In today's edition, a number of the merchants and other persons of Ranger are trying to show the graduates of the various schools of the city that they are not forgotten.

We have tried to get all the names of the graduates of the various schools in town along with their programs so that everyone may know these young men and women who have worked so hard, and will either go to higher fields of work in school, or go their chosen way after they leave school.

While the senior class is the smallest group of graduates from the high school in a number of years, there is hope in the numbers that are graduating from the junior high and the grade schools, that our school will increase in number in its classes.

One consolation at the moment is that we are better off in the water predicament than Eastland. They have so little water left that they are drilling water wells to secure an added source during the drought.

The Eastland city fathers have authorized the drilling of 10 shallow wells near the south spillways of the city lake. The first one was completed yesterday, and was estimated that it would produce somewhere in the vicinity of 40,000 gallons per day.

Ten such wells would give them 400,000 gallons, but less than their daily consumption. They plan to pump this water into the city reservoir and from there to the filtration plant to be purified.

If this well water they are trying to get tastes any better than the lake water—they should by pass the lake. Our water receives its quota of complaints, but it tastes like champagne in our estimation, compared with the taste of Eastland's fluid of life.

Maybe we should all chip in and go to the dam site of the new proposed lake and start building, while things are being negotiated over the sale of the bonds and other formalities.

We're getting worried about where the water for the next few months is coming from for Ranger.

That lake is something that cannot be allowed to fail to become a reality, and the people and the directors of the water district will not let it fail.

We took a tour through the telephone exchange here yesterday, and found out what is going with the telephone subscribers money.

Jury Selection In Parsons Case Going Slowly

PASO, May 16 (UP)—The selection of jurors for the sanity trial of 21-year-old Mary Jean Parsons is moving slowly in El Paso.

The Tulsa, Okla., socialite is accused of the murder of her husband, L. Richard O. Parsons, in the couple's El Paso apartment last February 16th.

Seven more men must be qualified for the panel before attorney's begin picking a 12-man jury for the sanity hearing. Twelve prospective jurors were qualified yesterday after the initial panel of 53 men was exhausted and all but 13 excused.

Mrs. Parsons' attorneys say the woman was insane when her husband was killed and is insane now. She will escape trial for murder if the jury judges her insane but will be placed in a mental institution.

Social Security Checks Arrive; Many Are Aided

Checks for insurance payments under Federal social security went to 706 aged persons, children and their widowed mothers in Eastland county for December, 1951. These payments amounted to \$20,690.00 in the county for that month.

In releasing these figures today, Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, also said that these monthly payments under the old age and survivors insurance system amounted to \$130,831 for the 16-county area served by the Abilene office, and went to 4,670 persons. "Without these payments earned by workers under this contributory system, the ability of many people to pay for necessities would have been drastically curtailed or entirely ended," he said.

More than one-third of all people over 65 in the United States who could not count on income from work for support, were getting social security insurance benefits.

Fisher pointed out that this federal program is affording substantial survivor insurance protection. Three out of every four mothers and young children in the nation are now assured of monthly payments if the insured breadwinner of the family dies.

In this connection, he cited monthly payments totaling \$39,659 to 1,277 children and 298 widowed mothers in the Abilene area. These monthly payments are going to families deprived of earned income by the death of the working member of the family. They are making it possible to keep families together, and keep children in school. They are, at the same time, lessening the drain on both public and private welfare funds.

De-Controls Set For Today Will Be Kept In Force

WASHINGTON, May 16 (UP)—Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall has decided to hold up orders which would have suspended ceiling prices on raw cotton and most textiles.

The orders have been drawn up and were to be issued today, but officials are still wary of what de-control might do to cotton prices.

The planned de-control fits into a general trend toward relaxing economic controls. Price officials say that present indications are that ceilings will soon come off whiskey and clothing without hurting the consumers' pocketbook.

Union Heads Say Men Won't Go To Work, Same Pay

Everyone is hunting for industrial peace, but no one expects to find it immediately.

Leaders in the oil strike see little chance of quick settlement of the 17-day-old strike which has idled 90,000 workers. But government negotiating teams are standing by at hundreds of negotiating talks across the country.

O. A. Knight of Denver, president of the CIO Oil Workers Union repudiated a statement attributed to him yesterday in Washington. The statement reportedly was, "we are calling off the strike."

Today, Knight says—"striking workers are not expected to return to work until they have agreements giving them the full amount of wage increases approved by the wage stabilization board." That comes to 15 cents an hour.

Most companies are optimistic. Two settlements were reached yesterday and two companies speak of possible agreements today. However, all negotiations are local—there's no nationwide bargaining in the oil strike.

In the steel situation, CIO President Philip Murray says there are "no negotiations whatsoever" in sight with steel operators. And Murray—on hand for the CIO's convention at Philadelphia—hints that no negotiations are in sight.

Guinea Pigs
A strike at Pearl River, New York, has brought on the invention of "Aperation lettuce."

A helicopter and a Piper Cub are flying in fresh food to some 400 scientists, who stayed in a strikebound laboratory of the American Cyanamid Company to carry on experiments and feed thousands of experimental guinea pigs.

AF of L Chemical Workers walked out Wednesday to back up wage demands.

The planes carrying food over the picket lines to the scientists also were loaded with a cargo of snails and lettuce for the strike-

Members of the Oilworkers International Union (CIO) have gone back to work at the American Liberty Oil Company Refinery at Mount Pleasant without any raise.

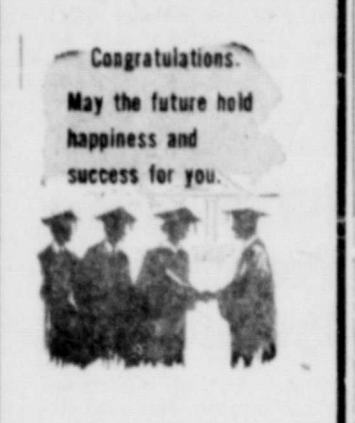
Russell Allen, the firm's director of industrial relations, says the company will continue to bargain with the workers as required by law. But he says the company has made no commitments.

The refinery had been in operation during the strike, largely with supervisory personnel. And about 50 of the 150 striking employees found they had no jobs when they reported for work yesterday. About 15 or 20 positions were eliminated, Allen says, "because we found out we'd been overmanned and the jobs were unnecessary."

The union contract expired February 15th and the employees went out as part of the nationwide oil strike which began 16 days ago.
