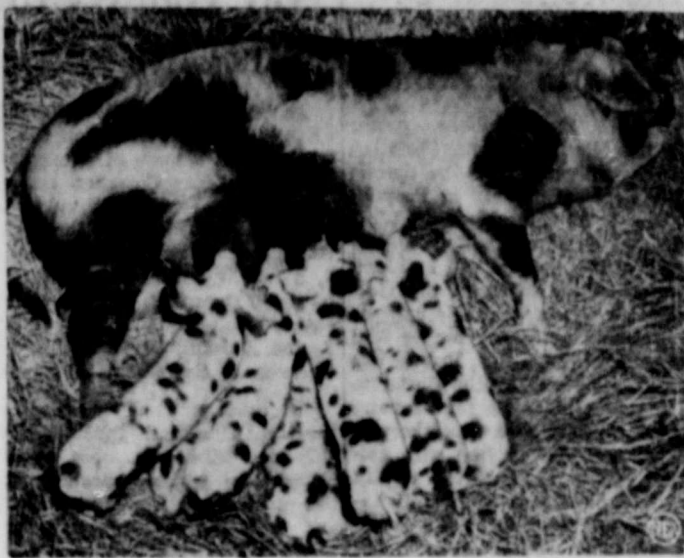

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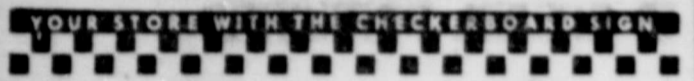

Will Government Take Freedom Of Working Away

WASHINGTON—Will the time come when the U. S. Government will require a worker to belong to a union to hold his job?

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States sees that threat in the steel and aircraft union demands now before Wage Stabilization Board. If the demands are met, says the Chamber in its weekly "Washington Report," government which supposedly protects individual liberties will be taking that protection away.

"If government," says the Chamber, "tells a worker that he must belong to a union to work, it could tell him that he must renounce unions if he wants to hold a job. Under the same principle, it could require him to belong to a specific political party as a condition of work. That was done in Nazi Germany and is the rule behind the Iron Curtain today."

"If the Board finds in favor of the unions and grants their demands, hundreds of thousands of workers would be affected."

The decision of a union shop in the steel and aircraft industries lies with a small group of six men—the public members of the Wage Board.

"Congress," says the Chamber, "would not presume to legislate on so important an issue without months of hearings and debates. Yet, this little administrative body—the Wage Board—is under union pressure to decide the issue."

"This a liberty could be taken away from a large group almost overnight by a small group of unselected members of the Board. Many of our liberties have come to work which is a liberty we have always taken for granted may be after long struggles. The right taken away any day by a mere handful of men."

Match Found For Pest Crabgrass

Crabgrass the toughest and most persistent of lawn weeds—has finally met its match in the form of weed killers whose basic ingredient is potassium cyanate.

The chemical, which is sold under a variety of trade names, offers from 95 to 100 per cent control over crabgrass.

Although potassium cyanate is effective on crabgrass at any time of the year, best results are obtained by using it during the late spring, when the ugly weed first begins to sprout.

Safe and economical to use, potassium cyanate is mixed with water. A rule of thumb formula is to use two and one half teaspoons of the chemical with one gallon of water to cover 135 square feet of lawn. If crabgrass is particularly heavy, use five teaspoons of the chemical.

Oftentimes it isn't even necessary to use a pressure sprayer. If the area to be covered is relatively small, prepare the solution in a galvanized steel sprinking can and spray it from the same container.

A potassium cyanate solution may temporarily discolor turf and lawn grasses but no permanent damage is done. Generally it is best to delay artificial watering of lawns until 24 hours after the solution has been applied.

Even though potassium cyanate is quick acting, more than one application of it is needed during the year on lawns where crabgrass is well entrenched.

Carving Leg of Lamb

Here's a word to pass on to the man of the house about carving Easter's leg of lamb. With the roast placed on the platter with the leg bone to the carver's right, cut three or four slices from the side next to the carver. Then turn the roast and rest it on the cut surface. Starting at the leg bone end, cut slices at right angle to the leg bone. Release by cutting along the bone parallel to the platter.

Easter Bunny

Bunny faces will add a seasonal touch to your lamb roast. Make features with whole cloves in canned pear halves. Decorate with cream cheese, then place the "bunnies" around your roast on the platter.

Let Lamb "Set"

Give a roast leg of lamb time to "set" in a warm place for 20 to 30 minutes before dinner. During this period the roast becomes firm and much easier to carve.

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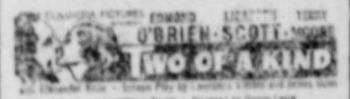
