The driver tried to have officers meet his bus at the terminal in Houston but a mix up signal sent police to the wrong bus station. Kassinger says the man walked away without entering the bus station.

The search is continuing for Chick and another convict, George Theodorou, the only two that remain at large of four who escaped Tuesday night.

Attorneys Select Jury In Parsons Slaying Trial

EL PASO, May 15 (UP)—Attorneys are questioning a special 87-man venire in an attempt to complete a jury to decide the sanity of Mrs. Mary Jean Parsons.

Mrs. Parsons is accused of murdering her soldier bridegroom of six weeks, Lieutenant Richard O. Parsons, in their El Paso apartment last February 16th. Thirteen men have been qualified out of 52 veniremen questioned during the first two days of the trial. The special 87-man panel was called after the earlier one was exhausted. And 32 men will be qualified for the jury with 12 of the 32 to be chosen to try the case.

Attorneys for the Tulsa, Oklahoma socialists contend that she was insane at the time of the killing and is insane now.

Ex-RJC Ranger Takes Hurdles At Commerce

COMMERCE, May (Special)—Jerry Cook, ex-Ranger Junior College track and basketball star, won a first and second as East Texas State took the track championship of the Lone Star Conference Saturday at Bonham.

Cook won the high hurdles and placed second in the lows. He is also a pole vaulter, but he spiked himself vaulting in practice and was held out of this event. He pulled a muscle shortly after the close of the basketball season, and this was his first competition on the cinders.

The Lions of Coach Joe Taylor piled up 74 points for a wide margin over defending champion Southwest Texas with 40. Stephen F. Austin tallied 19 for third place. Sam Houston trailed with 17, followed by Sul Ross with 12 and Lamar Tech with 2.

Airman Helps Police Break Dope Rackets

ODESSA, May 15 (UP)—An Air Force man on furlough went undercover to help Odessa police set a trap which broke up a narcotics ring in the city.

Eight Negroes have been arrested and 22 "sticks" of marijuana seized. Police Chief J. J. Heaton says the unidentified airman purchased marijuana at the home of one of the suspects with marked money. And waiting officers closed in on the suspect as he sold the dope to the undercover agent.

Three Boys Are Charged With Chicken Theft

A. C. Yeager, special Ranger for the West Texas Cattle Growers Association, has reported several law violations. Three boys have been arrested on charges of chicken theft. Hearing will likely be had this week.

Careless hunters are also a constant source of trouble. Some cars may not be carelessness, it is thought, but rather premeditated. Another dead calf was found by a Ranger this week, and the case is being investigated.

H. B. Gray Well Makes Showing

A well on the Newham, about 12 miles north of Ranger, just west of the Caddo Highway, known as the H. B. Gray, and others, on Section 44, Block 6, T&P Railway Survey, is in the process of completion, and is a potential producer. A favorable showing has been made.

The well was drilled to about 1840 feet with rotary, and then swabbed with cable tools.

New Commander Cracks Down On Koje POW's

House To Vote On Tidelands Bill Today

WASHINGTON, May 15 (UP)—The House is cleared for some action on Capitol Hill.

The controversial bill to give the states control of the oil tidelands comes up for a vote in the House. And supporters are confident of easy passage.

Backers of a new GI Bill of Rights predict early passage of the measure designed to aid Korean war veterans. The bill, which will cost the taxpayers one-billion dollars a year, provides free school, and government-guaranteed loans.

The Senate Democratic leader indicates floor debate will begin within a few days on the almost seven-billion dollar foreign aid bill. Yesterday the Senate Armed Services Committee voted down a move to trim 400-million more dollars from the measure. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee already had cut the bill by one-billion dollars, and that's the way it will go to the Senate floor.

Truman Defends Farm Program

WASHINGTON, May 15 (UP)—President Truman made a speech which reminded listeners of his 1948 campaign today.

The nation's top Democrat attacked what he called the "mass-backs" who oppose his farm policies.

