WASHINGTON, May 16 (UP) -Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall has decided to hold up orders which would have suspended ceiling prices on raw cotton and most textiles. The orders have been drawn up and were to be issued today, but officials are still wary of what decontrol might do to cotton prices.

The planned de-control fits into a general trend toward relaxing economic controls. Price officials say that present indications are that ceilings will soon come off whiskey and clothing without hurting the consumers' pocketbook.
