SEEN OR HEARD

Polio Rumors In Ranger Have Not One Ounce Truth

Rumors would have the city of Ranger in the throes of a polio epidemic, of which there is none according to the city health officer, Dr. W. C. Harris.

Dr. Harris said that only one actual case of polio had been reported in Ranger this year, which was not unusual, nor could it be classified as an epidemic.

Dr. Harris did say that there is quite a bit of illness attributed to stomach disorders that some people may have diagnosed as the early stages of polio, but which they find out in a few days were not.

Dr. Harris mentioned a few things that might be done to prevent any outbreak of the disease here in the future. He reaffirmed facts made known by the National Foundation as to cleaning up any contaminated areas, or filth that might be lying around, and don't get tired out or run down.

Harris said good diets and plenty of rest will do more, along with cleanliness, toward preventing an outbreak of polio than any other thing.

In other words, make Junior eat his cereal and take a nap to keep him from getting exhausted. Or in the case of sickness that might leave your body in a weakened condition, do something to overcome the sickness and restore your body strength.

Harris did say that if we had an outbreak of polio in Ranger, to stay put and not run away. Lead a normal life, avoid only large crowds with which you do not associate in your daily life. If you run away you might run into another "strain", and defeat your own purpose, as well as be a carrier.

Just don't allow yourself to become "run down", eat plenty of good food, and get an adequate amount of rest, and you will probably be doing all that you can to avoid the disease.

There is a remote possibility that we might be able to continue to get by with what water we can catch in our present reservoir, at our present population level of less than nothing added that would use a large amount of water. But who wants to just exist? Why not make room for progress? And if we want to progress we're not going to do it without water.

Now that we have a little water in sight some of us will probably forget how we once worried about the water situation.

We can't afford to do that. We must go on with our plans for a new lake as if it had not rained, and no prospect of rain in sight. Because we have seen what a short time without rainfall can do to our town.

Take Eastland—they weren't as lucky as Ranger. They may have gotten a little more than a month's supply of water in their pond. You can bet they won't forget.

When the time comes to vote on a water contract for Ranger to buy water from the water district, turn out as we did for the bond issue, and get the thing passed so we can get right down to business.

Mother, Daughter Found Drowned In Stephens Co. Tank

Two persons, a 35-year-old Abilene mother and her four-year-old daughter, were discovered dead Saturday morning in a cattle tank on the Lee Burgess ranch in the northeast corner of Stephens county.

Sheriff Tom Offield reported tracks, apparently the mother's, leading to the tank were found, but none of the child's were visible. The water is estimated at about 15 feet in depth.

Mrs. Mable Davis and Marsha Gallyn Davis were discovered about 7:45 a. m. Saturday by Mrs. Davis' brother, Lee Burgess, who lives on the farm with his mother, Mrs. Sim Burgess.

Burgess told Offield that his sister had left breakfast about 6:30 and walked out of the house across the pasture. Another daughter, Elizabeth Ellen, age one, remained in the house.

When they were found, Mrs. Davis had sunk to the bottom of the tank, while her child, Marsha, remained floating on top of the water. Burgess declared his sister had never learned to swim.

Mrs. Davis and her two daughters had been visiting on the Burgess ranch, reportedly her birthplace, for the past four months. Her husband, Joe B. Davis, was notified of the tragedy in Abilene where he is employed at a filling station.

The bodies were taken to Maple funeral home in Graham, where Mrs. Davis has relatives.

The Burgess farm is located about 28 miles northeast of Breckenridge, in the corner of the county.

Offield was called to the scene along with deputy H. A. Ramsay and Justice of the Peace L. T. Woodall.

Chamberlain To Sink Deep Test North Eastland

The Texas Railroad Commission, oil and gas division, has just granted a permit to Jack Chamberlain of Eastland to drill a 4,000 test on Sec. 56 BBB&C survey. This location is almost north of Eastland and is in Eastland county, though only 350 feet south of the Stephens county line. Owing to the excellent location, the test will be closely watched by members of the oil fraternity.

It will be known as the Jack Chamberlain No. 1 Frank Good. Cable tools will be used for drilling which will begin within the next few days.

Senate GOP Leader Calls For Report On Compound Activity

One prisoner of war compound took up where another left off in South Korea today.

A riot broke out early this morning in compound Number 10 near Pusan, on the Korean mainland, less than two weeks after the prisoners in compound 76 on Koje Island seized an American general as hostage.

It began when Allied officials ordered the segregation of prisoners in the camp for medical treatment.

Communist agitators refused to permit the segregation, and when Allied soldiers moved into the compound to force the Reds to conform—the fight began.

Allied troops held their fire. Put they fought the Reds with what's described as "riot tactics." One prisoner of war was killed, and 85 were injured. One Allied soldier was slightly hurt.