He threw out as "plain hokum" charges that the administration's farm program is socialistic. He said that "actually, what he has been doing is the very opposite of socialism."

The President spoke at a gathering in honor of 149 Agriculture Department employees cited for outstanding service.

Said the President: "any time a government employee does something wrong, it makes the headlines. But when government employees do something good, it's just a commonplace thing that people never hear about."

Corinth Church Plans Cemetery Work Saturday

There will be an all-day cemetery working at the Corinth Baptist Church, west of Cisco, on Saturday, May 17. Interested parties are requested to be present. Dinner will be served at noon, it was stated.

Deacon In Hospital At Cisco, And Pastor In Jail, After Shooting

Disagreement over church matters resulted in the shooting of one deacon of the Cisco (Col.) Baptist church, and the jailing of the pastor, P. T. Gee, Wednesday evening.

According to a statement made by Sheriff Tucker, who went to the scene, the pastor had told certain members that they could meet in the church, for certain purposes. Earlier in the evening individuals began to gather, when about 9:30 the pastor entered the door and opened fire on Deacon Patterson, with a shotgun.

BULLETIN

The House has overwhelmingly approved a controversial bill to give states title to the oil-rich submerged lands off their coasts. The roll call vote of 248 to 89 was 23 more votes than the two-thirds majority required to override a presidential veto. Opponents of the bill hope the president will veto this measure as he did a similar bill in 1946. The measure, which is a Senate-House compromise now goes to the Senate, which is expected to act on it within a few days.

Several Speeches Scheduled Today For Politicians

Political leaders are making speeches today.

Republican Gov. Earl Warren of California and Democratic Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee are in Oregon, campaigning for delegates in tomorrow's state primary.

Another Republican, Gen. Douglas MacArthur is in Michigan today, addressing a joint session of the Michigan House of Representatives at 8 o'clock EST (7 o'clock CST) tonight.

In Chicago, the executive committee of the Democratic Party will sit down to choose a keynote, the opening speaker at the Democratic National Convention.

The group also will name a sub-committee on platform and resolutions to write a preliminary draft of the 1952 platform.

Michigan's 46 Republican national convention delegates have given their first public indication of who they prefer for president, even though they go to the Chicago convention uncommitted. More than half of the state's delegates answering a United Press poll showed 11 preferred Gen. Eisenhower, nine wanted Sen. Taft and six were non-committal.

More Wind In Store For State

High winds lashed Texas yesterday and more of the same is in prospect for today.

The wind, which blew as hard 44 miles per hour in Dallas, was responsible for the death of 55-year-old Arnold McCall, McCall fell four stories when a gust caught his wheelbarrow on a construction job above ground level.

The winds yesterday were lighter in West Texas and only East Texas—particularly the Tyler area—reported any blowing dust. But weathermen say the winds will be stronger and will raise dust in West Texas today.

Otherwise, fair and partly cloudy weather will continue with temperatures in the 90's and 100's. No rain is predicted for today or tomorrow and weathermen say there isn't any indication of when Texas may have moisture.

Aircraft Worker Killed In Lake Near Ft. Worth

FORT WORTH, May 15 (UP)—A 20-year-old Fort Worth aircraft worker has been killed when he broke his neck diving into shallow water at Burger's Lake near Fort Worth.

The victim is Carl E. Gierty, Jr., who was swimming with a girl friend, 18-year-old Katye Draper. Miss Draper says Gierty was a good swimmer but slipped and dove head-first into about two feet of water.

Self Styled Yogis Guilty Smuggling Dope, Court Finds

BROWNSVILLE, May 15 (UP)—Two self-styled yogi practitioners are going to jail for smuggling marijuana.

The men are Eugene Webster Moore and Calvin Joseph Carroll who were convicted yesterday in federal district court. But Moore and Carroll prefer to be called by their yogi names of "Ahmed Rasool" and "Ab Yusuf Al-Ai Rasool." When arrested they complained that the "vibrations" were wrong leading to their arrest.

