SEEN OR HEARD

The telephone company, in their petition before the 91st District Court that requests the ordinance setting their rates in Ranger be set aside to allow them to raise their rates rates.

"Because the rates established in the City of Ranger by the Ordinance of November 16, 1948, were and are unlawfully low, plaintiff on May 15, 1951, duly filed and presented to the City Commission of the City of Ranger its written application for an increase in the basic rates prescribed by the ordinance of November 16, 1948, freely offering its books, records, and accounts and all data in its possession, to assist the City Commission in its determination of fair and lawful rates."

This may be an elapsion of memory on the part of the telephone company, but those rates set in 1948 are exactly what they asked for in the application to the Ranger City Commission. They say in their petition that they WERE and ARE unlawfully low. How can they say that when they got what they asked for at the time?

Someone mentioned that the telephone company here was the only utility in Ranger that did not join the Quarterback Club, at the time they had their membership drive earlier this year. It seems the only interest they have here is the fair and lawful return upon their investment, regardless of how other people in Ranger, and other businessmen are fairing, and what their demands can do to the economy of the town.

It might be mentioned that the other utility companies in Ranger see fit to have a manager here, and that in most cases these managers have been and are now very active in civic affairs, and take a personal interest in the life of their community. The manager of the local telephone exchange lives at Cisco.

We have heard other people state they think the telephone company is asking for to much in Ranger. One person went so far as to say he would like to form a stock company and buy them out.

From the rates another company has set for the Denton dial exchange, and what the people of Eastland, Cisco and Breckenridge are now paying, it might appear that Ranger is being used as an example in the telephone company's plans of bigger and better profits from their extensive holdings.

If our city commission believes that the telephone company is asking too much, and seeing that we have invested in them, the authority to operate our city, we feel that they are right and that they should receive support from us and the citizens of Ranger.

Two school elections and a \$1,500,000 bond election are coming up in Ranger this month.

Saturday, April 5th, three regents of Ranger Junior College will be elected and two members of the board of trustees of the Ranger Independent School District will also be named.

Regardless of whether there is any opposition to the two school elections, you should exercise your right to vote and give these men willing to serve their community a vote of confidence.

Arthur Deffenbacher and Hugh Smith have consented to have their names placed on the ballot for the public schools and J. M. Nuesle, Carl Page, and L. L. Bruce have made known that they will work for the betterment of the Junior college.

On April 22 all qualified voters of the Eastland County Water Supply District will vote on a bond issue that may well be the turning point in the existence of the two towns of which that district is made up.

The citizens of Eastland and Ranger, who own and have rented taxable property with the Eastland County tax collector and who have paid their poll tax, will cast their votes for giving the water district the authority to issue these bonds and assess a tax to insure their payment.

The water district will probably be self supporting and very little, or no tax at all, will be assessed against the property owners of the district.

By voting for the issuance of these bonds you will be assuring yourself of an adequate water supply for you and those to follow you.

Those of you who have not rendered your property with the county can do so at the city hall. City Secretary Lester Crossley has the necessary forms for the rendition of the property.

Allies Repell Largest Attack In Three Months

KOREA, April 2 UP—Allied troops in Korea have beaten off the enemy's biggest ground attack in three months.

The assault was launched today by some 1500 Chinese who hit the U-N lines in the west shouting "Kill! kill! kill!"

The weight of the attack knocked off a hill near Panmunjom, the site of the truce talks. But the U-N troops rallied and won back the height in a bloody battle with rifles, bayonets and grenades.

At last reports the Reds were still retreating north.

As for the truce talks, the U-N has warned the Reds it will not give in to the demand that Russia be accepted as a neutral inspection nation for an armistice. The warning was given at a final meeting of staff officers, who are turning the problem over to senior truce men tomorrow.

Mild Weather Over The State

The weather in Texas today is mostly clear and mild, with no prospect of rain. Weather forecasters said skies are fair except along the lower Gulf Coast, parts of extreme West Texas and over the Rio Grande Valley. The forecast calls for warmer temperatures tomorrow.

Yesterday's maximums varied from 97 degrees at Alton to 65 at Dalhart. Overnight, Dalhart had the state's coldest reading—81 degrees, while Brownsville's was 87.

A dust storm blew up in West Texas yesterday, whipping topsoil from the damaged Big Spring agricultural area into Wink, which previously had dust troubles of its own.

Europe Told They Must Start Now To Stand Alone

PARIS, April 2 UP—General Eisenhower has warned Europe to try to stand on its own feet because there is a limit to the amount of economic support America can give it.

In a report on his first year as top commander of Allied Forces in Europe, he said the tide is now flowing to the west in the cold war.

And he said the time has come for Europe to forget its national barriers and pool its resources.

Eisenhower put it this way: "America cannot keep on being the main source of arms for the west. That would be unsound from a military standpoint. Also America can't keep up for long its high foreign aid payments without endangering its own economy, which he said is vitally important for the western world."

In spite of the warning, however, Eisenhower said the United States favors military and economic support because, as he put it, "Most American people" do.

Ambassador To Russia To Take Oath Of Office

WASHINGTON, April 2 UP—America's new ambassador to Moscow, George Keenan, will be sworn in today.

The ceremony is scheduled at the State Department. Afterwards, the scholarly expert on Russian affairs will spend a day or two in Washington, then take a brief vacation before leaving for his post in Moscow. Keenan is expected to talk with Stalin and top Russian officials in an attempt to find whether the Russians are serious and sincere about their peace moves.