But the riot was put down, the prisoners were segregated as they had been ordered. And the last report from the camp is that the GI's have the situation "well in hand."

A-Bomb Fails To Explode At Test Grounds

A scheduled atomic test failed today for the second time since the Atomic Energy Commission started using its Southern Nevada proving grounds. The commission said it doesn't know what went wrong.

Today's scheduled explosion was to have been the 18th nuclear blast at the desert proving grounds near Las Vegas. Apparently the failure was either in the wiring mass or in the device itself on top of a 500-foot steel tower. A loose wire caused the previous failure during the series of tests last fall.

Weekend Rains Fill Hageman Lake; End Drought Condition

Ranger's water problems were ended, temporarily, over the weekend. A deluge of rain fell from 3:30 p. m. Saturday through Sunday morning that filled Hageman Lake to capacity, with more water going over the spillway.

In five hours Saturday 3.13 inches of rain fell in the rain gauge at the "Times." That amount had fallen at a reading Saturday at 8:00 p. m. Rainfall that night and Sunday added another .67 of an inch for a total of 3.80 inches.

The hard rains caused creeks and streams to leave their banks, washing down fences, covering yards, and crossing the highway in enough depth to hold up traffic for some time at the Russell Creek Bridge on Highway 80, about five miles east of town.

At several places on Highway 80 East the water was crossing the highway in enough volume to drown out cars and prohibit only the larger vehicles from continuing.

Light hail fell for a short time in the business district, causing little or no damage. In the east side of town it was reported that roofs were damaged by such hea-

Another change is the method of obtaining support. This year CCC will not buy peanuts nor finance shellers as a means of supporting the price, as has been done for several years past. The method of support will be through loans and purchase agreements. This is in line with the general policy of Commodity Credit Corporation and is followed for other basic commodities. During the past several years, when supplies of edible peanuts were in excess of demand, surplus quota peanuts were purchased by CCC at support prices and sold for crushing at a substantial loss to the Government. Direct purchases and purchases through shellers provided the most effective and most economical method for handling these surplus peanuts. However, this year's acreage allotment is expected to result in production for edible use about equal to demand. Under loans and purchase agreements, producers may retain control of their peanuts and take advantage of any seasonal rise in market price.

You may, of course, sell your peanuts to shellers and other buyers, but they will not be under con-

tract with CCC to pay you support prices.

This is a good time for you to check on your farm storage facilities, if you wish to take advantage of the farm storage loan or the purchase agreement on your 1952 crop peanuts. CCC loans are available through this office to help you build suitable farm storage. Such a loan may cover up to 85 percent of the cost of such a structure, and the repayment period may extend up to five years.

Four Plans For 1952 Crop Peanut Price Support

1. Farm Storage Loan: You may obtain a loan through your county PMA Committee, and hold your peanuts in any committee-approved farm storage structure. You may sell them at any time after repaying your loan to the county committee. Loans bear interest at 3 1/2 percent per year and mature May 31, 1953, with CCC accepting delivery of peanuts if the loan is not repaid by that date. There will be no recourse on you except for loss in weight and grade that may take place during the time your peanuts are under loan.

agreement, signed by you and a representative of your county PMA committee, guarantees you a market at price support. It may cover any quantity of eligible peanuts produced on your farm. The peanuts remain in your possession, may be stored either on or off the farm, and may be sold or disposed of in any manner you desire. No funds are advanced to you but you have the right to deliver these peanuts to CCC, although you are not obligated to do so. You may deliver your peanuts at the support price after notifying the county committee within 30 days before May 31, 1953, of your intention to deliver to CCC.

3. Loans Through Peanut Cooperatives: CCC will advance funds to the peanut cooperatives to be used in making loans to you, the producer. The cooperative will sell these loan peanuts for edible use at the best price obtainable above the loan rate. You may not redeem or individually sell the peanuts you have placed under loan with the cooperative. But you will share in any profits realized by the cooperative on the sale of peanuts.

4. Warehouse Loan: You may obtain a loan through your county committee on the basis of a negotiable warehouse receipt issued by an approved warehouseman.

This receipt will enable you to market your peanuts readily at any time you find it advantageous. If you do not repay your loan the warehouse receipt becomes the property of CCC on the maturity date, which is May 31, 1953.

5. Service Charges, Inspection Fees and Storage Costs: A small charge for preparing and handling loan and purchase agreement papers will be made by the county PMA committee or the cooperative. Inspection fees to cover the cost of grading will be paid by the producer. The producer who obtains a warehouse or cooperative loan, will be required to pay the cost of storage and to absorb the normal loss in weight and grade while his peanuts are in storage.