And they acted on their own counsel during the trial, frequently interrupting Judge James V. Allred with such legal remarks as "object to that line of questioning, your honor," and "that's irrelevant."

But the men evidently needed more experienced defense. Judge Allred will pass sentence later.

House Approves Billion Plus For Armed Services

WASHINGTON, May 15 (UP)—The House Appropriations Committee has approved an extra one-billion-475-thousand dollars for this fiscal year. Most of the money will make up for what the committee calls an urgent deficiency in military funds caused by the Korean War.

However, even with the additional funds, the Army will have to dip into next year's funds in advance. This fiscal year ends June 30th.

The committee says Korean casualties have been lower and reenlistments higher than anticipated. Thus military strength is running ahead of plans. And this requires more money for payroll and other expenses.

The House group says regular fiscal 1952 appropriations provided for an average army strength of one million 531-thousand men, while the deficiency funds will allow an average strength almost one million 576-thousand men. Actually the Army strength will average some 15,000 more men than this.

General And Mrs. Ike Dine With Queen Elizabeth, 2nd

LONDON, May 15 (UP)—Gen. Eisenhower and his wife had lunch with Queen Elizabeth the Second at Buckingham Palace today.

The retiring Atlantic Pact Commander is in London for a farewell visit to Britain before coming home to campaign for the Republican presidential nomination.

Congressmen To Probe Incident

KOJE ISLAND, May 15 (UP)—The Communist prisoners of war on Kojé Island got the word today, from the new camp commander.

Brigadier General Hayden Boatner told them bluntly: "Prisoners of war do not negotiate."

Boatner, a soldier of the old school, told them they might as well stop making demands right now, because under the Geneva POW Convention none of the demands held water.

Apparently, Boatner says, the Reds "are getting this place and Panmunjon, the site of the truce talks, "mixed up."

Boatner says the prisoners will get fair treatment all down the line. But he intends to punish violators of prison regulations.

Whether he plans to punish the Reds who seized the former camp commander, Brigadier General Francis Dodd, Boatner doesn't say.

But it was obvious on Kojé today that Boatner wasn't fooling.

When he drove by a group of guards in his jeep and they failed to salute him, he got out and gave them a tongue lashing. And while he was talking to newsmen, a prisoner tried to escape. Newsmen heard five shots, and an officer reported to Boatner: "we got him." The prisoner was wounded in the leg.

The Supreme Allied Command, General Mark Clark, is giving full support to Boatner's get-tough policy. Clark has completely repudiated the concessions made for the release of General Dodd. He says the man who made the concessions, Brigadier General Charles Colson, acted without authority.

Congressmen in Washington are calling for an investigation of the Kojé Island incident. Democratic representative Mike Mansfield of Montana says he will introduce a resolution today asking for an investigation by the House Armed Services Committee.

State Department Expediting West German Treaty

The State Department is working against time in its effort to get the proposed West German peace pact signed and approved before Congress adjourns in July.

Diplomats believe the United States must act quickly to ratify the agreements because the Communists want to block them.

The Russians are trying already. They have called a slow-down on the movement of freight trucks carrying industrial goods across the International Highway between West Berlin and West Germany. The Russians imposed their new slow-down, yesterday, and last night more than 100 trailer-trucks were tied up before the West Berlin barrier. Today the number is down to between 40 and 50.

The Russians say they are searching for contraband, the Allies say they are putting the pressure on, to scare West Germany out of its pact with the West.

