President Young Speaks To Full House At RJC Commencement Sun.

The First Methodist Church of Ranger was filled to capacity Sunday evening, May 25, at 8:00 p.m., when Mr. J. B. Young, president of Jones County College, Ellisville, Miss., delivered the commencement address to the graduates of Ranger Junior College.

The speech of the evening was "This Occasion a Reminder of Our Individual Responsibility."

Mr. Young paid tribute to the great contribution of Junior Colleges, and specifically Ranger Junior College, to the total education program over the nation, the state of Texas, and the community. Then he reminded the graduates of the duties and responsibilities that related to them as individuals:

1. It becomes your individual responsibility to keep upward and onward.

2. I call upon you to assume individual responsibility for right decisions.

3. I call upon you to let this occasion remind you that it is your individual responsibility to take an inventory of yourself, to take your measure, at this moment when you are about to move out from this graduation.

4. This occasion places upon you the duty and responsibility to gain greater knowledge of the world about us and to live in this world in an attitude of heart and mind that will enable each of us to contribute something. It is our individual responsibility to present some saving ideas to our present world.

5. We have come to this point in order to live our lives in the future. Education assumes a future.

Parsons Sanity Witnesses Heard

The prosecution has taken over questioning in the sanity trial in El Paso of Mrs. Mary Jean Parsons, who is charged with murdering her husband.

A state witness said yesterday that the Tulsa, Oklahoma socialite "was a very sophisticated and cold-blooded young lady."

Mrs. Walter E. Swartzman, manager of the apartment in which Lieutenant Richard O. Parsons was shot, was the first state witness in the trial in 34th District Court. She said she saw Mrs. Parsons enter and leave the apartment house several times the day her husband was killed.

The slow moving trial is expected to determine whether Mrs. Parsons is sane, in which case she will be tried for murder. Her attorneys are attempting to prove that she was insane at the time of the killing and is insane now.

Two Conventions Likely For Both GOP, Democrats

GOP Executive Committee Seat Taft Minority

MINERAL WELLS, May 27 (UP)—The Texas Republican executive committee has apparently presented Senator Robert A. Taft with 38 contested delegates to the National Convention.

At Mineral Wells yesterday, supporters of General Eisenhower were voted down every time they put a contested delegation before the committee. They promised to hold a rump convention today and elect 38 delegates to oppose the Taft group. If that happens, it will be up to the credentials committee at the Republican National Convention to determine whether the Taft or Eisenhower delegation is seated.

The executive committee met yesterday and through the night to rule on the contested delegations from 51 counties. And nearly all the contests were raised by Taft supporters at the county conventions and who bolted and elected minority delegations.

These minority delegations were—with one exception—seated by the Taft-dominated executive committee. The exception was the Galveston County Delegation where the committee gave Taft four votes and Eisenhower four.

Today, the convention itself gets underway. And the Eisenhower delegation says if Taft's group persists in carrying through their state of delegates, they will carry the fight all the way to Chicago.

O. G. Lanier, Jr. Receives Degree ACC On Monday

O. G. Lanier, Jr., received his bachelor's degree in accounting from Abilene Christian College Monday evening at eight o'clock. The ceremony took place in the college stadium for the 202 graduates.

Lanier completed his work on his degree at ACC in January of this year, and has been at the University of Texas for the past four and one-half months working on a master's degree. All told he has been doing college work for only 33 months, which shows the remarkable progress in getting all that work behind him in such a short time.

His mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. O. G. Lanier, Sr., of Ranger, attended the ceremonies in Abilene Monday evening. Lanier chose his father to escort him during the graduation and present him with his hood.

O. G. Jr., is a 1948 graduate of Ranger High where he played football all four years. Upon entering ACC he was a candidate for the college team. He succeeded in making the squad during his sophomore year but in his junior year he withdrew from the team to devote his time to his accounting studies.

He will be associated with his father in the accounting office in Ranger this summer. And barring call by the draft board he will return to the University of Texas to complete work on his master's degree this fall.

Violence Marks Florida Primary

Violence has broken out in the Florida primary. Police say an explosion, probably caused by dynamite, occurred in Jacksonville at the Walker Vocational College a few hours before a polling place for negroes opened. No injuries were reported. Democratic Senators Richard Russell of Georgia and Estes Kefauver of Tennessee are meeting for the second time in the Florida Primary. The first time, Russell defeated Kefauver in the preferential primary. Today they will be contending for the 24 Florida delegates.