Government Tries To Take Control Safety Programs

ABILENE, March 26 (UPI)—Introduced in Congress would put industrial safety regulations and enforcement under control of the federal government through an expanded Labor Department, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce pointed out today.

Stassen On Ballot Topped By "Ike" And Taft With Write-Ins

The presidential flag of two United States Senators are flying high this morning in Wisconsin and Nebraska.

Republican Senator Robert Taft has won the Wisconsin presidential primary by taking 24 of the state's convention delegates to 6 for Governor Earl Warren of California and none at all for Harold Stassen.

In Nebraska, Taft and Gen. Eisenhower, both write-in candidates, staged a close race but at latest reports, Taft is leading in the popular vote and slowly increasing it. Both write-in candidates beat Harold Stassen who was on the ballot.

In the Democratic ranks, Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee emerged as the top man. He had a walkaway in the Wisconsin primary because his only opposition melted when President Truman announced he would not run again.

District Voters Return All Three Men As Directors

L. E. McGraw of Eastland and C. B. Pruet and Dr. J. M. Kendall of Ranger were returned to their offices as directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District in the election held yesterday in Eastland and Ranger.

Eastland voters turned out 243 strong at the courthouse to return them to their positions on the board. They were unopposed.

There were no write-in candidates at Eastland. On some of the Eastland ballots the names of one or more of the directors were scratched, but no write name was written in their place, there were also some mutilations reported among the very few that did not vote all out for the directors.

Sixty-seven Ranger voters turned out at the polls at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. All 67 of these voters were for the three men whose names appeared on the ballot, no scratches or write-ins were reported.

The Eastland County Water Supply District voters will again return to the polls and vote on the \$1,500,000 water bond issue April 22.

House Leader Believes Ike Should Quit

WASHINGTON, April 2 (UPI)—House Democratic leader John McCormack said the Eisenhower report "confirms" his belief that the general should take off his uniform and come home. He accused Eisenhower of renouncing his position as commander for "political reasons."

At the same time, backers of Sen. Robert Taft said the Ohio Republican could not have been referred to when Eisenhower spoke of "strong voices in America" who were against the Atlantic Pact and the idea of collective security.

They said Taft urged cooperation with Europe, even if he did vote against the pact. As for pro-Eisenhower men, they are hailing the report as a masterpiece of statesmanship.

Air National Guard Units Be Released

WASHINGTON, April 2 (UPI)—The Air Force announces that nearly all tactical Air National Guard units will be released between July 1st and next February.

The units, about 230 of them from 44 states and the District of Columbia, were called up following the outbreak of the Korean War. Each unit will be released after 21 months of active duty.

In Washington, a spokesman for Taft said the Senator is "very happy with the primary returns, that he will make a statement later today. The 'fighters for MacArthur' organization has thrown in the sponge. It's head, John Cappel, said he will swing behind Taft and urge a Taft-for-president MacArthur-for-a-vice-president Republican ticket.

Democratic voters in Wisconsin handed Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee an overwhelming victory over two pro-Truman candidates. And with the victory went 28 national Democratic convention votes for Kefauver.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the District on the 22nd day of April, 1952, for the purpose as set forth in the resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on the 21st day of March, 1952, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,500,000.00 BONDS PAYABLE FROM THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES AND THE PLEDGE OF REVENUES OF THE DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, Eastland County Water Supply District was created under Article XVI, Section 59 of the Constitution of Texas by Chapter 465, Acts of the Fifty-First Legislature, effective May 26, 1949; and

WHEREAS, said District, as created by the law just mentioned, included all of the territory then contained within the corporate limits of the City of Ranger, in Eastland County, Texas; and

WHEREAS, by an election held in the City of Eastland on January 31, 1952, and an order entered by the Commissioners' Court of Eastland County on February 4, 1952, all of the territory then contained in the City of Eastland, Eastland County, was annexed to the District so that all of the territory then contained in the City of Eastland thus became a part of said District; and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish the purpose for which said District was created, principally to provide a source of water supply for cities and other users for municipal, domestic and industrial purposes, it will be necessary to issue bonds payable from ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable property in the District and the revenues of the District; and

WHEREAS, an election should be held in the District for the purpose of authorizing the issuance of such bonds;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said Eastland County Water Supply District on the 22nd day of April, 1952, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the Board of Directors of Eastland County Water Supply District be authorized to issue the bonds of said District in the sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$1,500,000.00) Dollars, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Directors, the maximum maturity being not more than Forty (40) years from their date, for the purpose of providing a source of water supply for cities and other users for municipal, domestic and industrial purposes and by constructing or otherwise acquiring works, plants and other facilities for the purpose of processing such water and transporting it to cities and others for municipal, domestic and industrial purposes, and to levy and collect ad valorem taxes for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon and to pledge all or part of the net revenues of any one or more contracts for the sale of water and such other revenues as may be specified by resolution of the Board of Directors, as provided in the law creating said District?"

2. For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts, All of the territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct", and all of the territory of the District contained in the City of Eastland shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct".

3. (a) The election in the Ranger Precinct shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Ranger, Texas. Lee Duckery is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(b) The election in the Eastland precinct shall be held at the Eastland County Courthouse, in the City of Eastland, Texas. Billy C. Frost is hereby appointed as Presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant judge and two (2) clerks to assist him in holding said election.

4. That said election shall be held under the laws governing general elections except as otherwise provided in the law creating said District. Only legally qualified electors residing within said District who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote, and each elector shall vote only in the precinct of his residence.