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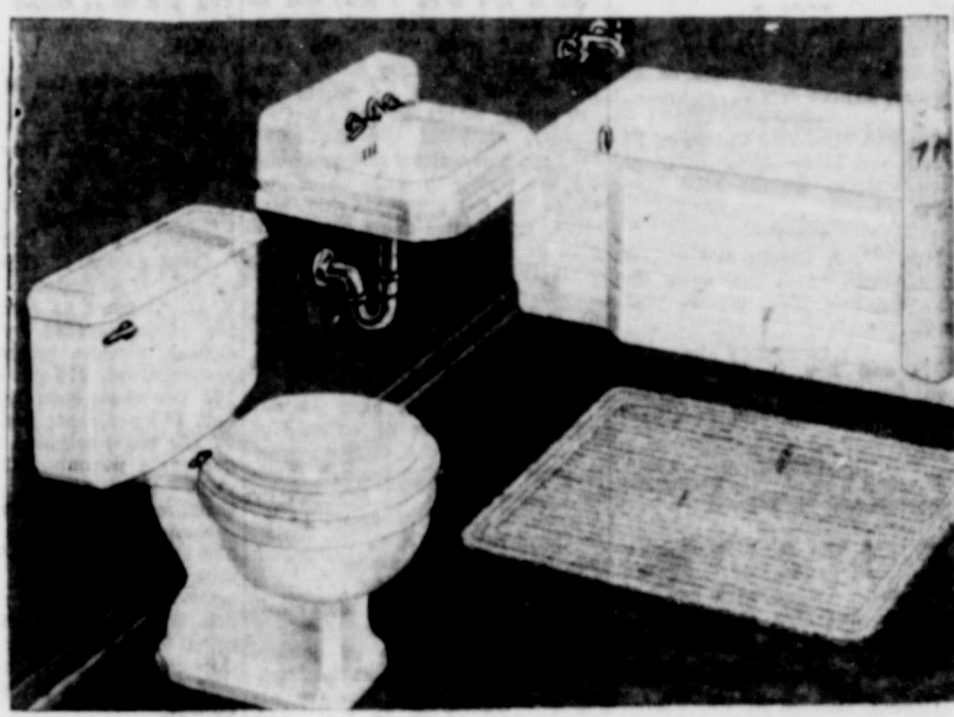