The republican state convention in Connecticut and the Democratic convention in Kentucky are expected to wind up without conflict. General Eisenhower is expected to get most of the 22 Connecticut GOP delegates, and thus overtake Senator Robert Taft in the National preferential sweepstakes.

Kentucky Democrats are expected to give their 26 delegates to vice-president Alben Barkley.

Ridgway Arrives In Paris; Will Take Command

PARIS, May 27 (UP)—The new commander of the Western Europe Military Defense Forces has arrived here.

Gen. Matthew Ridgway landed by plane from the United States to take over from Gen. Eisenhower, who is returning home next week.

Some 200 helmeted French Gendarmes lined the runways of Orly Field, just outside Paris, as Ridgway's Constellation landed and taxied to the main terminal building.

In Paris more than 15,000 police and troops are guarding the city against the possibility of any demonstrations by Communists. They'll stay on the alert today and tomorrow. The police are equipped with helmets, gas masks and tear gas bombs and many are armed with carbines, ready to quell any uprising.

The general's arrival coincides with the day the western powers and Germany sign the treaty that will provide Ridgway with a 400,000 man army, including German troops, to defend Western Europe against any possible Russian aggression.

Reds Threaten Retaliation For Koje "Slaughter" Of Prisoners

KOREA, May 27, (UP)—The Reds in North Korea have threatened angrily to unleash their million-man army to get back at the U-N for what they called the "massacre" of prisoners on Koje Island, the Reds struck in six attacks today and one red jet was shot down in air battle.

North Korean General Nam Il dropped the hint at the truce talks during the day when he said the communists could not "sit by" while POWs are being "slaughtered," as he put it, in the U-N camps.

The Nam speech brought varied reactions from different U-N officials. The top Allied spokesman, Brigadier General William Nuckolls, told reporters it could be taken as a threat. Major General

But pro-national administration Democrats will hold the regular convention, hold a rump convention of their own today, and elect 52 instructed delegates to the national convention.

The course of today's convention was laid yesterday by the Democratic State Executive Committee, which met and heard the Loyallists' arguments in the cases of 27 contested county delegations. But the contests, which unlike the Republicans were over candidates, were over the pledged or unpledged delegation.

The Democratic executive committee yesterday ruled in favor of 27 anti-administration delegations and the opposing Loyallists plan to bolt today and march through the streets of San Antonio to another meeting place.

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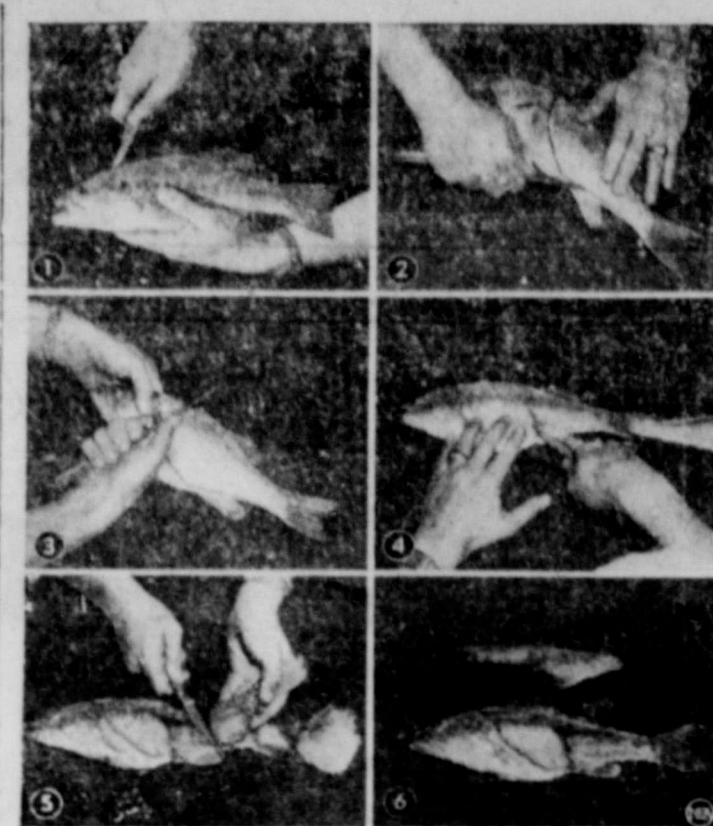

Don't Worry About IQ. Psychologist Advises. BERKELEY, Calif. (UP) — Most parents and teachers take a child's IQ test too seriously, in the opinion of Dr. J. W. MacFarlane, who has just completed a 24-year study of such things. The University of California psychologist, whose survey tested each year the IQ's of 250 selected families, said a person's score might as much as 20 points between the ages of 6 and 18. It depends to a large extent on "health, worries, moods and other factors," MacFarlane said.

