War Prisoners And Guards Injured in Car-Truck Wreck

Two motor vehicles, a car and truck, occupied by twenty people collided in Flagg Friday morning, with all but three of the occupants fortunately escaping with only minor injuries. The truck, driven by Mr. Pete Coke, headed west was occupied by two guards and fifteen Italian prisoners of war. The car, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Posie L. Cunningham and being driven by Mr. Cunningham, was going south, when the collision occurred at the road intersection in front of the Flagg store. All of the local people, Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham and Mr. Coke escaped injury, while five of the prisoners and two of the guards were not so fortunate. The injured prisoners and guards received emergency treatment at the Dimmitt Hospital for head and body injuries. The extent of their injuries had not been ascertained, however, when they were removed from the local hospital. It was reported that both vehicles were badly damaged in the collision and it was believed that the reason that more of the prisoners were not seriously injured was due to the fact that a heavy tarpaulin was drawn tight over the top of the truck body, breaking their fall, when they were thrown from the truck.

Local Soldier Gets Trip to States On Hospital Ship

A WEST COAST PORT, ENGLAND—Homeward bound, even though not for long, is the happy plight of soldiers stationed aboard one of the largest hospital ships in service—the "Larkspur," a former German cargo vessel recently redesignated for the Army Transportation Corps.

Among members of the hospital complement aboard as the Larkspur sailed recently from this port with 600 casualties was Sergeant Delbert W. Dieter of Dimmitt, Texas. Medical technicians care for the wounded during their passage back to the United States, and assist in handling the patients from hospital trains to and from the ship's wards.

Henry Timmons Is Injured In Explosion Today

Mr. Henry Timmons was painfully, and probably seriously, injured in an accident which occurred this evening at 7:00 o'clock, when an acetylene welding generator exploded, burning him about the face and head, and at least causing temporary loss of sight in one eye. He received emergency treatment at the Dimmitt Hospital and was then taken to Amarillo for treatment by an eye specialist.

The accident occurred while Mr. Timmons and Mr. P. C. Daniels were cleaning the acetylene generator preparatory to refilling it. The explosion was thought to be caused by a lighted match which Mr. Timmons was holding in his hand when he went near the empty container. Enough fumes remained in the generator to cause the explosion. Mr. Daniels was uninjured.

State Health Dept. Assists Recruiting of Technicians

Austin, Texas, Feb. 19—The Texas State Department of Health has been asked to assist in recruiting WAC Medical Technicians. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer believes that this offers a splendid opportunity to learn and be of real service to men recovering from battle wounds and illness in government general hospitals.

The first and most important qualification for hospital service is the earnest desire to render service to the sick and wounded soldiers in our Army hospitals. The applicant must be between the ages of 20 and 50 years. She must be a citizen of the United States. And she may be either single or married, but she must have no dependent children under 14 years of age. She must pass a physical examination before enlistment. The minimum educational requirement for enlistment is the completion of 2 years of high school or equivalent, such as business, vocational, or trade schools. She need not have previous medical experience; the Army will train her.

General hospitals located in Texas are Harmon, Longview; Ashburn, McKinney; McCloskey, Temple; Brooke, San Antonio; William Beaumont, El Paso. Women enlisted under this program will be assigned, after completion of training, to the hospital selected at the time of enlistment.

It is expected that at least 17 platoons of 15 each will be recruited in Texas. Applications can be secured at any county seat post office.

At least 85 per cent of the women recruited under this program will be trained and used as technicians. A small number may be used in clerical and administrative capacities. Women will, therefore, be recruited for duty with a WAC General Hospital Company.

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE, HANDLING, TRANSPORTATION, AND STORAGE OF ANY FORM OF MANUFACTURED OR LIQUEFIED PETROLEUM GASES; FIXING INSPECTION FEES; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS. BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL (BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS) OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS:

Section 1. That all persons, firms, or corporations who may, from and after the effective date of this ordinance, install or equip any residence, business house or apartment house, or any other building located and situated within the corporate limits of the City of Dimmitt with any installation or equipment designed to use as fuel any form of manufactured or liquefied petroleum gases, shall use in any such installation, whether for domestic or industrial use, only standard grade of pipe or piping, and all appliances used in connection with any such installation shall be a standard grade and type of equipment. Any system which uses any form of manufactured or liquefied petroleum gases must bear the label of approval or listing of the Underwriter's Laboratories. The storage of any liquefied petroleum gases in any individual customer size container, either above ground or underground is prohibited inside of or underneath any building in the corporate limits; and no equipment using liquefied petroleum gases shall be permitted within the fire limits of said City; and no equipment used for the purpose of storing quantities of such gases either for wholesale or retail shall be permitted within the corporate limits of the City.

Section 2. The term "Standard Grade" as used herein shall mean that grade of article which is accepted by dealers in any such equipment and recognized as complying with all fire law regulations.

Section 3. Any such equipment as provided for shall be installed or repaired, in a workmanlike manner which shall comply with all laws and the regulations of the City, the regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters and the regulations recommended by the National Fire Protection Association.