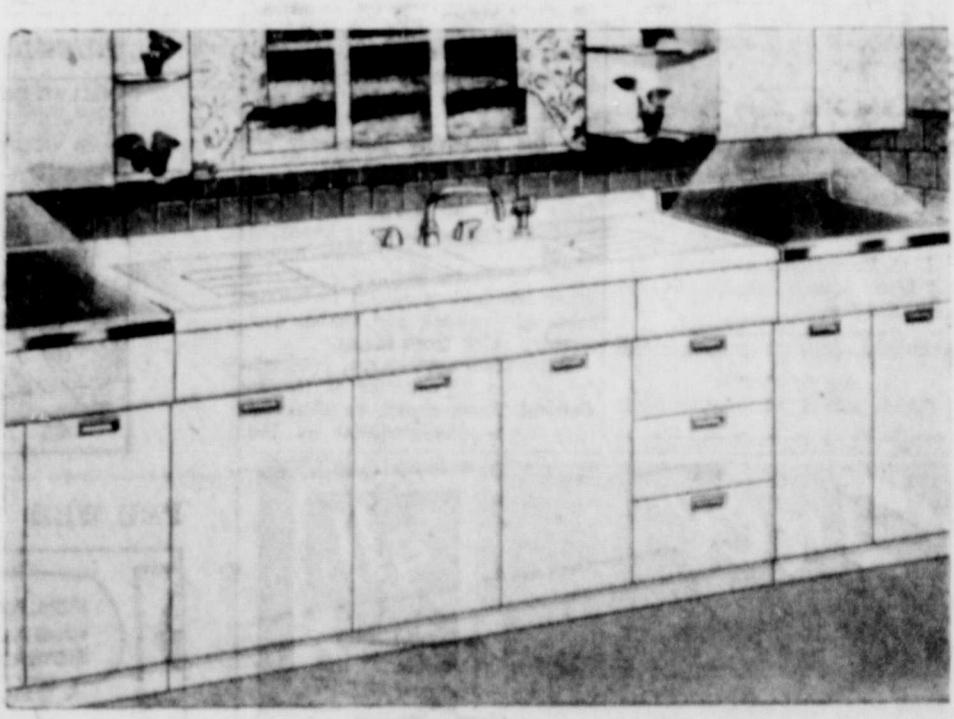

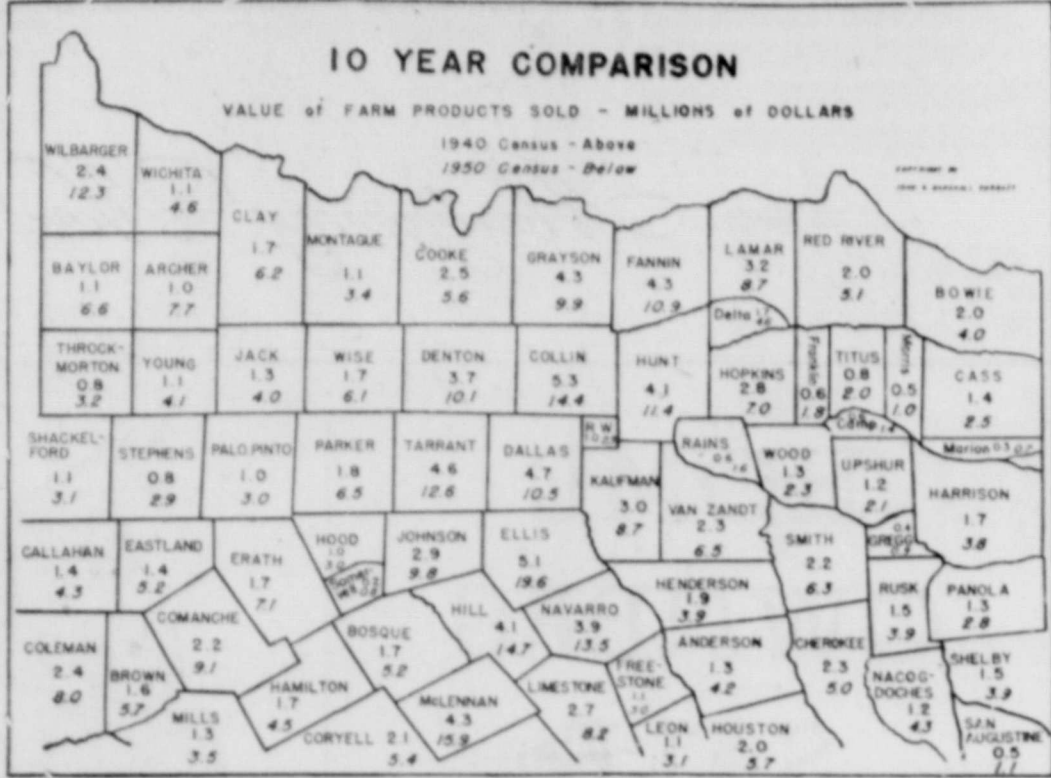

FARM AND RANCH PROSPERITY IS THE BASIS FOR ALL WEALTH

By John E. Surratt and Marshall E. Surratt

Upon the request of newspaper publishers and editors of this area, this map on farm and ranch income has been reproduced so that you, the men and women, boys and girls who build your home community may have a better understanding of where we are going, where we can go. Ordinarily, statistics are dry, dull reading. The writers and your editor are trying to make these statistics on the accompanying map alive, truly vital facts that will give a clearer understanding of what is happening and that will inspire the young people to want to build better and finer home communities. Special permission has been given your editor to publish the copyrighted map.