Matt Cvetic, who posed as a communist for the Federal Bureau of Investigation for nine years, will relate his experiences at Will Rogers Auditorium in Fort Worth Thursday, June 5, at 8:00 p.m. The public is invited and admission is free. Cvetic is being brought to Fort Worth by the Star-Telegram and Radio Station WBAP.

Cvetic dressed in the plainest of clothes at all times, never had a bodyguard or a badge and was constantly attending all kinds of communist meetings and keeping the F. B. I. informed of each move made.

Cvetic will address the Fort Worth Junior Bar at a luncheon of the group of June 5 and will appear before press, radio and television representatives at 5:00 p.m. June 5. He will also be heard on Radio Station WBAP and seen on WBAP-TV.

The radio series, "I Was A Communist For The F. B. I." will be broadcast for 32 weeks and was especially written and produced for radio by the Frederic W. Ziv Production Company.

Deckhand Strike Halts Shipping On West Coast

A strike has been voted by deckhands in the AFL Sailors Union of the Pacific, and the crippling walk-out is expected to tie up shipping in nearly all ports on the West Coast.

Union President Harry Lundberg ordered the strike into effect last night after the union voted heavily in favor of strike action to back up their wage demands, demands that include a straight five per cent pay boost, and overtime for deckhands who work on Saturday at sea. Lundberg says that the strike will not affect ships carrying essential military cargoes.

All in all, the strike may affect about 350 ships in ports from Los Angeles, Calif., to Seattle, Wash.

House Foreign, Military Cuts Irks Mr. Truman

WASHINGTON, May 27 (UP)—The Senate goes to work today on the foreign aid bill with a plea and a warning from President Truman.

Originally, the administration asked for seven-billion-900-million dollars in foreign aid. A Senate committee proposed a one-million dollar cut across the board. The House voted to trim still another 600-million, cutting the original request by 20 per cent.

In a speech before the Jewish National Fund Dinner in Washington last night, Mr. Truman let go both barrels, at those congressmen who want to slash the foreign aid funds, and those who support the limit of 46-billion dollars the House voted for American Military spending.

On that last measure, the mil-

tary budget, President Truman blasted the house for doing a "foolish and reckless thing" in setting the 46-billion ceiling. He said this might mean cutting down the nation's armed forces in what he called "this hour of peril."

Mr. Truman emphasized his hope that the Senate would eliminate the cuts.

However, indications are that this question will be the subject of a stiff fight. How it will come out is uncertain.

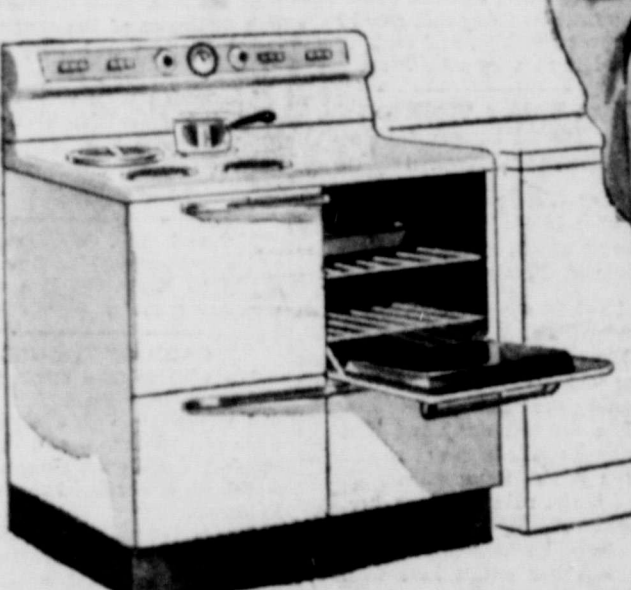

Vitamin "A" For The Quail

AUSTIN, May—How the King Ranch determined that a Vitamin deficiency was responsible for the sale losses of bobwhite quail is described in the May issue of Texas Game & Fish magazine.

An article by V. W. Lehmann, wildlife manager for the big South Texas ranch, states that tests leading up to the disclosure were made after quail died off mysteriously in the late winter of 1950-51 with the heaviest mortality from mid-February through early March.

He writes that it was determined that lack of native food containing the indispensable vitamin plus severe cold weather which restricted the bird's feeding routine caused the heavy toll in adult birds.
