

Earthquake **Felt From Texas** To Nebraska

Southwesterners are recovering from the shakes today . . . earthquake shakes. And they are asking what caused ground tremors yes-terday that shook the mid and outhwestern part of the United States, all the way from Nebraska to Texas.

The answer has been provided by seismologists. They say the quake was caused by a massive underground mountain range. The Nemaha, shifting itself about four inches. The vast Nemaha Range extends from Nebraska to Oklahoma and the men who study earthquake phenomena say it shifted from one end to the other.

The Reverend Joseph Downey, eismologist of Regis College i actually was lucky. He estimates that the epicenter of the quake probably was north of Oklahoma City. 