We, the writers, have as our work the building of cities. But we are convinced that cities grow only as the farm and ranch family prospers. And we are equally convinced that whether we go up or down depends upon our young people and the inspiration which we can instill in them. These figures on the map merit your careful study. And although they are in millions of dollars, they do not indicate that the farmer is getting rich at the expense of the rest of us. In fact, such prosperity as is enjoyed by the farmer or rancher and his family is the basis for such wealth as comes to the rest of us. Admitted of course that the rest of us have been in recent years also reaping temporary war-contract dollars in some communities, and in this part of the country enjoying the relatively temporary oil and gas production dollar.

The figures on the map show sales from all farm and ranch products during the year reported at such census—including crops, dairy products, poultry products, other livestock products including sales of livestock and timber and nursery sales from farms.

Sales from agricultural products for all the 71 counties of North-Central Texas shown on the map rose from \$137,985,000 at the

expenses being way ahead of increases in the prices of the things which the farmer had to sell. On the single item of hired labor the 1940 cost to the farmer was \$16,879,000 at the time of the 1940 Census. Ten years later, \$62,596,000 was the amount these farmers paid out for hired labor. Every other expense for the farmer went up in like manner. Dairy farms faced great obstacles during war years, with price controls on dairy products and greatly increased feed and livestock costs cutting into the dairy farmer's profit. Milk prices between the years on the map increased 136 per cent, cream went up 151 per cent at the cost of a milk cow went to 247 per cent and the total outlay for feed in this area for a livestock and

poultry went up 372 per cent. A 248 per cent increase in the price of beef cattle caused many farmers to go into the cattle business in a big way. For this North-Central Texas area, however, the chief increase was from 1940 to 1945, with a decrease in number of battle between 1945 and 1950 due to the fact that there were too many cattle on too few acres of pasture, with much of this poor pasture. During that period the total cost of feed for all livestock and poultry increased from \$11,508,000 at the 1940 census to \$56,224,000 at the 1950 Census. More efficiency in our farming, better educated farmers, better markets for our farm products hard-surfaced roads to get the farmer and his family to school, church and market—all are needed for greater prosperity in this area. City and farm people must work together to get these. And our boys and girls, with our encouragement, are the ones to see the job done.

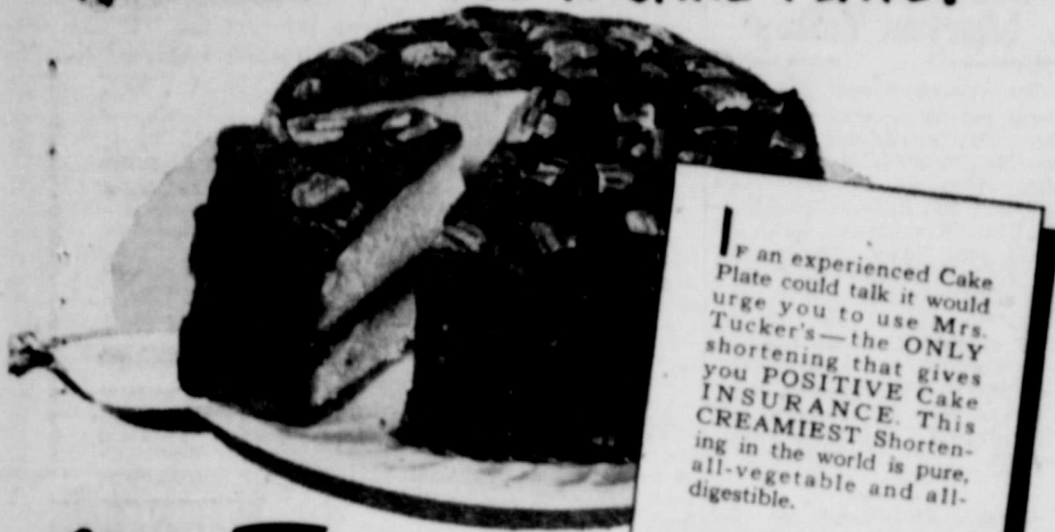

Many people do not know that most refined sugar sold in this country is American grown. This of course, includes Hawaii, an American territory, now occupying the same status that Oklahoma and New Mexico held prior to statehood.