Section 4. When any such equipment is installed as herein provided, same shall not be placed in operation or used unless and until said installation has been approved, as complying with this ordinance, by the City Secretary.

Section 5. Any person, firm or corporation installing any such equipment as herein provided shall secure the approval of same as complying with the requirements of this ordinance by the City Secretary, as herein provided for, and shall, upon requesting such inspection for approval, pay an inspection fee of \$1.00, for each piece of equipment, to cover cost of inspection.

Section 6. All tank trucks and tank trailers used for the transportation of liquefied petroleum gases within the City shall be so constructed and operated as to comply with the regulations for the design, construction and operation of automobile tank trucks and tank trailers for the transportation of liquefied petroleum gases as approved by the National Board of Fire Underwriters and the National Fire Protection Association. Any person, firm or corporation who shall operate or cause to be operated any tank truck or tank trailer used for the purpose of transporting liquefied petroleum gas within the corporate limits of the City shall keep any such equipment in good condition at all times, and upon the development of any defect that would create a hazard to persons or property, said tank truck or tank trailer shall be removed from the streets of the City until such defects have been repaired, or faulty equipment replaced; and any such tank trucks and tank trailers shall be subject to inspection by the proper authorities at any time. No tank truck or tank trailer shall be stored, parked or operated upon any street within the fire limits; nor shall they be stored or repaired inside or outside of any building within the fire limits as defined by ordinance.

Section 7. All liquefied petroleum gas sold within the City shall be treated with a malodorant in such quantities as required by State law to create an odor easily detected in case of leaks in piping or equipment.

Section 8. In the event any section or part of section or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not effect the valid portions hereof, which shall be enforceable regardless of such holding.

Section 9. The fact there does not now exist any rule or ordinance regulating and controlling the installation or use of manufactured or liquefied petroleum gases within the corporate limits of the City of

Dimmitt, which said gases are highly volatile and inflammable and if not properly controlled and regulated constitute a dangerous and hazardous condition affecting life and property, creates an emergency and imperative necessity for the immediate preservation of the public welfare and safety, which necessitates the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read on three separate days before the final passage thereof, and that no ordinance shall become effective before the expiration of ten days from the time of its final passage; wherefore such rules are hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be effective from and after its final passage, and it is so ordained.

A LASTING RECORD

Dr. Jacobs of Oglethorpe University created a crypt of civilization to preserve in it the twentieth century's scientific and cultural progress for the dwellers on earth some 6000 years from now. To be opened May twenty-eighth, year of 8113 high noon. The crypt of civilization is a room twenty feet long, ten feet wide and ten feet high, beneath the Oglethorpe Administration Building and enclosed by granite three feet thick on all sides. In it have been stored nearly a million pages of Literature, ranging from Corpus Jevies Civilis to the Important American Joke Book. It contains working models of trains, ships, airplanes, and automobiles, miniature models of clothing styles of '40, bottles of Coca-cola and beer. Also in the crypt are recordings of President Roosevelt, eleven hours of them, addresses by Mussolini and Hitler, and motion-picture films of various present day events, such as the German army entering Austria and some of the recent Oglethorpe commencements. There are musical recordings of grand opera and sweet swing. The book pages have been reduced to microfilm to save space, and sealed in glass jars, surrounded by asbestos and placed in stainless steel cylinders.

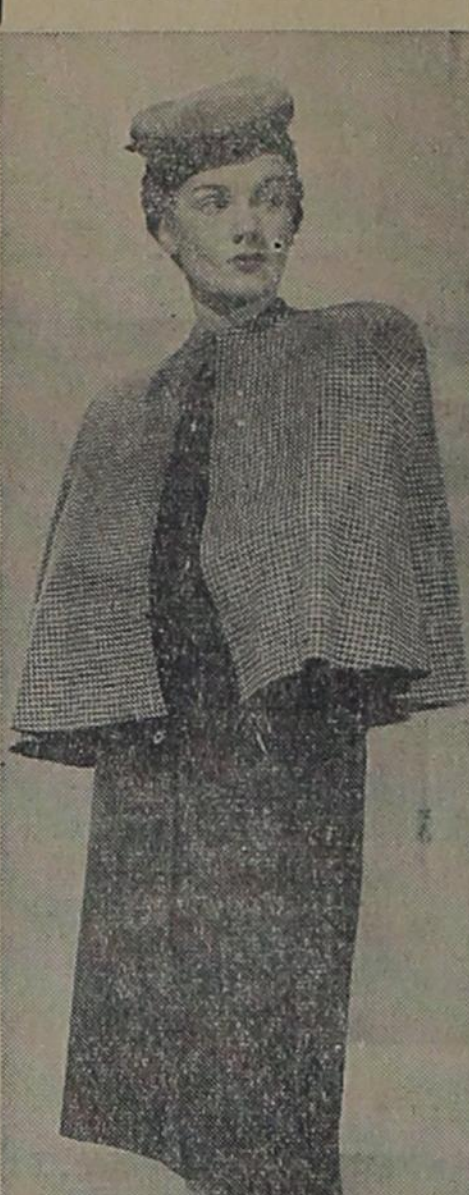