Texas produces very little raw sugar, though the C&H and other sugar refiners do much refining in Texas and California. Louisiana and Florida are rather heavy producers, and contribute heavily to the nation's sugar supply. One of the largest refiners is the C&H Company whose largest plant is in California. During the war, when subs were active off the west coast, this raw Hawaiian product was shipped by rail to Texas and Louisiana refineries. For a while only C&H sugar was available in the western portion of the nation, including a portion of Texas.

Navy Announces Atomic Sub

One atomic submarine—coming up. The Navy says the keel of the "Nautilus"—the first atomic-powered sub, will be laid sometime in June. The sub will be built at the Electric Boat Company in Groton, Connecticut. The Navy refuses to give any other information about the building of the sub. Power of Attorney Explained By Bar

There are only two ways to get a thing done. You do it yourself or get someone to do it for you. When you get someone to act for you he is your agent. This right to represent you may be given orally or in writing.

It is best to have the agency relationship carefully defined and written down. When written, the document often takes the form of a "Power of Attorney."

Any person legally competent to act for himself may give to another power of attorney to act in his place. With the growth and expansion of business it is difficult for one man to handle the variety of complex tasks that come his way. It is more expedient to delegate power and responsibility to others, thus giving such persons authority to make binding contracts in his name.

The person who delegates the power is called the principal, and the person to whom the authority is given is the agent. Third persons can deal with a properly authorized agent with the knowledge that the law will enforce the obligation against the principal.

The law sets up two broad classes of agents—special and general. Most agents are special agents—that is, they have specific authority to do only certain things. When a person is named in a power of attorney as a general agent, he is authorized to act in all proper cases as if the principal were acting in person.

For example: A citizen-soldier leaves home to go to war. He needs someone to represent him while he is away. He names such a person—usually a parent, wife, or trusted friend—in a power of attorney, giving this person specific powers or a general power

QUESTION: After driving or prolonged rains the antique brick veneer finish of my home becomes saturated and water runs behind the veneer to the sill and eventually into the basement. Should I apply a sealer to the brick, or provide drip holes at the sill line? —A. W. N., West Englewood, N. J.

ANSWER: Using a sealer on the brick is good practice to preserve them against deterioration. Also, "weep holes" are a good idea to prevent rot of the sill. These may be drilled through the brick at the sill line, squared off with a cold chisel. Air admitted through these holes will help dry up the saturated wood.

QUESTION: Can you tell me of a preparation to clean a discolored bath tub? The stains are apparently just on the surface, but solid abrasive cleaning powders do not seem to remove the stains. —S. L. Gardner, Mass.

ANSWER: First try some of the bleaching liquids such as ammonia used straight, chlorine solution, lemon-juice-with-salt, trisodium phosphate, or sodium citrate. Wet a cloth with these, press over the stains, let stand a while, then rinse. A portion of any one of these mixed with whiting and glycerine and spread over the stains and let stand until dry may do the trick. Finally, try powdered pumice scrubbed over the area with a few drops of water as a lubricant. These should work on porcelain tubs—but may wear through the enamel-on-metal style tubs.

QUESTION: I wish to replace a rotted sill in an attic window. Can this be done without removing the whole frame? —C. J., Garfield Heights, Ohio

ANSWER: It is possible to do the job this way, but since sill and frame are usually nailed together at several points, removal of the frame and starting over is the quickest and best way.

to act in his behalf. If the soldier wants to sell his home while overseas, he can give such agent the power to sell the home, and may limit the agent's authority to this one matter. When this agent begins negotiations for the sale, the prospective buyer can, by an examination of the power of attorney, know exactly what authority the agent has.

If the person is given a general power of attorney, he can transact all the serviceman's business as though the soldier were home to act for himself. Suppose the soldier owns a store and wants someone to run it while he is away. He may authorize this person through a power of attorney



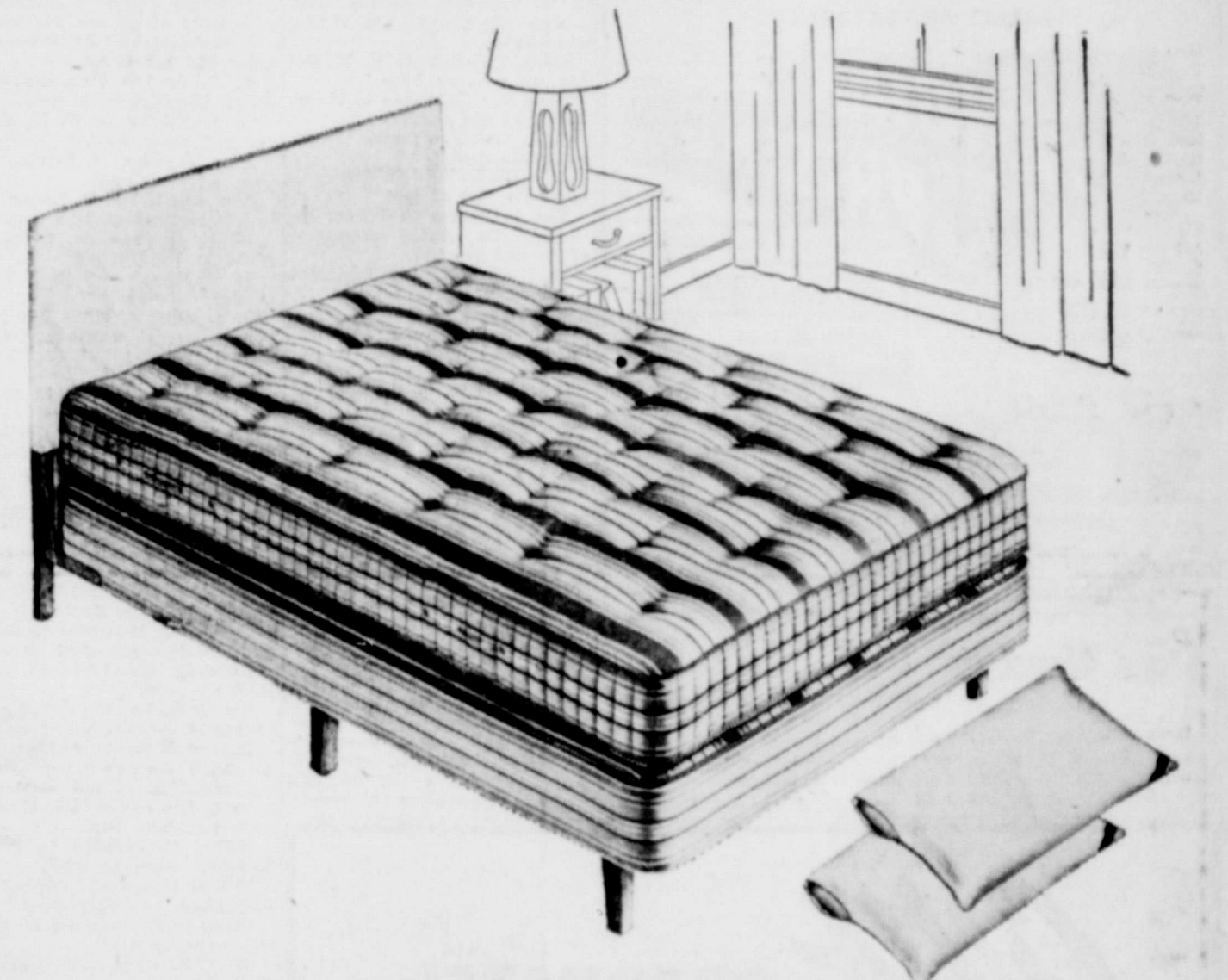
